Dr. Smith Withdraws Resignation; Named Manager & Superintendent

At the regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the Donley County Hospital District Thursday night Dr. George W. Smith withdrew his resignation and was named, as stated in minutes below, manager of the Donley County Hospital District and Superintendent of Adair Hospital.

Dr. Smith told the board that he was frustrated because he thought the Board was acting too slow and should be acting on the issues at hand. Following a discussion, the board gave Dr. Smith authority to act on the four items listed in the minutes below which included taking the doctors' offices out of the present 50 bed hospital facility plans and provide offices and clinic for 3 doctors adjacent to the hospital building, with provisions for easy expansions. It was pointed out that HUD loan money could not be used for this construction and same would be constructed out of the Bond Money voted by the people and would have to be constructed on separate property not covered by a HUD loan.

Dr. Albert V. Jellen, who has been practicing here the past four months, under an arrangement with Dr. Smith met with the board and after it was explained that it would be necessary to make application to become a staff member to the Hospital Administrator and be approved by the Hospital Board after they received recommendations of the Hospital Staff, told the board that he did not choose to make application. Dr. Smith is the only member of the local Hospital Staff.

Two separate letters addressed to the Board and signed by Dr. Jellen are on file at the Leader office.

Minutes of the Meeting Thursday, May 28, taken from a XERO Copy and submitted by Jane Bownds, Secretary, are as follows:

The Board of Directors of the Donley County Hospital District met in a regular meeting May 28, 1970 at 7:30 o'clock P.M. at the City Hall with the following Directors present: J. R. Bartlett, Emmett Simmons, Lloyd Risley, John Jones and Jane Bownds.

President, J. R. Bartlett, called the meeting to order.

Roll was called.

Minutes of the regular meeting of May 14th, 1970 were read and approved. Minutes of the Special called meeting of May 24th, 1970 were read and approved.

The President asked Dr. Smith to explain to the Board the requirements necessary to keep Adair Hospital open until a new facility can be constructed. Dr. Smith read letters from Medicare and Medicaid. That the Board needs to progress forward in their plans to build new hospital facilities. Dr. Smith informed the Board that insurance has been obtained to protect the Doctors and the Board of Directors from law suits filed against said Doctors and/or Board of Directors.

The Secretary read to the Board of Directors the Policy and Rules and Regulations of the Donley County Hospital District. The President ordered that this Instrument be made a part of these minutes.

Dr. Jellen was presented to the Board of Directors. The President recognized Dr. Jellen. Dr. Jellen asked the Board of Directors permission to practice in Donley County. The President informed Dr. Jellen that he should make application in the proper manner and the Board would consider his application. Dr. Jellen thanked the Board for hearing him.

Dr. Smith read a letter, received on this date, from a doctor in answer to Dr. Smith's appeal for a doctor to consider the possibilities of joining the doctor's staff in Donley County. The Doctor informed Dr. Smith that he would meet with him the 3rd or 4th weekend of June for an interview.

Emmett Simmons explained the responsibilities of the Board of Directors. He reported that while he was in Washington, D. C. he talked to an authority on Hill-Burton funds and was informed that after July 1, 1971 all new hospitals will be required to have an extended care facility in connection with the acute hospital.

The President asked the Board this question: "Do we want a hospital?" The entire Board members present responded "Definitely we want a hospital."

Jane Bownds made a motion that Dr. George W. Smith be Manager of the Donley County Hospital District and Superintendent of Adair Hospital until the new hospital facility is ready to be opened. Motion was seconded by Emmett Simmons. After a call of the question, such motion was passed by the show of the hand of John Jones, Lloyd Risley, J. R. Bartlett, Emmett Simmons and Jane Bownds.

After a full discussion of the issues at hand, Emmett Simmons made a motion that the Manager of the Donley County Hospital District be instructed to:

IRS Tornado Loss Meetings Set Up

As a result of the tornado and storms in the ten-county High Plains disaster area, a tax assistance clinic will be held in Plainview on June 9. The meeting will take place at 7:30 p.m. in the City Library Building. The meeting will be conducted by John Sloan, administrative Officer of the Lubbock Internal Revenue Service Office, and Arlen Ruthart, Administrative Officer of the Plainview Office. Mr. Sloan is coordinating the disaster tax information program throughout the ten county area. Mr. Ruthart is an Internal Revenue Agent Instructor for the Dallas District, in addition to his duties in Plainview.

The purpose of the clinic is to inform taxpayers on what steps to take to claim tax deductions for property damage and losses and how to claim immediate tax benefits for Tornado and storm damage.

A second meeting will be held in Silverton on June 11, at 8:00 p.m. at the Silverton State Bank.

A similar meeting will be held in the Citizens Bank and Trust Building Hospitality Room in Pampa at 8 p.m. June 17 and in the Academic Building at Clarendon College at 8 p.m. June 18.

The public is invited to these and other meetings to be scheduled in other areas.

Disaster Loans Now Available To Rural Residents Thru FHA

Donley and Gray Counties have now been designated by the Secretary of Agriculture as an Emergency loan area due to losses caused by the tornadoes of April 18, 1970.

Eligible applicants having qualifying losses and unable to obtain credit elsewhere, may be considered for Emergency loans at 3% and in special instances, cancellation of principal, not to exceed \$1800.00 through Farmers Home Administration.

Eligible applicants who are able to obtain credit elsewhere may also be considered for an Emergency loan at 5 1/2%, but no part of the loan may be cancelled.

Further details of loans available under this authorization may be obtained by contacting Claude Moore, Donley County Supervisor, at the Agriculture Building in Clarendon from 1:00 to 5:00 p.m., each Friday. Keep Vegetables Fresh Longer

Fresh vegetables are still alive and breathing, even though they have been harvested and are neatly displayed on the grocery shelf, reminds Tom Longbrake, area Extension vegetable specialist at Weslaco.

Consumers should remember that vegetables breathe, or respire, much like other living things. Oxygen is used up in the breathing process. With the help of enzymes, the oxygen combines with plant sugars, giving off carbon dioxide and heat in exchange. This is the reverse of photosynthesis, states Longbrake.

The breathing process is a continuous one, but it takes place at a faster rate in certain vegetable commodities such as corn, lettuce and celery. These vegetables are "living the fastest," therefore, they are the most perishable, and require the greatest care from food shoppers, the specialist adds.

As the life processes proceed in fresh vegetables, the commodity ages. It's important to retard these aging rates since hormones derive the same nutrients that gradually are self-consumed by the produce in their own life process.

Longbrake lists three major factors in keeping produce fresh: Refrigeration is the best way to hold down respiration and other life processes. About 50 percent of the sugars in sweet corn are lost in a single day at 70 degrees F., while only 5 percent will be lost during a day at 32 degrees F. Yellowing of green vegetables also is an indication of aging.

Moisture loss is the most conspicuous loss of freshness in produce since it causes wilting and shriveling. Most vegetables contains 85-95 percent water. So, unless the humidity around the produce is kept up to 85-100 percent, moisture loss and shriveling will occur.

Decay is a third quality factor affected by temperature and humidity countless micro-organisms, bacteria and mold spores, which cause decay, are present in air everywhere. Warm temperatures, moisture, and skin damage allow infection to develop and spread. Cool temperatures and careful handling minimize decay.

Refrigeration, prevention of moisture loss, and careful handling of fresh produce result in fresher and more nutritious fruits and vegetables in the supermarket and at home, reminds Longbrake.

Veteran Policyholders Receive Payments

The Veterans Administration suggests that GI insurance policyholders who receive VA compensation or pension payment may want to consider having their insurance premiums deducted from their monthly checks.

In making that suggestion, Administrator of Veterans Affairs Donald E. Johnson said about a quarter of a million veterans already pay their insurance premiums this way.

He pointed out that in order to use this convenient method, the veterans monthly benefit check must be equal to or greater than the premium to be paid.

One of the advantages of the deduction method is that premiums are automatic, reducing the likelihood that the insurance will lapse.

Other advantages are that the veteran saves time, check or money order costs, and postage, and it costs the government less to process, Johnson explained. He also said veterans with ac-

tive VA insurance policies may use the monthly deduction method to repay loans on their policies.

Veterans who wish to have insurance premiums withheld from their monthly benefit checks should request VA Form 29-888 from their nearest VA office. The completed form should be forwarded to the VA office where premiums are paid.

The VA Administrator added that veterans who draw retirement pay from the military services also may have VA insurance premiums deducted from their checks, but explained that technically they cannot repay policy loans through this method.

To switch to the deduction method, military retirees should request their finance offices to withhold VA insurance premiums and send them directly to the VA.

Both military retirees and veterans who draw benefit checks from the VA must pay insurance premiums through the month the first deduction is to be made by the VA, Johnson explained.

NEWS into FOCUS

IS THIS WHAT WE WANT?

Proposals for "Sweeping innovations" in the structure of the United Nations including an "elaborate timetable for charter revisions" to the United Nations Charter were discussed by State Senatorial Candidate Max Sherman recently in a paper submitted to the American Bar Association. Proposed were the following specific changes in the United Nations:

1. Universal membership of every independent state including Red China.
2. Worldwide disarmament.
3. An international police force.
4. Abolition of the veto power of the Security Council.
5. Popular election of General Assembly representatives.
6. A United Nations nuclear authority.
7. An outer space agency.
8. Compulsory jurisdiction of all disputes voted in the International Court of Justice.
9. A world development program to foster economic and social advancement of nations in need of it.
10. Power to tax world citizens.
11. A charter provision that all powers not granted to the United Nations be reserved to the member nations.
12. A clause in the Charter recognizing that the authority of the United Nations would extend to all nations.

Though he characterized the list of innovations as desirable and praiseworthy, he questioned whether the political reality of immediate international politics would permit them to be adopted. If the political reality of the time precludes the adoption of these innovations, Sherman questioned whether the United Nations could bring "peace in our time?"

The twenty-two page dissertation, generously interlarded with footnotes, develops Mr. Sherman's view of the United Nations in its role as a keeper of the peace.

"It is my position in this essay that the best hope for world peace is through an international common law developed within the present structure of the United Nations. The life-fores of peace exist within the Charter, and it is from these forces that the growth of peace must be nurtured," HE SAID.

Referencing to publications of the NATIONAL COUNCIL OF CHURCHES, NELSON ROCKEFELLER, and Senator WILLIAM FULLBRIGHT as "impressive support," Sherman also discussed an alternative plan for a federal union for a "concert of free nations" which would be separate from the United Nations but co-existing with it.

If we, the voters of this nation, do not want to live under a world government, in which we would be out-voted twenty to one, WHEN are we going to quit electing to public office candidates who are dedicated to the establishment of a one-world government (which would be a socialistic dictatorship OF THE "ELITE" — synonymous to a WORLD MONARCHY)?

Clearing Debris

This office will administer the program offered by the Office of Emergency Preparedness to clear debris left on farmland and homesteads by the April 18 tornado.

If your place has had debris left by the tornado and you are interested in getting it cleared away, come to the ASCS Office and make application.

Payments offered amount to 100% of the actual cost of clearing the debris.

Compliance

The final date to certify your program acres is August 15. However, to get an early payment, you must make an early certification. The first drafts should be issued in July.

When crops are all planted and you know you're in compliance, you should measure your crops and come on in and make your certification. There will be no opportunity to adjust after the certification is made.

Every 7th farm: will be spot

checked and the spot checking will begin early. It is possible that you might certify one day and be spot checked the next.

Crops, to be eligible for price support payments, must be planted and cared for in a workman-like manner. If they are not, price support payments will not be made.

Cross Compliance

If you are signed up in the Cotton, Feed Grain, and/or Wheat Programs on one farm, do not permit any other farm in which you have an interest to have more acreage than the base or allotment. Cash leasing a non-complying farm does relieve the owner of the offsetting compliance provision.

Soil Conservation District News

WATERWAYS

Several farmers in Donley County are constructing grassed waterways this year. Among these are Donald Smith of McLean, and Debert Robertson and Jack Land of Clarendon. Each of these men saw a need for installing some type of measure that would safely carry water through their farm.

Waterways are normally installed where there is too much outside water to be handled by conventional, parallel, or diversion terraces. They are constructed by shaping a channel that is deep enough and wide enough to carry any rain expected during a 50 year period. After shaping of the waterway the sides and bottom should be sprigged or seeded to grass. Normally bermudagrass will be sprigged in a clean tilled seedbed while native grasses are seeded in a dead litter cover. This vegetative cover is used along with the wide bottom to slow down the speed of the water and spread it over a wide area for safe removal.

A waterway aids in channeling water down to one specific area and safely removing the water from the land. Through proper construction, vegetation, and management, a waterway will prevent the development of impassable gullies, save valuable top and sub-soil, and prevent damage to crops due to washing and flooding. Under proper management it may also be used for additional grazing along with rangeland, pastureland, or grazing sorghums on cropland.

If you are interested in controlling water on your land to aid in controlling erosion and damage to crops then contact your Soil and Water Conservation District Supervisor or your local Soil Conservation Service. They will be glad to assist you with this problem or any other conservation problem you might have.

Ounce of Prevention May Prevent Trouble

The best method of dealing with snakebite is to avoid it, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. When spring comes in, snakes come out, and an ounce of prevention may save the outdoorsman from serious trouble.

Campers, hikers, fishermen, birders, outdoor photographers, flower enthusiasts and summer rabbit hunters invade snake territory when they go afield, and a watchful eye and a pair of boots are good protection from snakebite.

Region I Director Henry Burkett said a snakebite kit may be the lowest priced form of protection an outdoorsman can have, and if a trip afield is at night, a good flashlight may help avoid the hungry rattler out searching for food.

First aid is an important part of helping the victim, but not so much that a physician will have to undo damage before he can begin medical treatment.

While the fatality incidence for snakebite is extremely low, a bite may have serious side effects if not properly treated. Thorough familiarity with first aid is as important as the snakebite kit itself and may save a victim needless medical treatment.

Texas has some 16 varieties of poisonous snakes, and a bite victim should always attempt to identify the snake so the physician will be able to properly treat the wound.
