Tornado Takes Fifteen Lives

News From City Hall

Planting Dates
Planted cotton destroyed by natural causes before June 10 must be replanted in order to be eligible for price-support payments. Cotton destroyed by natural causes after this date can be replanted to cotton but it will not be required. Cotton destroyed after June 10 must be inspected before the land is plowed if it will not be planted back to cotton.

Planted grain sorghums destroyed before July 1 must be replanted in order to be eligible for price support.

Volunteer Wheat
Volunteer wheat for grain will be classified as wheat only if it reaches maturity and the harvestable yield would be less than three bushels. Volunteer wheat for grain which is destroyed by natural causes may be credited as wheat acreage if the operator so requests and the County Committee determines the crop would have yielded three bushels or more per acre.

Measurement Service
If you plan to request measurement service for wheat, please make your request by May 1. We cannot guarantee that the measurement service can be completed by the final certification date if you make your request after May 1.

Damage Estimated to Exceed Two Million Dollars Property Loss

Two separate Tornadoes hit the Clarendon area Saturday morning with the first being reported striking the Royce Hall home northwest of Hedley at 12:40 a. m. This was believed to be the same storm that struck Plainview, Silverton and other towns earlier. The Hall home was demolished but neither Mr. Hall or his wife were injured seriously. The second and most costly tornado (lives and property) struck first in the Martin community six miles west of Clarendon. The home of Mr. and Mrs. Pete Land was completely demolished along with outbuildings but both were in the storm cellar. Across the road to the west, the home of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Cole was unroofed and outbuildings destroyed. Cole's clock stopped at 2:01. The storm moved on to the northeast across Highway 287 and did considerable damage to outbuildings etc at the Paul Bell home. Next in line was the Odell Osburn home which was completely destroyed along with outbuildings and Mr. Osburn died a short time following the passage of the storm. Mrs. Osburn received serious injuries and remains on the critical list in Northwest Texas Hospital. Their daughter, Judy, summoned help from the Bell family. Her injuries were less serious.

After leaving the Osburn place several miles to the southwest, the Tornado struck the trailer section at Sherwood Shores where 182 trailer homes were completely demolished; Only one remained in the entire settlement. Twelve lives were lost and 36 were injured. Property loss was estimated at near 1 1/2 million at Sherwood Shores, not counting the loss to Greenbelt Electric and West Texas Utilities power lines and the telephone companies. The debris and personal effects from the trailer homes were scattered over a wide strip of country as far away as Mobeetie. Owners of the homes who were still able spent endless hours searching the mile wide area for personal effects Sunday thru Tuesday.

The trailer home of Mr. and Mrs. Archie Pool on highway 70 was in the direct path of the storm. Practically everything was blown away and Mr. and Mrs. Pool both died as a result of the tornado. Mr. and Mrs. Pat Robertson live in the D. G. Bray home to the north of the Pool place where considerable minor damage was done. The Robertsons drove to town to sound the alarm.

It was only a short time later after only two calls on the radio by Sheriff Clyde James, that help came from all around, to aid in any way possible. The local Fire Department was called out and an appeal was sent out for additional ambulances, doctors, nurses etc. Everyone who helped in any way was wonderful and all have the thanks and appreciation of the entire Clarendon area.

The storm had not spent its wrath at the Pool home but traveled on to the northeast where outbuildings were destroyed at the C. P. Hamilton ranch and then plunged into the valley below and destroyed the home of County Commissioner Jess Finley and family. With the family car and pickup damaged, Jess walked to a nearby field with a badly cut foot where he started his tractor and carried his wife and daughter to the C. P. Hamilton home and they were taken to the McLean hospital. None were seriously injured.

At the Clarendon Lions Club meeting Tuesday noon, a moment of silent prayer was offered as a memorial tribute to those who lost their lives or were injured in the storm. This tribute was followed by a prayer by Lion Carl Nunn.

Special appreciation is expressed to Jim Pratt and KVII-TV of Amarillo. When other stations left the air following the all-clear for Amarillo, Jim and his crew stayed on the job in an effort to warn the people of the Clarendon area and to the northeast. He had a man in the Hedley area and later at Clarendon who barely missed the tornado as he drove toward Pampa. After reaching Pampa, he turned around and returned to the tragic scene.

Neighbors, friends and volunteers in general have pitched in at each of the places mentioned to help clear and restore whatever they can. We have wonderful people here and all around us. Let us all be thankful that more were not killed or injured.

Clarendon College Rodeo April 24-25

The 1970 Clarendon College Rodeo will be held April 24th and 25th at the Clarendon Rodeo Arena. Lloyd Barby of Beaver, Oklahoma, producer of the 1969 rodeo, will provide the stock. There will be 3 performances: Friday night, Saturday afternoon and Saturday night.

The 6 events are: Bull Riding, Bareback Bronc Riding, Ribbon Roping, Tie Down Calf Roping, Girl's Barrel Racing, and Girl's Goat Tying. The entry fee for the boys events will be \$7.50 and the entry fee for the girls events will be \$5.00.

A Rodeo Queen contest will be held April 25th, which does not require an entry fee. The Panhandle Playboys will provide the music for the western dance on Friday and Saturday nights.

A total of 125 contestants competed a total of 245 times for the 1969 rodeo. Entries were from 11 colleges and 30 high schools. Three States were represented: Kansas, Oklahoma, and Texas.

Night performances will be at 7 p.m. Friday and Saturday, April 24-25 with the Saturday afternoon performance on April 25 at 2 p.m. All performances will be in the Rodeo Arena at the County Fair Grounds. 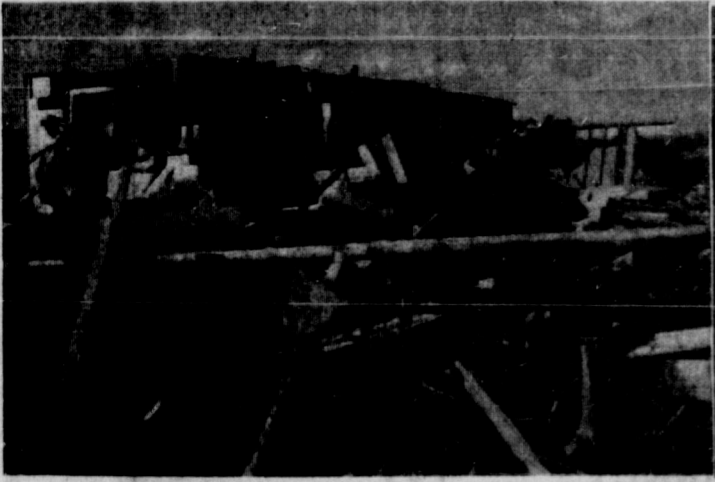

Congressman Bob Price

"I opposed the Family Assistance Act for three main reasons. First, in letters, telegrams, and personal conversations, Panhandle voters urged me to vote against the proposed welfare reform. I agreed with their views, and cast my vote accordingly.

"Second, the Family Assistance Act, despite all its talk of workfare and job incentives, is basically a program designed to give people guaranteed income. As such, it gives individuals something for nothing. In my view, this is the least effective way to help people help themselves.

"The Act also creates fifteen million new welfare recipients, at an added cost of over \$2 billion. This does not reduce welfare problems and costs — it increases them.

"Finally, I opposed the Act because House Liberals have taken President Nixon's good faith attempt to reform the national welfare scandal, and have turned it into a political football. They are desperate for a campaign issue. Since the President is doing an excellent job running the country, the Liberals are trying to fabricate issues to discredit him.

"I will not take part in any such efforts. Moreover, I am confident that the American people will see through and reject this shabby attempt to disparage our President."

Social Security News

Q—I enrolled for Medicare last year but have not received any cash benefits because I earn too much money. I decided to retire at the end of the year so in January I sold my equipment and rented my farm land. What do I need to do to have payments start?

A. It appears that you are now retired and entitled to payments. You should see your social security representative at once in order to get your checks started. Bring a copy of the bill of sale, if available.

Q. My father had cancer and filed for disability insurance from social security. No payment was made for the first six months of his disability. Is this correct?

A. Yes. The social security law provides for this six-month waiting period during which payments are not made. The type of illness does not alter this waiting period.

Q. There are three small children who survived my sister who died five years ago. They never received any social security benefits although their mother had worked on a job covered by social security before her marriage.

Why don't the children receive benefits?

A. Someone should file a new application for these children. Recent changes in the social security law now permit payments to many children whose mothers are deceased.

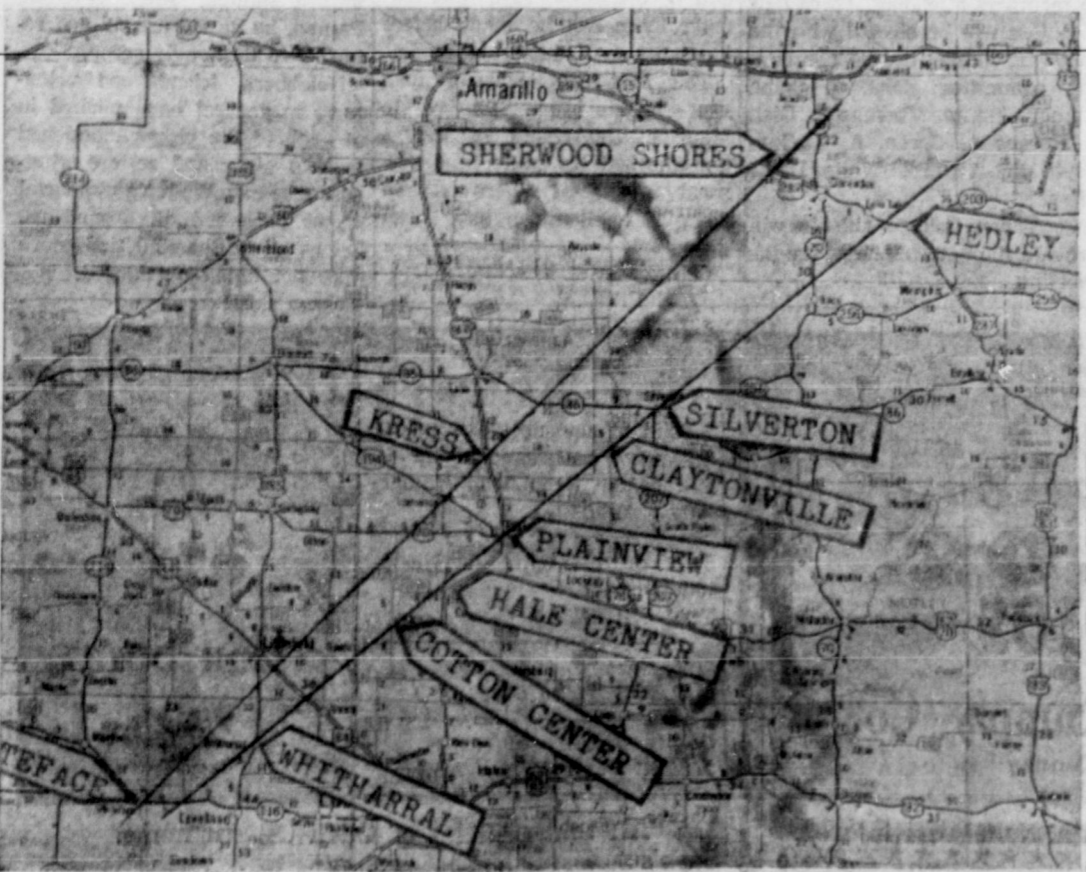

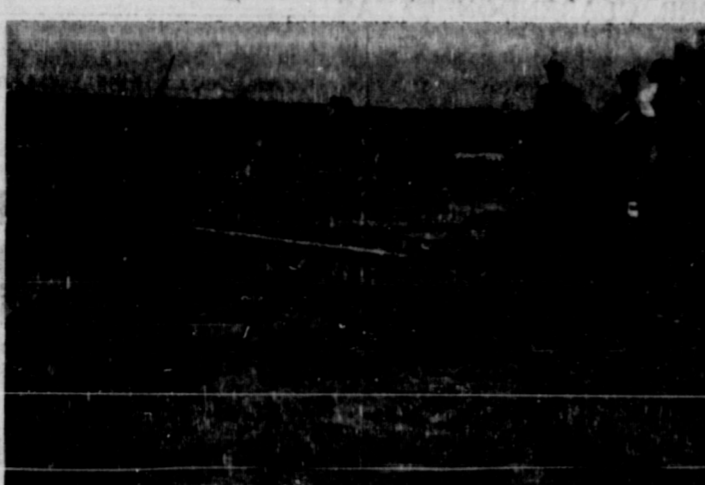

SPRINGTIME BRINGS ITS OWN SAFETY HAZARDS

The bluebonnets and other spring flowers are in bloom over Texas, and the thoughts of the average Texas home-owner turn to lawn and garden.

As Texans by the thousands begin to putter around their yards, the Texas Safety Association cautions that springtime can bring its own special hazards that cause injury and even death.

The safety group reminds that the first thing to do is get those garden tools in top shape before you start using them. Split, broken, or sharp-edged handles can cause serious injuries, not to mention troublesome splinters.

Insecticides can also be a dangerous part of springtime gardening. Over a billion pounds of insecticides are used annually in the United States. These compounds vary greatly in their toxicity, many are harmless, but some are lethal.

The Texas Safety Association reminds that there are some simple rules to follow to prevent accidents while handling insecticides. The first is to read and follow the directions printed on the product label. Insecticides should be stored where young children cannot accidentally get them. Some chemical sprays require that a person wear protective clothing, since they are very toxic if ingested through breathing or absorbed through the skin.

Insecticides should not be used on windy days. The chemicals could be blown back on the person spraying, or blown into neighboring areas where it is unwanted.

Fertilizers are not generally thought of as dangerous, but they too should be handled with care. Ammonia, nitrate, a common fertilizer, is also used in the manufacture of explosives. Under the right conditions it can be exploded by mechanical shock. Care should be exercised in the storage of fertilizers to prevent dangerous accidents.

Here are some other simple rules to follow that will prevent those troublesome springtime accidents in lawn and garden.

1. Carry any cutting tool with the blade facing downward.
2. Never leave a hoe, rake, or fork lying or standing with the head pointing up.
3. Never leave a scythe or sickle banking in a tree. Hang them, heads up on a wall.
4. Always cut away from you in using a knife.

Agriculture Is Largest Industry In U. S.

One farmer produces the food and fiber consumed by 42 of his fellow citizens and his efficiency continues to improve, says County Agent Ronald Gooch.

Yet urban Americans, who make up approximately 94 percent of the population, are often unaware that agriculture is still a "cornerstone of life," he points out.

Many children may think milk originates in a carton, that meat and poultry begin their trip to market wrapped in plastic, and that cotton shirts grow that way, Gooch says.

The county agent explains that agriculture, the producer of these goods, is the U. S.'s largest industry and employs more workers than any other industry.

Agriculture is a principal source of new wealth in America, Gooch says. Each dollar of wealth taken from the soil yields about \$7 of income throughout the rest of the economy.

Accent On Health

Extra bonus for prompt action on your part! Yours absolutely free — well, almost free — a premise with no mosquitoes.

You can save this mosquito-free home and yard if you'll spend just a little of your time in a do-it-yourself vector control program, says the Texas State Department of Health.

In addition to eliminating mosquitoes, you also can free your premises of flies and rodents with a little extra precaution. The cost can be just a little effort on your part.

Spring is the time of year when mosquitoes start breeding. So take an inventory of your property. Walk around the outside of the house and take a good look. What do you see? Did you notice whether the gutters were level and not sagging? Mosquitoes like to breed in the water that collects in sagging or stopped up gutters. Just a few minutes time on your part will eliminate this breeding site.

How many bottles, cans, tires, or other water-holding containers are valueless, again it is a simple matter to place them in the garbage pick up.

Should you have a container you want to keep, place it in a shed so it won't collect water.

Mosquitoes won't breed on your premise if you don't leave any water standing around. If there's a knothole in one of your trees, it can be plugged with cement mortar, roofing tar, or anything that will keep the water out.

If you have pets, develop a routine of washing the watering bowl a couple of times a week. And while you are at it, you should clean the birdbath the same number of times. This will also keep the growth of algae down and tend to do away with that ugly green, slimy look.

Since mosquitoes always develop in water, it would be well to stock your fish pond or lily pond with gambusia (top-water minnows) or goldfish. The fish will eat the wigglertails.

Anything you can do to eliminate mosquitoes will be to your advantage since the insects are a nuisance and can cause disease.

A Department of Agriculture study just completed shows that nearly two-thirds of the land in Texas needs one or more conservation practices to stabilize the soil and prevent erosion.

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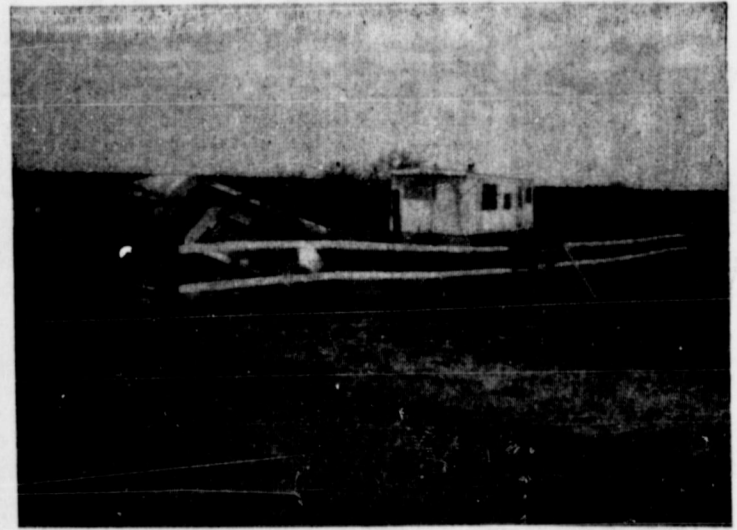
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Pool Services Held Here Sunday P.M.
