

Voter Registration Lagging With Only 3 Weeks Left To Sign Up

Donley County voters are again warned that they must apply for a voter registration certificate by the end of this month if they want to participate in this year's general elections.

Up to the present time only 1124 have signed up which is slightly over half of the anticipated number eligible to sign up. This is a strong indication there may be some long lines at the County Tax Office if you put this little chore off much longer.

Everyone, regardless of age, must register if they want to vote. There are no age exemptions and it does not cost a cent to register.

This is a general election year and politics are beginning to warm up considerably with a number of hot races in prospect. Aspirants have until Monday, February 2nd to throw their hat into the political pot.

Those desiring to sign up for precinct offices can check with the map in the County Judge's office in regard to the new boundaries for the various precincts since the redistricting recently. It is understood that all precincts will remain the same in the rural areas but the city of Clarendon has been divided up to include a portion of Precincts 1, 2 and 4.

Be sure and take time to sign up to vote so you will be able to go to the polls and voice your opinion when the time comes.

Cotton Yields
Let us remind you that if you think you may be able to prove a higher cotton yield under the new instructions, be sure to come to the office on or before January 9 and make your appeal. The County Committee has set the above date as the final one to accept production records.

1970 Feed Grain Program
Producers will receive notice of their 1970 Feed Grain bases and an explanatory leaflet on the 1970 program in January. Signup for the Feed Grain, Wheat and Cotton programs will begin on February 2 and continue through March 20.

The 1970 Feed Grain program will be much like the 1969 program. Minimum diversion of 20 percent of the base will be required for participation in the program. There will be no payment on the first 20 percent, except for the small farms. Farms with a base of 25 acres or less will be able to qualify for payment on the full acreage dividend.

Substitution provisions relating to wheat and food grain will continue as in previous years. There will be no advance payments made under the 1970 Feed Grain program.

Destroyed Acreage
If you harvested no cotton in 1969 or if you harvested only a part of the cotton you planted and reported, it might be best for you to come to the office and talk with us about it.

ACP
The County Committee has increased the individual ACP cost-share limitation from \$750.00 in 1969 to \$1000.00 for 1970. This limitation applies to all farms in which a producer has an interest in Donley County.

Dates to Remember
January 9—Last day to appeal cotton yields under the revised instructions—Also, the last day for bringing in production records.
February 1—Final date to sign up for ACP cost-share on listing and chiseling cotton land.
February 15—Last day to complete and report the listing and chiseling practice.
February 2—Sign up—for 1970 Feed Grain, Wheat and Cotton program begins.
March 8—Final date to request additional cotton acreage from released cotton acreage and to release unused cotton acreage allotment.

Cotton harvest entered final stages in the Eastern Panhandle and appeared to be around 90 percent complete in this area. The Memphis Cotton Classing office reporting 100,925 samples classed to January 2.

Grades changed little the past week with 67 percent in the light notted class. Forty percent staple lengths were in the 15/16 range and 26 percent in the 31/32 range. Mike readings were predominantly 3.5 to 4.9.

The market remained steady with prices ranging from 18.50 to 19.78. Seed continued to bring \$49 per ton at gin points.

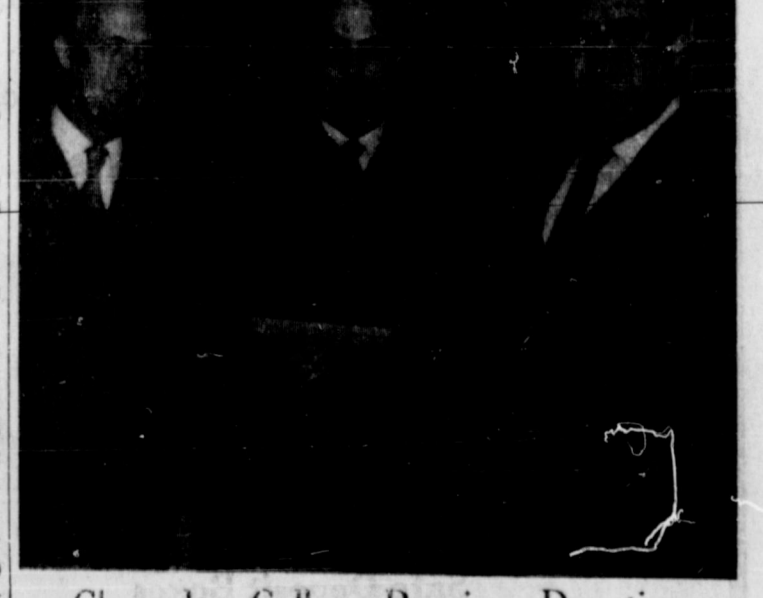

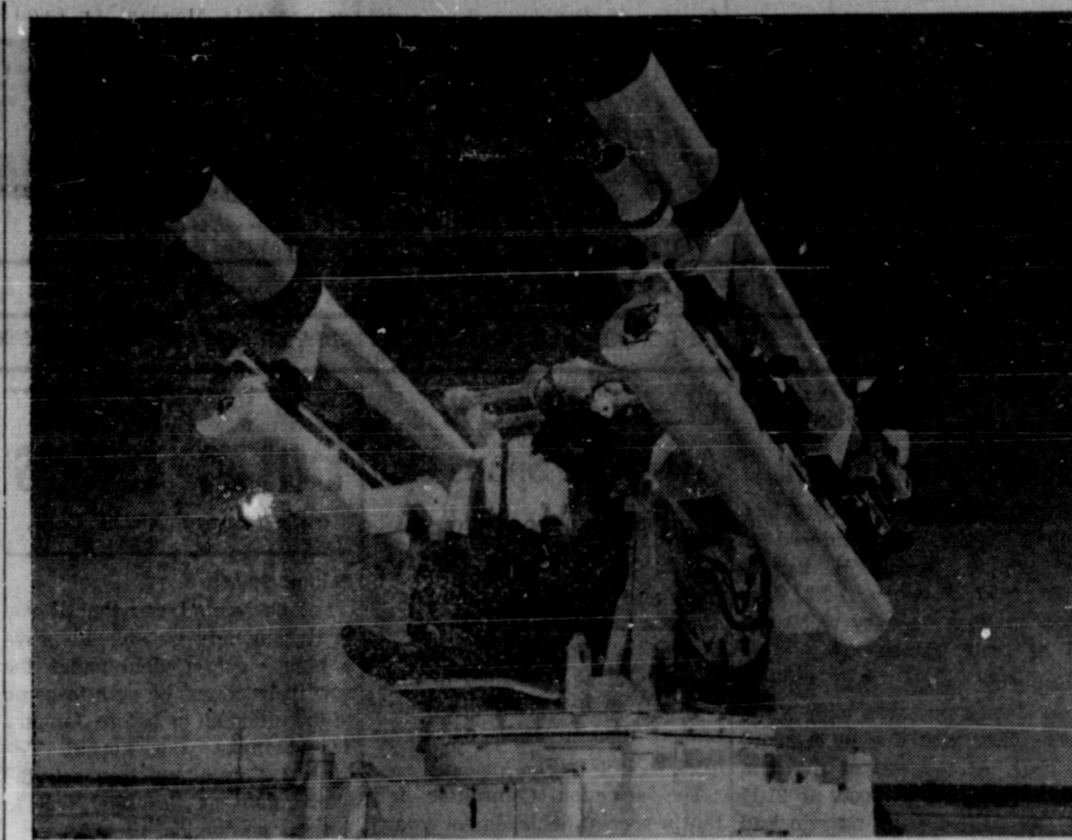

Estimated Income Tax Deadline For Farmers

Farmers who earned at least two-thirds of their 1969 gross income from farming should file their 1969 declaration of estimated Federal income tax by January 15, 1970. Form 1040 ES (F) should be used for this purpose.

However, Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for Northern Texas, said that farmers do not have to file an estimate if they file their 1969 Federal income tax return and pay all the tax due by Monday, February 16, 1970.

"Farmer's Tax Guide," Publication 225, furnishes information on this subject and may be obtained free by dropping a postcard to Supply, Internal Revenue Service, P. O. Box 1738, Dallas, Texas, 75221 or your county farm agent.

Fishermen who expect to receive at least two-thirds of their gross income from fishing follow the same rules as those for farmers.

CROP RESIDUE MANAGEMENT

CROP RESIDUE MANAGEMENT is a term or conservation practice where residues are left on the soil surface through the critical wind erosion period—about April. Spring planted sorghums are left through April and fall planted crops such as rye and wheat should be left through August 15.

Residues may be left undisturbed, mowed, shredded, or knocked down by stalk cutter. Normally loose residues need to be "TUCKED IN" by tillage to prevent blowing away. Best management is to leave standing because they will catch more snow.

On irrigated land the stalks may be shredded in late winter and plowed in with dish leaving part of the heavy stubble in and near the soil surface.

U.S. SAVINGS BONDS NOW PAY 5 PER CENT

Secretary of the Treasury David M. Kennedy today announced an increase in the interest rate on United States Savings Bonds from 1.25 per cent to 5 per cent.

The new 5-per-cent rate applies to all outstanding Series E and H Bonds sold on or after June 1, 1969, if held to maturity. The higher rate also applies to older Bonds. Beginning with the first semiannual interest period starting on or after June 1, 1969, rates on outstanding E and H Bonds will be increased to yield 5 per cent, when held to maturity or extended maturity. The original maturity of the Series E Bond has been shortened from 7 years to 5 years, 10 months; H Bonds will continue to mature in 10 years.

"Freedom Shares" (U. S. Savings Notes) — Sold in combination with E Bonds, since May 1, 1967 — will be removed from sale effective June 30, 1970.

The U. S. Forest Service is reducing concentrations and use of endrin a persistent pesticide which controls rodents that eat conifer seeds used for reforestation of National Forest lands.

Endrin is one of the nine long-lived pesticides suspended from use July 9, 1969. In Department of Agriculture pest control programs while reviews of dangers and alternatives were made. Review and evaluation of endrin use for conifer seed treatment has just been completed.

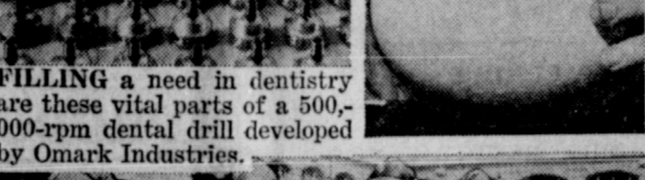

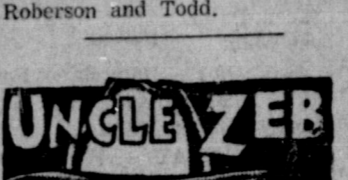

Tips Subject To Tax Withholding

Tips are taxable income and also subject to withholding when they are over a certain amount. Those who receive cash tips of \$20 or more in any calendar month from one employer, should report them to that employer according to Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for North Texas. Mr. Campbell said cash tips are subject to withholding of income and Social Security taxes and must be reported to the employer on or before the 15th day of the following month.

For more information, write for IRS Publication 531, "Reporting Your Tips for Federal Tax Purposes." It explains the requirements of the law and contains illustrations of the forms needed to make the necessary reports to employers.

Mr. Campbell emphasized that tip income counts toward Social Security and Railroad Retirement benefits and can result in higher benefits for the employee and his family.

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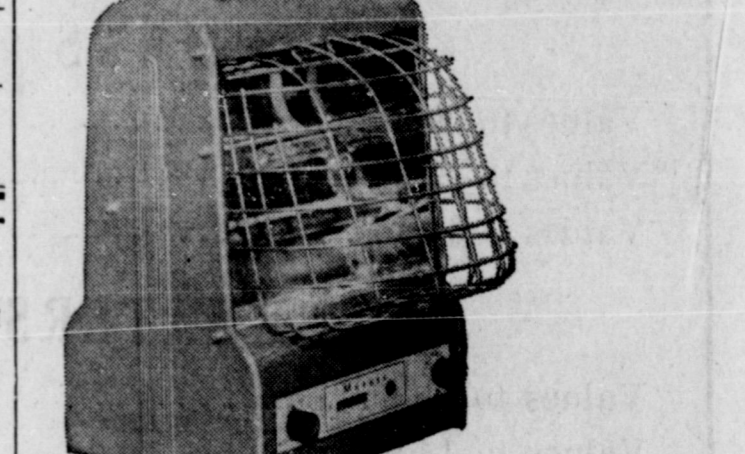
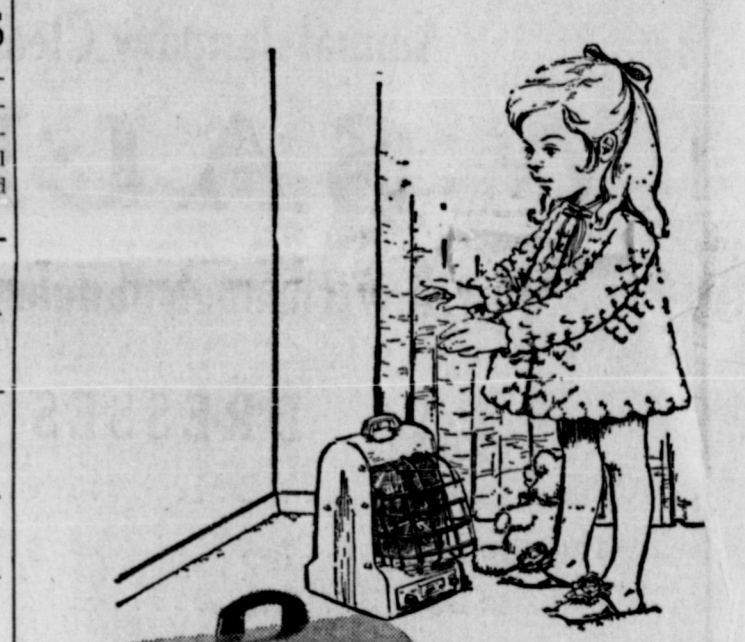

Tree Planting Season Is Now At Hand

The planting season for bare-rooted plants such as mulberry, roses and fruit trees is at hand. Selection of such plants along with planting sites should be made soon, advises County Agent Ronald Cooch.

Don't wait until the trees have been bought to prepare the holes for planting for successful plant survival depends upon the production of small root hairs which develop on the larger roots. It is best, points out the county agent, as soon as possible after your favorite nurseryman receives his bare-rooted plants.

The plants should then be planted immediately. This means their root system will not have a chance to dry out and they can become well established before plants leaf out in the spring.

When these plants are bought late in the season, the root hairs

will have developed in the "healing in pit" and many will be either broken or lost when the plants are removed.

Plants which do not transplant well by the bare-root method are sold in containers and these should be handled with care to prevent breakage of the soil ball when they are removed from the container.

A broken soil ball can mean that numerous small root hairs will be damaged or destroyed and the plant will show signs of wilting in a very short time. Cut the can on both sides, pry the side away gently and grasp the bottom and lift out.

Measure the depth of the hole and compare it with the plant to be planted. Adjust the amount of soil in the hole so that the plant will be set at the proper depth. This avoids the unnecessary removal of the plant from the hole to make planting depth adjustments and greatly lessens the risk of breaking the soil ball.

Social Security News

Q—Are social security benefits paid at the beginning or at the end of the month?

A.—Benefit checks are regularly paid on the third day of each month and represent payment for the preceding month. If the third day of the month falls on Sunday or a national holiday, you receive the check on the second day of the month.

Q—My 73-year-old husband is totally disabled. He receives a social security check. Could he also receive disability insurance benefits?

A.—No. He is not eligible for disability insurance benefits. The purpose of disability payments is to provide protection for a work-

er who becomes severely disabled before he reaches age 65.

Q—My daughter started to college in September. She was in an automobile accident last weekend, and the doctor says she cannot return to school until February. Can she continue to receive her checks during this fall semester?

A.—Yes, since she will be out of school no more than four months, she may continue to receive her checks.

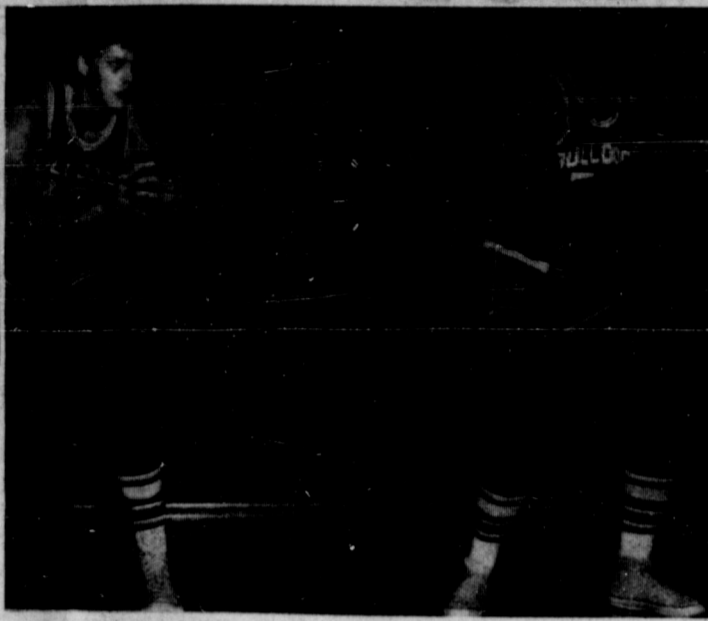
Q—When a wife receives her social security on the husband's record, do you issue two checks?

A.—No. However, the checks may be paid separately upon the request of the husband or wife.

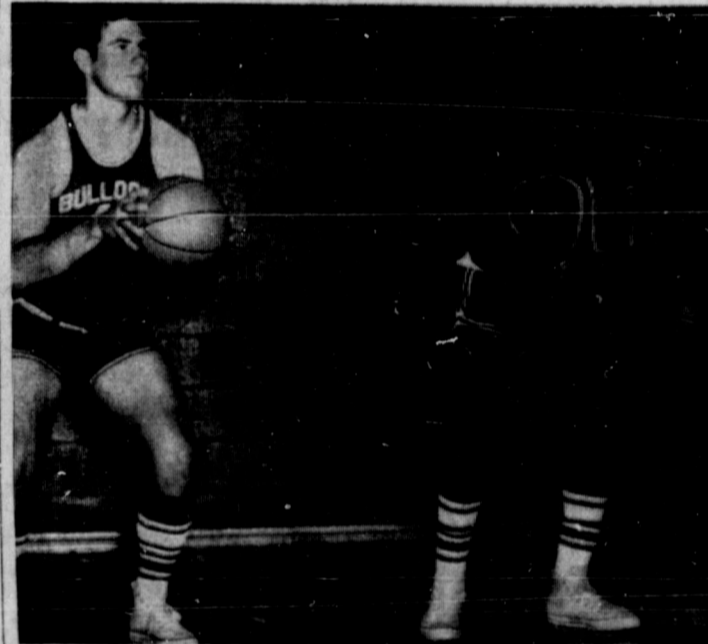

COLLEGE STATION ENGINEER NOTES CHANGES IN ELECTRIC MOTOR NAMEPLATES

Electric motor manufacturers have made a change in markings of motor nameplates and knowing their meaning can help buyers select a motor that's right for the job.

W. S. Allen, Extension agricultural engineer, says the older-type motor marking indicated the "degrees rise" which showed how much warmer the motor would be than the surrounding air temperature.

For instance, a motor marked "40 deg. C. Rise" was designed to operate 40 degrees centigrade (72 degrees F.) warmer than the surrounding air.

The nameplate did not say so, but most motors were meant to operate safely, with an air temperature of 104 degrees F. The new markings, says Allen, state the maximum ambient (surrounding air) temperature in which the motor is meant to operate, and the type of insulation, such as Class A, Class B, etc.

A motor marked "40 degrees C. ambient, Class A," should operate in an air temperature of 40 degrees centigrade which is about 104 degrees F. Class A insulation can have a maximum internal hot-spot temperature of 221 degrees F., and Class B insulation, a hot-spot temperature of 226 degrees F., explains the engineer.

Because of the higher operating temperature with Class B insulation, the old practice of holding your hand on a motor to see if it is too hot is now meaningless, says Allen.

A motor with Class B insulation can be uncomfortably hot and still be running safely.

Selecting a motor with adequate horsepower to do the specific job is still a must, and the new types are not designed to be overloaded any more than the old type, Allen cautions.

The recommended method of protecting motors from overheating due to overload is to use a fustat, circuit breaker, or other overcurrent device rated at the same amperes as that stamped on the motor nameplate.

Social Security Hike To Be Automatic

Social security beneficiaries need not apply for the 15 percent benefit increase just signed into law by President Nixon. "Every one of the 25 million men, women and children now on the benefit rolls will receive the increase automatically," Robert M. Ball, Commissioner of Social Security, said today.

"The first regular check in the new amount," Commissioner Ball said, "will arrive April 3, the usual day for delivery of benefit checks covering payments for the month of March." A separate check in the amount of the benefit increase for the months of January and February will reach beneficiaries later in April, probably during the week of April 20.

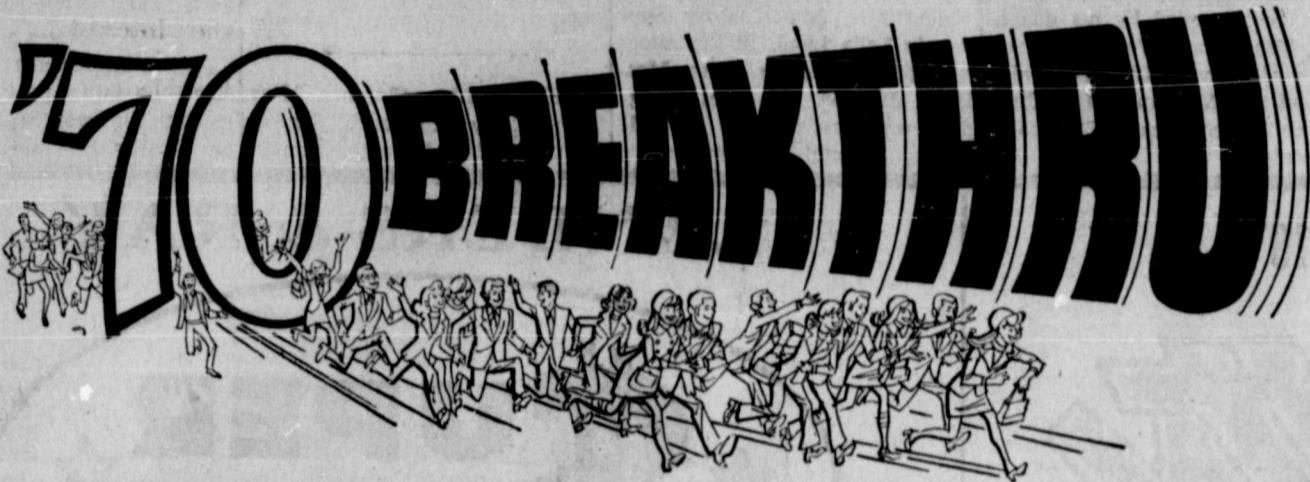
"Refiguring the benefit amounts of the 25 million men, women, and children now on the benefit rolls is a tremendous task," Commissioner Ball pointed out, "and it must be done without disrupting the regular benefit payment cycle."

"About one out of every eight Americans is now receiving a social security check each month," Commissioner Ball said. "As of the end of December, these monthly payments totaled \$2.2 billion and the monthly total will go up by \$345 million to more than \$2.5 billion as the 15 percent benefit increase becomes effective."

"The average retirement benefit of \$100 a month will rise to \$116 per month; a couple 65 or older receiving the average couple's benefit of \$170 will have their benefit increased to \$196; the average benefit for a family made up of a disabled worker, wife and one or more children will go up from \$237 to \$273; and average payments for a widow and two or more children will rise from \$254 to \$292."

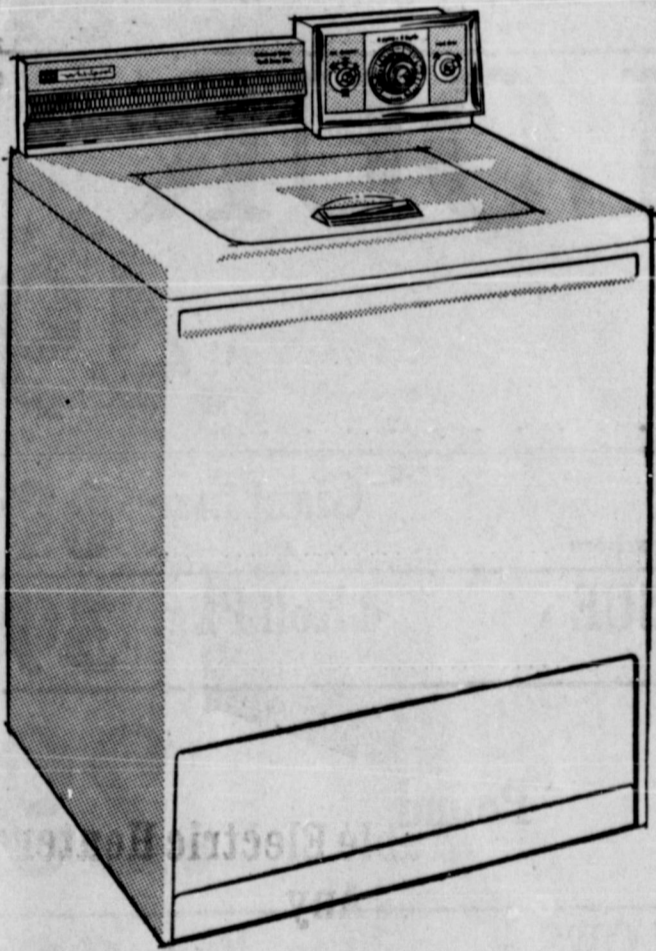

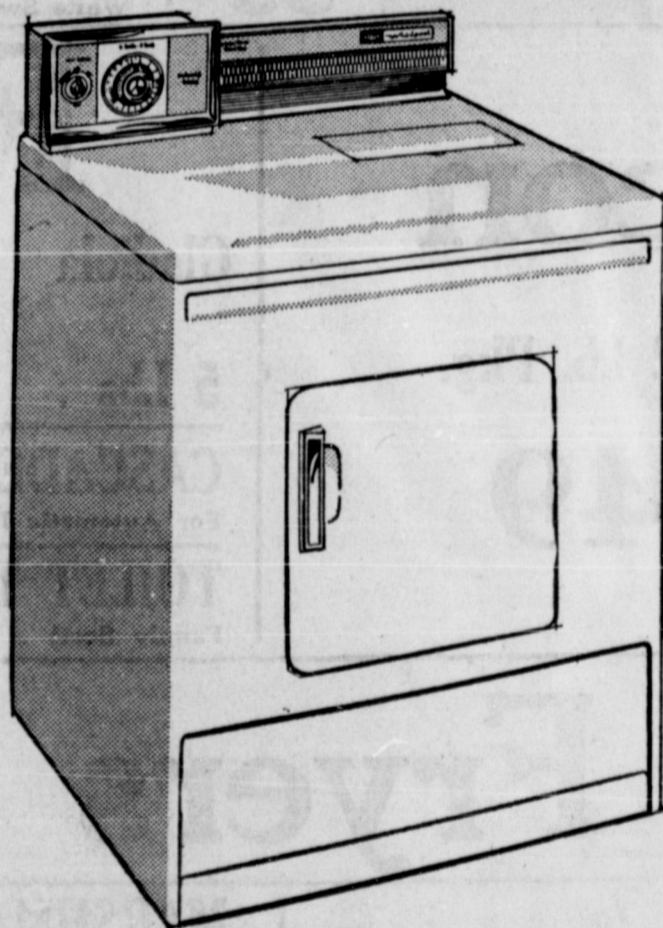

Lines Shorter For Vehicle Registration

AUSTIN — When the owners of Texas' seven million motor vehicles get their 1970 license plates, they will find that the Texas Highway Department has taken a lot of frustration out of registration.

Owners will receive motor vehicle registration applications by mail early in January.

This three-part form is the key to convenience.

In previous years, the vehicle owner had to hunt up his certificate of title and last year's license receipt and take them to the tax office or a substation. Often, he found himself at the end of a long, slow-moving line.

The lines should be much shorter this year. And there are provisions for license plates by mail.

Here's how easy it is:

If a motorist goes to the county tax office or a substation, all he need take is the three part form — the motor vehicle registration application — that came in the mail. And the registration fee, of course.

If he should find a line, chances are it will be shorter and faster-moving than any he remembered from previous years.

All he needs do is to present the renewal application and pay the fee. The clerk will validate the application with the new license numbers and return part of the form as a receipt.

Another part of the form is retained for the county's records and the third is sent to the Motor Vehicle Division of the Texas Highway Department in Austin.

Should the vehicle owner decide to register his vehicle by mail, he sends the entire renewal application, the fee and an additional \$1 to his county tax officer. The \$1 additional charge is provided by statute to cover the cost of handling and postage.

The registration "season" begins at county tax offices and substations on February 1. The vehicle owner can register his vehicle in person until April 1.

If he wants his plates mailed to him, he must send in his application, the fee and the \$1 postage and handling charge to his county tax officer by March 1. This allows 30 days for delivery before 1970 license plates must be displayed after midnight, April 1.

Easy-to-follow instructions are printed on the three-part form. The Highway Department asks that the owner leave the form in-

tact and that he not separate the three parts.

The new system is the product of many months of planning and work. The system began taking shape in 1967 with the installation of the first computer equipment by the Highway Department.

At one stage, 500 inmates of the Texas Department of Corrections were engaged in matching records and converting the records into a format suitable to be put into computers.

The new system give Texas one of the most modern and efficient systems for maintaining accurate and up-to-date records on motor vehicles in the world. The big beneficiary, however, is the vehicle owner who will realize extra convenience and big savings in time.

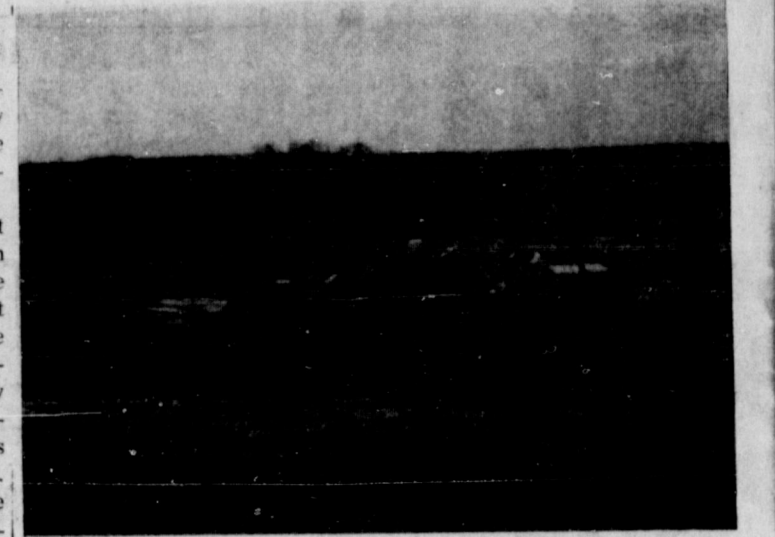
FRANK THOMAS SEEKS COUNTY JUDGE OFFICE
