The Rattlers own a 1-3 record so far this season and were drubbed by Childress last week end 27-0. Groundbreaking Held For New Church Of Christ Tuesday

Cong. Bob Price Visits Here Saturday

Local government must reassert itself if the flow of power to Washington is to be halted, Congressman Bob Price said Saturday in Clarendon.

"County and city government must be revitalized because a lot of people in Washington would just as soon run all of your local business for you, and will be, if new ideas are not forthcoming, I am supporting Jim Hayes for county judge of Donley County because I believe he can and will provide the kind of leadership that is needed if local government is to survive," Price said.

The Congressman, who is opposed for a third term, also noted that most Panhandle counties are losing population and pointed out that new leadership is needed to reverse this trend.

"As a member of the House Agriculture Committee, I am making every effort to increase farm income and expect legislation, I have introduced, to be passed soon, that would increase the amount of funds farmers and ranchers can borrow from Farmers Home Administration.

"We must have a closer partnership between Local-State and Federal Governments and Private Industry to attack the problems of rural economic development in the 1970's. We need young men like Jim Hayes.

The project is located from the end of PM 1260, 5.0 miles north of US Highway 287, east and northward 5.0 miles. Everett Monroe of Clarendon is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 150 working days to complete.

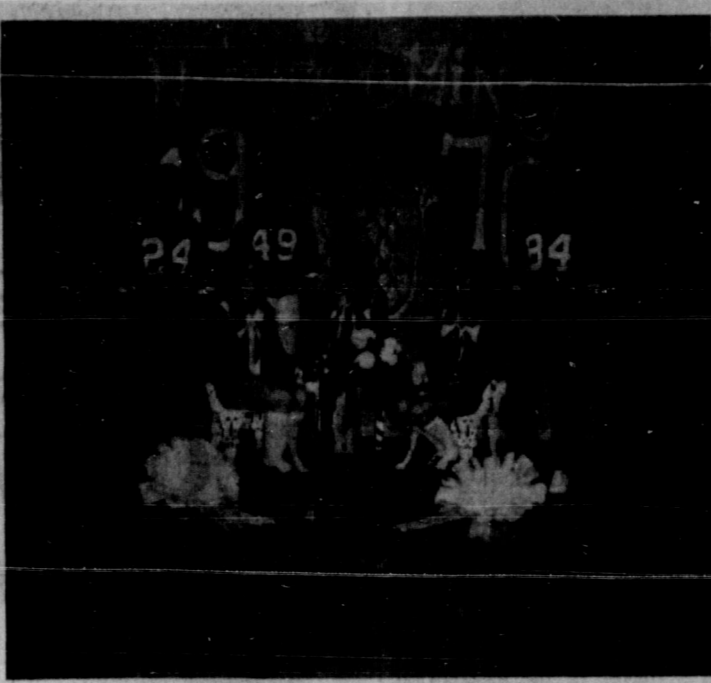

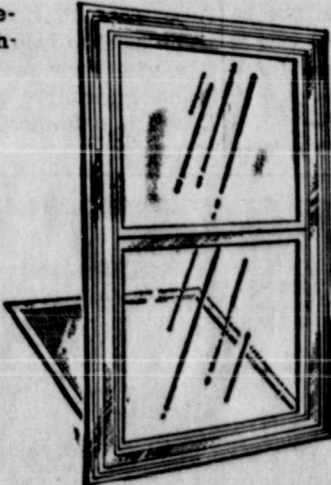
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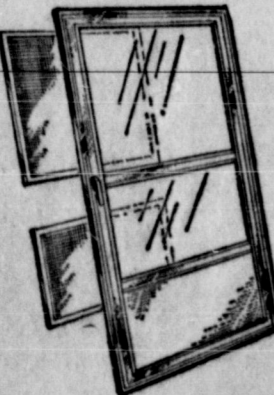

Q—I plan to enter college under the G. I. Bill and will be taking 16 semester hours. How much will VA pay me since I have no dependents?

A—If you have no dependents and carry the full-time load you anticipate, your monthly payments will be \$175 at the present rate.

Q—Upon my discharge from the service, I received a lump sum disability severance payment. Will I have to pay this back to the government if I am awarded VA compensation for the same disability?

A—The law requires that VA monthly compensation payments be withheld until the amount received is equal to the amount of severance pay you received because of the disability.

Q—May I purchase a home with a G. I. loan over the VA appraisal?

A—Yes, provided you pay in cash the difference between the reasonable value determined by the VA and the price of the house.

Q—I entered military service last year before completing high school. When I get out of service will the VA pay me any educational allowance while I complete high school? If so, how much?

A—Yes, if you have more than 180 days active service. If you are a single veteran, you will receive \$81 a month for adult evening high school or \$175 a month for a full-time schooling; more if you have dependents. The law entitles you to this allowance without deducting anything from your entitlement to further education and training.

Q—I have a service-connected disability which requires continuous treatment. Since I plan to travel abroad this summer, what arrangements shall I make regarding medication and treatment?

A—Contact the VA clinic now treating you to obtain appropriate supplies of your prescribed medication to carry with you, and for suggestions for obtaining medical supplies and services abroad. In case of a medical emergency, contact the American Embassy or Consular Of-

Most of the homes sold in May were concentrated in ten areas, including Los Angeles with 233, St. Petersburg, Florida, with 135, Waco with 87, and Houston with 57.

Johnson also explained that one reason home-buying continued brisk this year is that the VA finances homes it sells, something it has done since shortly after World War II.

Pointing to financing as one of the advantages of buying VA-owned homes, he also said other advantages include sale at fair market prices, with low down payments and financing which may run as long as 30 years; low closing costs; no attorney fees; and quick settlements with early possession.

The VA Administrator pointed out that anyone — veteran or non-veteran—may purchase available VA-houses through local licensed real estate brokers.

Additional information is available by contacting the VA Regional Office at 1400 North Valley Mills Drive, Waco, Texas.

Johnson said houses owned by the veterans Administration were financed originally with GI loans or direct loans, but the owners failed to keep up the mortgage payments. Of the 7.5 million VA loans, only 3 percent have resulted in foreclosure, he said.

He added that the houses are in excellent condition, and usually are located in convenient communities and desirable neighborhoods. Many are repaired and redecorated before they are offered for sale.

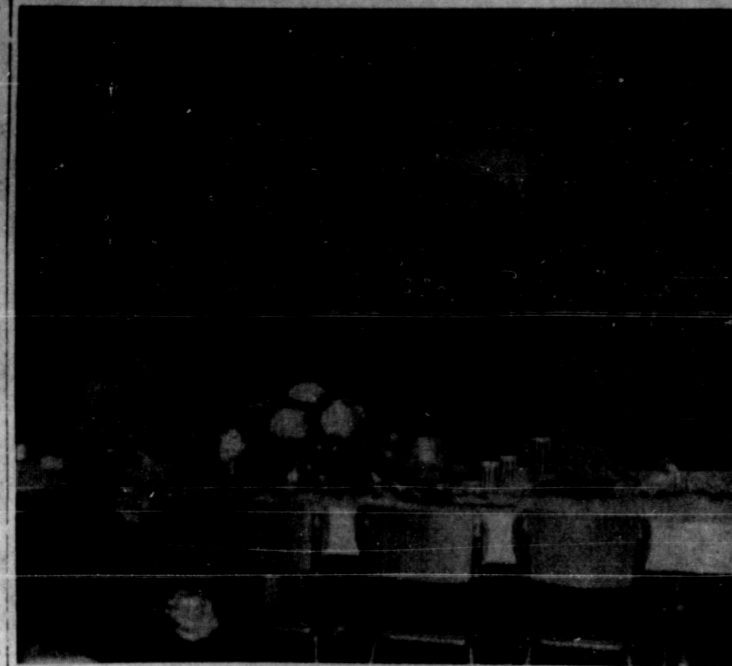

This approval was granted because rain was received in Donley County in time to make some hay, but much of the hay will not be ready to harvest until the middle or last of October. This extension will permit producers to harvest hay from diverted acres through October 31, 1970.
