May 15 will be the final date to dispose of wheat and barley on make grain. Grazed off wheat that is NOT on land intended for divesion can be grazed as long

as you desire after May 15. Wheat on diverted acres that has been destroyed by grazing cannot be grazed after May 14th and must be plowed as quickly as possible thereafter.

Most farmers participating in ASCS programs are familiar with day in the Hedley First United the "spot check" system.
