## Red Cross Chapter To Be Organized Here

The rec. at disaster which struck our area and Sherwood Shores caught Donley County without an organized chapter of the American Red Cross and without any available funds, to prevent such a happening again a meeting will be held Thursday, April 30, at 7:30 p.m. in the Hospitality Room of the Farmers State Bank at which time a local Chapter will be organized.

In the recent disaster, the National Red Cross Headquarters out of St. Louis granted Mrs. Mollie Ritter the authority to act with the National Red Cross bearing the complete financial expense.

Many volunteer workers joined with Mrs. Ritter in helping victims of the storm, rescue squads, law enforcement officers, and workers in the area by furnishing food, equipment, placing and receiving telephone calls and many other ways. It is impossible to name all who gave aid for the list would be too long and names might be omitted.

Local work was carried out under the direction of Mrs. Ritter assisted by Mr. Lawrence Neece and Mr. Mike McCully.

Mrs. Beach from the Red Cross office in Amarillo and three Red Cross units from Oklahoma and Dallas came to lend a hand; however after seeing what had been done by an unorganized chapter they went on to Plainview.

You are asked to become a member of the Donley County Chapter of the American Red Cross and help with its organization. We will then be able to be of service to our community, the surrounding area, and able to lend service in disaster areas when needed Red Cross has two main functions: to assist in a disaster and to accommodate our men in uniform.

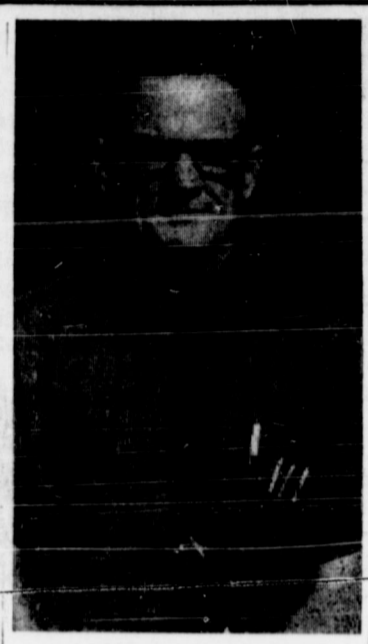

## PAKISTAN ENGINEERS VISIT LOCAL SCS

Mohammad Arif KHAN and Mahammad KHALIL-ur-Rehman, irrigation engineers from West Pakistan visited the local Soil Conservation Service Work Unit Monday of this week. This is part of a twelve month tour of the USA for the two men. They are here to study the various practices of irrigation and other engineering work carried out by the local farmers.

While in the Clarendon Work Unit, the two men are looking at various irrigation systems as well as dryland engineering practices. They report that the Texas Panhandle is in many ways similar to their country. They raise the same crops and are beginning to develop a substantial amount of irrigation. The snow melt from the Himalaya Mountains furnishes most of their water by way of rivers. They deliver the water by canals to the agricultural areas.

### Crop Disposition

May 15 will be the final date to dispose of wheat and barley on diverted acres or in excess of permitted acres. If you are grazing your wheat off to get within the permitted, it must be grazed down by May 15 to the point that it is obvious it will not make grain. Grazed off wheat that is NOT on land intended for diversion can be grazed as long as you desire after May 15.

### Spot Checks

Most farmers participating in ASCS programs are familiar with the "spot check" system. After certification, farms are picked at random to be checked. These farms are visited, and program crop acreages measured. The measured acreage is then compared with that reported by the farm operator. If a difference is found which is more than allowable, the farm will be considered out of compliance and loss of payment will result. Operators found out of compliance by spot check may not dispose of crops to bring themselves back into compliance.

You can adjust an acreage at any time prior to the day that you certify that acreage. After you make your report, there will be no further opportunity to adjust.

Be sure your acreages are exact; either too much or too little acreage planted can cost you money. Also, be sure that you report your acreages correctly. Your county ASCS office stands ready to give you all the help possible in certifying correctly. Or, if you have a problem, you can ask a county or community committee member.

### Soil Conservation District News

By Jerald O. Crump  
Soil Conservation Service

This article is part of a series, describing the more prominent types of soils found in Donley County. We are conducting a soil survey in Donley County and we are now about 1/2 of the way through.

The Altus soils are of minor extent, but are found throughout the county. They can be found in nearly level areas, all along the central part of the county. A typical area can be found in the flat just north of Hedley. Nearly all of this soil is in cultivation, as it is one of the most productive soils to be found anywhere.

The Altus soils consist of very deep, dark brown to black, friable, loamy soils that are well drained. The topsoil is a friable, dark brown, fine sandy loam about 20 inches thick. The subsoil is a brown, sandy clay loam about 25 to 35 inches thick. The parent material is a friable loam material that usually has concentrations of lime.

The Altus soils have good drainage and runoff characteristics. They have a moderate permeability or downward movement of water within the soil. This soil has a very high natural fertility and yields are normally above average for the county.

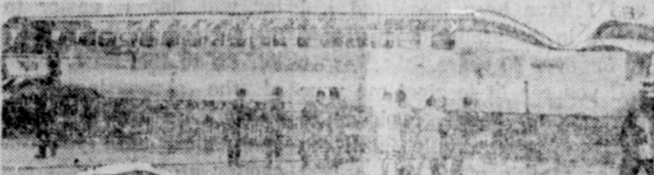

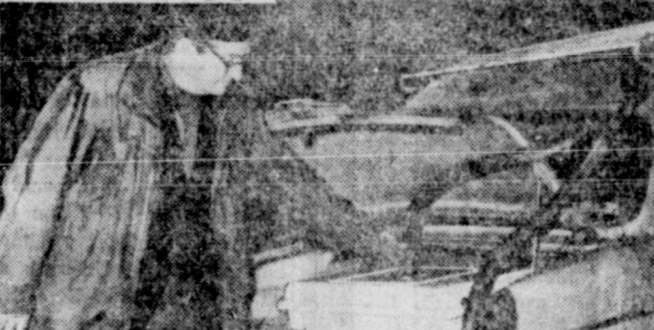

**DURABLE PRESS COTTON** ABRASION RESISTANT  
Thanks to a new process developed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, durable press cotton is now abrasion resistant.

Wearing in men's trousers at knees, pockets and cuffs has been a problem with all-cotton durable press garments, according to Joanne Thurber, Extension consumer education specialist in clothing at Texas A&M University.

The new permanent sizing process improved abrasion resistance as much as five times on sample trouser cuffs. The sample also showed about 65 per cent greater tear strength than conventional durable press fabrics.  
Miss Thurber says the sizing does not interfere with durable press qualities in clothes.

Martin L. Brochette, a key executive on the Texas Education Agency staff since 1968, has been appointed deputy commissioner of education, succeeding the late J. Martin Hitt in the number two post.

### Panhandle Important Area For Game

The rugged and rolling Texas Panhandle is experiencing growth as a major game-producing area of the State.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials point out that the nine important game birds and animals in the 33-county Panhandle area have either remained stable in population or have extended their range dramatically in recent years.

Mule deer, white-tailed deer, pronghorn antelope, turkey, quail, sheep, ringneck pheasant, lesser prairie chicken and bobwhite and blue quail are found in many of the counties and all have a considerable economic impact.

Department project leader Dick DeArment of Wheeler reports that the white-tailed deer herd has done well, with some unusually large animals harvested recently.

A total of 1,337 pronghorn antelope have been killed in six Panhandle counties from 1965 through 1969.

Aoudad sheep released in the Palo Duro Canyon have increased from an original herd of 44 in 1957 to an estimated 600 in seven counties.

Ringneck pheasants are reported to be extending their range, and increases in the lesser prairie chicken population have been sufficient to allow limited open

seasons in the past three years. The prairie chickens were protected in the State for 45 years while their numbers — and the habitat upon which they depend — dwindled. The situation has improved in some areas, however.

Hunters were able to bag about 300 birds in each of the first two seasons. This year's production of only 139 birds harvested was blamed on inclement weather for the two-day season.

### SAFETY FEATURES HEAD RESTRAINT

Of the many safety features incorporated in late model automobiles, apparently the most misunderstood and misused is the head restraint.

According to the Texas Safety Association, people seem to have got off on the wrong foot by thinking of the safety devices as "head rests."

TSA General Manager Lloyd F. Palmer, releasing the results of a recent informal survey, warned motorists, "Head restraints are not built or designed for use as a pillow."

"They are designed to prevent the head and neck from being thrown backward during rear-end collisions to minimize whiplash-caused injuries. In order to do this," Palmer continued, "head restraints should be adjusted so that they are centered at the back of the head—not at the neck."

Show-motion studies of rear-end crash situations show that the head can be thrown backward in as much as a 90 degree angle, causing severe injury. The head restraint, when adjusted properly, can reduce such injuries, commonly called whiplash.

The Texas Safety Association says the recent survey showed motorists are leaving the head restraint adjusted where it would strike the back of the neck if a rear-end collision were to occur. Leaving the restraint in that position, said the statewide safety group, could result in a major injury. The head restraints became standard equipment on 1969 model automobiles.
