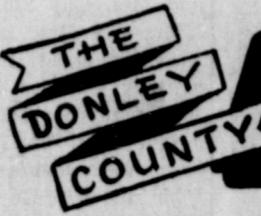

The church cantatas and plays and portrayals of the Christmas story were lovely. People rushed to obtain seats, as they sought peace in a war-torn world. Christmas was observed in the schools, the Rest Home, the College, Senior Citizens' party, the clubs and civic organizations, but the streets of Clarendon were neglected.

How about it, Clarendon? What can we do to bring Christmas back to downtown Clarendon in 1970?

CHS BB Teams Undeclared in District Play

The Clarendon High School Bronchos remain undefeated in conference play and with a continued winning streak this coming week will be undisputed winners of the district title.

Friday night of last week, the Bronchos hosted Spearman teams. Clarendon boys won their game 56-43 leading by quarters 12-8, 28-16, and 47-28. High for Clarendon was Charles Louis with 19 followed by Wayne Carter with 12. Top man for Spearman was Randal Schull with 18 points.

Coach Carl Irbeck reported that the Claude game Tuesday night of this week was expected to be one of the Bronchos tougher games; however the Bronchos added another win to their conference record with a score of 63-44. Clarendon took the lead in the first period 15-10 and continued to stretch the margin 35-19, and 48-26. Wayne Carter was high for the game with 25 points to his credit. Louis hit for 12 and Moore 11. Terry Knox dropped in 16 points for Claude.

B team also played Tuesday night with Clarendon taking the game 55-39. Kenny Bacon was high for Clarendon dropping in 29 points. Cope was high for Claude with 10 points.

Clarendon girls were unable to muster a win in either game being defeated by Spearman 27-92 and by Claude 32-57.

In the Spearman game by quarters the tally was 5-24, 15-48, and 21-69. Lee Ann McCracken paced the Bronchoettes with 9. Julie Taylor and Joan Smith hit 6 each. Patterson was high for the game with 29 points.

Claude took a lead of 2-17 in the first period of play, hit 9-32 by halftime and 24-40 at the close of the third period. Lee Ann McCracken hit 16, Annette Alexander 6, and Carolyn Barrow 5. Brenda Lorraine of Claude hit 15.

Games from this point on will be in conference play. Friday night Coach Irbeck reported games to be played at Silverton, Varsity Girls will play at 6:30, Varsity Boys at 8 p.m.

Tuesday night Happy will come to Broncho land, Varsity Girls will play at 6:30 p.m. and Varsity Boys at 8 p.m.

Judge Reynolds Is Candidate For Court Of Civil Appeals

Judge Charles L. Reynolds
The candidacy of 100th Judicial District Judge Charles L. Reynolds of Childress for Associate Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals at Amarillo was announced Monday by a spokesman following a meeting of area citizens.

"Because Judge Reynolds is highly respected for his judicial demeanor and his knowledge of, and continuing education in, the law, many people throughout the Seventh Supreme Judicial District served by the Amarillo Court of Civil Appeals have encouraged him to become a candidate for this position," the spokesman said.

The position Judge Reynolds is seeking is the one to be vacated by Justice Ernest O. Northcutt, who has announced he will retire at the end of his present term. Reynolds' candidacy is subject to the Democratic primary on May 2, 1970.

Becoming Judge of the 100th Judicial District, composed of Carson, Childress, Collingsworth, Donley and Hall Counties, in May, 1964, Judge Reynolds presently is serving his second elective term.

"Since he became a trial judge," the spokesman said, "Judge Reynolds has disposed of over 2,800 cases and only two of his judgments have been reversed. An indication of the high esteem in which Judge Reynolds is held by other trial judges and attorneys is that he has been called upon to decide 229 cases in courts other than his own in the Panhandle and in Houston. "His record speaks for itself," the spokesman continued, "and it, together with the fact that his docket is current in his five county district, certainly indicates that Judge Reynolds will be a valued member of our appellate court."

Reynolds, 48, is an area native, and, after enlisted service in World War II in the Southwest Pacific area in New Guinea, the Philippines and Japan, was admitted to the practice of law in Texas prior to his graduation from Southern Methodist University School of Law with a bachelor of laws degree. He was engaged in the general practice of law and served eight years as Childress County Attorney prior to becoming district judge.

A member and past president of the Childress County and 100th Judicial District Bar Associations; a member of the American and Texas Bar Associations and the Judicial Sections of each, the American Judicature Society, and a past member of the Executive Committee of the Judicial Section of the State Bar of Texas, Reynolds is a graduate of the 1936 session of the National College of State Trial Judges held at the University of Colorado.

Reynolds is a member of the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and various civic organizations. He and his family are members of the First Baptist Church where he serves as a deacon and Sunday school

teacher. He is a Rotarian and currently is serving as Governor of District 573 of Rotary International.

He is married to the former Nelmarie Parman, and they have two sons, Charles, Jr., a freshman at West Texas State University, and Parman Eugene, a senior in Childress High School.

Map of County Precinct Division Released by Commissioners Court

Local Politics Up With New Candidates

A City map showing the new division of County Precincts is being published in the Leader by the Donley County Commissioners Court this week. The map appears on page 7.

This map shows only a change up within the City limits of Clarendon which was necessary to even up the voting strength of each precinct. All precinct lines will remain the same outside of the City. Precinct 3 includes Lelia Lake and Hedley has no change whatever.

Precinct No. 4 is joined to the addition in town by FM road 1260 to Highway 287. The precinct as indicated by the arrows on the map will take in all the area from the east edge of the city along Fourth Street west to Kearney (main street) then north across the railroad tracks and will take in all of the city north of the railroad tracks.

Precinct No. 1 is joined to the addition in town by Highway 287 from the west. It travels the highway to FM 2162 which is Koogle Street then south to eighth street and then west to the City limits and takes in all the area west of Koogle Street back north to the highway.

The rest of the City not included in either 1 or 4 will remain in Precinct No. 2.

Although Precincts 1 and 4 are connected with the city by roads or highway no property beyond the city limits is included on either side of those roads unless already in those respective precincts.

Two Locals Kill Aoudad Sheep

Those desiring to enter politics can tell from this map which precinct they are residing in and make their plans accordingly.

Between now and election time, the Court will set up locations for voting places in each of the precincts in accordance with their new boundaries.

Be sure and clip the map from the Leader this week for future reference.

Only Two Weeks Left To Register to Vote

County residents are being reminded that they have only two weeks left in which to get by the County Tax office and register to vote. Taking away Saturday's, there are only 11 days left before the tax office will be open before the deadline, January 31st.

Everyone, regardless of age must register if they want to be qualified to vote. One member of a family can sign up for other members of the immediate family.

This is a general election year so you will have lots of opportunity to exercise your right to vote if you are qualified. . . so don't put it off any longer. . . go register today and avoid the long line the last few days.

Up to Wednesday noon only 1303 had signed up which is just a fraction over half the potential voting strength of Donley County.

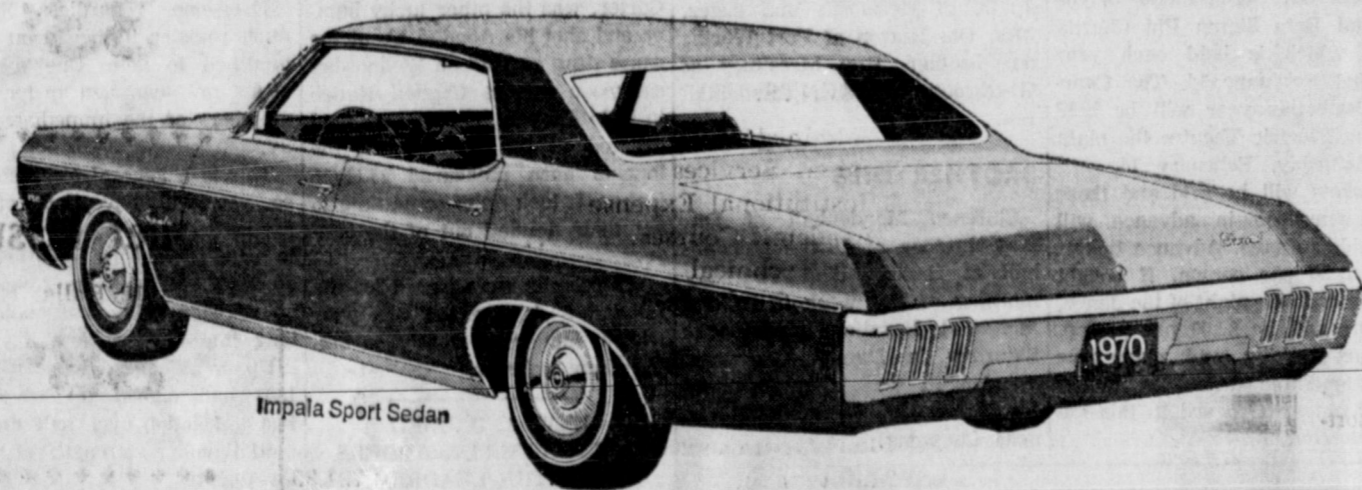

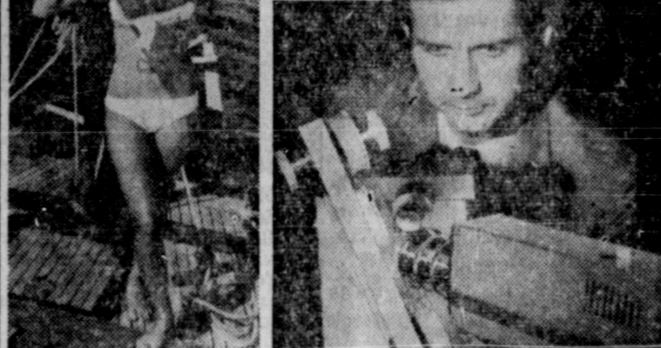

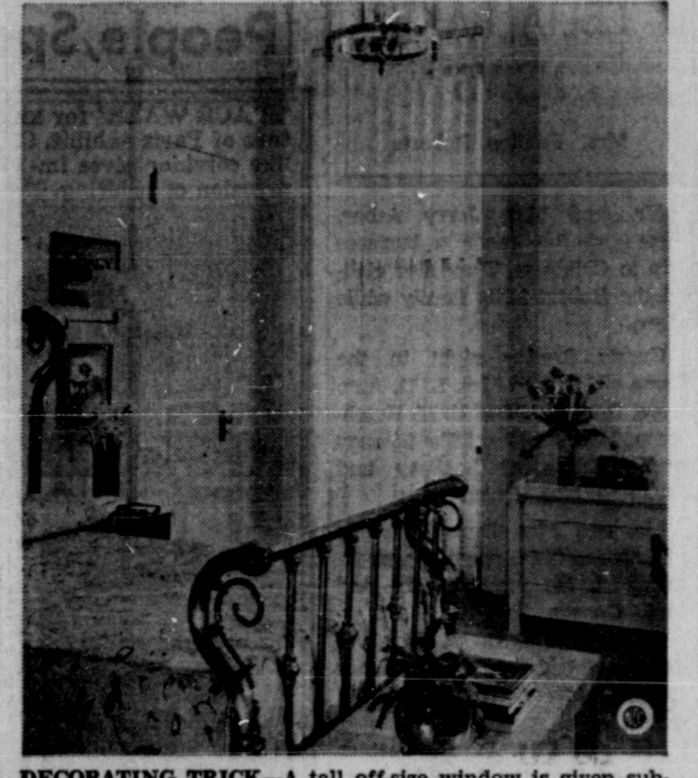

THE MILES SOILS

This article is part of a series, describing the more important soils of Donley County. We have been conducting a Soil Survey of Donley County for about a year now and we are 1/3 of the way through. This survey is

being made to learn what kind of soils are in Donley County and where they are located.

The Miles soils is a very common soil in Donley County, but the largest amounts of this are found all through the central part of the county, paralleling highway 287. Another large area can be found in the Northeast part of the county, just south of McLean. The areas of this soil are generally very large in size averaging about 150 to 200 acres in size. This soil occurs on undulating or rolling type of land.

Most of the town of Clarendon is located on Miles soils.

The Miles soils consist of deep, brownish, moderately sandy to sandy textured soils that are nearly level to sloping. They have brown, friable, fine sandy loam to loamy sand topsoils. They have a very deep, reddish brown, sandy clay loam subsoil. This subsoil is easily penetrated by roots and holds large amounts of water. The parent material is a sandy outwash material that is usually 50 to 60 inches beneath the surface.

The Miles soils have very good surface drainage and have very little runoff. They have a moderate permeability or (downward movement of water within the soil) with high water holding capacity. This soil's natural fertility is just average, but these soils respond well to fertilizer and irrigation. Also this soil is not a drouthy soil as some in the County are.

Most all of the Miles soils in Donley County are cultivated.

This includes proper land preparation, fertilizing, if normal for the crop in your area, planting a normal amount of seed, cultivating, and any other practice necessary to produce a crop.

Don't risk losing your payments by not planting and caring for a crop in a workmanlike manner.

PROGRAM SIGNUP DATES ANNOUNCED — The signup period for the voluntary wheat, feed grain, and cotton programs will begin February 2 and continue through March 20, 1970.

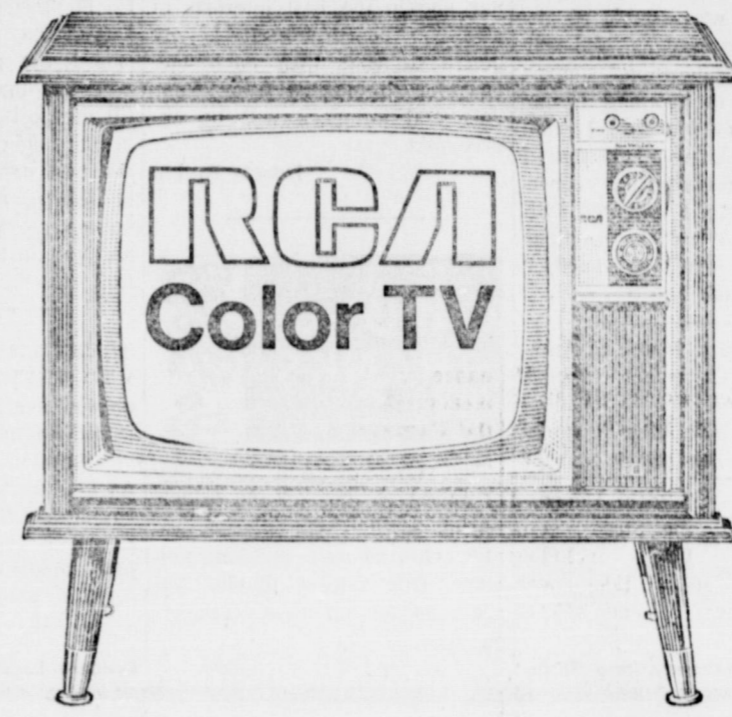

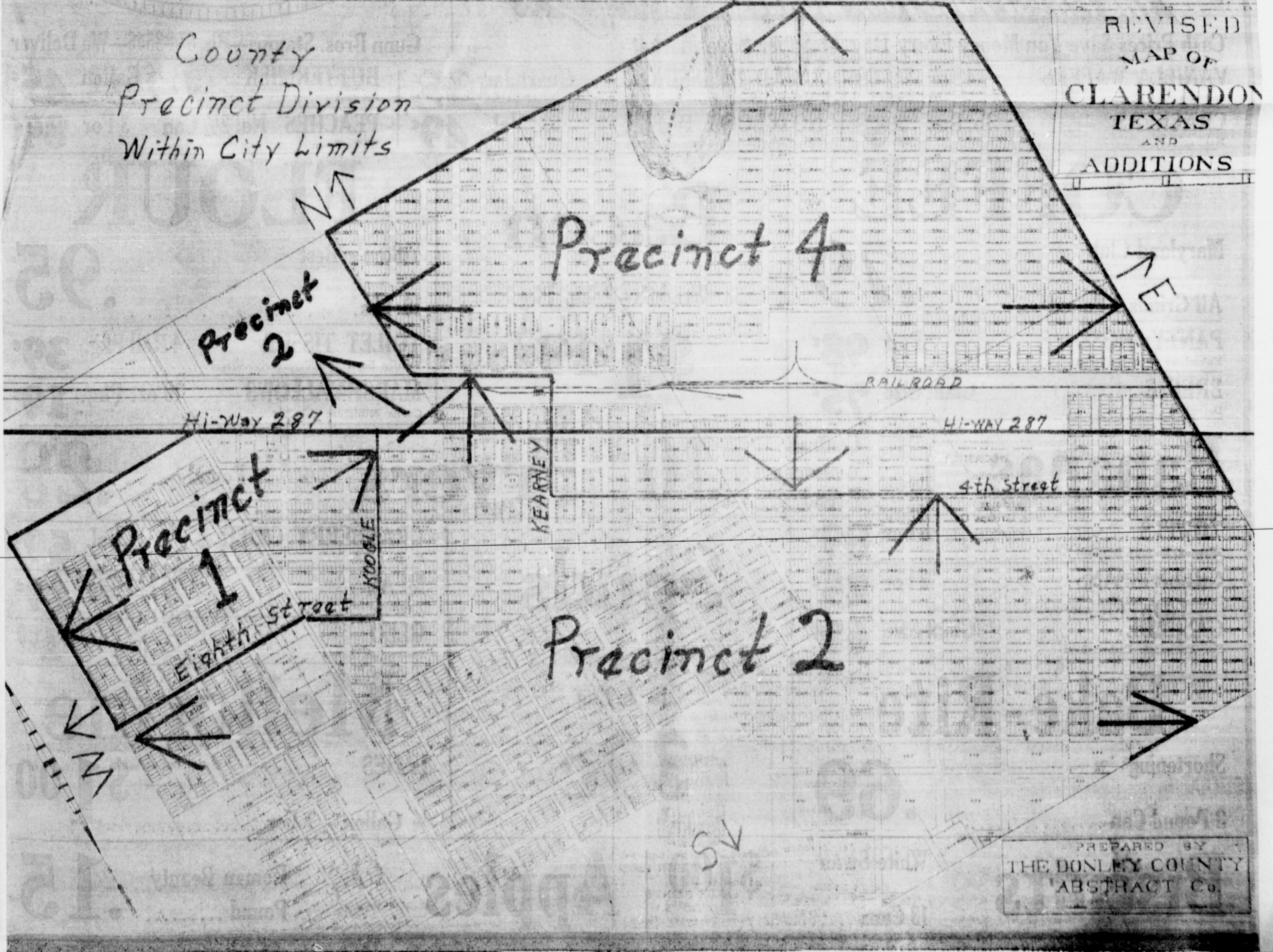
