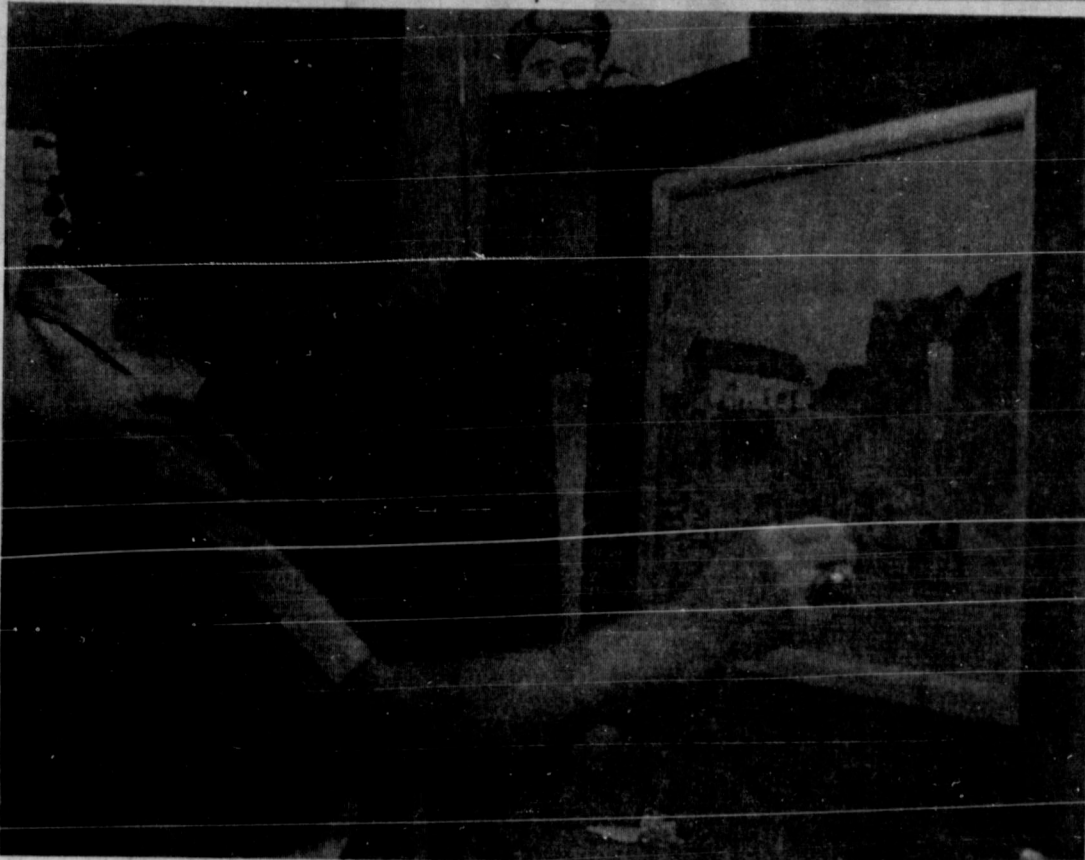

A display and sale of Western paintings and sculpture will be held at Barney's Marine, Highway 70 No. at Clarendon Thursday and Friday, July 30 and 31. The High Plains Galleries of Amarillo will furnish the show with the co-sponsorship of Nell and Gary Barnhill of Clarendon. Lois Grupe of Amarillo will act as the gallery representative.

Some forty paintings and a dozen pieces of bronze sculpture will be featured by area artists including Kenneth Wyatt, Carl J. Smith, Stephan Kramer, Bob Melne, D. Crew, Dan Ray and sculptor Jim Thomas. Lois Grupe, who is a High Plains Galleries staff artist and sales representative, will be in charge of sales at the show.

The Clarendon show will mark the introduction of Don Ray of Canyon as a new member of the gallery's staff of artists. Ray was born in Clarendon and reared on the McMurtry Ranch where his father was employed for many years. Ray worked on area ranches and with the U. S. Forest Service until he decided to devote full time to art.

Contracts Are Sought For Alfalfa Program

Contracts for a minimum of 5,000 acres of irrigated alfalfa are being sought in Hall and Donley Counties by Western Alfalfa Corporation of Memphis for its 1971 ground alfalfa program.

"In order to produce quality cuttings for next year, seed must be fall-planted", said Hap Kensing, Western Alfalfa Panhandle District General Manager. Contracts should be signed prior to September 15.

"We are interested in contracting irrigated land of more than 30-acre fields so we can program for 1971," Kensing said in pointing out that his company will pay \$16 per ton for alfalfa. "Growers must plant, irrigate and tend the alfalfa. We will cut and grind it to our specifications."

"Local bank money is available within the area for installation of irrigation for prospective growers," Kensing said. Western Alfalfa began operations early in 1970 in the Memphis area. It grinds alfalfa to specification for feedlots in the Panhandle.

Over Two Thousand In Jewelry Stolen From Henson's Tues.

According to Sheriff Clyde James between two and three thousand dollars worth in Jewelry was taken from Henson's Tuesday morning in a daring robbery that took place by all accounts sometime after 5 a.m. The City night patrolman reported everything in order on his last round at 5 o'clock.

The robbers entered the business thru the south door after breaking a hole in the glass and releasing the lock. Mostly diamond rings were taken from the Jewelry case which is located near the front window of the store. One bridal set was dropped by the robbers outside the door as they left.

This was the most costly of similar robberies that have occurred here the past few weeks. Among other places which were broken into by the glass door was Landers & Ray Super Save, Foxworth-Galbraith Lumber Company, Pittman's Cleaners, Donley County Leader and others where lesser amounts were taken. Indications point to the same person or persons pulling all the robberies.

Before going to press Wednesday, another robbery was reported. Frank's Restaurant was the victim Tuesday night. Bettie Stimaker reported the loss of \$25 in change, her payroll, plus meats, cheese, butter, pies, canned goods etc. Entry to the business was gained by a back door.

Clarendon residents have been lucky up until the present time as far as break-ins have been concerned but a seige like this is getting to be too much. Local citizens out at night or early morning are asked to report any type of suspicious movement by persons on foot or any cars moving about. One tip could mean a lot to local officers.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read by each Director. Motion made by Lloyd Risley that the minutes of the previous meeting be approved. Motion was seconded by Earl Wheatley. Motion carried unanimously.

Temporary Chairman Barbee commended J. Roy Bartlett for his service to the Board and to the Donley County Hospital District. Mr. Bartlett replied that he did not feel that he had resigned and was still a member of the Board. No action was taken by Pleasure of the Board.

Burning Stubble
The State ASC Committee has determined that deliberate burning of any crop residue, other than flax, violates reasonable conservation principals and will be considered a practice tending to defeat the purpose of the ACP Program. Payment cannot be made for any ACP practice to a producer who burns stubble.

Emergency Grazing
Donley County has been approved for emergency haying and grazing on Cropland Adjustment Program (CAP) land. Be sure to come to the office and make your application before any grazing is begun. There will be a charge for such grazing.

Public Hearing For Hog Producers Slated

Commercial hog lots located near public flowing streams or surface water supplies will be placed under regulation in the near future by the Texas Water Quality Board. Notice of public hearing has been published in 12 daily newspapers across the state. The hearing is set for 10 a.m., August 4, at the Terrace Motor Hotel in Austin.

Also, any swine producing operation may be required to comply with regulations if it is located over a sensitive ground-water area where seepage may cause contamination of wells or other water supply in the neighborhood. Hog farms are subject to regulation if they cause a nuisance or appreciable damage to public waters in the state.

The regulation does not apply to small-farm hog producers unless they are endangering some public water supply. It is primarily written to cover units with 50 or more breeding animals. Five hundred pigs under 50 pounds would also be under regulation.

Anyone interested in receiving a copy of the proposed regulation can get one by writing to the Texas Water Quality Board, 1108 Lavaca, Austin, Texas 78701. All concerned are invited to write their comments to the Board, or to appear and testify at the hearing.

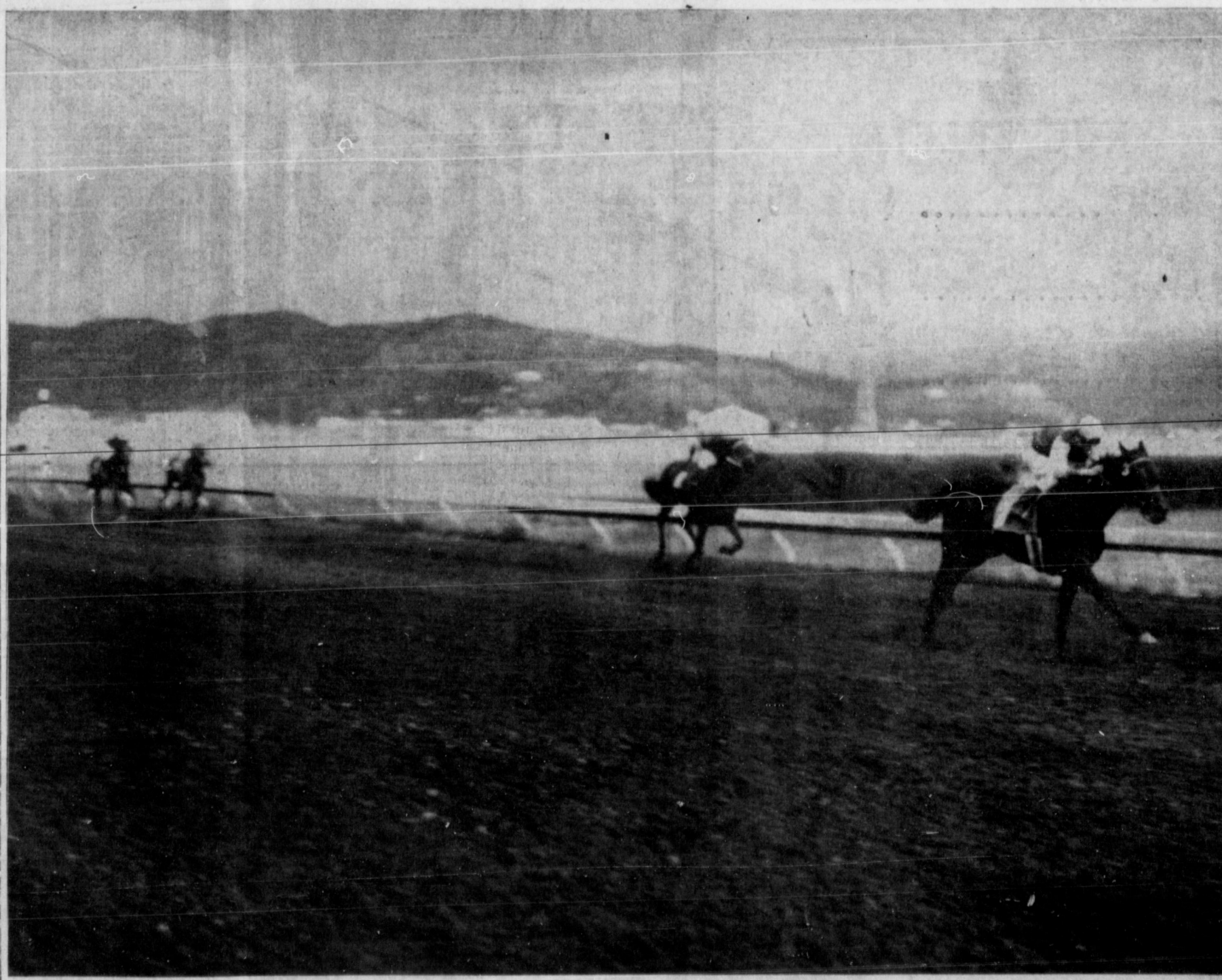
COUNTY AGENTS IN STATE MEETING

The expert was John Fox, National Bass Champion for 1968... and an expert he is!

Like most bass champions, Fox began making his own "bait" immediately after winning the national honor.

Fortunately for us John's trip out this time was to test his newest product, not yet on the market.

We were in John's own rig, designed strictly for fishing. All of the other ten host's boats went out about the same time and most stopped at the first likely point - about a half-mile from the launching ramp, John did too.

With the wind rather calm, none of the boats anchored - just floated where they stopped and cranked up the kicker only to come closer to shore when needed.

John brought in a half-dozen small bass before either Earl or I caught any. It wasn't long, however, before most of the boats scattered for different areas.

This was when John said, "Now, I'll take you where the big ones are..." and that he did in short order.

Where did he go? To the brushier area! But to him the brushier area was the thickly wooded section where the iron trees were so close to each other that we could only reach his choice spots by pulling and pushing the boat from tree to tree, sometimes lying almost prone in the boat to clear the overhanging limbs.

Finally he found a spot that looked good. There he settled down to serious fishing... with plastic worms, of course.

You'll be interested in how John rigs up his gear. To begin with, John uses a heavy bass rod designed especially for worm fishing. It's a five-and-one-half foot, real thick at the handle and slowly tapers off to the end. Only really flexible part is the tip... for about the final 12 or 16 inches.

His choice is 20-pound monofilament line and a not-too-heavy, one-shaped slip-sinker. He runs the line through the sinker's pointed end, first, then ties it to a large and very sharp 5/0 drop-shaft hook. After inserting the point of the hook through the nose of the worm, about an inch or so, John turns the hook over so that he can imbed the point into the worm. This makes it weedless, without the use of a metal weedguard.

Naturally he uses the Flutter-tail Worm... his own brand... with a thin, flat flexible tail.

In this case, John's experimental worm had a white tail. At its nose the worm was solid black, but it was lighter and lighter in color as it tapered to the end, becoming light gray as it reached the white tip.

That, and his Ambassador-reel, comprised his fishing gear. With no luck at the first spot, John moved to another, saying "Well, I know we'll get some lunkers now." And that he did, and so did his two companions... thanks to him.

Here's how John did it. He dropped the worm tightly into the water, keeping the line tight as he slowly released it straight down alongside one of the multitude of "Iron Trees" that clutter the area. When the worm hit bottom, 30 feet down, John slowly began to retrieve it. Following his instructions, we did the same alongside other nearby trees.

Now, warned John, when you think you have snagged the hook, set the hook as hard and as fast as you can—because it's almost impossible to snag that hook if you have imbedded it into the body of the worm, properly. So, set it HARD!

Meanwhile, John pointed to small bubbles rising from the water where he had let down his lure. "See these bubbles—that's a sign the old hoss has opened his gills and is about to strike." After stringing that one he let down the bait for another try—in the same spot. Shortly he had another of identical size. Within a period of 20 minutes he boated four, four-pounders. Same spot, mind you.

Then he said, Vern, you try it... the same way, in this same spot... and we came up with three-pounders. Meanwhile, Earl was doing well, too.

So, that's how John Fox does it. First he finds them; then he works the same hole again and again. Some say you can't catch more than one bass in the same spot. But not John. He figures that when one lunker leaves the throne another moves in and takes over.

Who's to argue that point when seven good ones come out of the same hole 30-feet deep and in an area no more than three feet in diameter. John made a believer out of us!

SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

Q—My husband recently passed away. He was receiving social security benefit payments. I am only 59 years old. What kind of a payment can I expect to receive?

A—You can apply for and receive the lump sum death payment now (it may be as much as

\$225), and when you are 60 years old you can qualify for a reduced monthly benefit payment as a widow.

Q—There has been a death in our family and I wish to file a claim for the lump sum death payment. However, I am working every day and unable to get to the social security office.

A—Social security offices now are able to handle many kinds of claims by telephone. Simply dial the local social security phone number, ask for service by telephone, and the claim representative there will complete your application over the phone and mail it to you for your signature.

Q—I have changed my address. Do I have to notify the social security office?

A—Only if you are receiving social security payments, or have previously filed for monthly benefits or Medicare. You can report a change of address by a telephone call to the social security office.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR10) General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 20, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"(a) The Legislature shall have the power to enact a Mixed Beverage Law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option election basis. The Legislature shall also have the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquors, including the power to establish a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors.

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in any county."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR30) General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Subsections (5), (6), (7), (8), (9), (11), (12), and (13), Section 1-a, Article V, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"(5) The Commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet at Austin at least once each year. It shall annually select one of its members as Chairman. A quorum shall consist of five (5) members. Proceedings shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement, censure, or removal of any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, receive complaints or reports, formal production of documents at any hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court.

"(6) After such investigation as it deems necessary, the Commission may in its discretion issue a private reprimand, or if the Commission determines that the situation merits such action, it may order a hearing to be held before it concerning the removal, or retirement of a person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section or it may in its discretion request the Supreme Court to appoint an active or retired District Judge or Justice of a Court of Civil Appeals as a Master to hear and take evidence in any such matter, and to report thereon to the Commission. If, after hearing, or after considering the record and report of a Master, the Commission finds good cause therefor, it shall issue an order of public censure or it shall recommend to the Supreme Court the removal, or retirement, as the case may be, of the person in question holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section.

"(7) The Commission shall keep itself informed as fully as may be of circumstances relating to the misconduct or disability of particular persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, receive complaints or reports, formal production of documents at any hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court.

"(8) After such investigation as it deems necessary, the Commission may in its discretion issue a private reprimand, or if the Commission determines that the situation merits such action, it may order a hearing to be held before it concerning the removal, or retirement of a person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section or it may in its discretion request the Supreme Court to appoint an active or retired District Judge or Justice of a Court of Civil Appeals as a Master to hear and take evidence in any such matter, and to report thereon to the Commission. If, after hearing, or after considering the record and report of a Master, the Commission finds good cause therefor, it shall issue an order of public censure or it shall recommend to the Supreme Court the removal, or retirement, as the case may be, of the person in question holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section.

"(9) The Supreme Court shall review the record of the proceedings on the law and facts and in its discretion may, for good cause shown, permit the introduction of additional evidence and shall order public censure, retirement or removal, as it finds just and proper, or wholly reject the

recommendation. Upon an order for involuntary retirement for disability or an order for removal, the office in question shall become vacant. The rights of an incumbent so retired to retirement benefits shall be the same as if his retirement had been voluntary."

"(11) The Supreme Court shall by rule provide for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court. Such rule shall afford to any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, against whom a proceeding is instituted to cause his retirement or removal, due process of law for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court in the same manner that any person whose property rights are in jeopardy in an adjudicatory proceeding is entitled to due process of law, regardless of whether or not the interest of the person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section in remaining in active status is considered to be a right or a privilege. Due process shall include the right to notice, counsel, hearing, confrontation of his accusers, and all such other incidents of due process as are ordinarily available in proceedings whether or not infeasible is charged, upon proof of which a penalty may be imposed.

"(12) No person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall sit as a member of the Commission or Supreme Court in any proceeding involving his own retirement or removal.

"(13) This Section 1-a is alternative to and cumulative of, the methods of removal of persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section provided elsewhere in this Constitution."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR28) General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 52, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 52. (a) Except as otherwise provided by this section, the Legislature shall have no power to authorize any county, city, town or other political corporation or subdivision of the State to lend its credit or to grant public money or thing of value in aid of, or to any individual, association or corporation whatsoever, or to become a stockholder in such corporation, association or company.

"(b) Under Legislative provision, any county, any political subdivision of a county, any number of adjoining counties, or any political subdivision of the State, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas, and which may or may not include, towns, villages or municipal corporations, upon a vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of such district or territory to be affected thereby, in addition to all other debts, may issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit in any amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of such district or territory, except that the total bonded indebtedness of any city or town shall never exceed the limits imposed by other provisions of this Constitution, and levy and collect taxes to pay the interest thereon and provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof, as the Legislature may authorize, and in such manner as it may authorize the same, for the following purposes to wit:

"(1) The improvement of rivers, creeks, and streams to prevent overflows, and to permit of navigation thereof, or irrigation thereof, or in aid of such purposes.

"(2) The construction and maintenance of pools, lakes, reservoirs, dams, canals and waterways for the purposes of irrigation, drainage or navigation, or in aid thereof.

"(3) The construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof.

roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof.

"(c) Notwithstanding the provisions of Subsection (b) of this Section, bonds may be issued by any county in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county, for the construction, maintenance, and operation of macadamized, graveled, or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of the county, and without the necessity of further or amendatory legislation. The county may levy and collect taxes to pay the interest on the bonds as it becomes due and to provide a sinking fund for redemption of the bonds."

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing any county, or a majority of its qualified electors, to issue road bonds in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county."

P&W COMMISSION SETS SEASONS. BAG LIMITS

Principal changes in district proclamations include a change in the dates of the deer, turkey and nouded sheep seasons in the Panhandle District. The deer and turkey seasons will remain the same length in the number of days, but the starting date will be the Saturday preceding Thanksgiving in order that hunters in the area would be afforded the opportunity to hunt during the Thanksgiving holidays.

The aoudad sheep season has been increased in length by two days and has been set ahead by two months to Nov. 20. This earlier date was proposed in the hopes of avoiding the bitter cold experienced by hunters for the past year or so.

Fishery changes were minor with the most significant being removal of the possession limit on largemouth, smallmouth and spotted black bass in the Panhandle, Possum Kingdom and Permian Basin Regulatory Districts.

The daily limit on largemouth, smallmouth and spotted black bass was set at 10 in the aggregate on Lake Texoma. A limit on 100 hooks was also approved for Lake Texoma for pole and line, rod and reel, artificial and natural baits, hand lines, set lines, thrown lines and not more than two-metallic trotlines, including rubber lines with more than 50 hooks each, or any combination of these methods.

The seasons, bag and possession limits for quail were not considered during the Commission meeting since biologists have not yet determined the nesting success and bird populations.

Highlights and Sidelights From Your State Capitol By Vern Stanford

AUSTIN, Tex. — As fast as the state's major finance agencies moved out of the capitol into the new Finance Building, contractors bids were opened for remodeling of the old quarters to the tune of more than \$1 million.

Work soon will be underway on all floors of the capitol, including the basement. Senators will get private offices of at least 550 square feet each. Bulk of the new Senate space will come from quarters long occupied by the State Comptroller.

House members will have smaller offices — but at least a private office — in the old first-floor State Treasury quarters and the basement.

Senators plan new committee rooms, including one specially wired for sound and TV lights.

Capitol station post office will make an early move into the new Finance Building, clearing the east entrance of the statehouse for restoral to its original splendor.

ENROLLMENT LIMIT ASKED — Soaring public college enrollments prompted a request from the Coordinating Board of the Texas College and University System that each school give "immediate consideration" to the problem.

If voluntary curtailment does not result, Board officials indicated they will ask the Legislature for power to order mandatory ceilings. Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin held in a recent opinion that the agency does not now have such authority. University of Texas system regents, meanwhile, approved a UT enrollment-control plan and a lottery system for use when units reach capacity.

Coordinating Board at its last meeting also placed the student loan program under federal loan insurance to guarantee repayments, advised expulsion of students who are involved in campus disruptions, and directed studies of free credit exchange among all public institutions and possible elimination of unnecessary college courses.

INTEGRATION PRESSED — Federal negotiators conferring with representatives of Texas school districts found 48 not in compliance with desegregation provisions of the 1964 civil rights act.

Sessions are seen as a last-ditch effort to get voluntary integration without a massive lawsuit by the U. S. Justice Department demanding immediate compliance.

Negotiators included three teams representing the civil rights division of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, plus Justice Department of Health, Education and Welfare, plus Justice Department Washington headquarters and Dallas regional office.

Texas Education Agency has contacted all 48 districts following receipt of a letter from the Justice Department asking TEA's help in ending school segregation.

School districts were limited to

a maximum of three on their negotiating teams — preferably the board president, superintendent and school attorney or board vice-president or another board member.

Federal teams limited each district to one-hour hearings. Any agreement, if not worked out in that time, will be communicated to HEW as soon as possible after local board discussions.

Each district was requested to bring copies of its own desegregation plans to the Austin meetings.

Amarillo, Atlanta, Aus in, Bellville, Calvert, Carthage, Church Hill (annexed to Jacksonville), Concord Rural High, Crockett, Cypress-Fairbanks, Ector County, Elysian Fields, Ferris, Friendship (annexed to Caldwell), Galena Park, Garland, Hearne, Hempstead, Henderson, Jackson, Jasper, Jefferson, Karnack, Katy, Kilgore, Klein, La Vega, Lubbock, Lufkin, Madisonville, Marshall, Midland, Mount Haven (annexed to Jacksonville), Nacogdoches, Palestine, Port Arthur, Refugio, Richardson, Sabine Pass, San Angelo, San Augustine, Shelbyville, Silsbee, South Park, Sulphur Springs, Temple, Waskom and Wichita Falls.

COURTS SPEAK — Third Court of Civil Appeals voided incorporation of West Lake Hills (an Austin suburb), holding that a city cannot incorporate solely to escape annexation and taxes of a neighboring city.

Supreme Court held that the State Board of Medical Examiners could not revoke the license of a Galveston pathologist for failing to keep records of medication administered to himself and his family.

Reversing an Abilene domestic relations court ruling, the High Court directed that custody of four children be taken from the mother and given to the father.

Court of Criminal Appeals said the co-defendant in a case cannot be called as a witness against another unless he previously agreed to testify.

WAR ON TAXES — Texas Manufacturers Association has declared war on additional state taxes and set up a special department to keep an eye on state spending.

Alarmed by reports that the 1971 tax bill may go as high as \$700 million, TMA President Ed C. Burris said its organization is going to do everything in its power to prevent any kind of increase.

TMA, said Burris, also will be on guard against long range spending programs, with increases automatically built into state law.

Carl H. Braubach, a budget analyst under former Gov. John Connally, and one time Legislative Budget Board staffer John A. Haddad will head a research project on keeping government spending within revenues. Offices will be located in Austin near the capitol.
