**Highlights and Sidelights**  
From Your State Capitol

AUSTIN, Tex. — Half a dozen new amendments have been added to the Texas Constitution, including one authorizing sale of liquor-by-the-drink.

Passage of Amendment 2, however, does not mean automatic mixed drink dispensing. Amendment merely repeals the ban on open saloons and empowers the legislature to pass a law regulating liquor-by-the-drink.

Starting next January, lawmakers must first act to establish procedures, licensing requirements and regulations. Then, local option elections must be held to determine where mixed drink sales are wanted by voters.

Many observers feel there actually will be no legal sales of booze over the bar in public estab-

lishments before the end of 1971. Others think preliminaries will be disposed of in some areas by mid-year, but that would mean passage of the bill by a two-thirds majority to place it in immediate effect. More likely effective date of legislation is next September, with elections to follow.

Other constitutional changes would provide for:

Disciplinary action, including censure, of all judges.

Appointed (by governor) three-man State Building Commission. County issue of road bonds up to one-fourth of assessed value of all local real property, on majority vote of property taxpayers. Increase from \$5,000 to \$10,000 in value of homestead which is exempt from forced sale.

Laws permitting all counties to consolidate certain services and offices.

Amendment to permit farm land assessment on the basis of crop yield was defeated.

GOP'S ECONOMIZING — Texas Republican party began off-year cutting back on its operation 24 hours after the general election.

Headquarters staff here shrank suddenly from 23 to eight, and further reduction is expected.

Democratic leaders — Gov. Preston Smith, Senator-elect Lloyd Bentsen and Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes — meanwhile, began sizing up Tower for attack in 1972 election. Barnes said he is thinking about running against Tower himself, although he has not firmly ruled out the governor's race.

TAX BURDEN LOWER—Texans may be tax-shy after reading what is going to happen to them in the next legislative session, but they are better off than most industrial state residents, according to a new study.

Only Ohio among 16 most industrial states has a lower state and local tax burden, Texas Research League reports. Texans' 1969 burden amounted to 8.5 per cent of personal income. Ohio's was 8.2 per cent, study showed. Louisiana and Oklahoma had

10.7 and 9.4 per cent, respectively.

League's study found that a Houston family of four with gross income of \$10,000 would have paid \$510 in 1968, excluding city sales tax. Same family would have paid \$545 in Cleveland and \$891 in Boston.

In the \$3,500 income class, Texas ranks 10th among the 12 states in tax burden, while in the \$50,000 class, Texas is 12th.

Rich or poor, said the League, Texas' burden is relatively low.

**Many Factors Influence Per Capita Consumption of Meat**

There are several factors which influence the per capita consumption of meat in the United States but, explains Ed Uvacek, Extension livestock marketing specialist, none is more important than meat production.

How is the per capita consumption of meat figured in the first place? Uvacek says it's simple; namely, meat production plus imports, minus meat exports, divided by the human population. Since imports are small and exports insignificant, the really important factor then is meat production. Larger productions of beef, for example, tend to raise the per capita consumption level as long as they are greater than the population growth. Beef consumption per capita is expected to reach 114 pounds this year compared with 110 pounds last year, notes the specialist.

Income is another factor Uvacek relates as highly important to meat consumption. As per capita income after (taxes) rises, meat consumption usually increases, he says. This relationship is much more pronounced for certain cuts such as steaks and roasts and less evident for items like bacon and ham.

Price has a major influence on meat consumption levels and the usual pattern — as prices rise — meat consumption moves lower. Consumption of specific meat cuts, however, varies considerably in their reaction to price changes, explains Uvacek.

Research indicates that the consumer's occupation also affects consumption habits. Laborers, for example, tend to eat more meat than white-collar workers.

Where one lives also influences the types of meat and the amount consumed, notes Uvacek. City dwellers, in general eat more meat than rural people. Regional differences in meat consumption habits are real. A person who grew up in the North East U. S. is likely to consume more lamb and heavier beef than is a native Texan, says Uvacek.

Family size and its composition may also play a role in meat consumption. In general, explains the specialist, teenagers in a family usually eat more meat while older people consume very little. As a rule, the per capita consumption of meat decreases as family size increases, says Uvacek.

**Social Security News**

Q—I just turned 65. I was told if I do not perform substantial services in my business I could get social security benefits. What is meant by "substantial services"?

A—"Substantial services" refers to the amount of time you work in your business, the nature of your services, the type of business, and the relationship of your activities before retirement to those after retirement. Usually, 45 or more hours of work in a month is considered "substantial services." Less than 45 hours may be considered substantial if the service is managing a large business or working in a highly skilled occupation. You can get more detailed information at your social security office.
