Stern Coloniai Laws

Many laws that seem queer to us now were passed in Colonial times, among them the following.

plaint of the excessive wearing of lace and other superfluities tending to little use or benefit, but to the ourishment of pride and the exhausting of men's estates, and also of evil examples to others; 'tis therefore ordered by the court, and decreed, that henceforth no perbuy or sell within this jurisdiction any manner of lace to be worn or within our limits. And that no tallor, or any other person what-soever, shall hereafter set any lace or points upon any garment, either linen, woolen, or any other wearing clothes whatsoever, and that no person hereafter shall be employed in making any manner of lace, but such as shall and will transport the same out of this jurisdiction, who in such case shall have the liberty to buy the same.

"And that hereafter no garment shall be made with short sleeves, whereby the nakedness of their arms may be discovered in the wearing thereof, and such as already have garments made with short sleeves shall not, hereafter, wear the same, unless they cover the arms to the wrist with linen or otherwise. And that hereafter no person sha!l make any garment for women with sleeves more than half an ell wide in the widest place thereof, and so proportionable for larger or smaller persons."-Kansas City Star.

The sole representative of the fish group recorded upon the floor of North America's greatest subsea level depression is a small minnow scientifically designated as Cyprindon Macularius. This creasalt water springs of Death valley. The mammals represented range in size from the bighorn sheep (Ovis Nelsoni), which come down upon the floor of the valley from their natural habitat in the neighboring Panamint and Funeral mountains: on down to coyotes, rabbits, moles, mice and shrews.



SANITARY RUNWAY QUITE VALUABLE

Brooding Platform May Be Used With Fair Success.

(By G. T. Klein, Extension Poultryman, K. S. A.)

By making use of the "sanitary runway," the permanent brooder house that has for years been the menace of the poultry industry may be used with a fair degree of

The runway is merely a brooding platform that is placed in front of the brooder house. It has a floor of one-half inch hail screen or bardware cloth. The wire floor, which is about 15 inches from the ground, allows all droppings and fifth to fall through. Wire sides and top of one inch poultry netting confines the chicks to the runway and protects them from enemies.

The sanitary runway accomplishes everything that turning the chicks outside will accomplish, giving them exercise and sunlight and them from contaminated soil. Diseases are less likely to spread when chicks are running on the wire floor, for they have

less opportunity of infection. The runway may be ten feet wide and the entire length of the brooder house. The framework may be constructed of 1 by 4 inch material. These boards are placed on edge to support the floor. Boards may be spaced two feet apart. The wire may be either 24 or 48 inch widths. high-quality egg. 48-inch material makes a slightly stronger floor. Sides should be two feet high. Sections of the top should be hinged for ease in filling the feeders and care for the

Sufficient Number of

Nests Properly Placed The number of nests in relation to the size of the laying flock during the heavy laying season is important. With a sufficient number of nests properly placed there is less danger of eggs being deposited

in the litter and becoming lost, stepped on, or otherwise broken. Nests should be darkened; they should be so constructed that it is easy for one to see and remove eggs. If nests are too large eggs be had to some artificial means of may be broken by two or more hens crowding into them. Twelve by fourteen inches is suggested for the smaller breeds. Nests should

Chilling Kills Chicks

More little chicks die from diarrhea caused directly by chilling than die from all other diseases. A chick that gets chilled quickly develops bowel trouble, which is hard to distinguish from white diarrhea. Soon the entire flock is a fected. Just keeping the floor of the brooder at the right tempera-ture will solve half the problems of bringing the chick through the crucial first three weeks. Remem-

Care of Young Turkeys

The young turkeys, when first First, look for lice and be sure to get rid of every one or they will get the young turkeys. Use any good insect powder, dusting it on them, then put them in a paper sack and shake them up. Second, be sure to keep them dry and warm -not too closely confined. Place the mother in a coop with a little pen in front so the little turkeys cannot run away, for, at first they are very shy.

SELECTING EGGS FOR HATCHING

Quality of Chickens Hatched Depends on Care Used.

Considerable care should be taken in the selection of eggs for hatching, for the quality of eggs used will determine to a large extent the quality of the chickens hatched from them.

This caution is usged by O. C. Ufford, poultry specialist for the extension service of the Colorado Agricultural college.

Eggs used for hatching should never be over ten to fourteen days old, and the fresher the better, the poultry specialist declares.

The size, shape and color of an egg is an inherited quality, and if one uses small or mis-shaped eggs for hatching, the pullets that hatch from such eggs are liable to be under-sized and have a tendency to lay the kind of eggs from which they are hatched.

The standard weight of an egg is two ounces. It is best to set eggs as near this weight as possible. hatching egg should not be long and narrow or illformed in any way. Eggs that are ridged, rough-shelled or thin-shelled in spots are undesirable for hatching purposes.

White eggs should be uniformly chalk white in color; a tint of brown is objectionable. There are many shades of brown, but if one will select for a certain shade one may build up a strain of birds that will lay very uniform colored eggs. This is particularly desirable when one is marketing a particularly

When one is saving eggs for hatching one should keep them in a cool place, with a temperature of between 45 and 65 degrees. When saving eggs longer than three or four days they should be turned

Gravelly Soil Is Most

Desirable for Sites Poultry yards and the sites for poultry houses should be selected with a view to dryness and shelter. A sandy, gravelly soil is most de sirable for this purpose, while the lay of the ground should be such as to provide a free natural drainage. If the topography is of such a nature as to render the latter difficult or impossible, recourse must securing dryness. Excessive mois-ture of the environment is always objectionable from the standpoint of poultry production, while, fur be easy to remove to facilitate thermore, the presence of surface water, which birds are apt to drink, must be regarded as a very serious source of mischief. Turkey Raising Given Earnest Consideration

Turkey raising has attracted considerable attention in late years due to the possibility of raising the turkey in confinement. A majority are of the opinion that turkeys must be given the entire range of the farm, and where this is done it is impossible to keep them away

from infected grounds.

The confinement plan which is being successfully used confines the turkeys to areas which are not infested with blackhead, and keeps the turkeys away from chickens. So far as care of turkeys is concerned they may be brooded and fed the same way as baby chicks.
All feeds should be hopper fed.

Making Plans Now for Improvement of Flock

As the returns from the flock depend largely upon the number of eggs laid, we must first get better stock. This means stock with the ability to lay more eggs bred late them. In the case of farm flocks, this may be brought about to a range.



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
