CERTIFICATION

May 15 is the final date to certify your wheat acreage. If you are not signed up in the Feed Grain Program, you must certify to your diverted acres by May 15 also.

Diverted Acres

No grazing is permitted on diverted acres after May 14. If you have wheat on diverted acres which is grazed off, it should be plowed as soon as possible. If rye is left standing on diverted or conserving use acreages after May 15, statements must be on file in this office of your intentions to leave the rye. This must be done by the same date, May 15.

Soybeans

Because of the increased demand for soybean meal both in the U. S. and abroad, American soybean producers are selling record quantities of soybeans this year. Growers have reported intentions to plant in 1970 almost one million acres above the 1969 acreage.

Cotton Loan Rate

The basic loan rate for middling 1 inch upland cotton will be 20.25 cents per pound.

Agricultural Conservation Program

Funds are available for carrying out needed conservation practices. Make your application before starting work.

Better Storm Warning System Set Up Here By Civil Defense

In order to correct some of the deficiencies that were evident here following the recent tornado, the Donley County Civil Defense unit has initiated plans for a better communications network.

A 24-Hour telephone number has been established so you have a definite place to report a storm or any other type of emergency without delay. The number is 874-3438 (City Hall Number) and someone will be present to take your call at any hour around the clock. Post this number in a convenient place so you can make a report of tornado or other emergency without delay.

Information received at the above number will be relayed to local officials, civil defense units, weather bureau and the local Cable TV for immediate transmission for public safety or action. Plans are under way to organize a Citizens Band Radio communications system also.

The next meeting of the Civil Defense will be at the City Hall tonight, Thursday, from 6 to 7 p.m. Purpose will be to fully organize the unit here to be ready for anything that might come up. Interested citizens will be welcome at the meeting.

Voter Turnout Is Poor Here For First Primary Election Saturday

Only a fraction over half of the registered voters in Donley County went to the polls to cast their ballot in the first primary election Saturday. The same situation was evident over the entire state. This is a deplorable situation when so much confusion and criticism is the topic of the day. Voters will not take time to go and voice their opinion or way of thinking through the candidate of their choice who they hope will represent them fairly in whichever office he may be seeking. Some were possibly defeated because you and your neighbor did not vote or the person that did win would have felt even better with a larger vote of confidence. Think about it more seriously and plan now to

be counted in the run-off election June 6.

All but one office was settled in Donley County and that of State Senator, 31st District for the area, W. R. (Billie) Christal and Frank Thomas will be making the campaign routes for another 30 days to stir out the voters for the run-off primary June 6 for the office of County Judge. Christal needed only 15 votes to win by a majority. Max Sherman and Jack Hazelwood, both of Amarillo, will be battling for the State Senate seat to be vacated by Senator Grady Hazelwood.

In other contested County Races Jess Finley defeated both of his opponents, Dennis Rattan and Billy Ray Johnston by a 63 vote margin, for re-election as Commissioner of Precinct 4. John W. Swinney defeated Roy Blackman by a 27 vote margin to become the new Commissioner of Precinct 2. M. O. Weatherly of Hedley defeated his opponent, L. E. (Louie) Bogue by 188 votes to be re-elected Justice of the Peace.

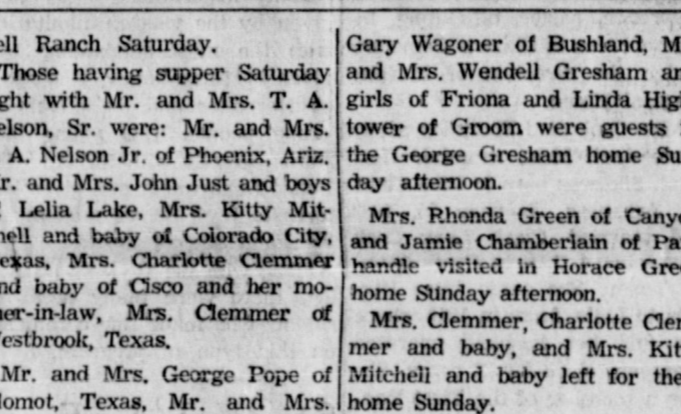

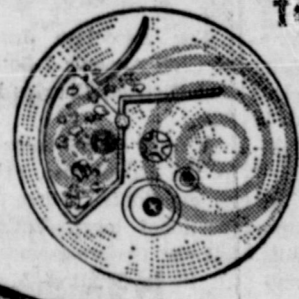

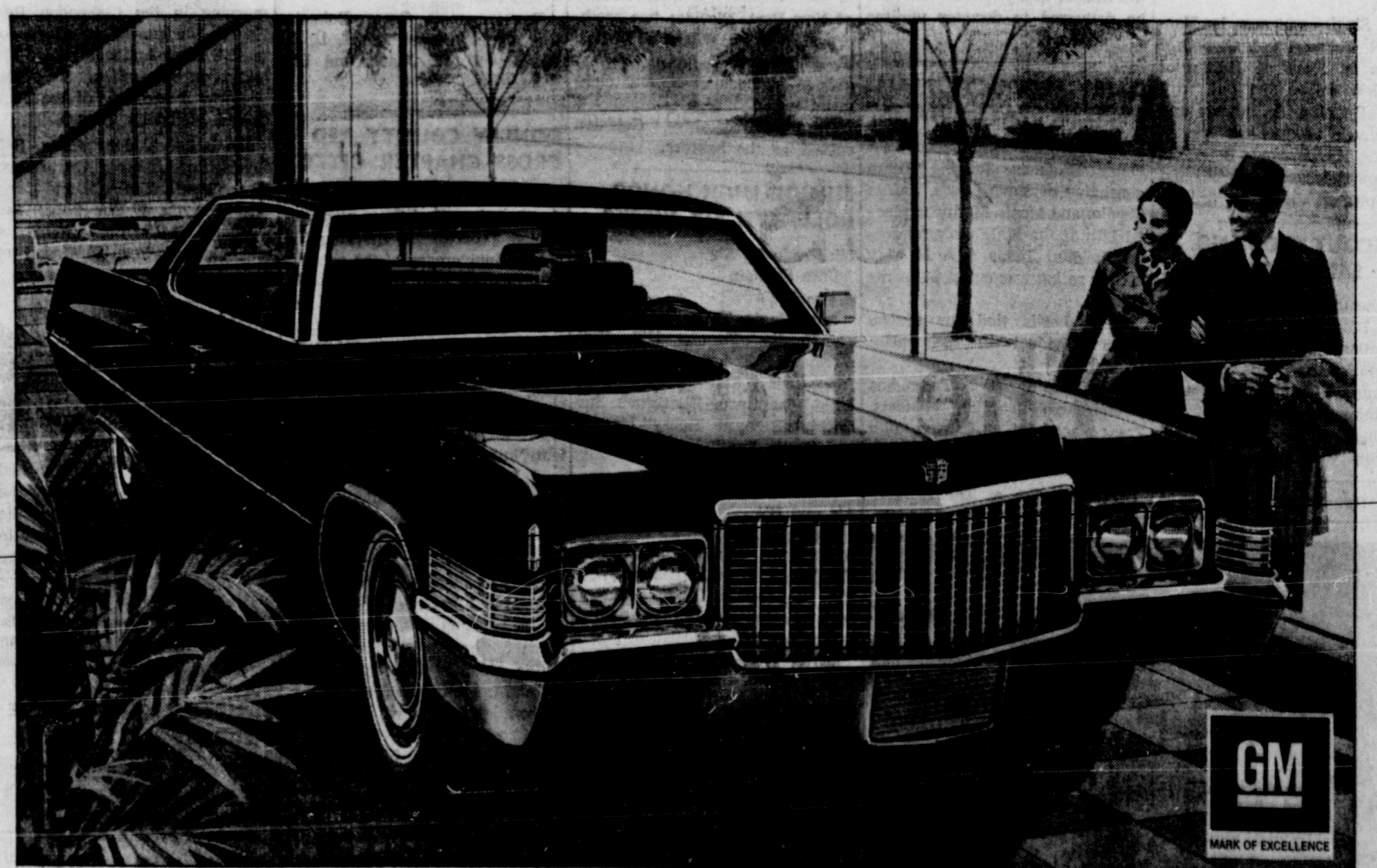

Bright Newhouse presented a beautiful plaque to Mrs. Brumley on behalf of Mu Gamma and

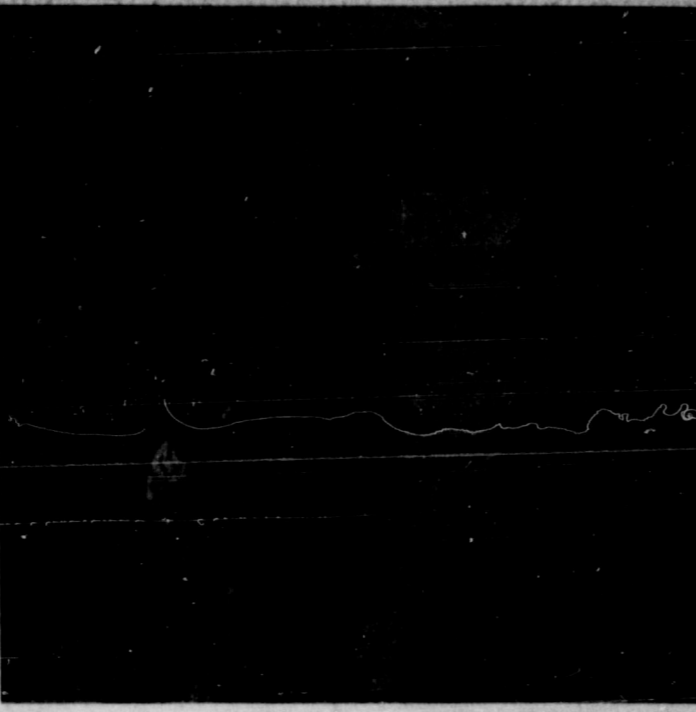

Highlights and Sidelights
From Your State Capitol
By Vern Stanford

State Board of Mental Health, Mental Retardation accepted the resignation of State MH-MR Commissioner John Kinross-Wright and appointed a committee to look for a new commissioner.

Committee consists of MH-MR Chairman Ward Burke of Lufkin; Dr. Charles H. Brown, a Wichita Falls psychiatrist; Dr. Robert S. Tate Jr., pastor of the First Methodist Church of Austin, and Edwin R. Van Zandt, Beaumont newspaper executive.

First three appointees were among the six board members who had requested Kinross-Wright's resignation. Van Zandt was one of three board members who wanted the commissioner to continue heading the massive (27,000 patients, 13,000 employees) state MH-MR care and treatment system.

Finding a new commissioner will not be an easy task. When the old Texas Board for State Hospitals and Special Schools was converted into the Board for Mental Health-Mental Retardation in 1963—and the new law charged that a commissioner should dictate everything but basic policy—it took many months to find a commissioner. Law also says the commissioner must be a physician.

Finally, Dr. Shervert Frazier of Baylor University Medical College was persuaded to take the job on a part-time basis. That didn't work out well for Frazier, or the system, and Kinross-Wright was lured from the Texas Research Institute for Mental Sciences in Houston three years ago.

His tenure was ridden with strife, as a segment of board members led by Dr. Tate charged that the commissioner neglected the community mental health center program. Controversy flared into a firing when Kinross-Wright asked for the resignation of Deputy MH Commissioner Dr. Gary Miller, and Kinross-Wright ultimately bowed out.

Miller literally was waiting in the wings this week (having refused to accept his firing) as a hopeful for the vacancy. Gov. Preston Smith's comprehensive health planning director, Dr. David Wade of Austin, a psychiatrist who formerly headed the Texas Medical Association, was mentioned as a possibility. But Wade insists he is committed to his present health planning pursuit. Whatever the committee does will be subject to criticism by some segments of state mental health and state mental retardation organizations.

AG OPINIONS — Attorney General Crawford Martin ruled that

Hidalgo County voters who signed a petition to nominate Raza Uida Party candidates for county and precinct offices signed a valid document, but could invalidate it if they participated in any other party primary. So, the candidates may not have a clear path until the primary lists are checked against the petition signatures.

Martin also held that: An independent school district may deduct union dues from the wages of its custodial and maintenance employees with their authorization.

New Texas Commission for Rehabilitation is the legal successor to all function of the Texas Education Agency's divisions of vocational rehabilitation and vocational determination.

In Harris County, probate instruments must be filed under the direction of the county clerk.

"TALKING LICENSE" — Texas Public Safety Commission is considering possible future use of a "talking driver's license." Project is under development by DEK Processes Division, the firm that makes pictorial licenses for the state.

Proposed "talking" license would resemble a credit card, provide DPS officers with an instantaneous method of checking drivers. Card would have a magnetic number on the back (in computer code) which could be fed to a computer center over police radio.

Computer would send a print back to the apprehending officer within 30 seconds, indicating whether a person is wanted, the number of previous traffic violations, and so forth.

NATURAL FIBER STUDY — Chairman Charles Scruggs of the Interim Committee on Natural Fibers appointed subcommittees to assault the problems of the state's natural fiber industry. "Our goal is to add a billion dollars to Texas' farm income in five years," Scruggs said. "That's why we don't just want to write a report. We hope this will be an action committee."

Scruggs named the following to the subcommittee on cotton, wool and mohair export development: Rep. Hilary Doran of Del Rio, Sen. Wayne Connally of Floresville, Hillsboro Cotton Farmer Dan Pustejovsky and Natural Wool Growers Pres. James Powell of Fort McKavett.

To study textile industry development he appointed Sens. J. P. Word of Meridian and W. E. (Pete) Snelson of Midland, Rep. Charles Finnell of Holliday and Scruggs. To study producing and marketing development, he appointed Rep. Delwin Jones of Lubbock, Sen. Snelson, Powell and Pustejovsky.

JUDGES' VIEWS ON MARIJUANA SOUGHT — While other politicians and state officials argue about what penalties should be applied to persons possessing marijuana, Governor Smith decid-

ed to ask the men who mete out the punishment.

So, he had Harold K. Dudley, director of the Governor's State Program on Narcotics and Drug Abuse, send a six-part questionnaire to every district judge in Texas. Query asks if the penalty for possession should remain a felony or be changed to a misdemeanor. And — if a change is advocated — should it be changed on the first offense, or the second and subsequent offenses.

Accent on Health

More than 500,000 children will swallow poison this year in the United States; and 90 per cent of all cases reported will involve children under the age of five.

The tragedy of the situation, says the Texas State Department of Health, is that most all accidental poisonings are preventable.

Why are young children the greatest victims of accidental poisoning? The pre-school child has an inquisitive nature. Closets and cupboards are great places to hide and investigate. A child will taste, bite and swallow anything he can reach, and teething time calls for chewing on furniture, toys and window sills.

At about the age of two, a child takes to "mountain climbing," using chairs, tables or stools to open medicine cabinets and any other reachable places.

Accidental poisonings don't just happen. They take a special mixture of factors which normally have a formula which reads: A contributing thing, plus a contributing surroundings, plus a contributing individual. The result of this formula is poisoning.

Many of us are unaware of the potential dangers of medicines and other household substances. Even salt and pepper may produce an injurious or deadly effect when used in large amounts. A five-year-old youngster in Rhode Island died after swallowing about two tablespoons of ordinary pepper. In another tragedy, a 22-month-old child died after inhaling a large amount of talcum powder.

How do you determine if your child may have been poisoned? Suspect it when you observe: 1. Bottles or packages of medicines, household cleaning agents or poisonous substances open near children. 2. Unconsciousness, confusion or sudden illness which is unexplained. 3. Pain or burning sensation in mouth or throat. 4. Discoloration of lips and mouth and strange odors on the breath. If you suspect an accidental poisoning, take the following steps: 1. Call your doctor at once. 2. If you cannot reach the doctor, take your child to the nearest hospital and be sure to take the container of the suspected poison with you. A sample of the chemical can be most useful also. 3. One important point: A person who has swallowed poison should not be made to vomit since this could aggravate the situation.

The phrase, "Poison Proof Your Home," may seem trite due to over-usage. But it is even more meaningful today than in the past with the advent of more and more home chemicals. In 1968 in Texas a total of 73 fatal home poisonings were recorded. Some 4,000 fatal poisonings occur in the United States each year.

To help poison proof your home, you can: 1. Store all medicines and household products in locked cabinets; 2. Clean out medicine cabinets regularly; 3. Don't put hazardous objects in soft drink bottles but keep them in their containers; 4. Don't use any lead paints on toys or furniture.

Storm Damage to Trees Should Get Immediate Attention

Trees damaged by violent weather during spring and early summer should get immediate attention. Storm damaged limbs or branches should be removed immediately, advises Everett Janne, Texas A&M University Extension landscape horticulturist.

When a limb or branch must be removed in its entirety, the Extension specialist says to make the cut flush with the tree trunk or limb from which it is growing. Also, he says paint all wounds with a good tree wound dressing to prevent the entrance of disease or insects into the freshly made cut.

The job of removing large limbs can be simplified and damage to the bark can be prevented if care is exercised, says Janne. He suggests making a cut from the underside of the limb about eight inches from the main trunk. Make this cut at least one-third of the way through the limb or until the saw binds. Then make the second cut from above and several inches farther out on the limb and continue cutting until it can be removed. Then apply tree wound dressing to the exposed surface.

The regulation, adopted by the State Legislature, does not apply to freshwater trotlines. Further regulations concerning both fresh and saltwater trotline fishing are available in the Department's "Texas Fishing Guide."

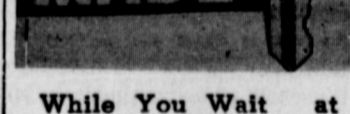

Social Security News

Q.—I recently lost my social security card and someone told me it was easier and quicker to get a duplicate card with my original number. Is this true?

A.—Absolutely not! If you have a record of your number (on W-2, or written on an identification card or other record) the Social Security office can now usually issue you a duplicate card within two days. This faster service is due to computerization and use of wire service. However, if you did not keep a record of your number, it could still take 10 to 12 days to get a duplicate card. But, most important of all, a person should never have more than one social security number.

May Is Senior Citizens Month

May celebrates Senior Citizens Month in Texas and the rest of the country... for the eighth time, Presidents Kennedy, Johnson and Nixon have issued proclamations each year since 1963 honoring those people 65 years and older.

The movement actually began in 1963 when New York celebrated May as Senior Citizens Month.

When the movement to select a month for senior citizens began to shape up in the early 1950's those first leaders were impressed with trends in longevity and the increasing life span. They believed that a senior citizens month observed nationally would emphasize this new fact; older persons would be recognized for their judgment, skills, experience and wisdom; outstanding service by senior citizens could be recognized; it was very important to begin early in life to prepare for the senior years and that such a celebration could tend to discourage or counteract the tendency to segregate older persons as a group apart.

Most people credit a Fort Worth woman, Miss Anna C. Leahy who was director (in 1956) of Senior Citizens of America, as the one person who so diligently pursued the idea. She is credited, also, with persuading President Kennedy to sign the first proclamation.

In 1959 thirty-nine state heads proclaimed May as Senior Citizens Month and nationwide observance was sponsored by the Senior Citizens of America. By 1960 forty-eight states participated in the observance.

Finally in 1963 the hope for recognition of older Americans came with the first presidential proclamation.

This year 207 Texas county committees on aging will proclaim May as Senior Citizens Month and hold suitable affairs in honor of it.

Following the early pattern for celebration, states, counties, and communities were and still are urged to implement special programs, activities and events to honor senior citizens. "In Texas we use two special activities more than others: the proclamation and the selection of outstanding senior citizens of the county or community," according to Minnie Bell Extension specialist for aging at Texas A&M University. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service works with the Governor's Committee on Aging to implement activities for Senior Citizens on the county level.

Some of the other aims dealt

with unifying agencies and groups working on needs and problems of the aging; to help familiarize senior citizens with services from government, private and educational institutions and to encourage home, school, church, community, state and nation to take cognizance of the senior citizen and his worth in the society.

Congressman Bob Price

18th District, Texas

Congressman Bob Price (R-Texas) told the House of Representatives Wednesday of last week that President Nixon should declare a new strategy in Vietnam designed to focus this Nation's military might on bringing the conflict there to a speedy close.

Price introduced a resolution calling on the President to "institute a plan of action of day and night bombardment that will assure the total destruction of North Vietnam's military and industrial installations, transportation and communications lines, Haiphong Harbor, and a total air land and sea embargo on commerce between North Vietnam and other Nations."

The Korean War fighter pilot also called for the President to send U. S. military equipment and supplies and military advisors to Cambodia.

Price called his proposal the "fourth alternative."

"The Paris Peace Talks have been marked with much heat, but little light. The second alternative, unilateral withdrawal, has been rejected because it would mean that great American sacrifices have all been in vain and would constitute proof that the United States is unwilling to live up to its commitments. The third alternative, Viet-namization, has worked much better than I originally thought it would. Recent events, however, have demonstrated that the enemy has not scaled down his activities in response to American troop withdrawal."

"The Communists do not want any peace except on terms which will allow them to enforce their will on millions of helpless Asians. Bitter experiences demonstrate that where dealing with the Reds is concerned, there is no middle ground. Accordingly, I believe that President Nixon should declare this new strategy in Vietnam."

"I think the military policies I have outlined would lead to the swift defeat of the aggressors, and a well earned peace could

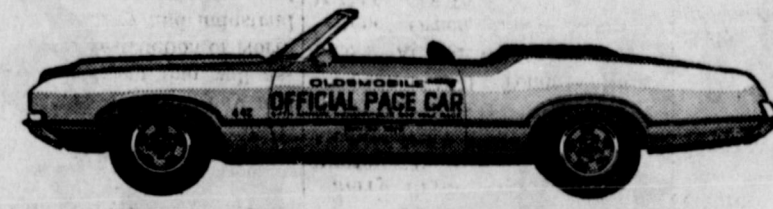
