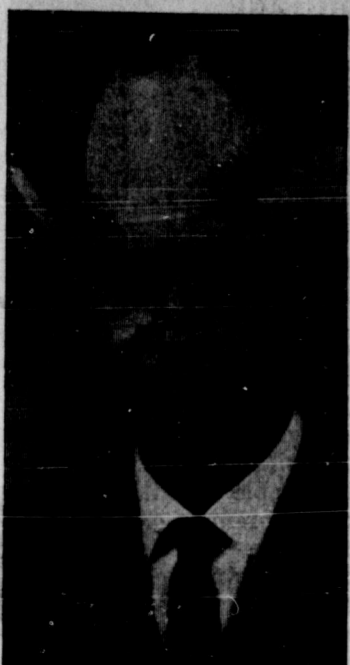

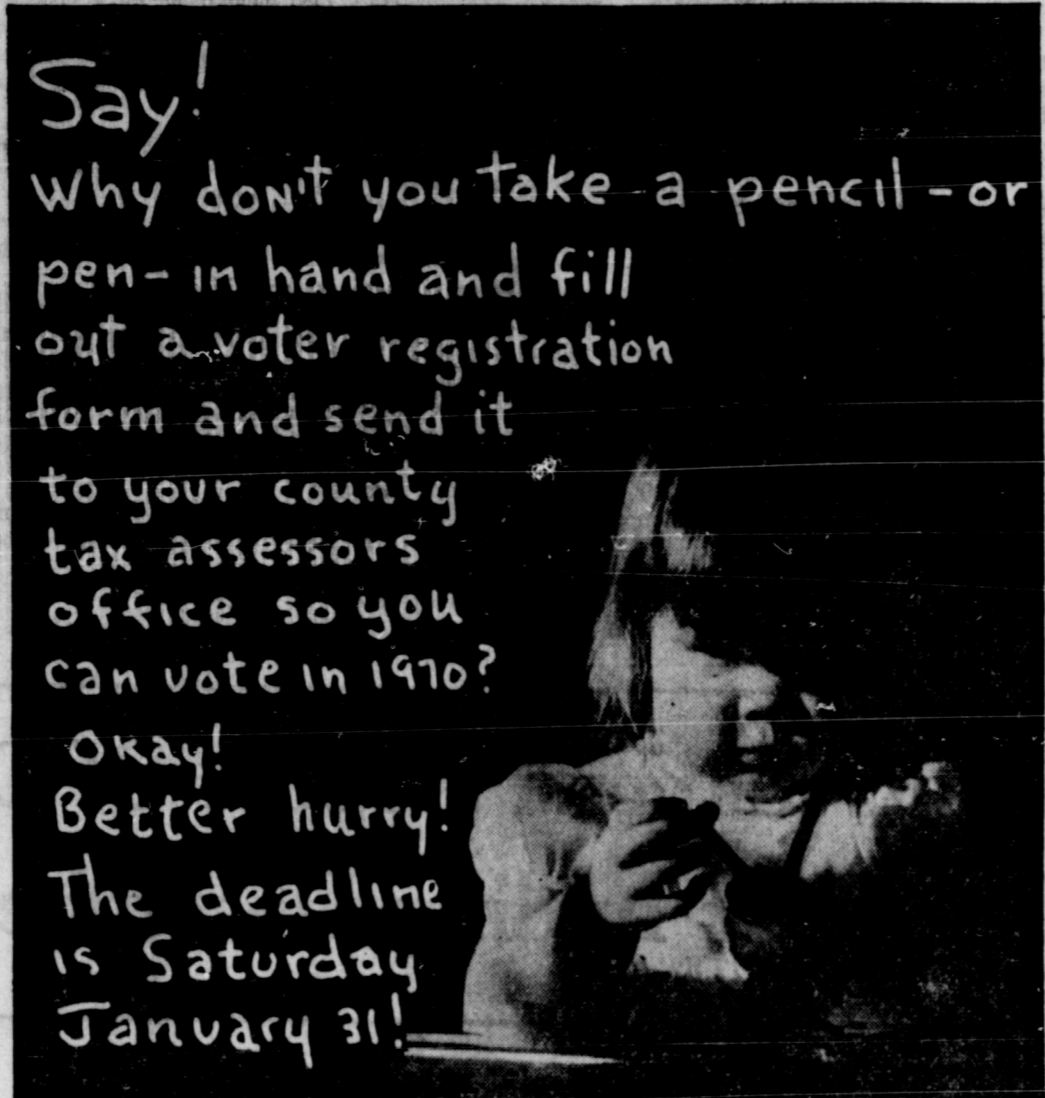

Hill Services Held Tuesday At Hedley

Funeral services for John Franklin Hill, Sr., 86, of Hedley were held Tuesday afternoon at the First Baptist Church of Hedley with Rev. Dave Sellers, pastor, Rev. C. R. Murphy, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Silverton, and Rev. Billy Wilson, pastor of the United Methodist Church of Hedley officiating. Burial was in Rowe Cemetery.

Mr. Hill died in Hall County Hospital at Memphis late Saturday afternoon of injuries he sustained about 2:30 p.m. when his pickup went out of control on icy streets in Hedley and struck a utility pole.

Mr. Hill was a native of Paint Rock, Alabama and had lived in Donley County for the past 48 years having moved to this area in 1922 from Montague County. In 1902 he married Eva Jane Sanders in Winchester, Tenn. He was a member of the First Christian Church.

Election Called Wednesday To Create Hospital District, Set Tax Rate And Vote Bonds

A joint meeting of the Adair Hospital Board and the County Commissioners Court was held Wednesday morning at which time the Hospital Board requested, in accordance with the law passed by the Texas Legislature during their last session, that an election be called confirming the creation of a Hospital District in Donley County.

The Commissioners Court called the election for Saturday, March 14, 1970 with one voting place at the County Court House in Clarendon and were joined in the action by the Hospital Board.

The election order calls for two propositions: 1. An Election confirming the creation of a Hospital District for Donley County and setting a tax rate not to exceed 75c per \$100 valuation to meet requirements for the retirement of bonds and maintenance and operating expenses. 2. Voting bonds to construct a new County Hospital in the amount of \$590,000.

Mike McCully, chairman of the hospital board, stated that the purpose of creating the district and the proposition of building a new county hospital has been brought about by the fact that the present hospital has been classed as inadequate to be approved for Medicare payments. It is now operating on temporary approval until some action can be taken on the forming of a Hospital District and the construction of a new County Hospital.

More particulars regarding the election and the official publication notice calling the election will appear in the Leader next week.

Bronchos Add Wins To Season Record

Clarendon High School Bronchos added two more wins to their season basketball record the past week when they defeated Silverton Friday night 82-49 and Happy on Tuesday night 75-52.

The Bronchos traveled to Silverton Friday night. Clarendon held a two point lead, 20-18 at the end of the first period of play but by half time had surged forward 56-26. By the end of the third quarter the score stood at 65-37. Charles Louis and Jim Moore paced the Bronchos with 22 points each. Wayne Carter hit 11 with Bennie Reese and Steve Adams each adding scores. All of the reserves scored at least two points. Finesas Ivory was tops for Silverton with 28 points.

In the game with Happy here Tuesday night by quarters the tally was 17-9, 39-26, and 63-33 to the final 75-52 with the Bronchos on top all the way. Charles Louis was high point man for the game with 28, Bennie Reese and Wayne Carter each hit 17. High for Happy was Tommy Taylor and Joe Dempsey with 18 each.

Clarendon girls showed improvement over previous weeks play though they lost to Silverton 29-39 and to Happy 44-62.

At Silverton Friday night Clarendon girls took the lead in the first quarter 6-3 but by halftime had dropped behind 11-15 and were never able to regain the lead. The third quarter ended on a 20-29 score. Lee Ann McCracken paced the Bronchoettes with 14 points. Joan Smith dropped in 11. High for Silverton was Paula Birdwell with 16.

A similar set up carried through into the game with Happy here Tuesday night with Clarendon girls leading the first quarter 16-11 but trailing by halftime 22-30. The third quarter ended with a 31-52 tally. High for Clarendon was McCracken with 13. Smith with 12, and Carolyn Barrow with 8. Sandy Woods was tops for Happy with 30 points.

The first half of District play will come to an end Friday night of this week with the McLean teams playing here. B Boys will play at 5 p.m., Varsity Girls at 6:30 p.m., to be followed by the Varsity Boys.

Tuesday night Wheeler will play here with the B Boys scheduled to play at 5 p.m., Varsity Girls at 6:30 and the Varsity Boys to follow.

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School Census Now Underway Here

The annual school census is being taken at the present time with census blanks being sent home to parents of children now in school this week. Supt. Arling Cordell said, pointing out that it is most important to get the names of children who will be beginning school next fall on the rolls now.

Parents who will have school beginners in September, and who do not have children in school now, are urged to contact the office of either of the school principals or of Supt. Cordell to obtain a census form. The census must be completed by February 1.

Eighty per cent of the operating budget of the local school comes from the state based on the census, transfers and the average daily attendance so it is quite important that each child be counted.

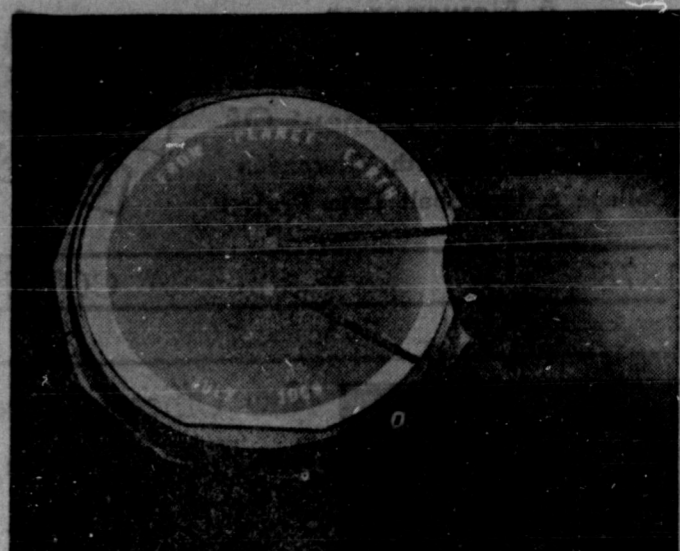

MICRO-MESSAGES FOR THE MOON from 74 heads of state plus four U.S. documents are contained on this 1 1/2 inch diameter silicon wafer in a Time Capsule left on the moon by the Apollo 11 astronauts. The messages were reduced to 1/200th of their original size by a new information technology process developed by the Sprague Electric Company Semiconductor Division, Worcester, Mass. By etching the micro-messages in an ultra-thin, 4-millionths of an inch, quartz (silicon dioxide) coating on the silicon wafer, a record able to withstand the extreme conditions of space will remain permanently on the moon to signify the historic event. The Sprague process allows the pin-head sized messages to withstand temperatures over 1800°F indefinitely, something far beyond the abilities of microfilm and other previous micro-reproduction techniques.

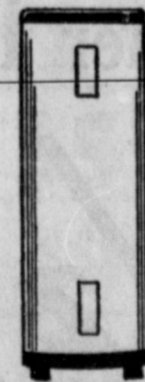

CC In Western Information Network

A grant of \$63,000 from The Moody Foundation — to be used to start initial programming for 18 colleges and universities in the Western Information Network (WIN) — was announced recently by Dr. Marvin Baker, chairman of the WIN Board of Directors and president of South Plains College in Levelland.

Four institutions — Hardin-Simmons University at Abilene, Midwestern University at Wichita Falls, Howard County Junior College at Big Spring, and South Plains College — already have made arrangements to offer the first WIN course, an Introduction to Computer Science.

Dr. John R. Bradford, executive director of WIN and dean of engineering at Texas Tech University, and who originated the concept of WIN and pressed for the enabling legislation, said that the money will be used to purchase for each of the 18 institutions a video tape playback unit and monitor, a stand for the equipment, and video tapes. These will be delivered to each school early in 1970, he said.

"WIN is starting with video taped courses," Bradford said, "because The Moody Foundation support makes this possible. WIN was established, however, primarily as a closed-circuit television network between the WIN member institutions, and this still is the goal supported by each of the 18 WIN members. Until funding makes this possible, however, the video tape method allows WIN to provide services to the institutions of higher education in western Texas."

At the end of the course, tapes will be returned to WIN, erased, and the cleared tapes will be available for the next course offering.

Member institutions include: Abilene Christian College, Abilene; Amarillo College, Amarillo; Angelo State University, San Angelo; Clarendon College, Clarendon; Frank Phillips College, Borger; Hardin-Simmons University; Howard County Junior College; Howard Payne College, Brownwood; Lubbock Christian College; Lubbock; Midwestern University; McMurry College, Abilene; Odessa College, Odessa; South Plains College; Sul Ross State College, Alpine; Texas Tech University; the University of Texas at El Paso; Wayland Baptist College, Plainview, and West Texas State University, Canyon.

TEXAS WEIGHMASTER TRAINING SCHOOLS

A series of Weighmaster Training Schools sponsored jointly by State and Federal weighing officials drew 186 participants in Texas last week.

Sam M. Copeland, Scales and Weighing Specialist of USDA's Packers and Stockyards Administration's office in Fort Worth, and R. T. Williams, Director of Consumer Services, Texas Department of Agriculture, both described the schools as "highly successful."

Copeland said all those attending the sessions will receive certificates from the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Williams said the schools, a pilot training project in the State of Texas, were especially significant in terms of State-Federal cooperation, and in obtaining cooperation from the livestock industry in assuring accurate weights.

"Weights determine value and that's what livestock marketing is all about," Williams said. "We believe everyone will benefit from the sound, formal training that our weighmasters received in these schools."

Those attending the schools received instruction in correct weighing practices, improving weighing facilities, scale testing requirements and scale installation.

Accurate weighing is extremely important in Texas due to the value of animals marketed here. Meat animals sold in the state during 1968 brought almost \$1 billion.

A weighing error of only half of one percent, due either to inaccurate scales or improper weighing would have resulted in a loss of almost \$5 million.

POLICE ACADEMY AT WTSU FEB. 9-MAR. 6

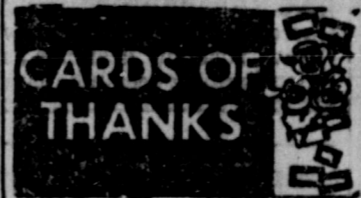
A four-week basic police academy will be held on the campus of West Texas State University Feb. 9-March 6, Bobby Hudson, head of the university security office, said today.

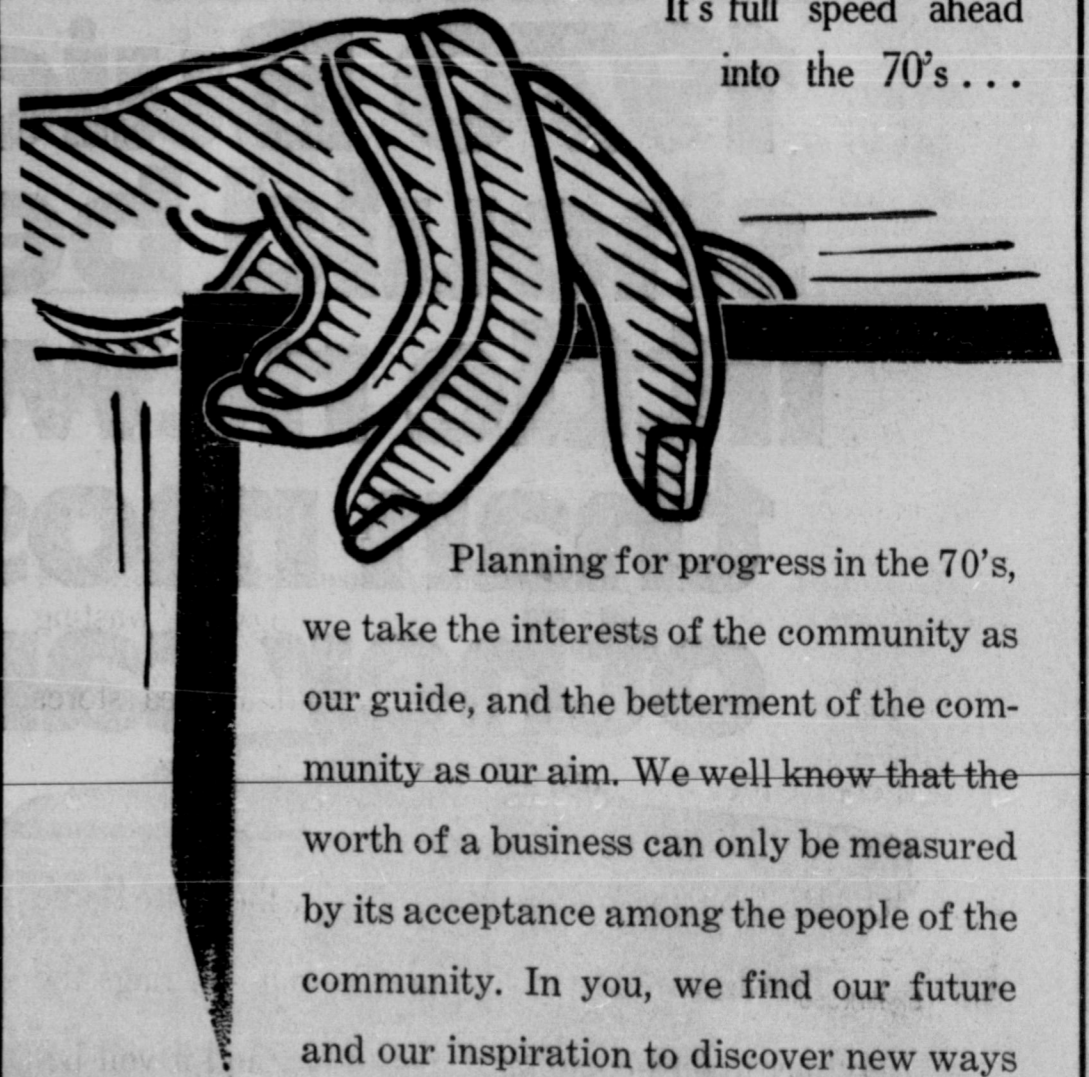

Cotton Classing News

The Memphis Cotton Classing Office received cotton through Tuesday, January 13, and then closed for the season. Something over 103,275 samples were processed, the lowest season total since 1959. Predominate grade remained Light Spotted with 74 per cent. Staples ranged mainly in the 15/16 and 31/32 bracket with mike readings showing 65 per cent in the 3.5 to 4.9 range. Market prices ranged from 18.75 to 20.41 with seed continuing to bring \$49 per ton at most gin points.

DEADLINE FOR W-2 FORMS

The deadline for employers to give employees their 1969 W-2 forms, showing earnings, income tax withheld and Social Security

information is Monday, February 2, 1970. Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for Northern Texas, said today.

W-2's have to be filed with income tax returns and those who had more than one job last year should make sure they attach all of them when they file their returns.

Highlights and Sidelights

From Your State Capitol

AUSTIN, Tex. — Lagging voter registration may spell bad news for Democratic officials, according to no less an authority than U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough. Yarborough called a news conference in the Statehouse the day after State Republican Chairman William Steger of Tyler announced Texas GOP's plan to field strong candidates for both senator and governor this year.

Steger cited a poll as the basis of Republican hopes, but Yarborough said registration statistics, not polls, are the real cause for Democrats to be wary. He said 80 per cent of Republican strength already has registered in such large counties as Harris, Dallas and Midland, while the sign-up is poor in traditional Democratic strongholds. On that same day, Secretary

of State Martin Dies Jr. urged all eligible adult Texans to exercise their constitutional rights by registering. Dies is the state's chief election officer. January 31 is the registration deadline. Dies issued these reminders:

Any citizen 21 years of age or older on the day of an election, who has been a resident of the state for at least one year and a resident of his home county for six months immediately preceding the election, is qualified to register for voting.

Eligible persons may register by personal appearance at the main office, branch office or authorized substation of the home county tax assessor-collector. Written applications may also be made to the tax assessor-collector.

The husband, wife, mother, father, son or daughter of a voter may act as his agent in registering if the agent is a qualified voter.

A person who moves to Texas after October 1 may register during the regular period or afterward but must have been registered for 30 days before voting.

Any person who will meet qualifications before Feb. 28, 1971, may register during the regular period. Those who will become 21 after January 31 may register during the regular period or afterward.

CRIME FIGHT — Department of Public Safety Director Wilson Speir persuaded the Criminal Justice Council to provide

\$364,638 to enlarge the DPS training academy at Austin. This, subject to availability of funds. Colonel Speir said the proposed construction and renovation would expand the student capacity of the facility from 181 to 381. Also, space would be made available for the council's proposed Texas Crime Information Center, a bank of computers and Teletypes linked with DPS offices around the state.

Council also voted to consider changing its name at the next meeting. Acting Chairman Harold Dudley said Gov. Preston Smith favor the title "Texas Justice Council," eliminating the word "criminal."

Among the eight local projects given council approval was a rehabilitation program for the El Paso County Jail. Project will involve counseling and a job-training program, starting with a cooking and baking school.

AIR POLLUTION — Texas Air Control Board will set up a regional office in Houston within the next three months. But the state board does not intend to duplicate any pollution control services offered by Harris County, the City of Houston or other local agencies.

Executive Secretary Charles Barden said the Air Control Board has been planning a regional office in Houston for a long time, but a request had just come in from the city. Regional offices already have been established in Corpus Christi, Tyler, Fort Worth and Lubbock.

COURTS SPEAK — Texas Supreme Court held Houston must turn over to Harris County hospital district \$1.4 million in pension funds contributed by and for Ben Taub and Jefferson Davis hospital employees.

Court ordered new trial in controversy over ownership of \$10 million 21 Turtle Creek Square apartments in Dallas.

Hall County man failed to convince high court his loss of sight was caused by cotton gin accident.

Oral arguments were set for January 28 in Jefferson County man's injury suit against Hudson Oil and Gas Corporation arising from gas line blow-out.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES — Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin says in an opinion that County and District Clerks must issue, without cost, as many copies of certified documents as is necessary to make claims for veterans benefits from the United States Government.

In other opinions Martin concluded that:

Railroad Commission has authority to prescribe safety standards for transportation of gas and gas pipeline facilities owned by a city and the attorney general is authorized to enforce them.

Provisions of Texas Engineering Practice Act are not applicable to Department of Health design of hospitals and related in establishing standards for institutions. Designs for structures larger than those specified in the act do not have to bear the seal of a registered professional engineer if the designer is exempt.

State Health Department is obligated to pay half the salary of a pilot for a plane jointly used under contract with the Department of Public Welfare.

Use of a horn, recording or other device to call or attract wild foxes in Shelby, Nacogdoches, Sabine, San Augustine, Falls or Leon Counties is illegal.

AGRICULTURE — Farm production in Texas, Louisiana, New Mexico, Arizona and Oklahoma for 1969 probably will fall a little short of last year's levels. So reports the 11th Federal Reserve District.

Livestock production, with more cattle on feed, will be up about six per cent, but crop production, hurt by adverse weather, will experience a 10-per cent drop.

Nevertheless, the estimated farm gross of \$6.1 billion and net of \$2 billion will be slightly higher than last year.

OIL LEAK — That four-man team Governor Smith dispatched to make an on-the-spot investigation of an oil slick in Trinity Bay reported to the governor that the nature and extent of pollution had been exaggerated. Committee said that it found evidence of four leaks into Galveston and Trinity Bays, but that they were all minor.

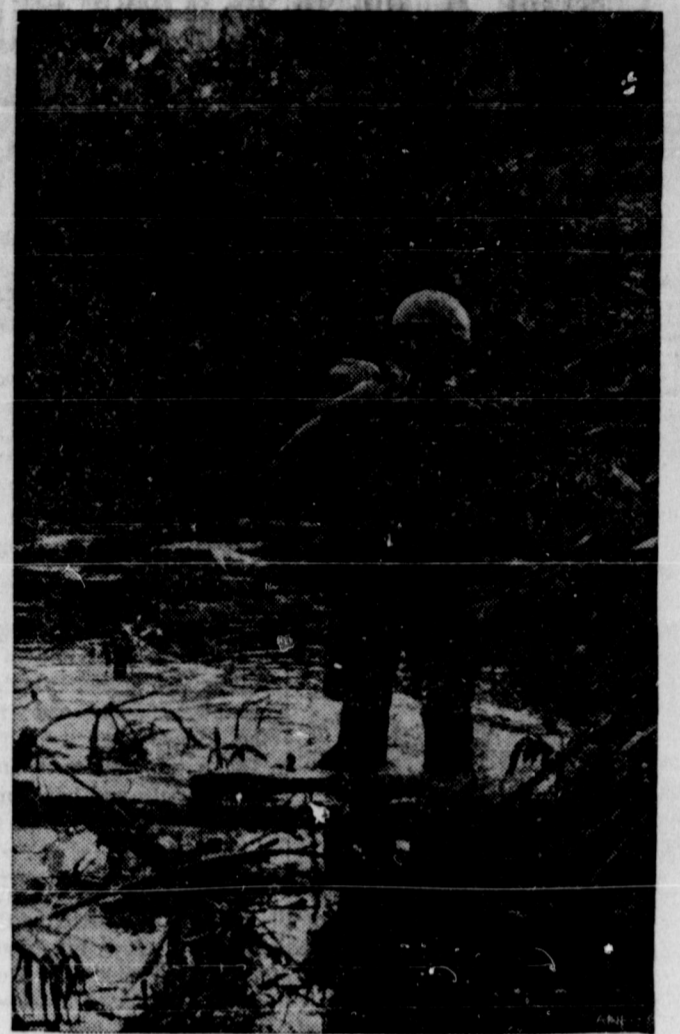

Christian Announces For Re-Election As State Representative

State Rep. Tom Christian of Claude announced his candidacy for re-election to the Texas House of Representatives Thursday morning during a press conference in Amarillo.

Christian represented Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Collingsworth, Donley and Randall Counties during the 61st Legislature and was instrumental in the passing of several pieces of legislation during his freshman year in the House.

"Serving as a State Representative from the 75th District has been a privilege," Christian said. "I am grateful to the voters of the district for the opportunity to serve in this capacity."

The farmer-rancher said "being a member of the Texas Legislature is an extremely challenging experience."

"A member can take pride in some of the accomplishments of the Legislature but at the same time become disillusioned over some of the legislation which passes," he said.

Christian served in the United States Navy before graduating from college, then taught school at Boys Ranch and Canadian. He currently farms and ranches near Claude.

He is married to the former Anne Thomas and has three children.
