## Fire set in Donley Hotel Building

Quick action on the part of a concerned citizen prevented a fire which could have burned the entire north end of town last week.

At 3:30 on August 22, Mr. and Mrs. George W. Estlack noticed smoke coming from the rear of the Donley Hotel building and called the sheriff's office. Within minutes the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department was on the scene. The fire was quickly extinguished and upon investigation, Fire Chief Delbert Robertson said the fire had been deliberately set in a pile of trash in the basement of the abandoned building.

When asked if the building would have burned, Chief Robertson said, "It was built beside a concrete wall and might not have burned, but there's no way of saying. I will say this. The building is extremely dangerous. The floor is almost rotted through and anyone walking across

the floors could fall very easily. Parents should be very sure their children do not play in the building. There's no doubt that the fire was set. It didn't start by accident."

According to Sheriff Jimmy Thompson the entire north end of town could have been destroyed.

"The wind was blowing right out of the south, and if we hadn't got the alarm as quick as we did, the building would have gone up and taken most of that part of town with it. It's an old, old building and has been standing vacant for years. The wood is dry and would have burned like tinder. The way the wind was blowing, if the roof had caught, the fire would have spread to the other buildings around it."

In addition to the fire trucks, the Clarendon ambulance and EMS members were at the scene, as were the members of the sheriff's department.

The Clarendon Consolidated Independent School serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for K-5 75c, 6-12 80c, reduced 40c and breakfast for K-5 50c, 6-12 60c, reduced 30c.

Children from families whose income falls within the level shown on the scale are eligible for either free meals or reduced-price meals priced at 40c for lunch and 30c for breakfast.

To apply for free or reduced-price meals, please fill out an application as soon as possible, sign it, and return it to the school. Please answer all questions on the form. An application which does not contain the following information cannot be processed by the school: 1. the total household income must be listed by the amount received by each household member receiving income and the type of income it is (such as wages, child support, etc.) or your food stamp case number if your household is on food stamps, 2. names of all household members, 3. social security numbers of all household members 21 years old or older or the word "none" for any household member who does not have a social security number, and 4. the signature of an adult household member.

The information on the application

may be checked by the school or other officials at any time during the school year.

If your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by more than \$50 per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases.

You may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a decrease in household income, become unemployed, or have an increase in family size, fill out an application at that time.

If you have foster children living with you, they may be eligible for these benefits. If you wish to apply for these benefits for them, please contact the school and they will help you complete the application.

Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age, or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

If you do not agree with the

school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing the following official: Jeff L. Walker, Superintendent, Box 610, Clarendon, TX 79226, (806) 874-2062.

The information you provide will be treated confidentially and will be used only for eligibility determinations and verification of data.

If you have any questions or need help in filling out the application form, please contact Floyd L. Guinn, at the Junior High and Elementary principal's office, (806) 874-3855. You will be notified when the application is approved or denied.

Hedley CISD today announced its policy for free and reduced price meals for children unable to pay the full price of meals served under the National School Lunch and Breakfast Program. Hedley CISD has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households should fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available at the school.

The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials.

For school officials to determine eligibility, the household must provide the following information listed on the application: Names of all household members; social security numbers of all adult household members or a statement that the household member does not possess one; total household income or the household's food stamp case number if they currently receive food stamps; and the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information is correct.

Applications may be submitted any time during the year. The following household size and income criteria will be used for determining eligibility: Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals.

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## Ernest and Verdie Tipton to celebrate 50th Anniversary

Ernest and Verdie Tipton are celebrating their 50th wedding anniversary on August 31, 1985. They have lived most of their married lives in Clarendon.

Ernest was born to Irving and

Lucinda Tipton at Mahi, Texas on December 8, 1914. He attended school for 3 to 4 months at Alanreed, Texas and the rest of his schooling was at Clarendon.

Verdie was born to Jack and Ida

Lee Woodard at Lipan, Texas on March 15, 1919. She went to school and grew up at Silgo and Gibtown, Texas.

As for their meeting, they lived about one-half mile from each other on opposite sides of the woods at Poolville. His parents came visiting her parents to play dominos one night. They began dating by walking everywhere they went. She wore her flat shoes but always carried her high heels. One time they got to borrow her dad's Model T to ride in.

Six months later he walked over to the tomato patch where Ida and Verdie were working. He asked Ida if he could marry Verdie. Ida shook her finger at him and said, "Don't you say that!" He said, "She is the only girl around and I am the only boy, so what else could we do?"

They each took their sister along as a witness and went to the preacher's home to get married. The preacher was having a big fish fry and had a house full of company. They got married with everyone staring through the doors and open windows at them.

Their first home was on a ranch near Poolville where Ernest was paid \$7.50 every 15 days for both their wages. He followed a horse and plow on foot and when it was too wet to plow, he took an ax and cut wood in the piney woods. She had to milk 18 cows twice a day and babysit for a neighbor which paid her \$2 a week. They bought flour, bacon, and sugar but raised everything else. They lived in a house where they could count the stars at night through holes in roof. When it rained, they used

pots and pans to catch the rain water so the bed and furniture wouldn't get wet.

They left that ranch and went to Seagraves to pull bolls in the harvest season then on to another ranch. That ranch owner didn't have a house for them to live in but he let them live in his attic. They both slept on one small cot and the ranch owner would bang on the ceiling with a broom handle to wake them up each morning. Ernest was paid 50c a day and from his earnings he bought a Chevrolet. When it rained, they were always stuck in the mud, and the tires blew out about every 100 miles. They used cotton sacks to patch the tires. The ranch owner gave them a runt baby pig. They fed it on a bottle. When they moved to Gibtown they carried that pig with them. He sat in the front car seat between Verdie and Ernest. Ernest told Verdie, "We should have put a bonnet on our pig so people wouldn't stare at us!"

They moved in with Ernest's parents at Gibtown where he helped his dad farm and she helped his mom "take in washing" from others. They used a washboard and hung the clothes on a barbed wire fence to dry.

Around 1935-1936 they moved to Alanreed where Ernest worked at a cotton gin and unloaded coal off a boxcar. He started driving a truck for the gin manager.

They moved to Clarendon when Ernest got the job carrying mail on the Brice Route. Verdie took over the route when Ernest went to work for Phillips Petroleum for a while. He was then a delivery man for Texaco.

Stella Ann was born in 1940 and her brother, Eddie, was born in 1943. Ernest went to work for Bill Mooney at the International Har-

vester Company in Clarendon. The Moonsys and Tiptons moved to Hereford, Texas to run a farm and feedlot. They branded and fed hundreds of cattle.

Once during a big hail storm, they moved all the baby calves and chickens into the house. That day Stella's teacher went to visit them. Verdie was so embarrassed for her to see calves and chickens running all over the house. The teacher said not to worry about it because she had moved her chickens in too. When the big cattle market fell in the 50's, Verdie and Ernest moved back to Clarendon to work for the post office.

Other jobs Ernest had were the Sheriff's Department, Coke Company and he owned a service station. Verdie has cooked, carried mail, and worked at the sheet factory.

Ernest was a postal clerk until his retirement in November 1977. He was with the post office nearly 40 years.

Verdie still carries the mail occasionally and quilts all the time. She delivers meals for the Senior Citizens Center.

After retirement, they went to Zapata, Texas two winters to fish, and in 1978 they spent the summer in Alaska fishing. They caught 728 salmon. They also visit Black Lake near Angel Fire, N.M.

Ernest and Verdie have 2 children, 5 grandchildren, 3 1/2 great grandchildren, and many relatives and friends who love them dearly.

# From The PEN of PASTOR PINION



## WHY SHOULD YOU SEND YOUR CHILD TO A CHRISTIAN SCHOOL?

The Christian School Explosion -- a term we have heard for nearly five years now. Christian schools are currently being established across the United States at the rate of two new schools a day.

2.
