Cheer to Many


The program as announced in the Leader, was carried out at the community Christmas tree on the courthouse lawn Thursday evening. The food and toys were distributed late: to the needy.



Above-Standard Youths Must Have Their Chance





Uncle Sam closed his books, the other day, on direct claims of Civil War naval veterans when Rear Admiral Reginald Nicholson died at the age of 87. After 75 years, we have finished paying off this part of our debt.

Still on our rolls for compensation, however, are widows and children of Civil War land forces and their widows and children; survivors and claimants from the Spanish-American war, 40 years ago; thousands of beneficiaries from the World War. only 21 years ago. Fact, Uncle Sam is still paying one daughter of a War of 1812 veteran and several others have filed claims for compensation. That conflict ended 125 years ago.

It takes a long time to pay for wars. Ever since this republic was founded, we've been paying in some measure for the bad temper of ourselves and the world. If, at any time we're not quite sure what we're going to do about the world's present struggle, we might ask the War and Navy departments to send us brief memoranda on our monthly war bill stretching back for 125 years




