





HOWARDWICK MALL-(Continued From Page 1)

Sherwood Mall One was the first of a three-phase Mall to be developed as the town grows. Mall One will house a discount grocery store which will be the major store, a drug store, bakery, beauty shop, ceramics shop, automobile and boat repair shop, a finance institution, and offices for The Wick (newspaper). As business will be placed in each. The development is a joint venture of Howardwick residents and will be owned by the residents. The Mall will run parallel to the highway and the Airport runway, and is expected to eventually include most every type of business or specialty shop.

Bro. Frankie Just, pastor of the newly organized Howardwick Baptist Church, spoke of the remarkable progress that has been made in developing the area from the time Greenbelt Dam was constructed, the opening of Sherwood Shores, the tornado that devastated so much property and cost a number of lives, the creation of the town of Howardwick in the rebuilding of Sherwood Shores, and the steps which led to Groundbreaking ceremonies for Sherwood Mall One.

The first shovel of dirt was turned by Lions Club Sweetheart Debbie Cherry, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lynn Cherry of Amarillo and Howardwick. Lions, in traditional gold vests with purple trim, the colors symbolic of Lionism, helped with parking and participated in the ceremony the Lions Club being the first service club in the community.
