Heartworm disease was considered a problem in Southern areas only at one time. The disease is now found in all areas of the U.S.

Only mosquitos have been shown to incubate Dirofilaria Immitus, the cause of heartworm disease. Mosguitos become infected upon inrestion of blood from an infected animal. When the mosquito feeds on a susceptible dog, the cycle is

From the time a dog is bitten by a "carrier" mosquito until circulating heartworms (immature forms) are Girl Scout Day observed, a period of 8-12 months is ICCESSALTY.

Young dogs may show up as negative to the heartworm test when in reality they may be positive at a later date.

Schools Out! The Texas Department of Public Safety wants to remind motorists to be especially watchful all day long for children playing in or around the public streets and highways.

"Schools out, warm weather is here and longer hours of daylight all signal the start of summer fun for our kids." warned Major V.J. Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety in Lubbock. He said, "Kids will be out from early morning to late at night and drivers must be especially watchful in areas around parks and playgrounds for a child to dart into the street after a ball or frizbee."

Bicyclists need to be aware of laws regulating their using the public streets or highways. As more

bicycles than ever will be on our streets or highways now that school is out. Bicyclists are required to obey all the laws that drivers of cars have to obey. They must stop for stop signs, and red lights, yield at yield signs, make legal turns, and ride in the same direction as vehicular traffic.

Major Cawthon cautioned, "Motorists should be on the lookout for the kids on bicycles and be prepared to give the bicyclist the right of way to save a life."

Last week we began to discuss the "Rapture". We want to continue this week by talking about three

outstanding truths about the Rapture that will make this event a joyful occasion for we Christians.

1. The dead are resting. For believers, death is not final. Those who have died in Christ are only asleep. In fact, only their bodies are asleep, for they are with Christ (2 Cor. 5:1-8; Phil. 1:21-23). And they will return with Him when He comes to resurrect their bodies: "For if we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so God will bring with Him those who have fallen asleep in Jesus" (1 Thess. 4:14). Paul wrote to the Thessalonians

because they were not sure whether saved loved ones who had died would experience the Lord's return. Paul assured them that those who had died in Christ would indeed be involved in the Rapture; in fact, they would rise first.

It will be a great resurrection. The bodies of the dead will rise, transformed and glorified. "The dead will be raised imperishable, and we shall be changed" (1 Cor. 15:52). Two events are involved. One is the resurrection of the bodies of dead believers; the other is the transformation of all believers' bodies.

The transformation of the living believers is in itself a kind of

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resurrection. In Romans 7: 24 Paul writes, "Wretched man that I am! Who will set me free from the body of this death?" He gives the answer in 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18. The Lord Himself will transform our bodies of

death into living, glorified bodies. 2. The Lord is returning. Paul assures us, "The Lord Himself will return from heaven with a shout" (1Thess. 4:16). He will return personally to receive us, just as He promised: "If I go to prepare a place for you, I will come again, and receive you to Myself, that where I am, there you may be also" (John 14:3).


What a blessed hope! He will not merely send for us, call for us, or let us come to Him-Christ is coming in person to receive us.

3. The promise is reassuring. Paul's message to the Thessalonians substitutes two facts about the Rapture.

First, it could happen at any moment. It may seem hard to believe that an event Paul was expecting at any moment almost 2,000 years ago might still be imminent, but it's true. Although no one knows the time of the Lord's return, it is the next great event on God's prophecy calendar.

Knowledge of the Rapture wouldn't have comforted the Thessalonians if they knew they would have to endure such petion. Paul couldn't tell th encourage each other with those truths if he knew they were facing the threat of the Tribulation.

As believers, we are to be watchful and faithful, living lives that are pleasing to Christ.

Now therefore, be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Clarendon, Texas:

1. That the City submit an application for funding under the Texas Community Development Program to be considered under the Community Development Project Fund Regional Allocation under the terms and conditions of the State of Texas and agree and understand the assurances contained in said application.

2. That the City Council endorses the activities as set forth in said application and more fully described

3. That the City Council directs and designates the Mayor as the City's Chief Executive Officer and Authorized Representative to act in all matters in connection with this application and the City's participation in the Texas Community

Development Program. Passed and approved this 14th day of May, 1985 by the vote all ayes and

Judge Christal met with the Board to inform them of the findings of Merriman and Barber Engineering Company concerning the location of the roll-off container site to be used by the County. Also, in accordance with the City ordinance, any individual resident or business, which is not a contractor producing roofing materials, construction materials, concrete, brick, stone, dirt or soil or other bulky materials in the normal course and scope of their employment or business operation shall not be allowed to dump more than one (1) pickup load of such materials in any given ten (10) day period without prior consent of the City office and paying the disposal fee. Motion carried to set the rates at \$5.00 for a pickup and \$30.00 for a truck per load.

Approved sending four firemen to fire school in July at the cost of \$350.00 each.

Bills for April 1985 were presented and ordered paid.

There being no other City business at this time, meeting was adjourned.

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ORDINANCE #253

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE USE OF GARBAGE CON-TAINERS WITHIN THE CITY OF CLARENDON, TEXAS AND THE DISPOSAL OF ROOFING MATE-RIALS, CONCRETE AND OTHER COMMERCIALLY PRODUCED BULKY MATERIAL.

Whereas, the City of Clarendon has contracted with Browning-Ferris Industries for the establishment of a containerized garbage disposal service; and

Whereas, the landfill previously operated by the City of Clarendon and the County of Donley is to be closed; and

Whereas, there are no ordinances or regulations controlling or regulat-ing the use and maintenance of new. garbage collection system; and Whereas, this City has the right

and duty to adopt and enforce such regulations as are necessary in order to control the use of such garbage disposal services and facilities, and to protect the health and safety of the community;

IT IS THEREFORE ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLARENDON, TEXAS:

Section 1: No burning of garbage, leaves, tree trimmings or other refuse within the city limits shall be allowed without the prior written consent of the city fire marshall. Under no circumstances shall any person burn or cause to ignite the refuse contained in any garbage or refuse container provided by the City, or by any person or business entity which provides such containers.

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Section 2: No side loading garbage container provided by the City, or by any person or business entity provid-ing such containers, shall be filled with roofing materials, construction materials, concrete, brick, stone dirt or soll, stoves, refrigerators, water tanks, washing machines, or other similar bulky materials.

Section 3: The disposal of roofing materials, construction materials, concrete, brick, stone, dirt and soll, and other bulky materials by contractors shall be made into the roll-off container provided by the City. Prior to disposing of such materials, the contractor shall contact the City office to obtain permission to dispose of such materials. At that time, the contractor shall inform the City office of the nature of the materials and the approximate weight and volume. Upon payment of a disposal fee to the City office, and approval by the City office, the contractor shall be allowed to dispose of such materials. The City shall maintain a fee schedule in the City office, which schedule shall be set by resolution of the City Council, and amended from time to time as the City Council deems necessary.

Section 4: Any individual resident or business, which is not a contractor producing roofing materials, conection materials, concrete, brick,



stone, dirt or soil or other bulky materials in the normal course and scope of their employment or business operation shall not be allowed to dump more than one [1] pickup load of such materials in any given ten [10] day period without prior consent of the City office. Any such individual or business desiring to dump more than [1] half-ton pickup load of such materials in any given ten [10] day period shall pay a disposal fee to the City office and receive approval from the City office prior to disposing of such materials. The City office shall maintain a fee schedule for such disposal, which schedule shall be set by resolu tion of the City Council, and amended from time to time as the City Council deems necessary. Section 5: All garbage, trash,

brush and trimmings which are placed in sideloading containers shall be no more than four [4] foot in length.

Section 6: The use of the roll off container provided by the City is reserved for use by city residents only. County residents desiring to dispose of garbage in City containers shall obtain permission from the City office prior to dumping. The City shall maintain a fee schedule in the City office, which schedule shall be set by resolution of the City Council, and amended from time to time as the City Council deems necessary.

Section 7: PENALTIES.


Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of the ordinance hereby adopted or fail to comply therewith, shall severally for each and every such violation and nonand every such violation and non-compliance respectively, be guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not less than \$10.00 dollars nor more than \$200.00 dollars. The mposition of one penalty for any ation shall not excuse the viola tion or permit it to continue; and all such persons shall be required to correct or remedy such violations or defects within a reasonable time; and when not otherwise specified, each ten [10] days that prohibited con-ditions are maintained shall constitute a separate offense.

The application of the above penalty shall not be held to prevent the enforced removal of prohibited

Bronco Track By TRENT SHARP

The Clarendon High School men's track team had considerable success as they won two meets, finished second in three and scored 38 points in the Regional Meet to finish fifth. The Broncos' year began with a bang as they won the White Deer Relays. A particularly rewarding meet was the District Meet at Shamrock where the Broncos outscored Memphis 145 to 125.

This season saw Bronco men turn in some outstanding individual performances. The first men's state champion in CHS history was among these. Trent Sharp saw things turn gold on a hot muggy day in Austin. Sharp won the 800m run in a time of 1:54.2. He will continue his track career as he signed to run for Baylor University. Other outstanding performances were by Rodney Smith who ran a 49.4 leg on the mile relay at the Amarillo Relays, and Robert Youngblood, running third at Regional, who broke the school 300m hurdle record with a 39.4. Also breaking a school record was Clay Sharp in the 3200m run with a time of 10:51.42. Throwing some outstanding throws were weightmen Russell Alexander, third at Regional with a discus toss of 148 feet and Don Brogdon, second at District, threw the shot put 47 feet.

The Bronco distance men worked especially hard all year. Distance people were Brent Hayworth, Regional qualifier 1600m run, Clay Sharp, Regional qualifier 3200m run. Wes Hatley, Scott Edwards, Arthur Harris, and Steven Phillips. Sprinters were Marcus Smith, who tied the 100m school record (10.9), Leland Howell (52.8 - 400m), Rodney Smith (22.9 - 200m), Booney Gardner and Mark Luttrell. Weightmen were Dan Nichols, Bret White, Russell Alexander, Don Brogdon and Derek Howard. Chris Downer and Dewey Mincey pole vaulted. Dewey cleared 13 feet and finished 4th at Regional. The 400m relay team consisted of Leland Howell, Marcus Smith, Dewey Mincey, and Rodney Smith. Finishing in the top three of every meet they participated in and run-ning a 3:25.9 at Regional, the 1600m relay team was very successful this year. The best splits turned in by individual members of the mile relay team are as follows: Robert Youngblood - 52.5, Leland Howell - 52.8, Rodney Smith - 49.4, Trent Sharp -48.7. The Broncos should be very tough and fun to watch next year as they return many key members. The graduating Broncs wish good luck to next years team. A special thanks go to the coaches who spent many hours traveling and training with the team. Those appreciated coaches are head coach Buddy Sharp, Mickey McGuire, Steve Loveless and Robert Klein.



Prelab


