Agriculture's Influence On Texas Economy

While all phases of Texas agriculture added nearly \$10 billion to the state's economy in 1970, about 80 percent of this total was generated from the manufacture and supplying of tools for production and the processing and distribution of agricultural

The remaining \$2 billion consisted of values added in farming and ranching and government payments to agriculture Cash receipts from farm marketing during 1970 were \$3.1 billion compared to \$3.0 billion in 1969. says Charles K. Baker. Extension marketing specialist. Livestock and livestock products sales totaled \$1.95 billion while crop cash receipts were \$1.9 billion

Baker adds that the total value of farm assets in Texas is about \$29 billion including \$27 billion for physical assets and \$2 billion in financial assets. 
