

Diapause Boll Weevil Meeting Thurs. Nite

A meeting to make plans for the diapause boll weevil spray program will be held Thursday night, August 26, according to Ronald Gooch, County Agent. The meeting will be held in room 104 of the classroom building at Clarendon College in Clarendon, at 8:00 p.m.

The Donley County Insect Control Ass'n. has hired a checker to check Ass'n. members cotton fields for boll weevils. He will give a report on the boll weevil infestations being found.

Charles Holt and Donald Arnold, Entomologists with the Texas Department of Agriculture, will be at the meeting to explain the program and answer any questions. The Texas Department of Agriculture will pay 50 percent of the cost of the program again this year.

All cotton producers are urged to attend this meeting.

President's Action Will Help Farms, Says Hardin

The following is an announcement made recently by Secretary of Agriculture, Clifford M. Hardin, concerning recent Presidential action:

"American farmers stand to benefit from the actions announced by the President to combat inflation, to spur the competitiveness of the U. S. economy, and to improve our foreign trade and monetary position. Farmers will benefit by the actions taken to fight inflation. The cost-price squeeze is the number one problem facing American farmers. Therefore, we strongly welcome the actions taken.

"Secondly, the steps announced to spur investment in equipment and to reduce taxes are designed to bolster our own domestic economy and make jobs. These will provide stronger markets for our own producers.

"Finally, the action taken to impose a temporary surcharge on imports and the withdrawal of gold support from the dollar are comparable to what other countries have done in similar balance-of-payments situations, and, as anyone concerned with agriculture knows, the use of variable levies by some countries to protect agricultural systems constitutes permanent border protection which should be of far greater concern to the world than temporary surcharges.

"I hope that as our friends abroad digest this series of actions they will recognize that the President is saying that all of us need to find better solutions to our trade and international monetary problems. Obviously, American agriculture could make a much stronger contribution than it already has to our balance-of-payments problem if other countries of the world would admit more of our farm goods."

Agriculture's Influence On Texas Economy

While all phases of Texas agriculture added nearly \$10 billion to the state's economy in 1970, about 80 percent of this total was generated from the manufacture and supplying of tools for production and the processing and distribution of agricultural commodities.

The remaining \$2 billion consisted of values added in farming and ranching and government payments to agriculture. Cash receipts from farm marketing during 1970 were \$3.1 billion compared to \$3.0 billion in 1969, says Charles K. Baker, Extension marketing specialist. Livestock and livestock products sales totaled \$1.95 billion while crop cash receipts were \$1.9 billion in 1970.

Baker adds that the total value of farm assets in Texas is about \$29 billion including \$27 billion for physical assets and \$2 billion in financial assets. Real estate taxes paid by Texas farmers were just over \$119 million in 1970 compared to a \$70.6 million level the year before.

Agribusiness provides employment for 35-40 percent of the Texas labor force. Farm and ranch operators or members of their families working on farms numbered 190,000. Hired workers on farms and ranches numbered 92,000 and were paid \$250 million in 1970. An additional 1.3 million workers were engaged in off-farm agribusiness employment.

The off-farm percentage has increased as Texas farms have enlarged, commercialized, specialized and mechanized. Baker notes that the rural population has dropped to approximately 2.3 million out of a total of more than 11 million, but many who live in cities own farms for revenue, recreation or other purposes.



All of the 375 boys now at the Ranch have a part in the rodeo, either as contestants or working in the many behind-the-scenes activities.

Each rodeo performance will begin at 2:30 both Sunday and Monday afternoon, and big bar-b-que beef sandwiches will be prepared and sold by the boys for only \$1.00. The rodeo is also a traditional homecoming for the more than 2,500 boys who have lived at the Ranch since it was founded by Cal Farley in 1939.

TAX RELIEF ON DROUTH SALES OF LIVESTOCK

Unfortunately the drouth has forced many livestock owners to sell a part or all of their herd. The Internal Revenue Service provides a modified form of tax relief on the sale of livestock due to a drouth. You are not required to pay taxes on any profit that you make on the sale of your herd (provided your sales for the year are in excess of normal sales) if you reinvest within two years with the same type of herd. An extension of this period beyond two years may be granted by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue Service in exceptional cases. Publication 225, the Farmers Tax Guide, spells out all the requirements on drouth sales of livestock on pages 36 through 40. Local county agents and Internal Revenue Service offices have free copies of the Farmers Tax Guide available for you. IRS advises farmers considering a drouth sale to obtain a Farmers Tax Guide and carefully check the rules in advance.

New Vocational Program At CHS

Classes in Home Economics Cooperative Education are the most recent addition to Clarendon High School curriculum according to a recent announcement by Superintendent Arling L. Cordell.

Miss Lynn Bourland, teacher-coordinator for the course, attended a workshop presented by the Texas Education Agency on the campus of Texas Tech University August 9-13 to learn details of establishing the program.

These classes afford students of Junior and Senior standing both on-the-job and classroom education in a variety of occupations. Practical work experience is provided the student through part-time employment at some cooperating business within Clarendon.

The work stations are to require the use of home economics related skills. Work stations for this school year include John's Loretta's Sew Shop, City Drug, Jake's Steak-Out, Ruby Bromley, and the Nursing Home.

The addition of this type of program will do much to provide the youth of Clarendon with a well-rounded educational program that will fulfill the need for practical and useful training. It is hoped that it will enable a large portion of our students who desire to become occupationally competent to enter full-time employment upon graduating from high school, or acquire part-time employment for college bound students.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS SHOW INCREASED ENROLLMENT

Superintendent Arling Cordell reports enrollment in the Clarendon Public Schools as being up over that of last year. In light of the fact that public schools in most small towns is decreasing, this is most significant.


"We welcome these young people to our school and are looking forward to a fine year of achievement", said Superintendent Cordell.







Legislative Redistricting Board will meet here August 24 to begin consideration of state senatorial reapportionment.

Shortly after the Board announced its meeting date, Gov. Preston Smith issued a sharply worded statement calling on the Board to forget "political consid-

erations" and start work on a House of Representative redistricting bill also.

Smith noted the fact that Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin's appealing a district court decision invalidating the 1971 legislative act which attempted to reapportion the House does not preclude the Board from preparing for any eventuality.

Supreme Court of Texas, Governor noted, may uphold or overturn the district court's August 2 decision that the Legislature illegally divided more than 20 counties. In either case, he said, the Board should be prepared with a House as well as a Senate reapportionment plan to avoid the need for a "million dollar" special session of the Legislature.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, a member of the Legislative Redistricting Board, expressed surprise at Smith's blast. He said the Board has made no decision not to consider House redistricting and, indeed, has not even discussed the issue.

Board has just 60 days to draw the reapportionment after its initial meeting which means its lifespan expires in late October.

State Supreme Court Chief Justice Robert W. Calvert said the Court will meet within 48 hours

after receiving a request for an appeal hearing and can reach a decision in 10 days or less.

Attorney General Martin said a transcript of the lower court proceedings is being speeded to completion and can be placed before the Supreme Court within another week.

AUTO INSURANCE RATE CURB ASKED — Governor last week called on the State Board of Insurance to permit no increases in auto coverage rates this year.

He summoned three members of that agency to his office to hear his proposal.

Board is due to meet this month to review requests of insurance companies for increases totalling almost 10 per cent on all types of auto insurance. Board staff members have proposed a modest 2.8 per cent average hike effective September 1.

Governor asked the Board to begin study immediately of no-fault insurance plans with a view toward adopting one for Texas. He said Massachusetts achieved a substantial reduction in auto insurance rates under its no-fault concept.

Smith also urged the Board to study the feasibility of establishing a flexible and competitive insurance rating system in an effort to reduce rates.

"We are confident that a suitable alternative to the ever-rising rates could be found — if the insurance industry and the agencies of state government wish to find them," said Smith.

WATER BONDS SOLD — A Chicago firm was low bidder on a \$25 million Texas Water Development Bond issue to help build or improve sewage treatment facilities.

Issue was the first step in a \$100 million program authorized by voters May 13 for loans to cities, towns, river authorities and water districts. State loans make political subdivisions eligible for increased grants from federal government for water quality improvement.

Board said it expects 40 or 50 applications for assistance by October 1. It will act on the first ones at its meeting here September 16-17.

Local units can borrow 25 per cent of cost of a sewage treat-

ment project from the state. Federal government will provide 50 to 55 per cent of the cost where a state program exists.

Halsey, Stuart and Co. Inc. and Associates bid effective interest rate of 4.9533 per cent for the issue.

AG OPINIONS — Attorney General Martin said in a recent opinion that Texas cities and counties may charge beverage cartage permit holders and local distributor permit holders additional liquor fees.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

Justices of Peace must take a 40-hour course of instruction determined by state-supported accredited institutions of higher learning in performance of their duties unless they are licensed attorneys.

State departments may pay premiums on group insurance policies for regular positions, of honor, trust or profit must receive clearance of their agency heads.

Bell county court at law has jurisdiction in eminent domain and probate matters, and vacancy in judgeship would not change jurisdiction.

A sheriff has no authority to release prisoners in his custody prior to expiration of sentences imposed and may be compelled to re-arrest prematurely-released prisoners.

Professional services procurement act of 1971 is not applicable to landscape architects licensed by Board of Landscape Architects.

APPOINTMENTS — E. C. McFadden of Dallas was reappointed by Governor Smith to Occupational Safety Board for a two-year term.

Governor also announced these appointments to Texas Vending Commission, effective September 1:

Don M. Edmondson of San Antonio, Gene R. Hendryx of Alpine, Jack C. Morgan of Kaufman, Gilbert G. Seelmeyer of El Paso, L. C. Butler of Houston and Raymond B. Williams of Dallas.

George H. Smith of Center was named to Sabine River Compact Commission.

18-20 YEAR OLD VOTE RULE CHANGED — Voter registration has, in effect, been reopened for newly-enfranchised 18-20-year olds to permit them to sign up at any time prior to March 1, 1972, close of the voting year.

County registrars have been instructed to accept applications from 17, 18, 19 and 20-year olds, with registration certificates to be effective for any election held 30 days or more afterward.

Young voters who failed to register during the registration period which ended February 28 may now present their applications to tax assessor-collector either in person or by mail.

They must sign up again October 1 or thereafter to remain eligible to vote in elections beyond March 1, 1972.

VOTE MACHINE SALE HALTED — Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr., Texas chief election officer, announced a temporary halt in voting machine sales over the state.

Dies said a survey indicated certain equipment has been discontinued and other machines have not been inspected by the state for many years.

While electronic or punch card voting devices are also being reviewed, Dies said temporary suspension of sales applies only to voting machines. Review of voting machines offered for sale will take "very little time" if companies cooperate, he added.

TIGHT WELFARE CONTROLS ADVISED — New State Welfare Commissioner Raymond W. Vowell, in meetings with field workers, is urging tighter controls on welfare caseloads.

He also is calling for greater effort at detection and elimination of fraud in claims and limitations on Texas' Medical Program. Vowell has been visiting 17 regional offices of the Welfare Department in a two-week swing.

"SCANDAL" HEARING HELD — House General Investigating Committee held the opening round in its hearings on stock-loan scandals involving high state officials.

Frank W. Sharp, onetime head of Sharpstown State Bank and National Bankers Life Insurance Company, was the star witness. He told Committee members he and House Speaker Gus Mutscher had a "tacit understanding" that there was a link between stock purchases in NBL by the speaker and passage of banking bills favored by Sharp in 1969.

Speaker Mutscher borrowed

money from the Sharpstown Bank to buy the stock, as did a few other state officials including Governor Smith.

Sharp denied, however, he ever gave anything of value to a state official in exchange for a political favor.

Former Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr, appearing before the Committee, called the federal Securities and Exchange Commission investigation of stock-loan transactions a Republican-inspired political "hatch job."

OIL ALLOWABLE CUT — For the fifth month running, Texas Railroad Commission ordered a reduction in statewide oil allowable, fixing it at 65.1 per cent of potential for September.

Figure is the lowest since August, 1970, when it dropped to 62.9 per cent.

September allowable, down slightly from 66.2 per cent for August, will permit a 3,350,493 barrel-per-day production flow, 45,264 less than the present top.

Nominations by crude oil buyers for next month totaled 3,218,430 barrels daily. That is 24,032 less than August figures.

Only one major producer, Shell asked more oil in September. Ten asked the same allowable, and three wanted less.

AG OPINIONS — Counties adopting workmen's compensation for their employees must carry appropriate insurance or lose common law defense of contributory negligence and assumed risk, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held.

In a flood of other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

A local option election legalizing the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages may be held in any city of Precinct 7, Jefferson County within a year after May 18, 1971.

Regional planning commissions may be created by two or more counties and/or cities and membership extended to other subdivisions, with the governing bodies determined by agreement among members.

Bexar County commissioners have no authority to expend money for the purpose of making a grant to a non-profit corporation to promote industrial development in the county.

Brazoria County Court of Domestic Relations has authority to try eminent domain cases transferred to it by district courts.

Hidalgo County Housing Authority has no statutory authority to dispose of any property by transferring it without consideration to a non-profit organization.

Orange and Jefferson County district attorneys may commission a regional juvenile legal services officer as an assistant d.a.

Bill to abolish county school superintendent in Matagorda County is void, so the office continues to exist.

New law eliminates requirements for certification on invoices to state agencies by contractors or sellers of contracts and purchases.

State Comptroller cannot issue a new or duplicate warrant to pay on original unemployment compensation benefits warrant presented more than a year after issuance.

Bill allowing county commissioners in Denton and Comanche counties to set their travel expenses and depreciation at a different rate from that set for the county judge is unconstitutional.

WELFARE POLICY CHANGED — State Board of Public Welfare has changed its policy to permit Old Age Assistance recipients to earn up to \$50 a month without loss of assistance payments, effective November 1.

Under current eligibility rules, only \$7.50 of any income source is exempted in calculating an OAA recipient's budgeted needs for an assistance check.

New policy will exempt the first \$20 or earned income and one-half remainder up to \$80 a month.

Governor said OAA recipients will be permitted a better standard of living and not penalized for working. OAA average monthly grant is about \$62.28.

Early Retirement Becomes Popular

Does time really affect a worker's enthusiasm for early retirement?

No, reports Minnie Bell, Extension specialist in family life education-aging.

According to a study by Michigan's Survey Research Center, workers are enthusiastic about the prospect of early retirement. Then, after retiring, they are satisfied with the experience.

Workers in increasing numbers have a choice of early retirement, Miss Bell explains. Their greatest worry is having an adequate income. Other important concerns revealed by the study are keeping relatively active, remaining involved with life and maintaining good health.

The study showed no significant dissatisfaction among retirees past 65, who lost the early retirement supplement, even though the younger retirees are receiving full pensions.

The Michigan study began in 1965 when a member of a large labor union asked about early retirement. His question resulted in the study on the decision to retire early and on what was thought of actual retirement experiences.
