State Health Department radiation officials are called in to supervise the removal of this hazardous substance and reduce any exposure to a minimum. An out-of-the-ordinary occurrence? Not really. Radiation accidents occur about 150 times each year. The hospital incident is only one of the many such radiation hazards or accidents brought to the attention of state health officials In addition to licensing and regulating use of radioactive materials and devices in Texas, the Occupational Health and Radiation Control Division of the State Health Department also maintains a stringent watch on radioactlyity in our environment. Recently, the Department asked the Environmental Protection Agency to send specialized equipment to South Texas to monitor areas surrounding uranium mining operations. Officially wanted to be certain that tailings from these operations were not being used as construction fill materjals. If it existed, this situation possibly pose a serious could public health hazard. Although federal officials earlier found such a situation in Colorado, th State of Texas got a clean bill of health, primarily because of continuous surveillance by state radiation officials. Although the bulk of their work lies in the licensing and regulation of commercial radioactive materials, these officials have a variety of interesting responsibilities. While routinely sampling the air for radiation and fallout, three separate monitoring stations in Texas detected a Chinese nuclear explosion. The small increase in radioactive fallout was well below any significant health danger.

Bairfield School To Be Restored At Tech

The 16 by 16 foot Bairfield schoolhouse, long a landmark in this area was donated to the Ranch Headquarters Outdoor Museum at Texas Tech by Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Bairfield and will be restored to its orignial state.

This one-room schoolhouse sometimes with one pupil and one teacher, was a most important facility in early days providing a source of learning within its walls. It was the only one-room school remaining standing in this area, so far as we know.

Quoting from the Lubbock A valanche Journal: C. E. Bairfield, who attended the school located on the Bairfield Ranch southwest of Clarendon, remarked that "Kids learned a lot more that way. Usually there was one pupil to a class and he got full benefit of the teacher's knowledge. Then, when the teacher went to the higher grades, he got to listen in on those and learn them too. I enjoyed hearing the older students recite history and listening to stories a bout George Washington gave me quite a sense of partiotism." Classes were alternated. Shelves in one corner held the school library, and a small shelf to one side the water bucket. Water

Mr. Bairfield started to school in 1907. The schoolhouse was built before his time. In research. however he learned that it had been founded to serve the children of three homesteaders -Fred Wiedman, Jim Porter, and
