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G. A. Gwin Dies; Buried at Oplin

Funeral for G. A. Gwin, 89, pioneer Oplin farmer, who died at 7:30 a. m. Thursday in Abilene, was held at 2 p. m. Friday in Elliott's Chapel of Memories. Officiating was Rev. M. T. Richardson, retired Abilene Baptist minister, assisted by Rev. Dan Gaines, retired Baptist minister, also of Abilene. Burial was in Oplin Cemetery beside the grave of his wife.

Mr. Gwin was born in Fannin County, Ga., Aug. 8, 1872, and moved to nearby Collinsville, Ala., at the age of 6. He married Anna Warren near Lovelace Ala., in 1896. They moved to Callahan County in 1903 at the bidding of Mrs. Gwin's parents Mr. and Mrs. Jim Warren, who had come to the Oplin area several years previously.

The Gwins arrived in Baird by train on Dec. 17 of that year and moved their household furnishings to a tract of land four miles west of Oplin. They joined the Oplin Baptist Church shortly after settling on their new homestead and he had been a deacon in the church since 1917. The couple celebrated their golden wedding anniversary on Dec. 15, 1946. Mrs. Gwin died last May 15.

If each person in the county who owns any type of livestock in this county, will go by or send his check for his part of the fund, to his local bank, it will greatly help the program. Each person is asked to put in 50c for each cow and 10c a head for each sheep, goat or swine.

This is a voluntary program but anyone that will give the program some thought as to what it can be worth to them knows that the donation asked for is only a small amount compared to the benefits it will bring. The money must be turned in from the county to the Southwest Animal Health Association by February 1st, so the program needs your help and support now.

County Agent

Reports from all over the county have been coming in on the great number of ticks showing up on livestock. Ticks can cause heavy losses in weight and even death if they build up to the point that animals are severely weakened by them. Reports have come from W. E. Scott and Tommy Johnson of Oplin, Earnest Windham of Rt. 2, Baird, Deel Edington of Cross Plains, R. D. and Lewis Williams of Putnam and Richard Windham of Baird, that the ticks have built up heavy enough in their cattle and horses that spraying is going to be necessary.

There are several chemicals that can be used to control ticks such as Lindane, Delnav, Toxaphene, Coral and Ronnel, which is Korlan as it may be better known. A good wetting is necessary for good control and it may be necessary to repeat the spray in 2 or 3 weeks. Spray young animals lightly, as the chemicals can have ill effects on them. A bulletin giving all recommendation for sprays, etc., can be obtained in the county agent's office.

Farmers income tax guides for 1962 are also available at the county agent's office. The Income Tax and Social Security school held Tuesday morning at Baird, had good attendance with 23 people attending some part of it. There were two visitors from Lawn, Mrs. Ford and Mrs. Hudson.

If Jesus Were Driving a Car

If Jesus were the driver of a car, how do you think He would drive it? Your honest opinion is that He would be driving quite differently from the way many people drive. Would He drive the way you drive?

We can be sure that Jesus would be a safe and careful driver, the kind whom you like to meet on the road. Since He said to treat others as we would like to be treated (Matthew 7:12), and to love our neighbors as ourselves (Mark 12:31), we would expect Him always to be fair to others. He would leave them half the road, their turn at stops, and not crowd them at intersections.

Would Jesus stop for a stop sign even if He thought no traffic was coming? Would He drive faster than the legal speed limit? Remember, Jesus had great respect for civil government and taught that God stood back of its authority. He said "render therefore unto Caesar (the civil authority) the things which are Caesar's" (Matthew 22:21). The Apostles, when passing the teachings of Jesus on to us, said "Let every soul be subject unto the higher powers (civil governments)" (Romans 13:1). "The powers that be (civil governments) are ordained of God Whosoever therefore resisteth the powers, resisteth the ordinance of God." (vv 1,2).

Must Christians have the police standing over them before they will obey the traffic laws? Can anyone break those laws and get by God with it?

Do you think Jesus would take chances on the road? Tired of poking behind a line of cars, would He pull out with no opening ahead on the chance that He could get in line farther up the line somewhere? It was He who said, "In your patience possess ye your souls?" (Luke 21:19)

Would He drive faster than a safe speed for the time and place and His ability? No, He would not drive dangerously at all. Remember that once when the Devil asked Jesus to take a chance, He replied positively, "It is written again, Thou shalt not tempt the Lord thy God" (Matthew 4:7).

Any traffic accident is unpleasant, causing unhappiness and suffering. Would anyone want the lifelong memory and regret concerning the victim whom he maimed or killed one day? Is it not better to be as careful, as patient, and as courteous as possible when you are the driver - always asking God for wisdom and help? Jesus is not here to drive a car. But we who are Christians represent Him. Are we a menace or a blessing on the highway?

BIG CHRISTMAS GIFT MAY BE TAXABLE

Although it may come as a surprise to some people, the federal government levies a tax which applies to gifts made by one person to another. However, the government has no desire to tax ordinary birthday and Christmas gifts. The law therefore excludes from taxable gifts the first \$3,000 given to each individual in each calendar year. The law allows each giver an over-all exemption of \$3,000 before the tax applies. In addition, gifts to the church, community chest, and similar charitable organizations are excluded from taxation.

The tax applies whether the gift is of money or of property. If it is of property, the tax is computed on the fair market value of the property at the date of the gift.

The purpose of many gifts is to remove the property from the taxable estate of the giver at the time of his death. This may or may not be accomplished. The federal law provides that transfers made within three years before date of death shall be deemed to have been made in contemplation of death and shall be taxable in the estate of the one who dies.

It may be advisable to "look a gift horse in the mouth," for the gift may cost the one who receives the gift in income taxes as well as the giver in gift taxes.

For income tax purposes the cost basis of property received by gift is the cost to the giver, plus the amount of any gift tax paid with respect to the gift.

The other rule is that in case of property received by inheritance, the cost basis is the fair market value at the date of the decedent's death.

An example will show the application of the rules. Suppose a farmer acquired his land in the early days at a cost of \$10,000. This property is now worth \$50,000. The farmer wishes to retire and to escape estate taxes, so he gives the farm to his daughter.

Although he may pay federal gift taxes totaling several thousand dollars, when the daughter decides to sell the farm for its \$50,000 value, she still has to pay income tax on about \$40,000 profit (the difference between the sale price and her father's cost of \$10,000, less the amount of any gift tax he may have paid.)

On the other hand, if the farmer had not given the farm to the daughter, but had left it to her under his will, he would have saved the gift tax. The daughter would have taken the property at a cost basis of \$50,000, so upon the sale, she would not have had to pay any income tax.

Of course, there would have been some estate tax and administration expenses in the father's estate, but that would have been much less than the total gift and income taxes resulting from the gift. However, depending upon individual and particular circumstances, there may be occasions when a gift is advisable. Your lawyer can advise you on this matter.





Safety Inventory Given at Austin

Governor Price Daniel and top State and citizen traffic safety leaders have been advised that the annual State Traffic Safety Inventory for 1960 "presents a curious -- but regrettable -- situation of work by government agencies that was better than the support provided by the public or the tools given it by the Legislature."

The annual report, prepared by experts of the National Safety Council and based on standards developed by nationally-known traffic safety experts, was presented by Don Hill of Dallas, district director of the Council.

Hill warned that "Texas faces the prospect of an increasing traffic death toll unless the people and their legislators step up to their responsibilities."

The report showed that Texas traffic deaths, "under active leadership by the Governor and through devoted work by State Departments and all too few private citizens... have declined steadily and substantially

"In the absence of critically-needed stronger traffic laws and in the face of steadily-rising travel," the report continued, "this trend is in danger of being reversed. Texas' traffic situation needs more than the enthusiasm which has held the line remarkably in recent years; it needs resources and better laws."

Hill said the program measurement on the nationally-accepted scale rated 80, an improvement from 78 of 1959. This ranked Texas fifth among the eight big traffic states, exceeded by Pennsylvania, Michigan and Illinois with a rating of 81 and California with 82.

In the nine separate ranking which make up the State ratings, Hill reported the Texas standings as follows:

Traffic death record, Texas 64 fourth among the eight-state group; accidents records and analysis, Texas 89, up from 82 in 1959 and sixth in the group; traffic and highway engineering, Texas 91, strongest phase of the Texas program, fifth in the group but not included in the rating for any State; police traffic supervision, Texas 85, up from 82 in 1959 and tied for third among the group; driver licensing, Texas 85, up from 84 in 1959 and fifth in the group; vehicle inspection, Texas 90, down from 93 in 1959 because of changes in standards and second in the group; school traffic safety education, Texas 69, down from 71 in 1959 and last in the group; public traffic safety education, Texas 68, up from 49 in 1959 and third among the States; and organization for traffic safety improvement, Texas 70, up from 69 in 1959 and fourth among the group.

The report showed that the 8 Texas' traffic safety activities rated 80, or fifth among the States, following an 81 for Ohio, Michigan and Illinois, and topped by California's 88.

When combined with the traffic safety record, the overall Texas rating of 78 placed Texas in a tie with Pennsylvania for third place in the big state group, outranked only by Illinois' 81 and California's 82.

Specific recommendations for improving each of the rated activities were included in the report.

Chief George Busby of the

Texas Department of Public Safety's Inspection and Planning Division presented a report on the 1961 traffic safety situation, and Brad H. Smith, Director of the Governor's Highway Safety Commission, reported on traffic safety legislation during the 1961 Legislature.

About 50 persons, representing the Texas Traffic Safety Council, the Governor's Highway Safety Commission, Texas Safety Association and various State agencies, heard the inventory presentation in Austin.

I Give You Texas...

Have you ever searched your memory for the very earliest events which you can recall?

Some of the events in my life are so early that actually I can not recall them; but, from having heard them related vividly, I felt that I remember them.

Such as the time that, carrying my pink parasol, I marched down the church aisle, the parasol still raised, to the very first row.

And the custom I had, regardless of what the congregation might be singing, of rendering, "When The Roll Is Called Up Yonder" -- good and loud, too.

Also, when my sister Vivian was a baby, I would watch her gurgle with delight as my mother pretended to nibble her tiny toes. One day, the baby's cries brought Mother into the room and asked, "What's sister crying for?" My reply was, "I bit her toes, like you did."

All these events however are only heresay.

The easiest way to begin is at the beginning, so --

I was born in Piggott, Arkansas, the oldest of three children, the others being my sisters, Vivian and Marlon. My father was N. E. House; my mother's maiden name was Margaret O'Brien. My father was the editor and published of the Banner; and he set, by hand, most of the type which made up each week's issue.

Piggott was the county seat of Clay County in the extreme northeastern corner of the States, with Missouri on the north and also on the east. We moved away before I was old enough to remember, but during my early boyhood, we revisited Piggott several times. I recall meeting Dr. Thornton who, as it was expressed, "ushered me into the world."

When I can first remember, we (Father, Mother, Vivian and I) were living in Doe Run, Mo. Understand that this was in the leadmining region and was a rather turbulent town. My father ran a cafe, a fact which I can recall.

There is also the recollection of a clicking mechanism into which a man would thrust a newly-purchased cigar for the purpose of clipping off the end. In a spirit of scientific investigation, I thrust in a finger and with a scream withdrew a bleeding digit. My father ran over, pale of face, but the wound was a mere nick.

There was a customer who was always giving me a coin or a trinket. One day, he came in and I ran toward him. And then an inexplicable thing happened. My father seized a baseball bat and ran the man out of the place!

Now I knew my father could do no wrong -- but the man was my friend. And so I could not understand. It was not until several years later that I learned the reason: the man had

been drinking and, in his hand, was an open knife; consequently, my father had feared I might be harmed.



Let's quit worrying about radioactive fallout from the 1961 bomb tests as a health hazard for a while and concentrate on getting ready for Christmas.

There are two things to think about in this business of fallout and its effect on humans --

The scientists are by no means in agreement as to how much radioactivity we can absorb with out bothering us.

There isn't very much that us average folks can do about it anyway.

In spite of all of the bombs set off in the last few months, the chances are that there still isn't enough radioactive fallout in the United States to constitute a health problem. This no one knows for sure, but a majority of the men who know most about the problem have said many times that they don't think we need to start worrying yet.

Whether you are in favor of fallout shelters or not, we can't just retreat to a shelter this winter. The man of the house has to go to work, the lady has to go shopping and the kids

have to go to school. We have to be out in all kinds of weather everyday. If there is radioactive fallout in the air, we'll get some of it, and there's nothing we can do about it.

The American Medical Association recently conducted a survey of seven of the top experts in the nation. All seven agreed that fallout was not a health hazard. Since that time, more bombs have been exploded, but the principle remains the same. The best opinion of a majority of the experts is that we can absorb all of the fallout now floating around without damage.

Radiation in all its forms will play an increasing role in the lives of all mankind. The uses of nuclear fission will continue to expand and potential radiation hazards will increase accordingly. The need for conservative management of all radiation sources is obvious.

There are still many unknowns and research on a wide front is going rapidly ahead. As new information is gained, man can expect to derive increasing benefits from the release of nuclear energy with a minimum hazard to himself and his descendants.

All of us are living in a world in which nuclear energy will be used more and more in the years to come. Learning to live with radiation all around us is something we cannot escape. Meanwhile we can keep from becoming panicky over something we cannot control, something whose harm to mankind is still largely an unknown factor.
