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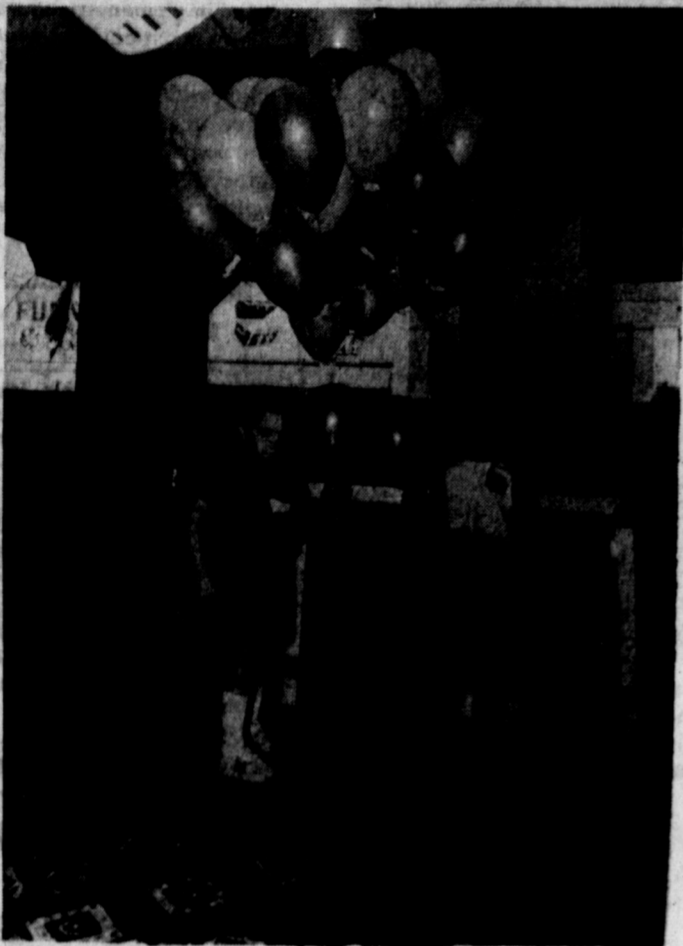

State agency sponsors seminars on new property tax laws

Representatives of the State Property Tax Board will visit 13 Texas cities July 15-August 1 to explain truth-in-taxation procedures and the new property tax laws passed by the 69th Legislature.

One of those seminars is scheduled for 9 a.m. to noon on Tuesday, July 23, at Region 16 Education Service Center, 1601 Cleveland in Amarillo.

Many taxing units will begin the process of adopting a property tax rate in late July and August. The truth-in-taxation statutes of the Texas Property Tax Code require taxing units to inform their taxpayers through public notices of proposed increases in the tax rate. Taxpayers then have an opportunity to express their opinions concerning the proposed increase at public hearings and can later petition for an election to roll back the tax increase.

Nuclear Waste Meeting July 23 in Amarillo

Residents of the Clarendon area are invited to a meeting Tuesday, July 23, in Amarillo, to learn more about the high-level nuclear waste repository that may be located in Deaf Smith County.

The program is scheduled from 4 to 9:30 p.m. in Exhibit Hall of Amarillo Civic Center, with the first part of the session devoted to giving the public an opportunity to visit with the question persons present to explain aspects of the project. Speakers will make formal presentations beginning at 6:30 p.m.

The Department of Energy is sponsoring the meeting, the first of its kind to be held in Amarillo, and more than 30 government representatives will be present to outline plans and answer questions about the proposed facility.

Also present will be spokesmen for citizens opposed to locating the nuclear dump in a nine-square-mile area in northern Deaf Smith County, one of three sites designated as "finalists" in the search for a place to store the nation's most dangerous nuclear garbage.

Mrs. Beulah Lee Carter of Amarillo, chairman of a temporary committee organized last month to fight choice of the Deaf Smith site, announced plans for the groups representation at the upcoming meeting.

Among spokesmen for the group, she said, will be Wayne Wyatt, manager of Hi-Plains Underground Water District No. 1, of Lubbock; Wayne Richardson of Richardson Feeds, the nation's largest producer of certified seeds, and which is located within the proposed site for the nuclear dump; Don Hancock of

Wilson Scaling, Chief of USDA SCS

Wilson Scaling of Henrietta, Texas became chief of the USDA Soil Conservation Service on May 21. In the July issue of SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION NEWS, he said he is pleased with his new job.

"The Soil Conservation Services run an excellent voluntary soil and water conservation program," Scaling said. "I'm proud to be named the agency's new chief, and I am confident in my knowledge and understanding of the strong partnership between SCS and conservation districts."

"I've learned firsthand how that partnership works - as a practicing steward of the soil, director of the Little Wichita Soil and Water Conservation Districts, and member of the National Association of Conservation Districts."

Conservation districts are governed by locally elected landowners who coordinate conservation work within their district.

Scaling said he firmly believes soil and water conservation is the key to America's long-term productivity in agriculture.

"Conservation has served my family well for many years," he said. "It's the care that my ancestors have taken of the natural resources that's keeping our livestock operation in north-central Texas profitable today."

"I plan to lead SCS in helping many more people share the feelings of pride and satisfaction that taking good care of the soil, water, and other resources has given me and my family. I believe SCS and local conservation districts working together have the natural ability to make it happen for generations to come," Scaling concluded.

Provide Supplemental water to wildlife

Texans are increasingly aware of the scarcity of water in their state. Some species of wildlife have been experiencing water shortages in Texas for a long time.

Some animals in arid southwest Texas, particularly reptiles, can manufacture water within their body (metabolic water). Many animals, such as deer and quail, normally meet their water food (succulence). Other animals, including pheasant, turkey, and dove, must drink water daily. During very dry periods many animals, that normally obtain moisture from dew and succulence, must drink water regularly for survival.

Around our homes, bird baths are excellent for providing supplemental water to songbirds and squirrels. Farm ponds and stock tanks water wildlife as well as domestic livestock. Faucets can be installed in steel water tanks to drip water into a mortar lined depression in the ground. When pastures are being deferred or rested, windmills should remain operational to maintain overflow areas, which are excellent wildlife watering sites.

Soil Conservation Service personnel at Clarendon provide assistance with the development of wildlife watering facilities, such as "gallinaceous guzzlers" which have been used for many years in arid sections of the West. Devices need not be elaborate and expensive - just provide a small pool of reliable water at ground level particularly during the dry, summer months.

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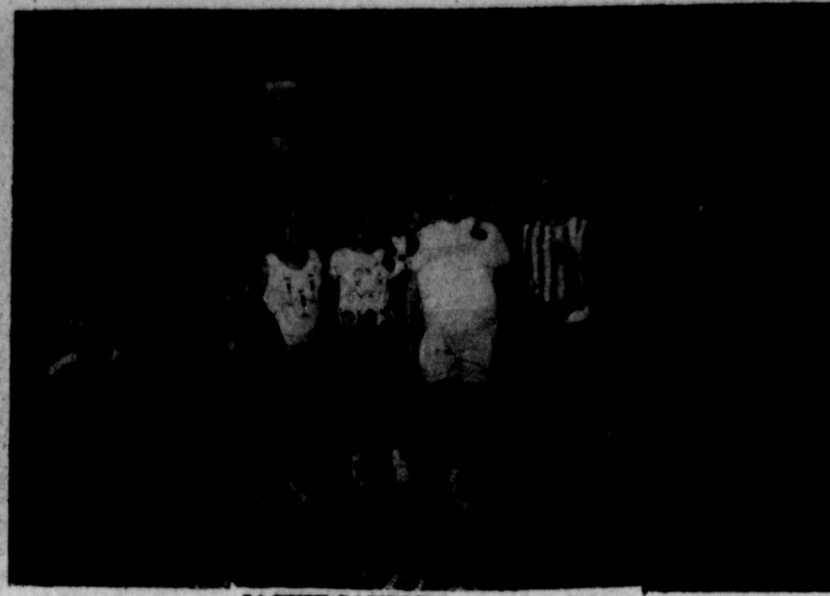

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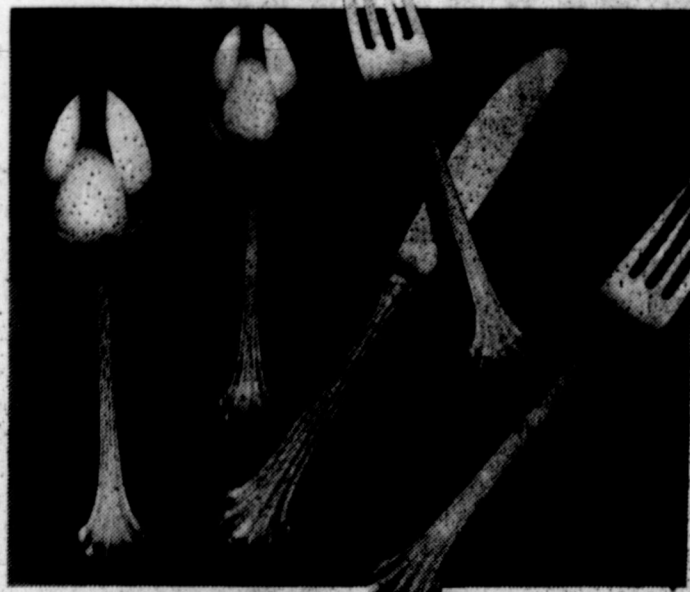

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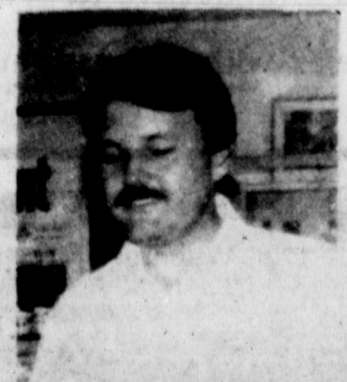

RUBBING ALCOHOL HAZARD
Most people are aware that rubbing alcohol can be poisonous when taken by mouth. Fewer individuals realize that rubbing alcohol can be hazardous even when applied to the skin. Parents should be especially alert to the danger of using alcohol rubs to reduce fever. The problems with rubbing alcohol are usually not associated with its absorption through the skin. When rubbing alcohol [either ethyl or isopropyl] is applied to the skin, rapid evaporation produces a cooling effect. Fever will be reduced - but not without danger. The alcohol vapor that is produced may be

inhaled. Intoxication can occur where there is ~~high ventilation~~ (the typical bedroom?) or when children are small. Coma in children is a serious, but fortunately rare, occurrence. Most child-health authorities strongly discourage alcohol to reduce body temperatures. Rather, they suggest baths in lukewarm water or simple sponging with water. Water has none of the danger associated with rubbing alcohol and provides moisture to often-dry tissues in the mouth, throat, and nose. Water is colorless, is just about free, and will not excessively dry the skin. Best of all, water is safe.

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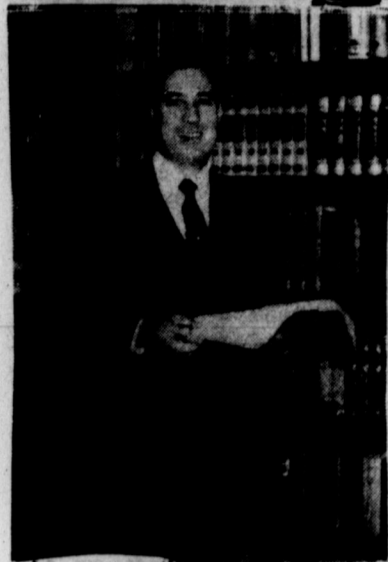

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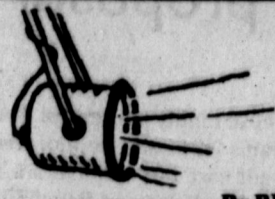

From The PEN of PASTOR PINION



As we continue our series on "Three Classes of men" we see that men are classified according to their ability to understand and receive the "deep things of God." Into these "deep things of God" no unaided man can go. "For what man knoweth the things of a man, save the spirit of man which is in him? Even so the things of God knoweth no man, but the Spirit of God" (knows them). An unaided man may enter freely into the things of his fellow man because of "the Spirit of man which is in him." He cannot extend his sphere. He cannot know experimentally the things of the animal world below him, and certainly he cannot enter a higher sphere and know experimentally the things of God. Even though man, of himself, cannot know the things of God, the Spirit knows them, and a man may be so related to the Spirit that he too may know them. The passage continued: "Now we have received, not the spirit of the world, but the Spirit which is of God; that we may know the things (the "deep things of God," which eye hath not seen, etc.) that are freely given us of God." "We (that is, all saved, excluding none) have received the Spirit which is of God." Here is a great potentiality. Being so vitally related to the Spirit of God as to have Him abiding within, it is possible, because of that fact, to come to know "the things that are freely given to us of God." We could never know them of ourselves: the Spirit knows, He indwells, and He reveals.

This divine revelation is transmitted to us in "words" which the Holy Spirit teacheth, as the Apostle goes on to state: "Which things also we speak, not in the words which man's wisdom teacheth, but which the Holy Spirit teacheth; comparing spiritual things with spiritual. God's Book is a Book of words and the very words which convey "man's wisdom" are used to convey things which "eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, neither have entered into the heart of man. Nevertheless unaided man cannot understand these "deep things of God," though couched in words most familiar to man, except as they are "revealed" by the Spirit. Just so, in coming to know these revealed things, progress is made only as one spiritual thing is compared with another spiritual thing. Spiritual things must be communicated by spiritual means. Apart from the Spirit there can be no spiritual understanding.

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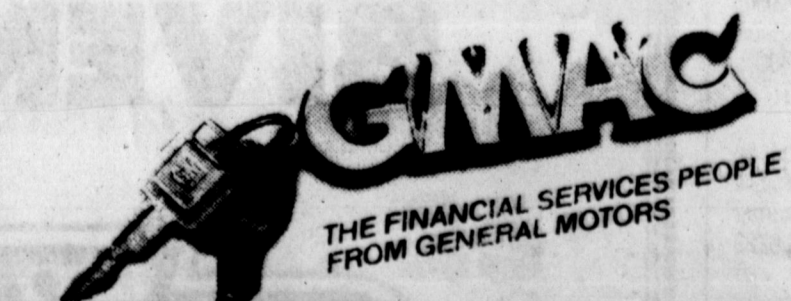
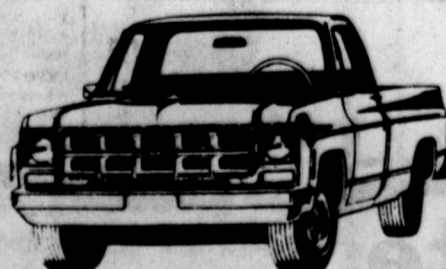
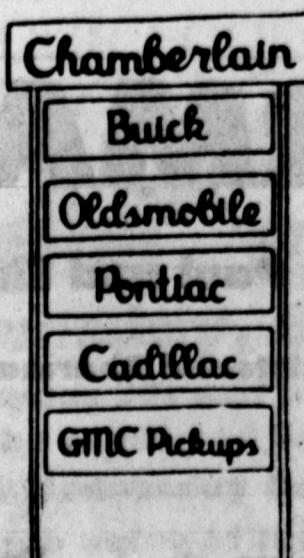
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Senior citizens news

Farm and Ranch Program bond proposal set for November ballot

A program to revitalize the family farm in Texas will be modeled after the successful and self-supporting Texas Veterans loan programs, so as not to cost taxpayers a single penny, Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro said.

Established by the recent Legislature, the Farm and Ranch Finance Program would be funded by the sale of \$500 million in general obligation bonds which must be approved by the voters next November -- Number Ten on the constitutional amendment ballot. If voters approve Proposition 10, the first loans could be made in September 1986.

Sen. Bill Sarpalius (D-Amarillo) and Rep. L.P. (Pete) Patterson (D-Brookston) authored the legislation that provides for low-interest loans of up to \$100,000 for the purchase of a minimum of 50 acres of land for a working farm. To be eligible, a family must have one member of the household that receives at least 35 percent of his income from agricultural purposes for the last three years before the loan is requested and have a net worth of no more than \$250,000. Also, Texas residency for the last five years is required.

Mauro pointed out that a Texas Veteran would be eligible for a Farm

and Ranch Finance Program loan even if he had already used his Texas Veterans program loan.

Designed to be a local farm and ranch program, the enabling legislation provides for a local committee appointed by the county judge and consisting of two resident agricultural producers and an officer of a financial institution located in the county.

Under the legislation signed by Gov. Mark White, the maximum mortgage period would be 40 years with a required down payment of at least five percent.

The Veterans Land Board will administer the new farm and ranch program and set the actual mortgage periods and interest rates after bonds have been approved by the voters and sold on the bond market.

"If the success of Texas Veterans Loan Programs are any indication," Mauro said, "this new program should prove to be even more successful because it appeals to an even broader number of Texans. We intend to model the program

closely after the Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program and the Texas Veterans Land Program -- the best Veterans loans programs in the entire United States."

"Those highly successful Veterans programs are self-supporting and have not cost the taxpayers a single penny. The Farm and Ranch Finance

Program should prove equally as popular, but now it is up to the Texas voters to provide the funding next November," Mauro said.

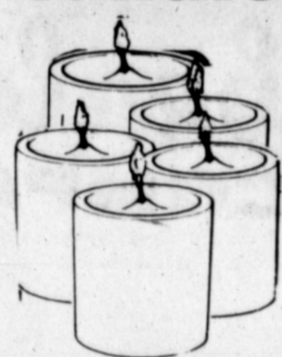

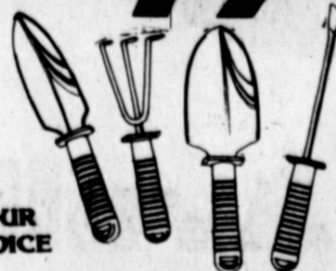

Citizens need to keep lots mowed

The recent rains have caused weeds to become overgrown in many places throughout the City. This creates a haven for mosquitoes, and

as the weeds dry out they become a fire hazard. The City Board of Aldermen is reprinting the ordinance governing this subject to remind all our citizens of the need to mow and clear any lot where the weeds have become excessive.

The word "slogan" comes from the Gaelic *slagh ghairm* which meant "war cry."

ORDINANCE
An ordinance to protect the public health and promote the public welfare of the City of Clarendon, Texas, by providing for the filling up and drainage of lots that shall have unwholesome place or places where stagnant water may accumulate thereon; the cleaning of any building or premises of filth, carrion or other impure and unwholesome matter;

requiring owners or occupants of lots in the City of Clarendon to keep said lots free from weeds, rubbish, brush, and other unsightly or unsanitary matter; providing for notice to be given to owner or premises in case of failure of owner to make lots and/or premises sanitary and slightly; providing that the same may be done at the expense of the City of Clarendon; providing for the fixing of a lien against such lots for such improvements; and providing for a penalty not to exceed \$200.00 and each and every day such violation is continued shall constitute a separate offense; providing a savings clause; and making this ordinance cumulative with all other ordinances.

Whereas, it is deemed by the City Council of the City of Clarendon, Texas that it is dangerous to the public health for lots in the City of Clarendon to have places thereon where stagnant water may accumulate and for filth, carrion or other impure and unwholesome matter to accumulate on lots in said city and that it is dangerous to public health and constitutes a fire hazard to have weeds, brush, rubbish, and other unsightly and unsanitary matter on lots in the City of Clarendon:

Now, therefore, be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Clarendon, Texas:

Section 1. That it shall be unlawful

for any person, firm, or corporation who shall own or occupy any lot or lots in the City of Clarendon, Texas, to permit or allow holes or places on said lots where water may accumulate and become stagnant, or to permit same to remain.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation who shall own or occupy any lot or lots in the City of Clarendon, Texas, to permit or allow the accumulation of any stagnant water thereon, or to permit same to remain.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation who shall own or occupy any house, buildings, establishment, lot or yard in the City of Clarendon, to permit or allow any carrion, filth or other impure or unwholesome matter to accumulate or remain thereon.

Section 4. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation who shall own or occupy any lot or lots in the City of Clarendon, Texas, to allow weeds, rubbish, brush, or any other unsightly, objectionable or unsanitary matter to accumulate or grow on said lot or lots.

Section 5. Should any owner of such lot or lots that have places thereon where stagnant water may accumulate and/or which are not properly drained, or the owner of any premises or building upon which carrion, filth or other impure or unwholesome matter may accumulate, fail and/or refuse to drain and/or fill the said lot or lots, or remove such filth, carrion or other impure or unwholesome matter as the case may be, within ten days after notice to said owner to do so, in writing, or by letter addressed to such owner at his post office address or within ten days after notice by publication as many as two times within 10 consecutive days in any newspaper in Clarendon, Texas, if personal service may not be had as

aforsaid, or if the owner's address be not known, then in that event, the City of Clarendon, Texas, may do such filling or draining or removal of filth, carrion, etc., or any other unsightly, objectionable or unsanitary matter, or cause the same to be done and may pay therefor and charge the expenses incurred in doing such work or having such work done or improvements made to the owner of such lot or lots or real estate, and if such work is done or improvements made at the expense of the City of Clarendon, Texas, then such expense or expenses shall be assessed on the real estate, lot or lots upon which such expense was incurred.

Section 6. Should any owner of any lot or lots within the City of Clarendon, Texas, who shall allow weeds, rubbish, brush, or any other unsightly, objectionable or unsanitary matter to grow or accumulate thereon, fail and/or refuse to cut down and/or remove such weeds, rubbish, brush or other unsightly, objectionable, or unsanitary matter,

as the case may be, within 10 days after notice to said owner to do so, in writing, or by letter addressed to such owner at his post office address, or within ten days after notice by publication as many as two times within ten days consecutive days in any newspaper in Clarendon, Texas, if personal service may not be had as aforesaid, or if the owner's address be not known, then in that event, the City of Clarendon, Texas, may do such cutting down and/or removing such weeds, rubbish, brush, or any other unsightly, objectionable or unsanitary matter, or cause the same to be done and may pay therefor, and charge the expenses incurred in doing such work or having such work done or improvements made to the owner of such lot or lots or real estate, and if such work is done or improvements made at the expense of the City of Clarendon, Texas, then such expense or expenses shall be assessed on the real estate, lot or lots upon which such expense was incurred.

Section 7. The Mayor of the City of Clarendon, Texas, shall file a statement of such expenses incurred under Section 5 or Section 6 of this ordinance, as the case may be, giving the amount of such expenses, the date on which said work was done or improvements made, with the County Clerk of Donley County, Texas; and the City of Clarendon, Texas, shall have a privileged lien on such lot or lots or real estate upon which said work was done or improvements made to secure the expenditures so made, in accordance with the provisions of said Article 4436, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, which said lien shall be second only to tax liens and liens for street improvements; and said amount shall bear ten percent interest from the date said statement was filed. It was further provided that for any such expenditures, and interest as aforesaid, suit may be instituted and recovery and foreclosure of said lien may be had in the name of the City of Clarendon, Texas; and the statement of expenses so made, as aforesaid, or a certified copy thereof, shall be prima facie proof of the amount expended for such work or improvements.

Section 8. Any person, firm or individual who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall

be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00), and each and every day's violation shall constitute a separate and distinct offense. In case the owner or occupant of any lot, lots or premises under the provisions of this ordinance shall be a corporation, and shall violate any provision of this ordinance, the president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer of such corporation, or any manager, agent or employee of such corporation shall also be severally liable for the penalties herein provided.

Section 9. If any part of this ordinance is, or should be held invalid for any reason, then that fact shall not invalidate the entire ordinance, but the remainder thereof shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 10. This ordinance is made cumulative to all other ordinances and shall not be construed as repealing any ordinance.

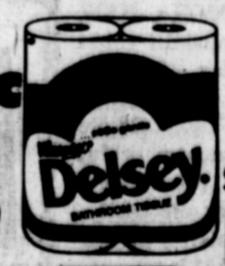

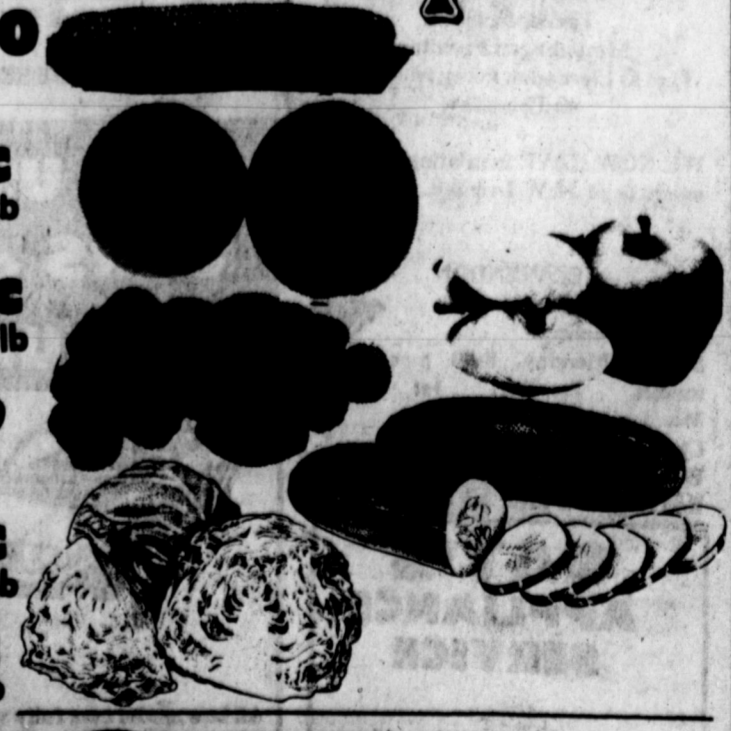
