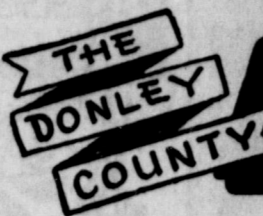

A Fine Paper For Fine People

Broncs Tame Tigers In Close Game 10-6

The Clarendon Bronchos played good sound football last Friday night to edge out the McLean Tigers 10-6 in District play. This gives the Broncs 4 wins and one to go for district honors.

Scotty Lindley opened up the Broncs scoring in the first quarter with a 27 yard field goal and Elray King pushed over from the one in the second quarter for the only TD. Lindley kicked the extra point. McLean picked their only score in the second period also pushing over from the 2 yard line. Their try for extra was blocked.

The Bronchos defense played an outstanding game and were faced by a top-notch passer that netted the visitors 131 yards.

The Bronchos mustered 20 first downs to McLean's 11 and gained a total of 297 yards to the visitors 239. Individual records for the game showed Tommy Shields gained 84 yard on 15 carries for a 6.3 yard average, Steve Carter gained 72 yards on 15 carries for a 4.8 average, Elray King gained 69 yards on 16 carries for a 4.3 average, James King carried 2 times for 19 yards and a 9.5 average. Mack Tomlinson completed 2 out of 10 pass attempts to James King for 13 yards and Mike Leeper for 17 yards.

Many local fans acclaimed that the Broncs played their best game of the season last Friday night.

Historical Award To Former Resident

Mrs. Jo Ellen Stewart Randel of Panhandle, Texas has been named to receive one of the highest history awards in the state, the Ruth Lester Award for Meritorious Service in Historical Preservation. The award is made annually by the Texas State Historical Survey Committee in recognition of an individual's contribution to the preservation of the heritage of Texas.

Mrs. Randel grew up in Clarendon, the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Stewart. She is chairman of the Carson County Historical Survey Committee and Vice President of the Texas Historical Foundation.

Among her outstanding services to the cause of historical preservation are years of researching local history, compiling and indexing archives, marking significant sites, sponsoring History Appreciation programs and presenting of educational lectures in schools and to adult groups. She gives aid and advice to neighboring countries in their historical activities and has helped educate the public at large in the lore of her region. She has also supervised the compilation and writing of "A Time To Purpose," a two volume history of Carson County, a book that won the first annual book award of the State Historical Survey Committee in 1966.

Texas Farm Bureau Meet In Amarillo

Donley County Farm Bureau will be represented at the 38th annual convention of the Texas Farm Bureau to be held November 14-17 in Amarillo.

Those from this county planning to attend the Amarillo meeting include: Mr. and Mrs. Hubert Rhoades, Mr. and Mrs. Lee Shaller and Jay Gould.

Some 2,000 county Farm Bureau leaders from all over Texas are expected to attend the annual meeting where Texas Farm Bureau policies for 1972 and recommendations to the American Farm Bureau Federation on national issues will be formulated by some 900 voting delegates from the 206 organized county Farm Bureaus. Any Farm Bureau member interested in seeing how a State Convention operates is invited to attend.

The convention will begin with a vesper service on Sunday evening, November 14, followed by the discussion meet and talent find; Speaking at the Monday morning general session: Finals in the annual TFB queen contest Monday evening; Special conferences on a number of topics of interest to Farm Bureau members Monday afternoon and Tuesday morning; The annual banquet on Tuesday evening followed by the annual dance.

The annual business session will begin at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday and will continue through Wednesday, culminating with the election of seven directors and the president by the voting delegates.

FM Road Approved To West Side Of Greenbelt Lake

The Texas Highway Commission today approved development of 3.3 miles of Farm to Market Roads in Donley County as part of the 1971 Texas Farm to Market Road Program.

District Highway Engineer V. J. McGee of the Texas Highway Department said the estimated cost of the work is \$100,000.

This approved Farm to Market Road extends from U. S. Highway 287, 2.0 miles Northwest of Clarendon, North; and work will be under the supervision of E. H. Monroe, Engineering Technician of Clarendon, Texas.

The work authorized for this county is part of 394.3 miles of new construction and additional financing for 177.1 miles of FM Roads previously designated and constructed in stages. Estimated cost of the program Statewide is \$20.9 million.

Texas has some 40 thousand miles of paved secondary roads under State maintenance in the Farm to Market system.

Of the new construction in the program, 290.8 miles are new roads being added to the system. Of this total 192.8 miles, or 66 per cent, are school bus routes; and 178.6 miles, or 61 per cent, are rural mail delivery routes.

Originally intended to get Texas farmers and ranchers out of the mud and to provide for movement of agricultural produce to markets, the FM system also now affords city dweller — and rural resident alike — access to hundreds of new lakes and other recreational areas in the State.

In addition, the FM system supports the movement of goods and workers to the many new industries now operating in smaller cities and towns in Texas.

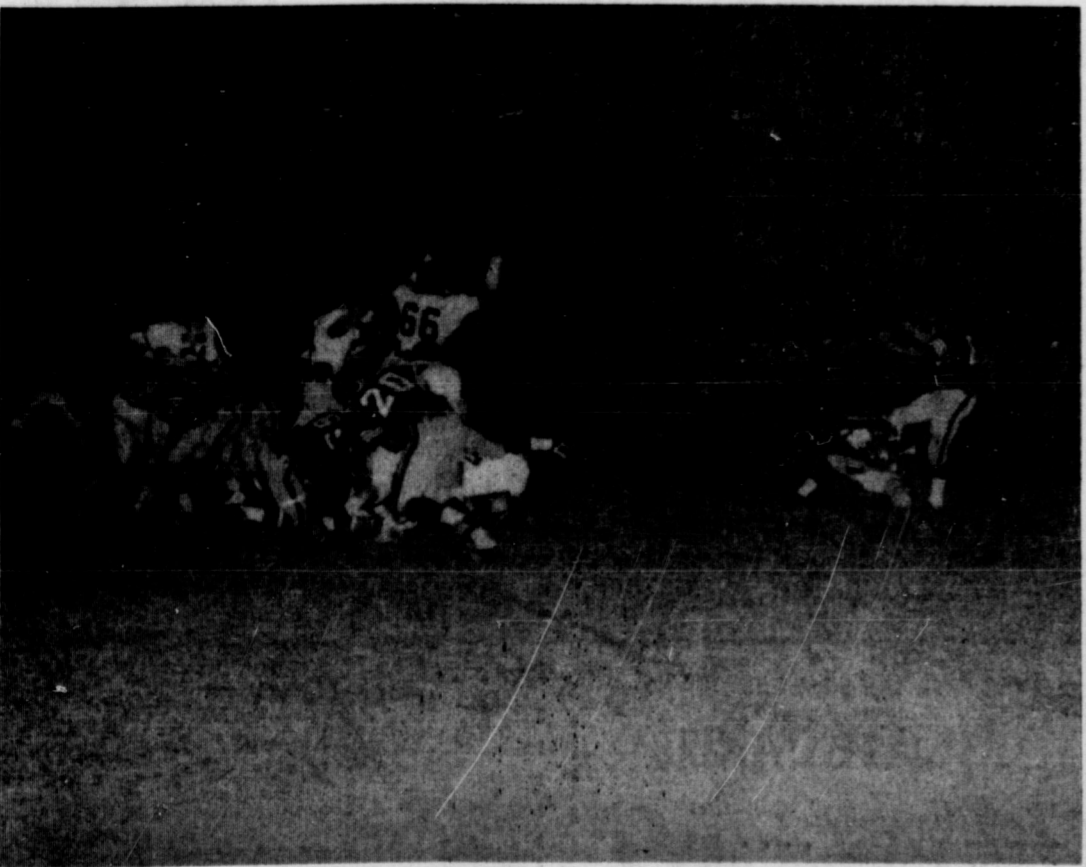
Surviving are a sister, and two brothers.

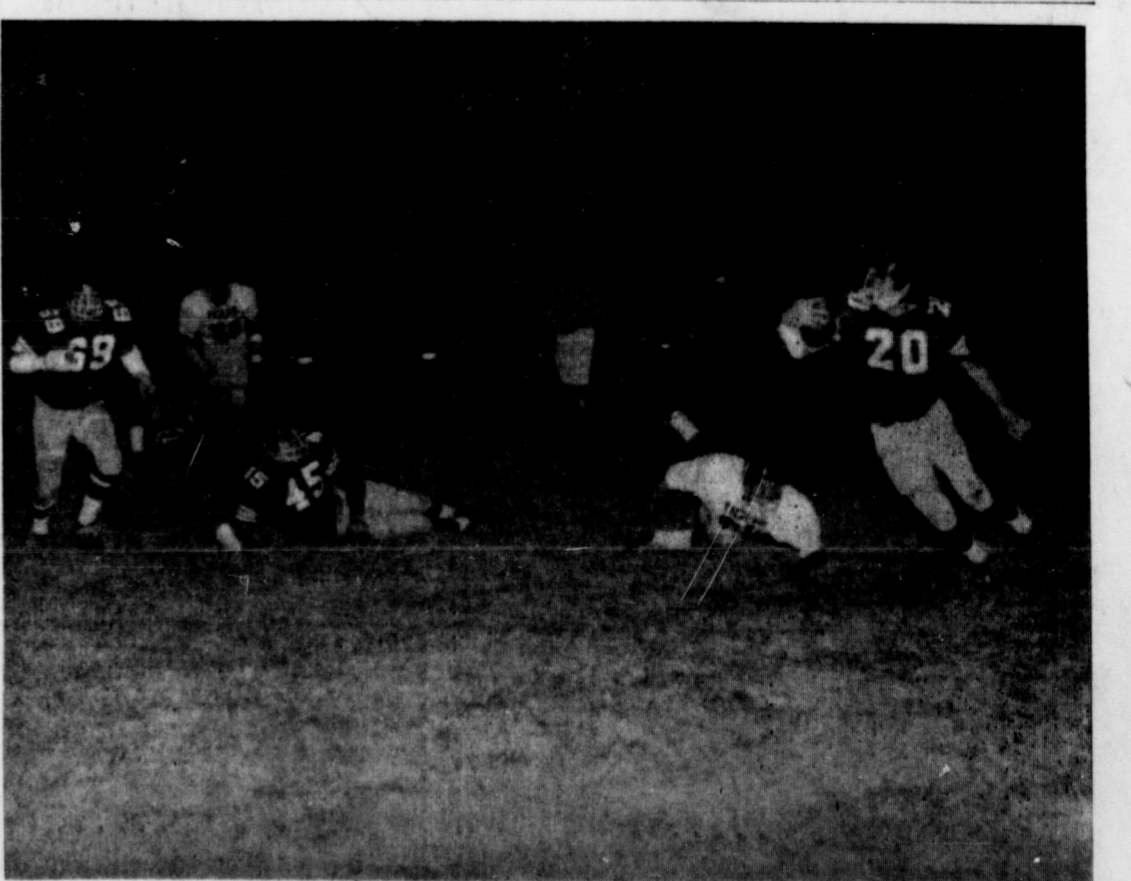
The Certificate of Achievement for Safety is awarded for driving 21,000 accident free miles.

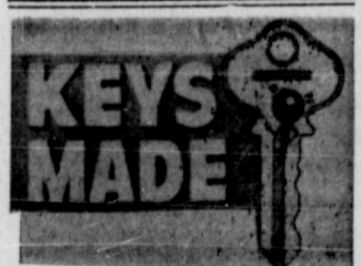

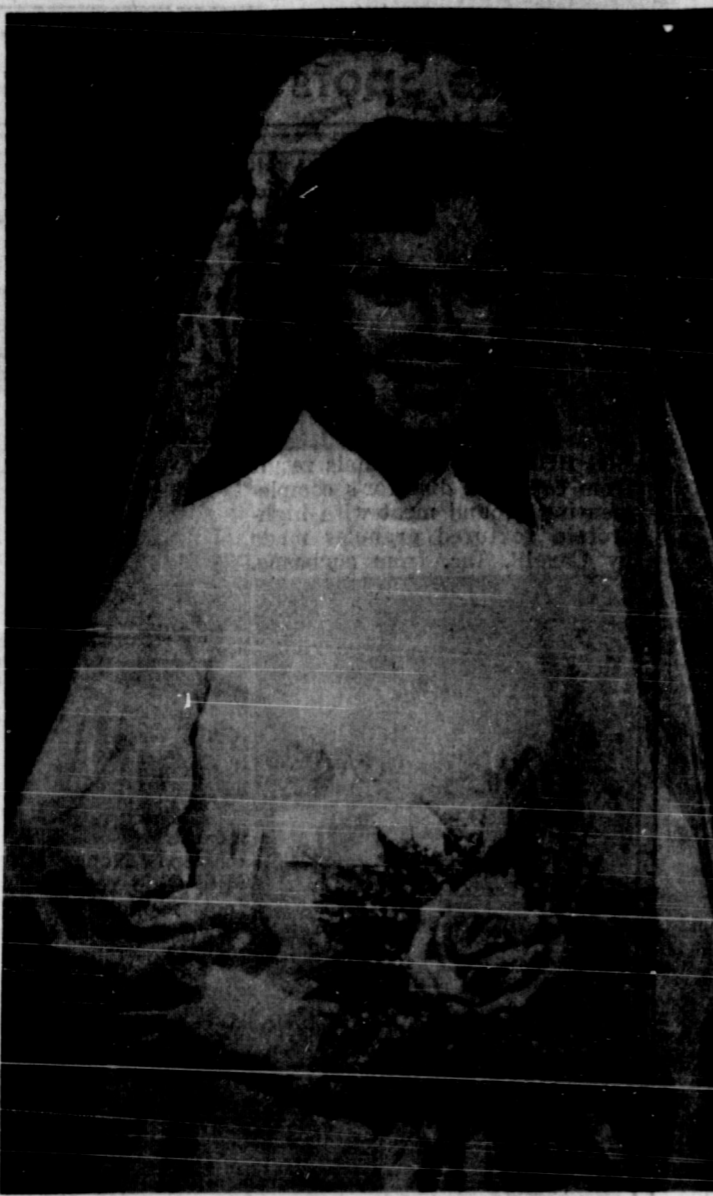

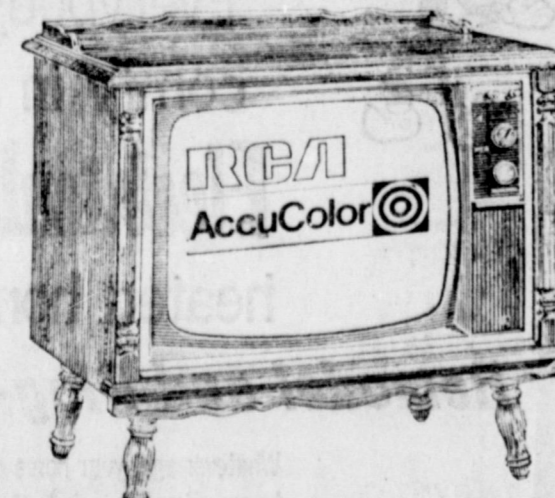
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Episcopalians, though, say the funeral service affords one of the strong reasons for their faith in the Church, because it's conducted as much for the living as for the dead.

In such a context, eulogies seem hardly appropos. After all, we're all children of God and equal in his sight. How important, really, is the fact that "the departed" was highly regarded by his fellow man? It seems pretty insignificant compared to God's loving promise of eternal salvation.

Like its funeral service, the Episcopal Church is conducted for living people. Afterwards, it's between you and God. Your nearest Episcopal minister would be delighted to talk with you about this "living theology."

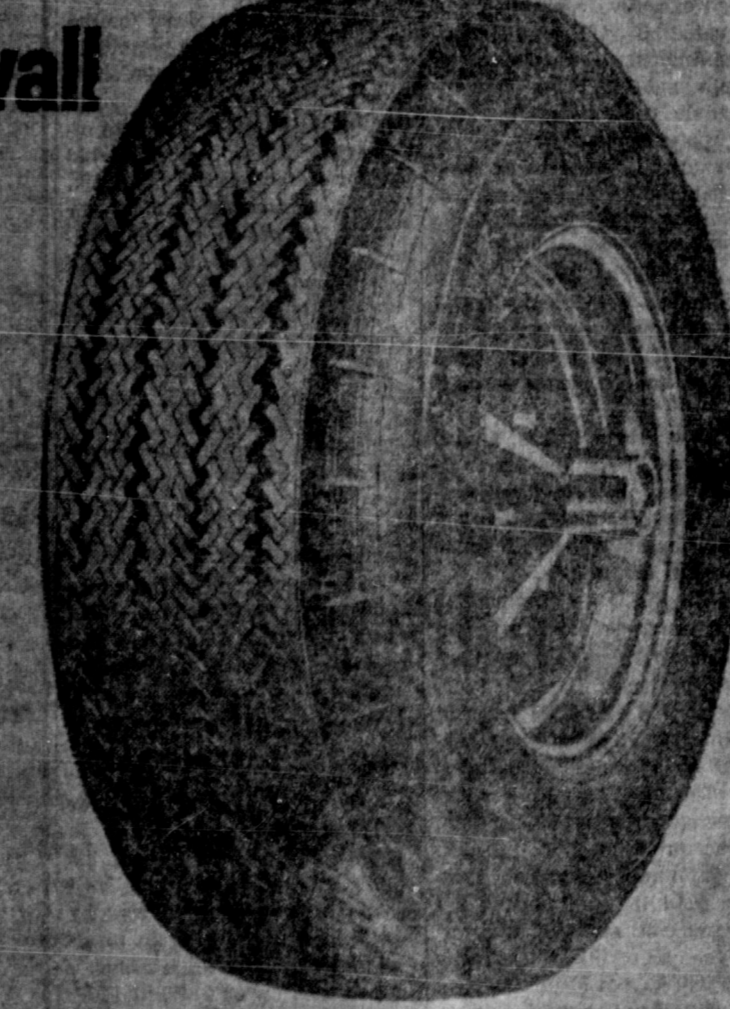

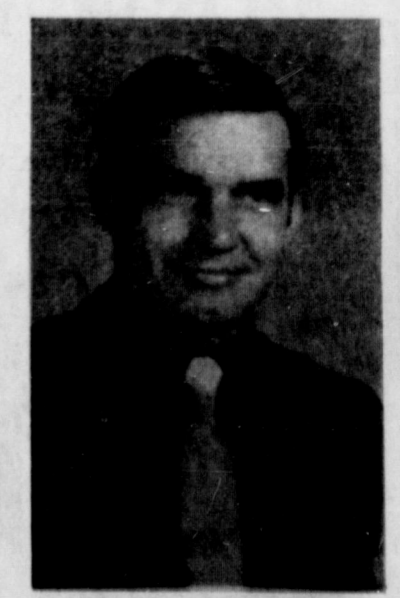

Deer Season Opens Its Doors In Texas

One of the largest businesses in Texas opens its doors in November. Its 510,000 customers will spend about \$88 million in about two months.

The business will utilize 37 million acres of leased land, and the processed product will be worth more than \$6 million.

It's the annual fall deer season in Texas, an event anxiously awaited by hunters as well as hardware store owners, ranchers and packing house operators.

The economic impact of the deer harvest in the state is becoming well known to most Texans. But oddly enough, the impact could be greater yet if all the areas populated by deer were used properly, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials.

A total of 290,706 deer was legally taken during the 1970 season. That's a lot of deer, but the total represents only about nine percent of the herd.

Biologists say under most conditions an annual harvest of 15 percent to 25 percent of the herd is appropriate. In fact, studies have shown that a higher harvest rate results in a healthier deer herd from year to year.

The acreage of lease land is expected to increase about 11 percent this fall, indicating an awareness on the part of many landowners of the value of deer as a marketable resource. But department biologists note that many owners of large tracts of land fail to put enough gun pressure on their deer herds, result-

ing in stunted deer and over-grazed land.

The state's overall deer population is remaining fairly stable at around 3.2 million animals, but civilization's constant inroads on deer habitat are likely to reduce that number in the next few years.

Biologists say the annual deer kill in Texas accounts for approximately 7,500,000 pounds of boneless meat. Figuring at the current price of ground chuck beef in the stores, at about 85 cents per pound, the value of the venison expected to be taken by hunters in Texas this year is \$6,375,000.

This is a considerable dollar value, but when the total average cost of a deer hunt is calculated it becomes obvious that the deer hunter pays dearly for that package of venison.

The deer season in most Texas counties opens Nov. 13, but prospective hunters should check the department's 1971-72 Hunting Guide for local seasons and regulations. The guides are available at locations where hunting licenses are sold and from department offices across the state.

Crop and Livestock Reports Needed

During the last half of November and in December, some 64,000 farmers and ranchers will receive either a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas and Livestock Reporting Service. Accurate estimates are of great importance to producers, providing an accurate picture of agriculture for each county and for the State of Texas. Each farmer receiving a questionnaire is urged to fill it out completely and return it promptly to the Agricultural Statistician in Austin, Texas.

Cotton Production Records

When bringing in your cotton production records for the 1971 crop year, remember that ginners' certification of gin numbers and bale weights will not be acceptable. You will need to bring in your sales documents, settlement sheets or warehouse receipts.

If you will not be harvesting your cotton, you will need to come to the office and make your request for yield adjustment. A farm inspection must be made in these cases, and a fee of \$5.00 will be charged. The request should be made before the crop is disposed of.

If your production is less than 90 percent of your 1971 yield because of adverse weather conditions, you may make a request for an adjustment in yield. This request should be made after harvest is complete and your 1971 actual production is determined.

Highlights and Sidelights

From Your State Capitol

A blue-ribbon study commission has come out strong for state constitutional revision and widespread restructuring of the state and local governmental systems.

The Texas Urban Development Commission, winding up an 18-month study which enlisted the services of experts and laymen, handed its 200-page report to Gov. Preston Smith.

Smith, commending the body for charting "a clear course for those in government to act on," announced appointment of a 17-member, permanent Texas Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations. The latter will follow up on the report of the study group headed by Arlington Mayor Tom J. Vandergriff as chairman and Dr. Earl M. Lewis of Trinity University in San Antonio.

"The Texas Constitution," said the Commission, "should be thoroughly changed to allow state and local governments to exercise more initiative and to be more responsive to current and future demands but at the same time free to be truly responsive to changing needs and emerging problems."

Among 50 major recommendations were the following: State government should begin moving toward a new organizational and management system and consolidation of urban services in about 20 existing agencies.

The governor should have more power over budgeting and appointments and removal of state agency governing boards chairmen.

Local governments should be reorganized to meet specific local needs and granted greater fiscal authority through additional revenue sources and property tax overhaul.

Growth of special purpose districts must be checked. Urban growth planning programs and coordinated land planning should be launched at all levels of government.

APPOINTMENTS — George E. Stanley of Port Arthur was named to the Veterans Affairs Commission, succeeding the late Charles C. Ford of Longview.

Governor Smith named 10 members of the Criminal Justice Council executive committee and designated L. O'Brien Thompson of Amarillo as chairman.

Smith appointed an 18-member study committee on traffic court reorganization.

Lawrence L. Jester has been designated district engineer of the State Highway Department's Atlanta district on retirement of G. A. Youngs.

William G. Reid of Austin will serve as general counsel for the recently established Texas Criminal Defense Lawyers Association.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes named committees to study the system of state licensing and examining boards and retirement benefits for employees of public educational institutions.

BONDS SOLD — Continuation of the veterans land program was assured by sale of \$20.8 million in bonds.

The low bid of 4.48943 per cent effective net interest was submitted by a group of 50 investors. The constitutional ceiling on interest rates is 4.5 per cent for the program.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong said the sale means the program can operate until almost the end of 1972 when Texas voters will have a chance to pass a constitutional amendment to raise the interest rate ceiling to six per cent.

The Veterans Land Board is constitutionally authorized to sell another \$70.7 million in bonds. More than 43,500 Texans have bought land under the program.

A NEW GOVERNOR — Texas will have a new governor briefly in December — when Sen. W. E. (Pete) Shelton, as president pro tempore of the Senate, is third in line for the governorship. Governor Smith and Lieutenant Governor Barnes will absent themselves from the state December 4 so Shelton can have the honor of serving as governor. He represents 35 counties of the 25th senatorial district.

COURTS SPEAK — The State

Court of Criminal Appeals upheld Texas' abortion law, and said the state has the right to prohibit operations, in a decision conflicting with a June 18, 1970, three-judge federal court ruling at Dallas.

The Court of Criminal Appeals also reversed a Waco marijuana conviction due to improper questioning of witnesses by the prosecuting attorney.

State Supreme Court heard arguments in a suit seeking to nullify University of Texas acquisition of a 588-acre Odessa site for the new UT-Permian Basin campus because of the proximity of oil and gas equipment and a potential safety hazard.

AG OPINIONS — The governor can commute death sentences to life imprisonment even though convictions are on appeal, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

A new "surtax" on misdemeanor and felony convictions (\$2.50 to \$10) cannot be assessed for offenses committed prior to last August 30, date the law went into effect.

Issue of tax cancellation certificates are authorized, and should cover all tax certificates showing no taxes due which had been previously and lawfully issued.

Computation of actual interest expense incurred and to be recovered as an item of selling price on long term federal war contracts shall be made by applying the cumulative average rate to only that portion of the "direct cost" of the facility which is attributable to Texas Water Development Fund money.

PESTICIDE DECISION PUT OFF — The new State Pesticide Advisory Committee delayed its decision on banning DDT for household uses.

No recommendation was made because the Environmental Protection Agency has not made its official rulings on DDT, committee chairman Dr. Perry Adkisson of Texas A & M University said.

The five-member committee will meet again December 7 to consider the matter. Texas Department of Agriculture, charged with administering the state law on pesticides, asked advice from the advisory panel authorized by the Legislature this year.

HUNT INVITE "DISAPPEARS" — State legislators and officials who had been invited to hunt on state game management areas found the invitations suddenly withdrawn after newspapers publicized them.

Parks and Wildlife Department Executive Director James U. Cross issued the invitations, although other would-be deer hunters are required to draw for the limited number of free permits in the areas. PW Commissioners expressed doubt special exceptions could be made for state officials and legislators, so the bid was unceremoniously taken back. One commissioner called for Cross's resignation over the incident, but the new director said he plans to stay on the job.

POOL MEET SLATED — Complaints about the new Texas catastrophe pool insurance plan will be aired at a public hearing here December 7.

The State Board of Insurance announced it will "consider all aspects" of the plan approved by the Legislature for 14 seacoast counties this year.

Texas Association of Insurance Agents will offer testimony and stress "positive steps" that can make the pool work as intended.

HUNTERS PLEAD GUILTY TO DOVE BAITING RAP

Birdseed is a dirty word for 23 Houston businessmen.

The group of men opened the state's South Zone mourning dove season in an expensive way by getting caught using grain to attract doves into shotgun range.

The men were arrested by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department game management officers near Pearland, where they had an elaborate "shooting station" layout marked with colored ribbons and sprinkled liberally with maize.

Fines assessed the group in a justice of the peace court totaled more than \$700.

Beans — Know the difference between green beans and wax beans? Wax beans are so called because of their waxy yellow color. Green beans are more common. The two types of beans have little difference in nutritional value, say Extension foods and nutrition specialists.

Price Freeze To Continue After November 13

The rules for the price freeze will continue after November 13 until new rules are provided by the Pay Board and the Price Commission, according to George E. Hastings, the Office of Emergency Preparedness Region VI Director in Dallas.

Hastings said he was repeating this information announced earlier by the federal government because of reports received in his office and the National OEP Headquarters indicating that a considerable number of people had not received word on how the transition will occur from the 90-day freeze period to the post-freeze stabilization program.

The OEP Economic Stabilization Reg. 1, Circular No. 24, formally published in the Federal Register (36 F. R. 20885) on this matter reads in part:

"(3) The Rules and Guidelines established by Regulation, order, directive, or circular provisions for stabilization of wages, prices and rents will not expire automatically on November 13. Changes will occur only through explicit action by the pay board, the price commission, the cost of living council or other competent authority."

Hastings said that the OEP Director, George A. Lincoln, had directed the freeze field organization, including the 360 Internal Revenue Service offices nationwide, to reply to all information requests about changes after November 13 by quoting the above regulation and stating that any change will be provided by the Pay Board and the Price Commission.

The OEP Regional Director added that during the last week, there had been several specific surveys initiated in his Region because of alleged increases in prices. Items that were spot-checked by Internal Revenue Service agents included fishing rods, golf clubs, beef and beef by-products. IRS agents found no freeze violations.

The surveys also included a check on the availability in stores and other retail establishments of ceiling price information. Here, the Internal Revenue Service did find some degree of non-compliance but also a willingness on

the part of sellers to get into compliance quickly. Of 214 stores checked on November 2, only one merchant would not assure compliance by the end of the week. 51 other merchants assured IRS agents that missing ceiling price information would be available by today. The Internal Revenue Service, which will be taking over complete responsibility for the field operations of the stabilization program after November 13, will be checking again on the laggards in compliance as to the availability of their ceiling price information.

Storing Cherries — Don't wash cherries before storing, advise Extension foods and nutrition specialists at Texas A&M University. Fresh cherries are very perishable and should be refrigerated as soon as possible after buying. Leave stems on the cherries until preparing them for the table. The fruit should be eaten within two days.

Waste — Did you know the average American throws away five to seven pounds of solid waste each day? That's over a ton a year, and the amount is increasing, report Extension home economics specialists.
