

One of the largest businesses in Texas opens its doors in Nov- but civilization's constant inroads ember.

It's the annual fall deer season in Texas, an event anxiously awaited by hunters as well as hardware store owners, ranchers and packing house operators.

The economic impact of the deer harvest in the state is becoming well known to most Texans. But oddly enough, the impact could be greater yet if all that package of venison. the areas populated by deer were used properly, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials.


A total of 290,706 deer was legally taken during the 1970 season. That's a lot of deer, but the total represents only about nine percent of the herd.




