In a voter registration "straw" poll conducted at the Tri-State Fair in Amarillo, Congressman Bob Price bested his opponent almost 4 to 1. The actual percentages were 71 percent for Price and 29 percent for Purcell. The poll also showed President Nixon leading Senator McGovern 82 percent

to 18 percent, and Senator Tower leading Sanders 70 percent to 30 percent. The registration drive and "straw" poll were conducted by the League of Women Voters and by Amarillo Radio Station KIXZ, Over 4,000 people participated in the sample balloting and ap-


