**Oil Interests  
 Get Hearing  
 Through Press**

Education of Public Is Sought in Texas' One Great Industry

With December issues of state newspapers, the Texas Oil industry through its service organization, the Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association, will begin a series of institutional and educational advertising.

"It is logical that Texas, being the biggest producer of oil, should think along lines of institutional advertising," George C. Gibbons, executive vice-president of the oil and gas group, said. "Twenty-five percent of all the oil in the world and forty percent of the oil in America comes from Texas. One hundred and thirty-four counties located throughout the state are now in production with exploration or leasing under headway in all but fourteen counties of the 254."

"Outside competition has forced average well production to such a low figure in Texas today that only by most careful management can our industry survive its fixed overhead costs. If through this institutional advertising program we can stimulate the bringing of other industry into the state, we can help stimulate added employment and incidentally our own industry through the use of more of our products at home."

"Each time we interest other industry in coming to Texas to use our oil products we cut down exportation of our surplus. The new paper mill at Lufkin is an example in point. Though the paper is made of another raw product, timber, it is made possible through the tremendous supply of cheap fuel. Much of our raw product is yet to be processed within the state. Wool and cotton are both examples of such opportunities."

"The oil industry has made tremendous strides in the processing of its crude oil, now refining more than eighty percent within the state's borders and thereby furnishing employment for many thousands of Texas people."

"The advertising series will endeavor to portray to the public the part the oil industry plays in the economic life of Texas and its contribution to employment, tax revenues, distribution of new wealth created through constant production of oil and the advantage it offers to new industry."

Meeting Priscilla again, he learns that Lynn, now in the district attorney's office, has had notes from Bogart threatening his life if he doesn't drop the racket investigating he is carrying on. She appeals to Cagney for help, and his answer to her plea forms the thrilling climax to the film story.

Authentic in every detail, "The Roaring Twenties" is essentially a true story of the era, for although the story it tells is fictional it has its parallels in the lives of hundreds who rose to the heights of power only to be smashed into oblivion in the great crash.

**Marines Now Guard Alaska**

UNCLE SAM OVERLOOKING NO BETS UP NORTH

For the first time in the territorial history of Alaska, a United States Marine detachment is now permanently based in that vast northern dominion, whose jugged coastal lines extend far out into the Bering Sea and only fall short of connecting with the mainland of the Union of Socialist Soviet Republics by a scant 54 miles.

Alaska is only one of the many new stations to be opened by the Marine Corps incident to the large increase of personnel authorized by President Roosevelt. Four Marine Corps recruiting stations are now functioning at full capacity in Texas and are located in the post offices at Houston, Fort Worth, Austin, with the District Headquarters in the Allen Bldg., Dallas.

The establishment of the Alaskan station gives the corps a wide field of activity in the western hemisphere in view of the fact that four U. S. Marines are included in the complement of men with Admiral Richard E. Byrd in his Antarctic Expedition.

**Contact Board Of University Gets Money**

AUSTIN, Dec. 5.—The University of Texas' Development Board is "not a spending organization, but an agency set up to study the financial needs of the University, encourage large gifts from donors and bequests to the institution by wills," John A. McCurdy, Ex-Students' Association secretary, said last week following the board's announcement of plans for immediate full-time activity.

The board, in operation for two years on an "organization and study basis," indicated that a full-time director will be named in the near future.

It will not conduct campaigns for funds, but will make available to possible donors and testators a group of prominent Texans who will be able to counsel with interested persons on the financial needs of the University.

The ten members of the board, chosen by the Regents, the Ex-Students' Association, and the faculty, will function under the supervision of the director, yet to be named.

**Student Free Legal Clinic**

AUSTIN, Dec. 6.—The University of Texas School of Law last week prepared to establish a legal aid bureau for Texas indigents.

Established at the request of Attorney General Gerald Mann to furnish legal advice for citizens unable to pay attorneys' fees, the bureau is to be manned by the Law School's 17 highest ranking junior and senior students, Ira P. Hildebrand, dean, disclosed. He said plans were to open bureau advisory doors by early February or with the beginning of the next school term in September.

Attorney General Mann's suggestion for establishment of the free legal service came, he declared, as a result of numerous appeals for legal advice. The Attorney General, he explained, is unable to supply legal advice except to State officials.

Pointing out that the bureau will "in no way compete with practicing attorneys," as proof of inability to pay legal fees must be submitted, he said the student corps might be allowed to represent its clients in Texas courts.

**Quails Build Liberty Church**

AUSTIN, Dec. 5.—Quail built a church for the Liberty community in Northeast Texas!

In 1934 a group of sportsmen in Sulphur Springs and surrounding towns formed the East Texas Field Trial Association. Seeking a suitable area in which to hold the annual trials, the association finally settled upon Liberty Community in Hopkins county. Quail were more plentiful in some other sections, but the spirit of cooperation of residents of Liberty Community sold the association.

When the Field Trials officials presented their problem to the community, landowners saw an opportunity to realize money from their quail crop without harvesting it—a case of eating cake and still having it. So an agreement was reached with the understanding the residents of the community would attempt to build up their supply of quail.

It costs \$3 to enter a dog in the field trials. \$1 goes to the Association, \$1 to the Liberty Community and \$1 is for the prize fund. The women of the Community add to the proceeds by serving meals.

SEN. SHEPPARD

Washington, D. C.—Approval of War and Navy Department plans for strong defense fortifications in the Caribbean for defense of the Panama Canal and the Monroe Doctrine was expressed here today by Senator Morris Sheppard of Texas in a special interview on the U. S. Possession of Puerto Rico.

Senator Sheppard pointed out that Puerto Rico is the mainstay in defense plans for that area, and that when constructions now projected for Puerto Rico are completed, it will, according to competent authorities, be a "Gibraltar" of the Caribbean for defense of the entire area.

According to official testimony, Senator Sheppard pointed out, planes from the Island base will be able to scout far out to sea, giving hours of advance warning of any attempted invasion. In addition, the Island will serve as a valuable supply base for warships, it was pointed out.



#### Engage in Project Tours

The second round of division project tours were made this week by members of the vocational agriculture classes. Monday, December 4th, the twelve members living near Clarendon inspected each other's projects. Wednesday, December 6th, the members living near Ashtola toured the projects in that territory, and Thursday, December 7th, the "Martin" boys checked each others work.

The members found the feeding projects, swine, sheep, and calves to all be progressing satisfactory with each member putting more improved practices into use than ever before. Each member was able to check his work with that of his fellow students. J. R. Gillham, F.F.A. Adviser, said the projects were in the best shape since he started his work in Clarendon and that the prospects for the spring show were the best in the history of the event.

#### Equipment Refinished

Members of the vocational agriculture classes retopped all of their classroom tables with plywood the past week. In addition to being retopped, the tables, tool room, play tables, and bulletin rack were all repainted. Five new pictures of winning livestock were framed and added to the wall displays and the Fall Pig Show ribbons were received and mounted on the trophy display.

Visiting teachers from Turkey, Canyon, Groom, White Deer, and other departments have stated that the local facilities for vocational agriculture will compare favorably with those found in any school in this section of the state and that the trophy exhibit is the best in the state.

#### Drill Sessions Held

Monday and Tuesday of this week were devoted to parliamentary drill by all members of the Clarendon F.F.A. Special study in each of the twelve parliamentary abilities was carried on, and each member presided over the meeting while at least one parliamentary ability was being performed.

The chapter members use the parliamentary procedure in each of their meetings, throughout the year. Special work is included in the chapter conducting contest each spring. The parliamentary drill for the 1940 chapter conducting contest has been worked out and each member has been assigned a definite part to train for in the parliamentary division of the contest.

#### Beautify School Grounds

In line with one of the objectives of the F.F.A. chapter for this year, the chapter members spent the morning of November 29th in clearing the south campus of rubbish and trash. Excess grass and weeds were removed from the grounds. The members plan to remove the trash pile, to prune and shape the shade trees, and to repair the tennis court posts at an early date.

### 17 Counties Located In This District

Seventeen Panhandle counties will be served from the district office in Pampa during taking of the 1940 census next April, it was learned today. Only other office in the Panhandle will be in Amarillo from which 11 counties will be worked.

A district manager and an assistant will be sent to Pampa after attending a school of instruction in Washington. Names of the officials have not been revealed.

Other employes will be local and they will attend a course of instruction there from which those making the best showing will be selected as enumerators.

Applicants cannot register until arrival of the office manager, Postmaster C. H. Walker of Pampa said today. He cannot take applications for jobs and he urges prospective employes not to call at the postoffice until notice had been given of the manager's arrival.

It is estimated that 143,000 enumerators will be required to take the census in Texas. Excepting for those taking the business census in January, most of the enumerators will not be named until next spring.

Counties to be served from the Pampa office will be Hansford, Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hutchinson, Roberts, Hemphill, Carson, Wheeler, Gray, Armstrong, Donley, Collingsworth, Briscoe, Hall, Childress, Motley and Cottle.

Construction is under way for the first unit of a crippled children's hospital near Gonzales. The famous warm springs of that section are at last to be utilized. School children of Texas are being asked to each contribute a dime toward some of the improvements.
