# HINES BOOSTED AS POSSIBLE CANDIDATE FOR GOVERNOR:

State Highway Commissioners Harry Hines of Wichita Falls, And Robert Lee Bobbitt of San Antonio Were Guests of Honor at Childress

The crowd attending the rally from 44 counties of the Panhandle, packed the high school gymnasium exceeding all expectations of the Chamber of Commerce and Board of City Development leaders of Childress who sponsored the event Tuesday night.

Heading the motorcade from here was Homer Mulkey, Sam Braswell and Garland G. Reeves. Others making up the Donley county attendance were commissioners John Hermesmeyer, Marvin Hall and Claude Nash. John Gillham, secretary of the local Chamber of Commerce was much in evidence with Judge R. Y. King, J. R. Bartlett, Clyde J. Douglas and Odos Caraway.

In speaking of the success of the meeting, Secretary Gillham said: "Members of Highway 18 Association were given a good deal of encouragement by Commissioner Bobbitt in a meeting with representatives of the group when he stated that in his opinion that "18" would receive additional work in the program now being planned for next year by the Commission. He stated that the Commission was working with a number of other government agencies and would probably be able to announce their full plans at an early date."

Hines tentatively threw his hat in the ring for the governorship race next year when he was introduced as a "possible" candidate. Astute Vance Johnson on the Amarillo News in his column, "The Line Rider" comments: "You can expect Harry Hines to come out flat-footed with an announcement soon after the first of the year, that he will oppose W. Lee O'Daniel for governor in 1940. The highway commissioner, with the help of Gen. # \$12,050 Bridge **Project Plans** Are Approved

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




# **Student Free**

AUSTIN, Dec. 6 .- The University of Texas School of Law last week prepared to establish a legal aid bureau for Texas indigents.

Established at the request of At ornex General Gerald Mann to furnish legal advice for citizens unable to pay attorneys' fees, the bureau is to be manned by the Law School's 17 highest ranking junior and senior students, Ira P. Hildebrand, dean, disclosed. He said plans were to open bureau advisory doors by early February or with the beginning of the next school term in September.

Attorney General Mann's suggestion for establishment of the free legal service came, he declared, as a result of numerous appeals for legal advice. The Attorney General, he explained, is unable to supply legal advice except to State officials.

Pointing out that the bureau will 'in no way compete with practicing attorneys," as proof of inability to pay legal fees must be submitted, he said the student corps might be allowed to represent its clients in

# **Marines Now Guard Alaska**

UNCLE SAM OVERLOOKING NO BETS UP NORTH

For the first time in the territorial history of Alaska, a United States Marine detachment is now permanently based in that vast northern dominion, whose jutted coastal lines extend far out into the Bering Sea and only fall short of connecting with the mainland of the Union of Socialist Soviet Republics by a scant 54 miles.

Alaska is only one of the many new stations to be opened by the Marine Corps incident to the large increase of personnel authorized by President Roosevelt. Four Marine Corps recruiting stations are now functioning at full capacity in Texas and are located in the post offices at Houston, Fort Worth, Austin, with the District Headquarters in the Allen Bldg., Dallas.

AUSTIN, Dec. 5. Quail built a church for the Liberty community in Northeast Texas!

In 1934 a group of sportsmen in Sulphur Springs and surrounding towns formed the East Texas Field Trial Association, Seeking a suitable area in which to hold the annual trials, the association finally settled upon Liberty Community in Hopkins county. Quail were more plentiful in some other sections, but the spirit of cooperation of residents of Liberty Community sold the association.

When the Field Trials officials presented their problem to the community, landowners saw an opportunity to realize money from their quail crop without harvesting itcase of eating cake and still having it. So an agreement was reached with the understanding the residents of the community would attempt to build up their supply of quail.
