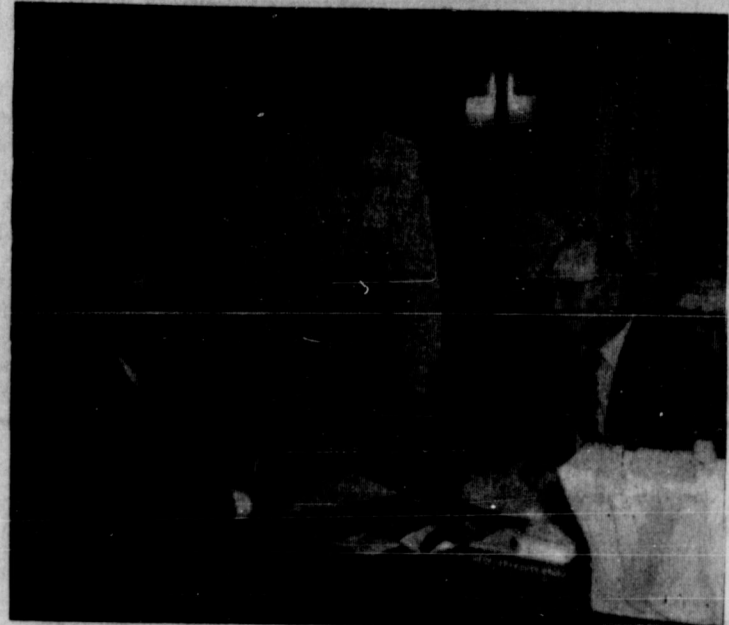

## Nov. 15-21 Is Food & Fiber Week in Tex.

To recognize the contribution made by the agricultural industry in Texas, the period of November 15-21 has been designated as Food and Fiber Abundance Week. This celebration was the idea of many people involved in the agricultural industry including farmers, ranchers and agribusiness people, according to Charles G. Scruggs, editor of The Progressive Farmer, and chairman of the state organization sponsoring the celebration. Scruggs said, "Never in the history of the world have so few fed so many so well with such a selection of foods. The average farmer in the U. S. today raises enough food to feed himself and forty-five other people."

Wm. R. Christal, County Judge is chairman of the Food and Fiber Abundance Committee in Donley County. Christal said, "While telling the story of agriculture it must also be mentioned that no nation provides the consumers with food as cheaply as we do in the United States, for the average family spends only sixteen and one-half percent of its income on food."

H. Leon Slaughter, projects director for the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and State Coordinator for the celebration, commented, "perhaps the most significant fact is that we need only five percent of our entire population to provide this food and fiber. The other ninety-five percent are free to pursue other vocations that in turn help to make our standard of living something that every other nation can very well envy."

## Charles Louis Sets Howard Payne Record

With two games remaining to be played, Charles Louis, dubbed the "Clarendon Comet" by local sports writers at Brownwood, has already established a season rushing record at Howard Payne College at Brownwood coming out of the Southwest Texas game with 93 yards rushing to bring his total for the season to 961. The previous record had been held by Danny Ehle with 873 yards in 1969.

Louis, a 6-2, 185-pound sophomore tailback was an All-State performer in three sports at Clarendon High School. Through nine games this season, Louis has averaged 5.3 yards per carry and 106.8 per game. He is currently ranked No. 2 in the Lone Star Conference in average yards per game and is second only to Angelo State's Jerry Austin who is averaging 119.7 yards per game.

Louis' record stands at a net 961 yards rushing offensively, six passes received for 60 yards, and a total of 11 TDs for 66 points. James Cameron, head football coach at Howard Payne commented, "I foresee two more great seasons for Louis if he continues to work as he has this year. He is not a power runner but carries the ball with a lot of determination in spite of his slight build. His best assets are probably his quickness and ability to cut. He also has good hands for a running back."

Charles is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Louis of Clarendon. We, at the Leader Office, congratulate Charles on his fine achievements and would like to mention that press releases from Howard Payne reach us too late for proper publication time. Since this release was sent out, Howard Payne played Texas A & I at Kingsville Saturday and Charles has added to his fine record.

Both teams scored in the first quarter with Louis Davis sprinting 24 yards for the first Memphis counter and the kick was good. The Bronc score came on a sensational pass play with Mack Tomlinson passing to Mike Leeper for 72 yards. Scotty Lindley's kick was good for the extra.

It was the Cyclone's game from then on until late in the fourth quarter when Tomlinson passed to James King for 16 yards and the 6 points. Officials judged Lindley's kick no good. In the other portion of the game, Davis and Paul Fowler picked up three more TD's.

In losing the contest, the Broncs shared co-district honors with Memphis but the Cyclone won the right to be called champions and play White Deer for bi-district at White Deer Friday night. The district title could have been split three ways but McLean was knocked off by Wheeler, completely eliminating McLean from the running.

## Ambulance Service For Area To Be Discontinued Dec. 31

It was announced this week that four area Funeral Service firms will be terminating Ambulance Service to residents of the Collingsworth, Donley, Gray and Hall County areas effective December 31, 1971.

The announcement was made by James Kelso, Kelso Funeral Home of Wellington; Mrs. J. W. Murphy and Louise Payne, Murphy Funeral Home of Clarendon; Robert Spicer, Spicer Funeral Home of Memphis and Creed Lamb Jr., Lamb Funeral Home of McLean.

They explained further that in order to maintain an Ambulance Service, it is necessary to secure an ambulance that meets the specifications of the State Board of Health and equip same with modern and comprehensive emergency equipment. Also it would be necessary to maintain first-aid trained personnel along with the special 72 hour training course by the Department of Health for all attendants would be required to be on call 24 hours a day.

It was their conclusion that "with continually rising costs, it would inevitably become necessary to increase the cost of other services to compensate for the expense of providing dependable Ambulance Service and rather than do this, it would be best to discontinue Ambulance Service in the best interest of all concerned."

### MOISTURE TOTAL NEAR YEARLY AVERAGE

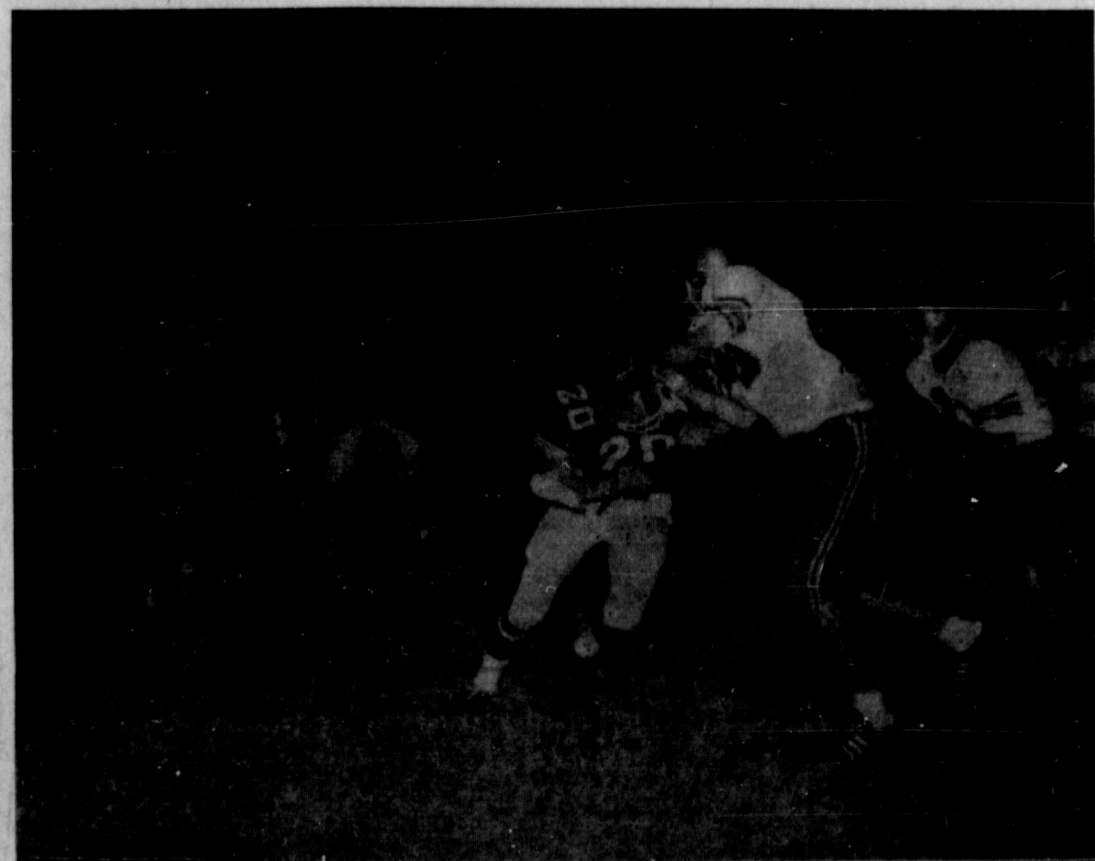
The cotton harvest was just getting underway so the damp spell will slow things down for a few days. Most of the grain crop had been gathered.

Supt. Arling Cordell announced this week that the Public Schools would be out Friday for teachers to attend the teachers conference in Amarillo.

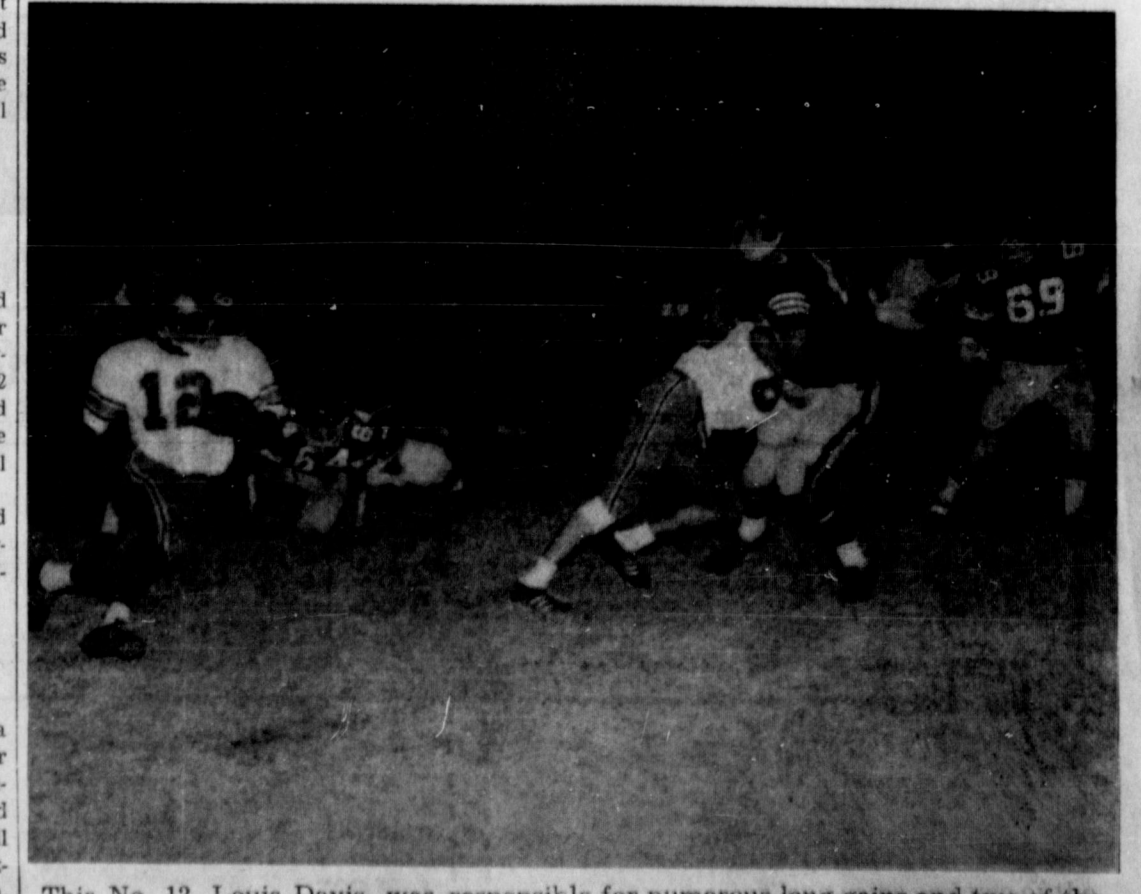
He also announced the Thanksgiving Holidays which will begin at 3 p.m. November 24. Classes will be resumed again Monday, November 29.

Highlights and Sidelights From Your State Capitol By BILL BOYKIN Texas Press Association

Hearings of major interest to insurance policy holders are scheduled here December 8.

The State Board of Insurance slated for that date public airing of new regulations to prevent insurance companies from arbitrarily cancelling coverage and a proposal to lower auto policy rates through "shock-absorbing" bumpers.

Allstate Insurance Company of Illinois recommends a 10 per cent premium discount for new cars equipped with the tough bumpers beginning next year. Rates would be reduced to 15 per cent if cars can be demonstrated to take a five-miles-per-hour front-end crash and a two-and-a-half-miles-per-hour rear end wallop. Rates would drop 20 per cent if the bumpers can absorb a five-miles-per-hour blow fore and aft.

New federal regulations call for the shock-absorb bumpers with five mph (front) and two-and-a-half mph (rear) capacity by 1973 models.

Proposed regulations would prohibit cancellation of hazard and liability insurance which has been in effect 60 days or more unless holders fail to pay premiums or lose a driver's license (auto coverage).

Under the rules to be examined at the early Dec. hearing, companies would have to give at least 30 days' written notice if they do not intend to renew a policy at the end of a year. Unless the notice is given, renewal would be required for another year. Firms which violate the rules could lose their licenses to operate in Texas.

The latter regulations resulted from special legislation passed this year following repeated complaints of motorists who claimed

policies were cancelled without advance notice.

A hearing was scheduled earlier for December 7 to consider all aspects of problems in operating the new catastrophe property insurance pool in 14 coastal counties.

JUKE BOX HEARINGS SET—The new Texas Vending Commission decided to air its problems in a series of seminars over the state after being hit with criticism over the discussion of the coin operated amusements machine industry and pertinent laws.

Meanwhile, State Sen. Chet Brooks of Pasadena called on Gov. Preston Smith to remove Raymond B. Williams of Dallas, a vending machine tycoon, as chairman of the Commission. Smith noted the law provides for three industry representatives to serve on the Commission, and said it is too late to remove Williams. Williams said he has no intention of resigning.

The House General Investigating Committee is gathering material concerning the vending industry controversy and Chairman Rep. Menton Murray of Harlingen has indicated a probe may be directed at a later meeting.

Commissioner Williams and the other two industry representatives vowed publicly they will not use their official position to get information about their 2,800 competitors from Commission files.

PAY RAISES ORDERED — The state proposed to begin the last half of this month granting state employees and school teachers pay raises approved by the Legislature unless stopped by the Federal Pay Board.

Governor Smith said an application has been sent to the Pay Board requesting permission to make retroactive raise payments to September 1 when the new state budget took effect.

The Pay Board set a 5.5 per cent salary increase guidpost on expiration of the wage-price freeze. The Legislature approved a 6.8 per cent pay raise for state employees. Texas was the only state government in the country blocked by the freeze from employee pay raises this year. Hikes in other states took effect before the president's order.

AG OPINIONS — "Surge" brakes for small trailers (such as

those used in hauling boats) will meet the new requirement of central braking systems for trailers, Attorney General Martin held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

Counties are responsible for damages inflicted by reserve deputy sheriffs or constables to persons or property, but they are not liable for injuries to the reserve officers.

A local option election to legalize liquor sale cannot be conducted in a new Randall County precinct because it has not been in existence 18 months.

The State Comptroller must transfer to the Texas Vending Commission all records and memoranda needed in enforcing coin-machine license fee requirements.

Counties are not authorized to contract with cities for the municipal tax assessor-collector to assess all property for tax purposes, but can contract for appraisal or assessment recommendations that do not abrogate the

county tax assessor-collector's constitutional duties.

School districts may purchase liability insurance for employees who are exposed to individual liability in their duties, but not buy policies protecting others against tort claims for bodily injury and property damage.

No certificate of authority can be issued to an automobile club whose services constitute an insurance business.

APPOINTMENTS — Hugo H. Lowenstern Sr. of Amarillo, John McKee of Dallas and Hulen Marshall of Houston were appointed by Governor Smith to the Committee on State and Local Tax Policy. Smith named William M. Streckert of Brownwood and Morris E. Bailey of Amarillo to the Texas State Technical Institute Board of Regents.

He appointed Robert J. Long of Austin to the Lower Colorado River Authority.

First Court of Civil Appeals Associate Justice Phil Peden of

Houston and Austin attorney Robert C. McGinnis were named to the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, and District Judge R. G. Vaughan of Sherman was reappointed.

Governor Smith made official his 18 appointments to a Commission on Intergovernmental Relations.

Dr. James H. Granberry of Lubbock and Mrs. Holt Atherton of San Antonio are co-chairmen of the Texas delegation to the Southern Republican Conference.

Earl Luna of Dallas is new State Democratic Executive Committee counsel.

COURTS SPEAK — A state law declaring desecration of the flag a felony was upheld by the Court of Criminal Appeals in a Dallas case where a 20-year-old flag burner got a four-year prison sentence.

The Court's opinion called such acts "an invitation to violence" and said they are not protected by constitutional guarantees of free speech.

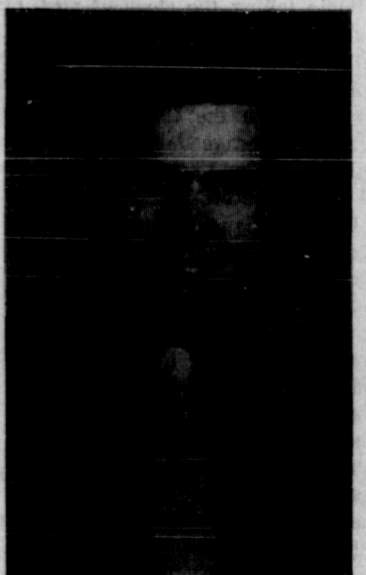

## Plan An All-Texas Thanksgiving Feast

An all-Texas Thanksgiving feast is being suggested this year by Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White. "For your Thanksgiving meal this year, you can be assured of quality and quantity of Texas-produced commodities. No other state offers the consumer the opportunity to purchase so much variety of food to put into your Thanksgiving dinner," White said.

A typical Texas Thanksgiving menu would be this:

Baked Texas turkey with cornbread dressing and gravy, Fresh Texas green beans, Texas candied sweet potatoes, Texas fruit salad and Texas pecan pie.

"Texans can purchase fruit which is produced in the South Texas and Lower Rio Grande Valley areas; vegetables from west, east and north Texas; and pecans and turkeys from central Texas," White said.

"Thanksgiving time is a time when we all give thanks for everything we have. Often, we overlook our bountiful agricultural production. This year as you enjoy your Texas Thanksgiving meal, give the producer a pat on the back, not a kick in the pants. He is providing for the consumer quality food at bargain prices," White said.

The Texas Department of Agriculture is cooperating with agricultural producers in the state through the Texas Agricultural Products (TAP) program to acquaint Texans with the quality and quantity of Texas-produced foods.

## Ecology Should Start At Home

Most advocates of a better ecology concentrate their activities on outdoor environmental improvement and neglect to stress the importance of creating a more comfortable, beautiful and liveable atmosphere at home, according to J. L. Foxworth, president of the Lumbermen's Association of Texas, at a 85 year non-profit trade association.

The Texas Senate and House passed a Concurrent Resolution which was signed by Governor Smith, designating July, August and September as "Keep Texas Beautiful" months, a program to urge the continuing need for home beautification both inside and out.

"This campaign serves two purposes," Foxworth stated "one is to promote home improvement for better living, and the other to help the homeowner protect his investment." "Many people would rather 'improve than move' in order to preserve their close relationships in their chosen neighborhood," he added. "Better ecology should start in the home," Foxworth stated "and the members of the Lumbermen's Association of Texas will continue their year-around efforts to assist homeowners to keep homes beautiful and investments protected."

A—Yes. Any deceased veteran whose last period of service was terminated honorably is eligible for this benefit which is administered by the Army.

Q—May I borrow on my G. I. insurance to help pay college expenses for my son and daughter?

A—Yes, provided you have a permanent plan G. I. insurance policy over one year old. In that case, you can borrow up to 94 per cent of its cash value. Current interest rate on such loans is five per cent.

Q—Which is the better education program for a disabled veteran, vocational rehabilitation G. I. Bill?

A—Vocational rehabilitation usually more advantageous to the disabled veteran. However, there may be circumstances where it would be better to use G. I. Bill benefits, such as for training not available under the vocational rehabilitation program.

Q—Is a veteran's widow who draws VA pension entitled to an extra \$55 monthly if she becomes a patient in a nursing home?

A—Yes.

Q—I was recently released from a VA hospital after 35 days for injuries suffered in an auto accident. Am I eligible for the special payment veterans receive when they stay more than 21 days in a VA hospital?

A—Not unless the accident was in line of active duty and the injury was recognized as service connected.

Q—I am a veteran who did not complete high school. Will VA pay me an educational allowance?

A—Yes. Not only are you eligible for this assistance, but any veteran who must complete high school to qualify for higher education can do so without this assistance being charged against his basic entitlement.

## Accent On Health

"Pedodontics" is a big word with a simple meaning — the care and treatment of children's teeth. A major part of pedodontics is preventive dentistry, and preventive dentistry for the very young is the one great hope for a realistic solution to our dental woes.

If a child's teeth are properly

cared for up to age 15, a strong foundation has been laid for minimizing dental troubles in later years.

At about 6 months of age the four front teeth — two upper and two lower — begin to peek out. These front teeth are incisors, the cutting teeth. By age 7 to 11 months, four more teeth, upper and lower, start to come in. These are the lateral incisors at either side of the central teeth.

Then Mother Nature wisely skips a few spaces in order to properly shape the jaw. In 12 to 16 months, the back teeth or molars, come in. Then the cuspids show to fill in the space between. At about 24 months, the second molars come in.

Up to this point all teeth which have erupted are primary teeth, and although temporary they are vital. They help shape the face, help the youngster learn to speak distinctly, and help him nutritionally.

While all this has been going on, the permanent teeth are slowly developing in the jaw bone so they can come forth at the proper time.

The first permanent teeth to erupt are molars — sometimes called "six-year" molars simply because they emerge at about age 6. Because they do not replace the first teeth but come in just behind them, these molars tend to confuse parents who think they are also temporary teeth.

This error can lead to unfortunate consequences. Since the "six-year" molars are permanent teeth, they will not be replaced if lost.

Family dentists strongly emphasize the importance of watching for the six-year molars. They are important to the structure of the mouth. The manner in which they interlock with their opposite teeth will determine the eventual shape of the jaw, facial contour and regularity of alignment of other teeth.

Because of their importance, these first permanent teeth are often referred to as the "keystone of the dental arch."

The strength or weakness of adult dental health — barring loss of teeth through accidents — can invariably be traced to habits of preventive dentistry learned or left unlearned in childhood. And when it comes to preventive dentistry, the pedodontist is a child's best friend.

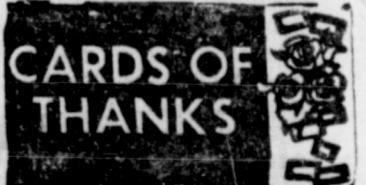
