

# Discontinued Dec. 31 It was announced this week


that four area Funeral Service firms will be terminating Ambulance Service to residents of the Collingsworth, Donley, Gray and Hall County areas effective December 31, 1971.

The announcement was made by James Kelso, Kelso Funeral Home of Wellington; Mrs. J. W. Murphy and Louise Payne, Murphy Funeral Home of Clarendon; Robert Spicer, Spicer Funeral Home of Memphis and Creed Lamb Jr., Lamb Funeral Home of McLean.

They explained further that in order to maintain an Ambulance Service, it is necessary to secure an ambulance that meets the specifications of the State Board of Health and equip same with modern and comprehensive emergency equipment. Also it would be necessary to maintain first-aid trained personnel along with the special 72 hour training course by the Department of Health for all attendants would be required to be on call 24 hours a day.

It was their conclusion that with continually rising costs, it yould inevitably become necessary to increase the cost of other services to compensate for the expense of providing dependable Ambulance Service and rather than do this, it would be best to discontinue Ambulance Service in the best interest of all concerned.'




The cotton harvest was just getting underway so the damp spell will slow things down for a few days. Most of the grain crop had been gathered.





#### **Continuation of Freeze**

There will be an automatic ending on November 13 of present freeze rules on wages, prices, and rents. They will be changed only by the introduction of new regulations, thus preventing a gap that would occur if present rules were allowed to end before new ones had been instituted.

The provisions of the economic stabilization program which have been in force since August 15 will continue until they are specifically modified by the Pay Board, Price Commission, or the Cost of Living Council. However, changes will occur only through explicit action taken by competent authority. Initial modifications are currently being made.



"The great story of American agriculture and the success of this industry is one of the great-

est success stories in the history of this nation," contends Gooch. "This nation's agriculture has its roots in technology, a viable people and helpful public policy. There is no way of dividing the interrelationships of the three. Research, education and the application of technology transformed agriculture in our lifetime from what we call a labor intensive to a capital intensive industry."

Texas Food and Fiber Abundance Week provides an opportunity to tell the story of agriculture, the story of "foodpower."

"Foodpower in the United States is a miracle of efficiency, the greatest secret weapon for peace and God's greatest blessing," says Gooch. "Just imagine what the balance of power in the world might be today if the huge masses of people in such countries as Russia and Red China were not tied to the plows in the fields. What if they could put 95 percent of their manpower in munition factories, for example?"

Yes, we live in a great country with a great agricultural heritage. We have the best, safest and most wholesome food products offered to any civilization at any time. And we have all this for only about 16 cents of every dollar we earn.

"We have an abundance of the natural fibers of cotton, wool and mohair for clothes and other fabrics, adds Gooch. These fibers offer so many plus factors that nearly all synthetics include a percentage of them in their blends for wearing qualities, warmth, bright colors and consumer satisfaction.

"The next time you see a farmer or rancher, take a moment to tell him that you appreciate his efforts," suggests Gooch. "Tell him that he's doing a good job and that you're proud of him.'
