Tornado Watch And Warning Signals

In the event a Tornado Watch is placed in effect for our area and our weather is threatening Two (2) Blasts will be sounded on the siren at one hour intervals as long as the condition prevails.

Should the weather deteriorate and a Tornado Warning be placed in effect Two (2) Blasts will be sounded on the siren at more frequent intervals depending on the severity of the weather. On this signal preparations should be made to seek a place of safety.

In the event an actual tornado is sighted or reported moving in the direction of the city the siren will be sounded continually until the danger is past. On this signal a place of safety should be found immediately.

Don't confuse the following Fire Signals with the storm warning blasts of the siren.

- 1 Blast of the Siren—Grass Fire or Out of Town Fire.
- 3 Blast of the Siren—Dwelling or Business Fire.

Howardwick to Vote On Hosp. Committee Agency May 6

The Citizens of Howardwick will decide on May 6th whether or not to set up a Municipal Hospital Committee Agency.

In the event the vote is yes, a board of five (5) trustees will be selected simultaneously. The three elected trustees receiving the highest vote count will serve two year terms, and the two elected trustees finishing 4th and 5th will serve one year terms.

Nominations will come from land owners who are also registered voters. Howardwick now has about 70 registered voters, and 1000 tax paying families.

Henry Bland, Ruth Mills, Alice Wilson and O. O. Smith are the nominating committee, and they will nominate ten people who are ready to serve. Any others, who qualify, may add their names to this list.

A Hospital Committee differs from a Hospital District in that it has no powers to tax, and is not required to treat indigents. However, the Committee can qualify itself to receive Federal and state grants for purposes of providing medical facilities. It can also borrow state and federal funds.

The Board of Trustees, if and when elected, will plan to make every effort to coordinate their efforts with those of surrounding Hospital Districts.

More Area May Be Added To Cattle Scabies Quarantine

The cattle scabies quarantine on 34 Texas Panhandle counties may possibly be expanded to nine more counties with stricter dipping requirements, according to Dr. Bill Clymer, Extension area entomologist at Amarillo.

He has received word from the Texas Animal Health Commission that as of June 1, the quarantine may be extended to cover another tier of counties south and east of the current control area. Those that may be added to the list include Cochran, Hockley, Lubbock, Crosby, Dickens, King, Knox, Baylor and Wilbarger counties.

Clymer reports that official dipping will be required of all cattle in movement except those animals that:

1. are moving directly to slaughter;
2. are moving to slaughter through a livestock market;
3. are moving to a livestock market for sale and dipping prior to release;
4. are released from a livestock market to a dip point with an official permit;
5. have been dipped within the past seven days;
6. are from a non-control area moving through the control area with no stopovers;
7. are being moved by the same owner from one place to another within the quarantined area;
8. have been dipped within seven days from scabies-infested areas with permit or with a permit to be dipped upon arrival;
9. are from a non-control area being moved into the control area for grazing.

"These new restrictions are being implemented in an effort to eradicate the scabies mite and prevent its spread to other areas", the entomologist concludes.

prices if sales total \$200,000 or more.

Q.—What price controls are in effect on so-called "points" paid by residential purchasers?

A.—The "point" system is a method of adjusting interest rates and, therefore, of compensating the mortgage dealer. Since, however, the variation of points is principally a function of interest rate changes, and since interest rates thus far have not been subject to Price Commission regulations, neither have points.

Q.—When do the prenotification and certification requirements relating to retroactive pay adjustments become effective?

A.—On January 27, 1972 the date the regulations relating to retroactive pay adjustments were published in the Federal Register.

Q.—I employ less than 5,000 employees in my factory and I want to make a retroactive pay adjustment of less than 7 percent for my employees because the increases were called for in an employment contract negotiated before Aug. 13, 1971 but were not paid because of the freeze. Can I begin making retroactive payments immediately?

A.—Yes. If the pay adjustment will be seven percent or less, payment may be made immediately. However, you must certify by letter to your Internal Revenue Service district director within 20 days after payment that the requirements of the new Pay Board regulations on retroactivity have been met. In addition, the letter must include: (1) the date on which the increase was agreed upon; (2) the num-

ber of employees involved; (3) the date it was scheduled to take effect; (4) the reason for not paying the increase as attributable to economic stabilization controls; and (5) the percentage of the increase.

Q.—Do retailers with annual sales of \$100,000 or more but less than \$200,000 still have to post a sign announcing the availability of base price information?

A.—Yes. These retailers are still required to post at least one sign (minimum 22" by 28") announcing the availability of base price information and must make such information available upon request.

Q.—Is a security deposit considered rent under the stabilization regulations?

A.—No. A deposit of money with a landlord by a tenant as a security for the faithful performance of the terms of the lease and which is refundable upon such performance is excluded from the definition of rent, unless security deposits are considered rent under local law.

Q.—Does an increase or decrease in overtime pay to any employee due to working more or less hours at the existing overtime rate constitute a "pay adjustment?"

A.—A bona fide increase or decrease in overtime pay to an em-

ployee who is working more or fewer hours at the existing overtime pay is not subject to the 5.5 percent limitation because the rate of compensation to the employee remains the same. However, should the employer adjust the work day or overtime in an attempt to circumvent the Economic Stabilization Act of 1970, as amended, this adjustment would be subject to the 5.5 percent Phase II limitation.

Internal Revenue Questions & Answers

Q.—Are tuition and room and board charges exempt from price controls?

A.—Yes. Tuition and room and board charges for state colleges and universities and private, non-profit schools, colleges and universities are exempt from price controls. However, private institutions, operating for profit are not exempt from price controls.

Q.—Is every price increase above 2.5 percent a violation of stabilization program guidelines?

A.—No. The basic policy of the Price Commission is that price increases will not be allowed except as justified on the basis of cost increases, taking into account productivity gains. Thus, many price adjustments will be below 2.5 percent and some will be above 2.5 percent as justified on the basis of cost increases and other factors. The 2.5 percent figure is the goal the Price Commission is aiming at as the average price increase across the economy.

Q.—I rent out a room in my home. Is the rent I charge subject under the economic stabilization program?

A.—Owner-occupied dwellings of four or less units having longer than month-to-month rental agreements are exempt from rent controls.

Q.—Are small service firms, such as laundries, restaurants and television repair shops, exempt from price controls as are retailers with sales of less than \$100,000?

A.—No. This exemption applies only to retail firms and not small service firms.

Q.—Is a department, such as a jewelry counter, which operates under a concession in a large department store exempt from posting requirements if the department has less than \$200,000 annual revenues even though the store itself has more than \$200,000 revenues annually?

A.—No. A concessionaire whose parent company has an annual sales volume of less than \$200,000 is subject to the posting requirements if the store in which it operates has an annual sales volume of more than \$200,000. A concessionaire whose parent company is less than \$200,000 is not subject to the posting requirements if the store in which it operates also has an annual sales volume of less than \$200,000. A concessionaire whose parent company has an annual sales volume of more than \$200,000 must post base price lists regardless of the annual sales volume of the retail establishment in which it operates.

Q.—Are the new Forms PC-1, PC-50 and PC-51 now available at Internal Revenue Service offices?

A.—Yes. These forms are now available at IRS offices in many cities throughout the country. A PC-50 is filed only once, to detail base period profit margin data, by any Tier I and Tier II firms which have raised prices or desire to raise them. A PC-1 must be filed by Tier I firms whenever a price increase is sought. Tier II firms must file a PC-1 for the quarter in which a price increase has occurred. A PC-51 is a report of price increases, sales, costs, and profits and must be filed quarterly by Tier I and II firms.

Q.—If a state law or state pharmaceutical board or other official agency prohibits the posting of legend drug prices, what should a pharmacist or pharmacy owner do?

A.—The pharmacist or pharmacy owner, like other retailers, must comply with Federal Price Commission regulations and post

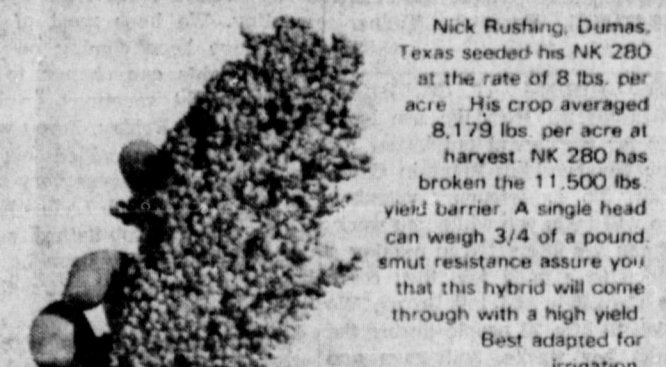

Muscle Development Of Children

Recently there has been an outcry against children watching too much television.

One reason for the protest is that children sit quietly by the TV hour after hour and don't run, jump, climb or throw enough. "In a sense, these children suffering from TV addiction simply don't get the proper exercise that helps large muscles develop," said Texas Agricultural Extension Service family life specialist Dorothy Taylor.

Miss Taylor said that muscle-developing activities are essential to a child's development. "Parents can do much to provide children with a variety of activities that will help a child grow and develop," she said. "It's been said that a child will naturally develop his muscles. This is true — up to a point.

"It's still true that every parent who cares for his child wants the youngster to develop in the best way possible. A parent can stimulate and encourage the child to try new and different activities to aid muscle development." The specialist told the story of a mother who visited a kindergarten and became very upset because four-year-old children were using real saws to saw soft wood.

"After the mother's initial flurry of words," Miss Taylor said, "the teacher explained why the children's use of the saw just might be a worthwhile activity. Children learn many things from using wood. They like to cut wood and are capable of learning how to use a saw carefully."

The specialist said that real tools are far better than some plastic tools that don't do anything except look like the real tool.

"But possibly the most important reason for the child's using the saw is that it helps him develop his large muscles and his large-muscle skills. He also learns how to control his muscles and use them in activities."

As a child develops his large muscles, he also gains confidence in his ability to deal with his environment. He gains confidence in himself as well.

Some activities that help a child develop his large muscles include: throwing balls through a hoop, throwing bean bags at a target, pounding nails, swinging in a swing, balancing by walking on low boards, climbing a rope ladder, climbing a tree or jungle gym and running — sometimes barefoot — and sand or grass.

"Each parent can praise his child as he acquires new skills and new coordination," Miss Taylor pointed out.

Social Security

Q—I recently had an operation and had 2 pints of whole blood in transfusions. I was told that I had to pay for the blood. I thought Medicare took care of everything over \$60 while I was in the hospital. Why do I have to pay for the blood?

A—The law provides that the cost of the first 3 pints of blood received in a hospital is not covered by Medicare. The reason this was done was because of the difficulty in obtaining blood donors. Most blood programs have provisions whereby they do not charge for blood if replaced by someone in the name of the recipient. It was felt that greater effort would be made to replace the blood if it were not received free.

Q—I have been treated by several different doctors during 1971. Some of the doctors told me they would take care of filing the Medicare claim. Others told me I would have to do it myself. How can I tell what has been paid and what has not?

A—When a claim, from either doctor or patient, is received Medicare sends a statement to the patient, showing how much is paid and to whom it is paid.

Q—My Medicare premiums recently went up. Do I get a new Medicare card?

A—No, your old card is still

good. Q—I understand that there is a six month waiting period for disability payments. What I do not understand is, will I eventually be paid for these six months?

A—You are correct about the six month waiting period. This means no payment is ever made for the first six full months of disability, not even retroactive payments.

Q—I receive monthly social security survivors benefits for my son who is 17. He is mentally retarded and will probably never be able to work. Will his benefits stop when he reaches 18?

A. Probably not. You should get in touch with your social security office at least three months before he reaches 18 to see about continuing the benefits past 18 on the basis of his disability.

Q. How can I get complete information on the protection which social security provides for children and young working people?

A. Telephone your social security office and ask a free copy of the booklet called "Social Security Information for Young Families." It contains some of the most vital information you will ever find concerning the financial security of you and your family. If you have specific questions, representatives at your social security office will be glad to answer them for you—by phone, or in person if you wish.

Q. The term "teleservice" is frequently used in radio and television announcements regarding social security. Would you please explain what is meant by "teleservice"?

A. Most any social security business can be taken care of by telephone including applications. Any necessary forms can be mailed by social security to an individual for signature and then returned by mail. The agency used the term "teleservice" to help the public know their social security business can be taken care of by telephone.

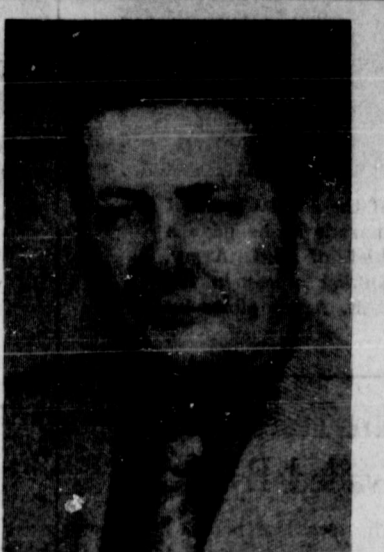

With one state representative indicted for allegedly using state postage stamps to buy a pickup truck and another known to have leased furniture for his state office from his own firm, the House administration committee also proposed new limitations on lawmakers' expense accounts.

Employers have been notified by mail and sent forms and instructions.

Reports must include wages paid and names of employees, along with taxes due. Employers brought under coverage of the Texas Unemployment Compensation Act are mainly those who have one to four employees.

COURTS SPEAK — The U. S. Supreme Court upheld a Massachusetts law requiring the state's public employees to take a "loyalty oath" that they oppose overthrow of the government by illegal force.

The State Supreme Court in a Tarrant County case upheld minimum filing fee and petition requirements for getting on the Texas primary election ballot as set by Secretary of State Bob Bullock.

The High Court also found the legislature can not exempt non-profit water supply corporations from property taxation. A corporation in Williamson County sought exemption from Leander school district taxes.

NO NEW TAXES: Smith—Gov. Preston Smith, in a statewide campaign speech via television, threatened to veto any tax bill passed by the legislature in special session this summer.

"I will present a budget that will require no new taxes, and I will use every available authority of the governor's office to insure that such a budget is enacted by the Legislature," said Smith.

Smith claimed he is the only candidate for governor who "can and will insure that taxes will not be higher in 1973."

Financial observers are waiting to see how the governor is going to shave the 1973 budget by an estimated \$150 million to avoid another tax bill. He may rely on increased federal revenue-sharing, or an increasingly-improved revenue picture.

REVENUE - SHARING AIDS CITIES, COUNTIES — A federal revenue-sharing bill approved by the U. S. House Ways and Means Committee last week would provide \$202 million a year to Texas cities and counties.

Allocation of the funds would be retroactive to Jan. 1, 1972, if the bill becomes law.

Enthusiasm of some city officials for the revenue-sharing plan was dampened by an apparent proviso that states participating would have to adopt state income taxes or receive a lesser amount than those which do levy taxes on income.

DROUGHT GETTING WORSE A Texas climatologist reported spring drought conditions are getting worse over most of Texas.

Agriculture Commissioner John White said the drought already has cost agricultural producers hundreds of thousands of dollars.

There was little rain anywhere except in North Central Texas. Climatologist Robert Orton said there is a moderate drought in the High Plains, North Central Texas, East Texas, Trans-Pecos and the Edwards Plateau. The Low Plains and the Upper Coast still are listed in a state of mild drought.

South Central Texas, Southern Texas and the Lower Rio Grande Valley have not entered the mild drought category.

ALLOWABLE STAYS UP — The Texas oil production allowable for May will stay at 100 per cent due to increasing demands.

A Railroad Commission order last week retained the April maximum after major buyers of crude asked for an increase in output of 83,312 barrels a day or a total for next month of more than 3.6 million barrels.

Ten of the 16 big buyers requested the same amount as April. Five asked an increase, and only one said less oil is needed. The April 100 per cent figure was the first wide-open allowable since 1948.

Careful study will be continued to prevent waste, Commission Chairman Byron Tunnell said. NEW DEADLINE FIXED — April 30 is a new tax deadline for about 72,000 Texas employers. Wage reports must be filed by then with Texas Employment Commission for purposes of unemployment taxes during the first quarter of 1972.

The center, located in the hill country northwest of Austin, is operated by the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation. In an outdoor recreational setting, the mentally ill and mentally retarded learn to relate to each other and the environment.

er include sheltered and rough camping, hiking, picnicing, swimming, fishing, bicycling, boating and horseback rides. Additional water recreation facilities are being developed.

"The center's four-man staff has been expanding an existing lake, building an additional lake and cleaning and beautifying the 755-acre site.

"We have received good cooperation and guidance from the Texas Water Development Board in building the new lake," said Robert Vassallo, TDMHMR rehabilitation services chief and center director. "Their top-notch staff has provided much support including engineering, design, planning and site study."

Vassallo said there were 8,000 camper/days at the center last

outdoor season, primarily during the summer months. He emphasized the year-round availability of the center to all TDMHMR facilities, community MHMR centers and allied groups.

"We invite and encourage community groups who do not have suitable nearby facilities for outdoor recreation and education to investigate Leander Center for their activities," he said.

Several groups from non-TDMHMR facilities are starting to use the center. For example, a group of 40 retardates sponsored by the Snyder Association for Retarded Children will visit Leander later this year. Their visit was arranged through a TDMHMR representative.

Elm Trees Here Invaded By Beetle

The elm leaf beetle has begun its annual invasion of the elm trees in Donley County. The first generation of the beetle has hatched and is feeding on the leaves of the elm trees. The yellowish-green, ¼ inch long beetle or the small yellow to black larvae can be found feeding on the under side of the leaf or crawling on the trunk of infested trees, according to County Agent Ronald Gooch.

This beetle can be controlled by thoroughly spraying the trees with one of the following insecticides: sevin, malathion, dieldrin, lead arsenate or toxaphene. Several spray applications may be necessary to control later generations of the beetle.

Be sure to follow the label directions of the insecticide used, as insecticides by design are toxic; thus, care must be exercised in their use, Gooch said.
