Press Freedom, A Public Freedom

THE week of October 8 to 14 is being observed as ▲ Newspaper Week in communities throughout the nation. Anyone who reflects on the role of modern newspapers in today's society is reminded anew how wise were those men who wrote into the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution the guarantee

Thomas Jefferson once said he would prefer to live in a country with newspapers but without a government rather than a country with a government but no newspapers.

'No experiment can be more interesting than what we are now trying," he wrote on another occasion, "and which we trust will end in establishing the fact that man may be governed by reason and truth. Our first object, therefore, should be to leave open to him all the avenues of truth.

'How do you go about giving the citizen a clear shot down the avenue of truth?

'The most effectual (method) hitherto found," said Jefferson, "is freedom of the press." It still is. Newspapermen throughout the English-speaking

world are well aware of Edmund Burke, who first referred to them as the Fourth Estate, 200 years ago in the British House of Commons. "In this Parliament," said Edmund Burke, "are

three estates: The Lords Spiritual, the Lords Temporal and the Commons. But, in the Reporter's Gallery, yonder sits a Fourth Estate, more important by far than all.

'What then remains?," he asked Parliament. "Only the liberty of the Press, which no influence, no power, no minister, no government, which nothing

but the depravity or corruption of a jury can ever destroy. It will be the nation's most awful moment, it will be the first grasp of tyranny, and how pregnant is the example. What remains if the public press is extinguished, the people enslaved, and the prince undone?

"As an advocate of society, of peace and of liberty, I conjure you to guard the liberty of the press, the great sentinel of the state, the grand detector of public imposture. Guard it and cherish it, because whenever it ceases to flourish, there will die with it the liberty of the people and the security of the

To benefit from a good press, the public should zealously defend press freedom even when it hurts. Freedom of the press is not a press freedom but a public freedom, a public possession and right, and in many ways the public's stoutest weapon.

To deserve its freedom, the press should strive to be full, fair and factual. But a free people does not leave it to the government to decide what is full, fair and factual.

The greatest strength of a free press is not points of similarity, but in the points of difference. In the production of news every step involves the conscious intervention of some news-gatherer, and two accounts of the same event will never be the same.

The threat to the liberties of the individual is always possible. External vigilance on the part of the public is essential, and that is why once a year Newspaper Week seeks to focus attention on Freedom of Expression — a priceless heritage bought with blood and tears over many years.

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





> Before moving into an apart ment, you, your landlord, and a third party should check it out. Make a list of all damages and needed repairs. Keep this list so you won't be charged for damages you didn't make when

> it's time to move. Moving out? A basic question is in what condition are you expected to leave the apartment? Generally, in the condition it was when you moved in, unless specifically stated in the lease that you must have the rugs shampooed, the draperies profession-

ally cleaned, etc.

Allowances are usually made for normal wear-and-tear. You are expected to make "tenantable" repairs and maintenance, such as filling holes left when pictures are removed or cleaning the oven. Major repairs are made by the landlord, but you must call them to his attention. Security deposits can cause difficulties and misunderstandings. Social Security

by Travis C. Briggs Don't try to memorize your social security number. Don'tespecially - try to repeat your social security number from memory when an employer asks you for the number for his records when you start a new job. That advice comes from the Amarillo social security dis-

rict manager. "Your social security number has nine digits," noted Travis C. Briggs. "If you try to memorize it, you can easily give a wrong number when you try to repeat it. If you furnish a wrong social security number to ar employer, it may cause difficulty in crediting your earnings to your social security record. This may eventually affect your social

security benefits." An employee's earnings are credited to his social security number when they are reported by his employer. The employee's earnings determine the amount of monthly social security benefits he may collect when he retires or becomes severely disabled; also the amount of benefits his family may get if he dies prematurely.

"If all of your earnings are not credited to your social security number, your benefits may amount to less than they should," Briggs said.

Briggs' advice: Always carry your social security card in your purse or wallet. When starting a new job, always show your social security card to your employer and make sure he copies the number and the name from your card.

"Remember, don't try to memorize your social security number. It could cost you money." Q-Suppose I am hospitalized for more than 90 days, does Medicare pay anything at all

after the 90th day? A-There is a life-time reserve of 60 days during which you pay \$34 a day and Medicare pays all other covered charges. As the name implies, this can be used only once during your life time.







Precautions Can Avoid Farm Fires

Farm fires are potentially the most dangerous, because the farmer, his fam'ly and his property are usually miles away from the nearest fire department or from neighbors who could lend assistance. Never is a farm so isolated than when a fire

Farm families should take all precautions to prevent accidental fires and they should use all methods of fighting fires if they do start, says Robert A. Keown, Farmers Home Administration county supervisor in

The Farmers Home Administration, in observance of National Fire Prevention Week, offers this list of fire prevention and protection ideas:

1. Make sure every member of your family knows how to call the fire department. Post the fire department number at the telephone. Also make sure your fire department knows the layout of your farm, house and barn, and the location of water

2 Check condition of heating equipment, including chimneys and flues. Make all repairs necessary for safe operation.


3. Check electric wiring for wear and loads - replace worn and inadequate wiring. Use only 15-ampere fuses unless a circuit has been especially designed for larger loads.

4. Keep fire fighting tools accessible in an emergency. 5. Have ladders ready for escape and for fighting roof fires. 6. Keep fire extinguishers on hand, Check them frequently and recharge them when necessary. Also, protect them from freezing during winter months.

7. Maintain a water supply in cisterns and stock ponds. They may be the only source of water for fighting fires.

in Amarillo "No application is needed for the 20 percent increase," Briggs said. "The Social Security Administration will refigure payments for everyone netting social security benefits and pay the increased benefits in the October checks."

Social Security pays monthly cash benefits to 28 million people - retirement and disability benefits to eligible workers and their families; survivors benefits to the families of decreased workers who were insured under social security.

Under the new law, the average social security payment to to \$12,000. retired workers will increase from \$134 to \$162 a month. Q-I am a 70-year-old veteran drawing pension for a non-service connected disability. Am I entitled to outpatient treatment at a VA hospital?

A-No, unless you have been found in need of aid and attendance, or you are permanently

Q-I'm going to graduate school under the GI Bill. How many hours must I carry for VA to pay me the full educational allowance?

A-Since this is not prescribed by law, VA will pay the full educational allowance based on the school's certification that the student is attending school full time. Half time or quarter time rates are paid on the basis of the schools certification also.

Q-As a veteran's widow eligible for VA educational assistance, may I receive this benefit if I attend school in Ger-

A-No. Courses may be in a foreign school only when they are part of an approved enrollment in an institution of higher learning in the United States
