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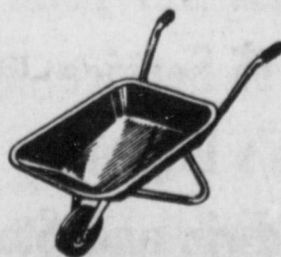


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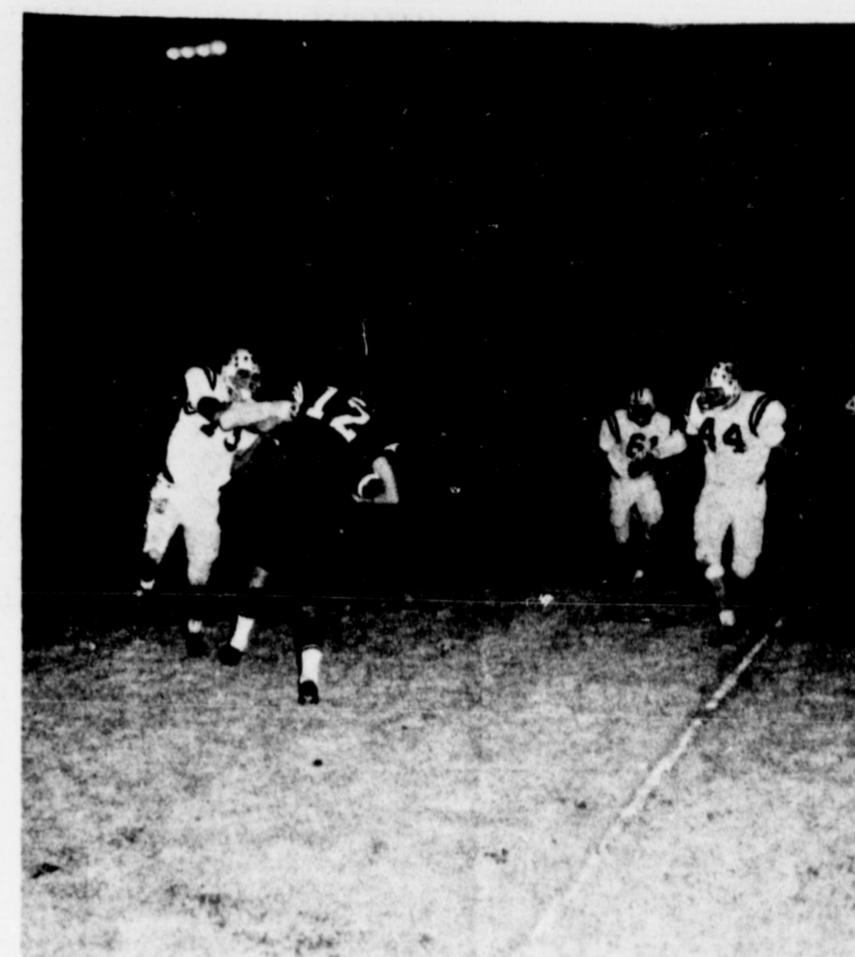

Bulldogs Edged Out By South Plains Mon.

In double overtime South Plains edged out the Clarendon College Bulldogs 80-79 here Monday night. The game ended regulation play at 66-66 and 72-72 after the first overtime period.

Brown led the scoring for Clarendon with 22 points followed by Pride with 20 in the two digit bracket.

This places the Bulldogs with a 3-6 record for the season. Pride is leading the Conference in rebounds. Listed with top scorers in the conference are Pride and Brown. Saturday night, Clarendon lost out to Western Texas 79-80 according to Conference reports.

The Bulldogs have two road games. December 7 their opponent will be New Mexico Institute and on December 11, and on December 9 they will play the West Texas State University Freshmen. The next home game will be December 11, Monday night, when they will host Howard County, game 7:30 p.m.

Dr. Thomas Marshall To Arrive Here This Week End To Stay

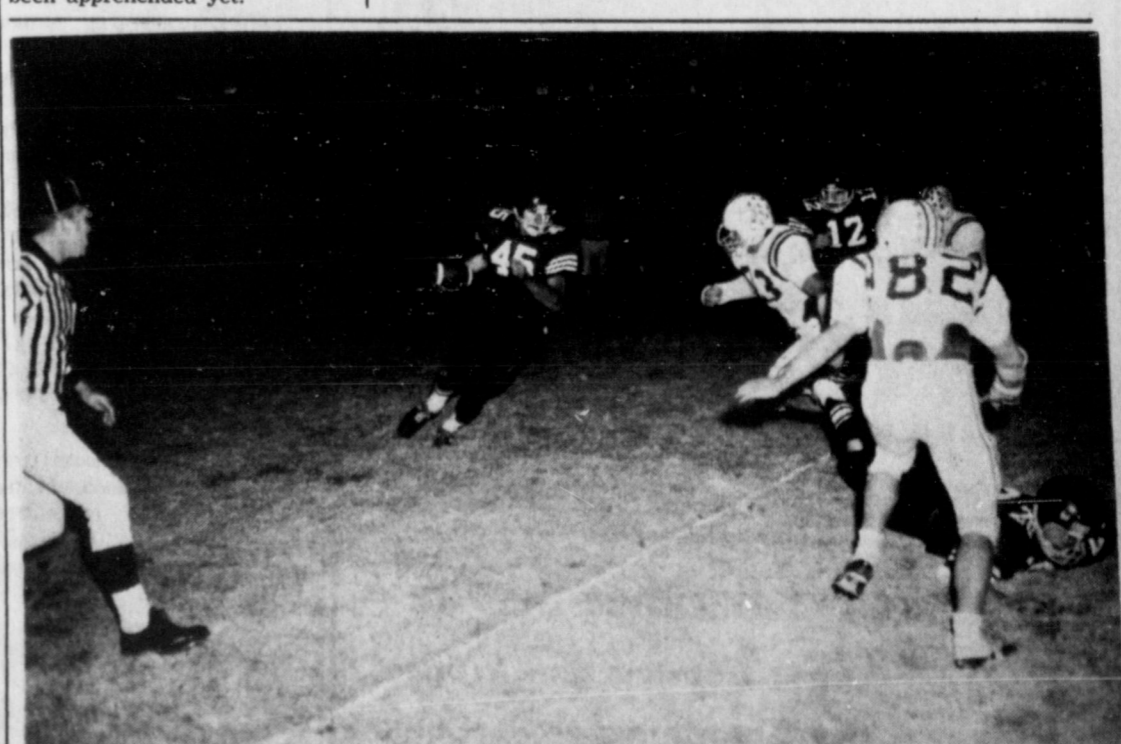

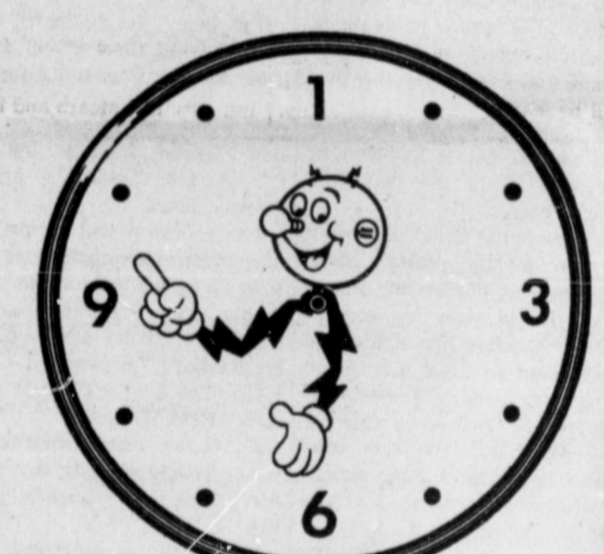

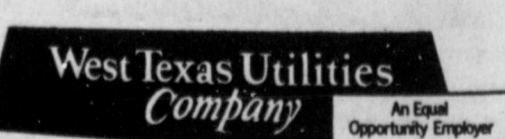

Schools represented will be Valley High, Motley County, Estelline, Clarendon, Silverton, Lefors, Paducah, and Lockney.

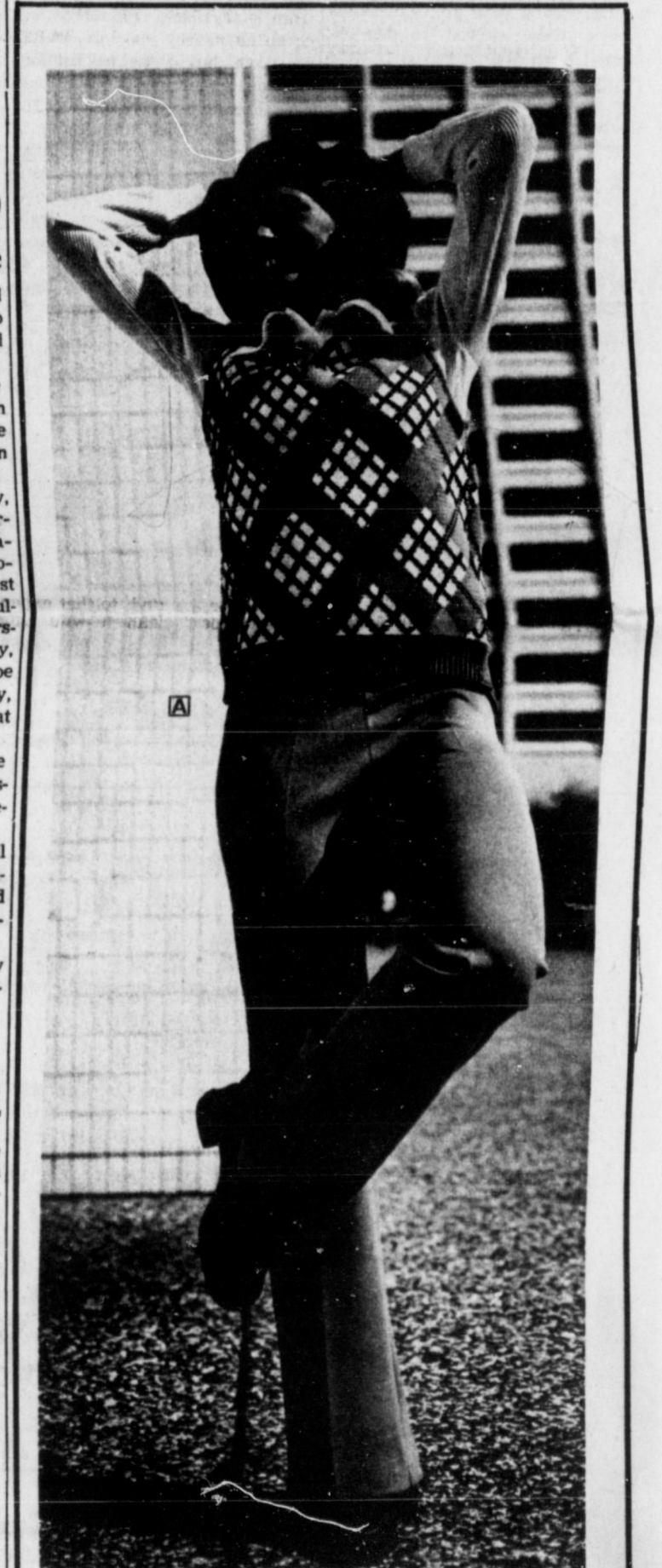

New Highway Sign Controls Effective As Of December 31

Owners of advertising signs along Interstate, US and major State-numbered highways have until December 31 to apply for permits under the Texas Highway Beautification Act.

The act controls all outdoor advertising signs from the largest signboard to the smallest sign hanging from a fence along the right of way line.

The Texas Highway Commission established the deadline under the legislation which became effective on June 29. The act requires that no person may erect or maintain a sign within 660 feet of an Interstate or federal-aid primary highway in Texas without a license to engage in outdoor advertising.

In addition to the license, the sign owner must have a permit for each sign he has now or which he plans to erect.

On-premise signs — those advertising activities conducted on the premises and those offering the property for sale — are exempt.

The act will be implemented in stages. The first stage requires the owner of the sign to obtain a State license and post a bond. The license fee is \$25 and the license is valid for an indefinite period.

The license application must be accompanied by a bond in the amount of \$2,500 for each county in which signs are located, or a maximum bond of \$10,000 for owners with signs in more than three counties.

Both license and bond form applications may be obtained by writing the Right of Way Division, Texas Highway Department P. O. Box 5075, Austin, Texas 78763, or contracting E. H. Monroe, Texas Highway Dept., Box 216, Clarendon, Texas.

After obtaining a license, the owner is required to obtain a separate permit for each existing and new off-premise sign on the affected highways. Sign permit application forms can be obtained from the Right of Way Sections of the Highway Department district offices.

For each sign permit required, the owner should submit an application accompanied by a check or money order for \$5 to the Highway Department district office for the county in which the sign is located. If the permit application is for an existing sign, the Highway Department will check to see if the sign conforms with the Beautification Act.

Permits now will be issued for signs in place prior to June 29 even if they do not conform to

the law. They will be permitted to stay in place until programmed for acquisition or removal.

Permits for new signs will not be issued unless they conform in the law.

Anyone planning to put up a new sign on the controlled highways should check with the Highway Department district office in his area before doing anything to determine if the proposed sign location conforms to the law.

The Highway Department also has begun removal of abandoned and illegal signs on controlled highways. An abandoned sign is one in which the owner no longer claims any interest. An illegal sign is one which is located on a private property without out permission of the property owner. Property owners on the affected highways with such illegal signs should contact the Highway Department district office.

NEWS FROM Congressman Bob Price 18th District, Texas

Congressman Bob Price has called on Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz to consider every possible alternative in the attempt to stabilize acreage allotments and price support payments. Price said he has visited with numerous cotton producers and bankers in cotton producing counties in an effort to establish the impact of any reduction of allotments and the elimination of set-aside acreage.

In a letter to Sec. Butz, Price said, "In view of the fact that farmers in my district are suffering from adverse weather con-

ditions which have continually hampered harvest efforts and lowered the grades of cotton resulting in low prices on the current market, I strongly recommend that you reconsider those adjustments in the cotton program which you announced November 15.

"I feel such a drastic change at this particular point of time would create an undue hardship on our cotton producers and result in financial ruin for a number of smaller cotton producers.

"The elimination of the set-aside requirement will free about 2 million acres of cropland on cotton farms for any crops that producers choose. This step will aid some cotton producers in irrigated areas but at the same time could create new problems for those farmers engaged in

the production of feed grains. Over production in feed grain could very well cause a price situation similar to that facing the cotton producer today. There must be some other method of achieving the same desired result other than such a drastic cut in the program during a period of depressed prices.

Price said, "I agree with your concept of allowing this nation's farmers the flexibility necessary for a stable supply and demand market. However, I do not feel this should be done at the expense of our nation's farmers."

Most homemakers are expected to get a big break on insurance rates next year.

Exceptions will be those who live in the 27-county Gulf Coast area.

The industry - ordered Texas Insurance Advisory Association to reduce fire insurance rates statewide by 7.7 per cent.

An Association spokesman estimated total savings of \$6 million for extended coverage and \$9.8 million for homeowners' insurance in the Central Inland territory. He calculated increases of \$8 million for extended coverage and \$5.9 million for homeowners' rates in the Seacoast territory.

About 500 million insurance agents who attended the Board hearing on the proposals expressed approval but loudly protested another recommendation by the Association to standardize their commissions.

The Board staff is awaiting directions as to whether to calculate new rates on its own formula or the new recommendations.

COURTS SPEAK - Texas Supreme Court agreed a re-trial is in order for a lawsuit against Union Carbide Company as a result of an explosion which killed two and injured two.

The Court of Criminal Appeals held a San Antonio man cannot complain about exclusion of blacks from his murder trial jury since he agreed to the exclusion himself.

The Third Court of Civil Appeals held property owners in Wylie County School District

coverage premiums and an 8.3 per cent increase in homeowners' policy rates.

All territories would benefit from an Association proposal to reduce fire insurance rates statewide by 7.7 per cent.

A Houston Court of Civil Appeals decision that heirs of a man who died in a Waller County Hospital after an auto accident should get a full trial of a malpractice suit against a doctor who treated the wreck victim was upheld by the State Supreme Court.

AG OPINIONS - Deputy constables are authorized to carry guns only after they have completed a minimum amount of training, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin held.

Martin's opinion, requested by Brazos County Attorney W. T. McDonald Jr., also stated that reserve deputy constables serve without pay at pleasure of the constable within the period of time authorized by the county commissioner's court.

Martin reached these conclusions in other new opinions:

Harris County can operate a mental health center for the state but cannot change it into a county department by commissioners court resolution.

Parks and Wildlife Department can spend other money for park expansion than that set out in Item 10B of the appropriations bill.

A Beauty operator may offer cosmetology services in a barber shop and may operate a barber shop under general supervision of a Class A barber, but a barber may not operate a beauty shop without a cosmetology license.

A district attorney who applies for retirement on a certain date fixes the date his office is vacated.

GAS PROBLEMS TOLD - Natural gas supplies are dwindling and producers are not meeting agreements, the Railroad Commission was told in a hearing last week.

The Commission is studying the possibility of setting priorities for gas distribution when there is short supply.

One pipeline company claimed a chief supplier delivered little more than half of the gas it agreed to provide. A company spokesman suggested homes and schools get first priority on the gas supply available, with second priority allocated to generation of electricity for domestic consumers.

HORSE RACING REVIVAL? - A Senate committee is conducting a survey, results of which admittedly may be used to bolster a new drive for pari-mutuel horse race betting.

The Senate Horse Racing Study Committee sent out 5,000 questionnaires assess the horse industry and its economic impact on Texas.

Among questions asked of the horse owners and riding equipment suppliers is whether pari-mutuel wagering would expand their operations and how local lawmakers would vote on the issue.

The Committee vice-chairman said results of the survey "could be used to build an economic case" for wagering on horse races. A meeting of the panel is slated here December 14 to hear opponents of racing and pari-mutuel gambling and to receive a report on potential state revenue from legalized wagering.

Committee heads said a constitutional amendment would be necessary to revive pari-mutuel betting on the races.

HOW TO PICK UP \$5 MILLION - Texas could gain \$5 million a year in delinquent sales taxes by changing collection procedures in the comptroller's office, a Senate interim study committee has been told.

Actually, an Illinois tax expert estimated, the state could collect \$8 million more each year, but hiring of an additional 200 state sales tax auditors would take about \$3 million of the gain.

An attorney general's representative said Attorney General Martin wants to require Texas businesses to post bond to insure payment of the sales taxes they collect.

POLLUTION MONEY MAY BE LOST - Texas may get only half the federal funds it counted on to help build new sewage treatment plants, State Water Quality Board Chairman Gordon Fulcher stated.

A new federal act, said Fulcher, would cut Texas' allocation to \$5.4 million for fiscal 1973 for treatment plant aid, as compared with \$106.3 million for fiscal 1972.

Fulcher said the loss would "hurt a whole lot of cities and towns in the state," particularly smaller communities which depended on federal help (up to 75 per cent) to finance the plants.

IRS Answers To Taxpayers Questions

Q-Is it true that small businesses are exempt from wage-price controls?

A-Yes. Companies with 60 or less employees are exempt from wage and price controls, except for firms in the health and construction industries. Small local governments with 60 employees or fewer have also been exempted from wage controls and most price controls.

Q-Will the Internal Revenue Service process an exception request form a landlord who is charging rent in violation of stabilization regulations?

A-No. The IRS will not process exception requests from landlords charging rent in excess of that allowed by stabilization regulations. However, if a landlord rolls back an illegal increase and refunds rents collected under that increase, the IRS will process his exception request.

Q-Does a landlord have to notify his tenants when he seeks an exception from the rent regulations?

A-Yes. A landlord must notify his tenants of the exception request at the time it is sought. If the exception is granted, he must also notify them of the proposed increase at least 30 days before its effective date.

Q-I am legally able to raise my tenants' rent 15 percent because I installed central air conditioning units in every apartment. Can I increase monthly rent 10 percent before obtaining approval for the remaining 5 percent increase from the IRS?

A-No. A landlord must obtain prior approval from his IRS District Director for any part of an increase based on a capital improvement that will raise rent in excess of 10 percent. This is the case even though he increases rent only 10 percent and seeks approval for the remaining percentage increase.

Q-How will using industry-wide average productivity figures reduce prices and increase productivity?

A-Firms with productivity gains above the Price Commission's industry-wide average are required to deduct only the industry average as an offset to their costs increases, thus encouraging above-average productivity gains. On the other hand, firms with productivity gains below the new industry-wide averages must now use the industry average figure instead of their own lower productivity figure. Therefore, their allowable cost increases will be proportionately smaller. The industry wide productivity figures may be found in the May 3, 1972 Federal Register, which can be obtained from the Superintendent of Documents in Washington, D.C. In addition, new PC-1 instructions contain a detailed example describing the method by which companies may compute the extent to which productivity should offset allowable costs. For further information on productivity computation, persons should contact their Internal Revenue office.

Q-If an employer and union execute an agreement after Nov. 14, 1971, which provides that any portion of an increase denied by the Pay Board will be paid when controls are lifted or relaxed, does that provision constitute an increase in wages and salaries chargeable against the Pay Board's 5.5 percent standard?

A-Yes. This provision for payment of disallowed wage and salary increases is consideration for work currently performed. It is, therefore a form of deferred compensation which, under Economic Stabilization Regulations, does constitute a wage and salary amount reasonably subject to valuation.

Use The Winter Pastures Wisely

Winter annual pastures can boost livestock profits if they're used wisely.

"To get the most use from such pastures consider both the animal's standpoint and the pasture's standpoint," suggests Dr. Neal Pratt, agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"From the livestock viewpoint, graze winter pastures with animals with high market values—stocker calves producing dairy cows and beef cows with young calves. Grazing pastures with dry cows usually means less returns than grazing with animals which can market the pasture sooner."

Stretching high-quality winter pastures and minimizing wastage is important, regardless of the kind of grazing animals, contends the Texas A&M University specialist.

"Limit grazing to the time the animals are actually feeding. Winter pastures are usually high in moisture, and livestock generally prefer to lie down and rest on dry areas. Make shade, dry ground and hay available in an area adjoining the winter pasture. Don't lock livestock into the winter pasture area."

It's also wise to allow animals to graze only a small portion of the pasture at one time, points out Pratt. Electric fences work well to manage grazing.

The specialist advises that dry cows should graze winter pastures only one day out of every four or five. By doing this,

the pasture serves to supplement the protein, vitamin, mineral and other nutrient requirements while these cows are grazing lower quality permanent pastures.

"County Extension agents in each county can cite results of winter pasture demonstrations and can recommend additional ways to improve profits from winter pastures," adds Pratt.

Social Security

Q-Do I need a work permit or anything else to get a social security number before I am age 16?

A-No. You don't need any work authorization and you don't have to be any certain age. In fact, people are encouraged to obtain a social security card well in advance of the time it is needed.

Q-I thought I would have my daughter get a social security number now even though she is only 12. Is this a good idea?

A-It probably is. Then she would have a number ready for any work, any trust or bank account or for any other reason. However, be sure she understands the importance of the number. She will be using it for the rest of her life.

Q-I need a social security number for a college entrance examination. How do I go about getting one?

A-If possible, you should go to a social security office and fill out a social security account number application. You may also request an application by telephone. But don't delay because it will take a few weeks to issue you a number.

Cotton Classing News For Past Week

Cotton harvest in the Memphis, Texas area got underway Thursday as skies cleared and fields dried out, according to W. E. Cain, in charge of the USDA, Agriculture Marketing Service, Cotton Classing Office.

The Memphis office classed 4350 samples this week to bring the season total to 18,300. This compares to 8,560 on the same date a year ago.

The predominant grade classed this week was Strict Low Middling (41) with 38 percent followed by Strict Light Spotted (42) with 30 percent.

The predominant staple classed was 32 with 58 percent followed by staple 31 with 30 percent and staple 33 with 9 percent.

Micronaire readings showed 91 percent milled in the desirable range of 3.5 to 4.9.

Pressley, strength, tests showed 95 percent of the samples tested 75,000 psi or higher.

The cotton market was active and steady early in the week but prices dropped about 100 points, or one cent per pound, on all qualities Thursday.

Some average prices on cotton sold earlier were: Strict Low Middling (41), staple 31, 24, 25 to 24.50 cents per pound, and Strict Low Middling Light Spotted (42) staple 32, 24.00 cents per pound. This was for cotton milled 3.5 to 4.9.

The average price paid farmers for cottonseed at the gin was \$50.00 per ton.

Veteran News

Q—Does VA's loan guaranty of \$12,500 or 60 percent of the loan limit the price a veteran or serviceman may pay for a home?

A—No. Only the amount the lender agrees to lend determines that. No matter what the amount of the loan, however, VA will guarantee only 60 percent, not to exceed \$12,500.

Q—Option one of a government life insurance policy, I understand, provides for a lump sum payment of benefits. Does this mean the beneficiary must take the proceeds in a lump sum?

A—No. Even though lump sum payment is available, if desired,

the beneficiary may take part the proceeds in cash, and the balance in monthly installments. All payments may be taken on a monthly basis.

Q—Are people who participate in six month active duty training programs offered by some branches of service eligible for GI Bill educational benefits?

A—No. Active duty for training purposes only does not entitle participant to GI Bill benefits.

Antelope Hunters Top Last Year's Tally

Panhandle antelope hunter brought home 242 pronghorn this year, 22 more than 1971.

Dick DeAmrent, Parks and Wildlife Department biologist in the Panhandle, said that hunters took 270 of the 385 antelope permits the department issues to area landowners and 90 percent of the nimrods were successful.

Statewide, this year's antelope harvest was one of the best in recent years.

In the Trans-Pecos, 742 were killed, 90 in the Permian Basin and the 242 in the Panhandle total 1,074 pronghorns for the year.
