Controls Effective Chamberlain News

The act controls all outdoor est signboard to the smallest sign hanging from a fence along the right of way line.

The Texas Highway Commission established the deadline under the legislation which be came effective on June 29. The act requires that no person may erect or maintain a sign within 660 feet of an Interstate or federal-aid primary highway in Texas without a license to en gage in outdoor advertising.

On-premise signs - those ad

vertising activities conducted on the premises and those offering tne property for sale - are ex-

stages. The first stage requires the owner of the sign to obtain a State license and post a bond. The license fee is \$25 and the license is valid for an indefinite period. The license application must

county in which signs are locatfor owners with signs in more than three counties.

Both license and bond form applications may be obtained by writing the Right of Way Division, Texas Highway Department P. O. Box 5075, Austin, Texas 78763, or contracting E. H. Monroe, Texas Highway Dept., Box 216, Clarendon, Texas.

After obtaining a license, the owner is required to obtain a separate permit for each existing and new off-premise sign on the affected highways. Sign permit application forms can be obtained from the Right of Way Sections of the Highway Depart-

ment district offices. For each sign permit required, the owner should submit an application accompanied by a check or money order for \$5 to the Highway Department district office for the county in which the sign is located. If the permit application is for an existing sign, the Highway Department will check
