Defense Against Injury" is the theme of National Farm Safety Week, July 25-31.

"Agriculture is the nation's third most dangerous occupation," points out Wayne Keese, agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "In 1971 there were an estimated 2,300 work-connected accidenal deaths and 190,000 disabling injuries."





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

Students Extra Help

A study was made in the summer of 1971 to determine if American College Testing scores could be used to designate those students who will have trouble with General Chemistry. In the fall of 1972, the department of chemistry plans to give diagnostic tests to chemistry students. This test will help to determine the chemistry and mathematical background of the student.
