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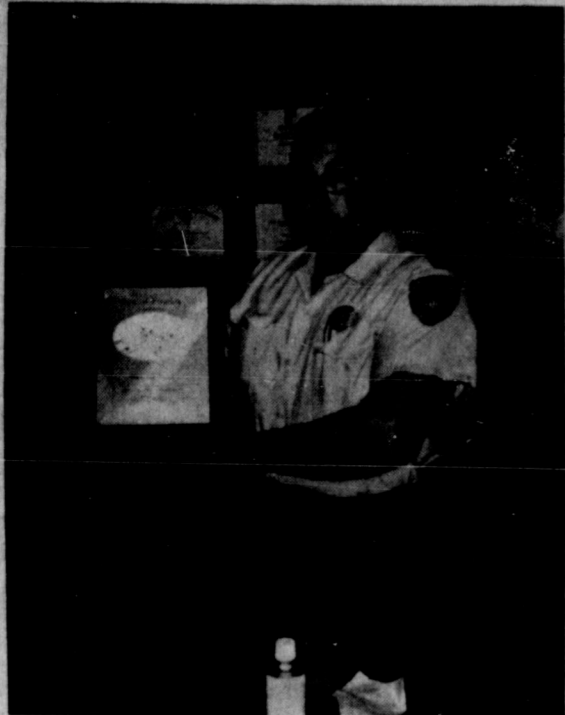

City Recognized For Pedestrian Safety

The City of Clarendon has won a Special Citation for Casualty Record for Pedestrian Safety in the 33rd annual American Auto-Safety Inventory.

The Special Citation, according to Sam Bell, General Manager of the Panhandle Plains Auto Club, was one of 239 awards and citations presented to winners among the 2,146 U. S. cities participating in the AAA safety judging for the year 1971.

All awards and citations were made on a basis of actual pedestrian casualty records and current accident prevention programs. Evaluation was made in each of the prevention areas of: safety legislation, enforcement, traffic engineering, community coordination, school traffic, public education, and records.

The program recognizes cities and states with outstanding pedestrian safety records in order

to improve public awareness of the need for strong safety programs.

Nationally, the pedestrian death rate increased 5% from 4.4 to 4.6 per 100,000 population in 1971 compared to 1970, while the injury rate declined 8% from 83 to 77 per 100,000 during the same period.

The American Automobile Association is the only non-governmental organization operating nationally to improve pedestrian safety. It has been heavily involved since 1937.

School Transfers Disapproved By TEA

Transfers for seventeen white and four negro children from Lakeview to Clarendon schools were disapproved recently by the Texas Education Agency due to a decision by the Federal Court in Tyler, Texas, concerning integration.

A letter signed by all the parents of these children was sent to the Agency, asking for relief from the Federal Court order.

A letter was received from the Agency last week saying that the Federal Court was holding hearings to determine if the transfers should be granted. An early decision by the court is hoped for in order for these parents to be enabled to send their children to the school of their choice.

In case the transfers are finally disapproved, the only recourse for the parents would be for them to move into the Clarendon School District and thus become local residents.

P & W Commission Completes Agenda

Land acquisition, game and fish proclamations and a long list of routine matters occupied the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission at their latest meeting in Austin.

The commission adopted without change proclamations proposed by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department staff con-

cerning seasons and bag limits on migratory birds other than waterfowl.

Bag and possession limits for the birds are the same as they were last year, but seasons are different from last year's for mourning doves, white-winged doves, teal, woodcocks and Wilson's snipe.

The mourning dove season was split into two parts. In the North Zone the season will be Sept. 1 through Oct. 14, 1972, and Jan. 6 through Jan. 21, 1973 from 12 p.m. until sunset.

In the South Zone the season will be Sept. 23 through Nov. 5, 1972, and Jan. 6 through Jan. 21, 1973 except that in counties having an open season for white-winged doves, the open season for mourning doves ends Nov. 2 during the fall segment of the season. In counties with a white-winged dove open season mourning doves may also be taken from 12 p.m. until sunset.

The white-winged dove season will be Sept. 2, 3, and 4 from 12 p.m. until sunset.

The commission established a sanctuary for white-winged and mourning doves south of a line extending along U. S. Highway 281 between the city limits of Hidalgo and Brownsville during the whitewing season.

The woodcock season will be Nov. 18 through Jan. 21 from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

Hunters may shoot Wilson's snipe or jacksnipe Nov. 18 through Jan. 21, from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

All species of teal may be hunted Sept. 9 through Sept. 17 from sunrise to sunset.

The season on rails and gallinules remains the same as it was last year.

The use or possession of firearms and crossbows while hunting deer or turkey during the special archery season is prohibited.

Archery season for deer is amended to include a provision for either-sex deer hunting during the special archery season in most counties where antlerless deer tags are required.

The statewide quail season is Dec. 1, 1972 through Feb. 15, 1973; the bag limit is 12 per day, 36 in possession.

Largemouth, smallmouth and spotted black bass — daily bag limit is 10 in the aggregate, possession limit shall not include fish processed and stored at the fisherman's permanent residence.

Delete the 11-inch minimum length on catfish.

All trotlines that remain in public waters shall be redated at the expiration of each 90-day period. Parks and Wildlife enforcement personnel shall be authorized to remove expired or undated trotlines.

Delete "spear" and substitute "Spear gun and Spear, bow and arrow" as a legal method for taking fish.

Floating buoys for marking crab traps will be 10 inches in height above the waterline for visibility.

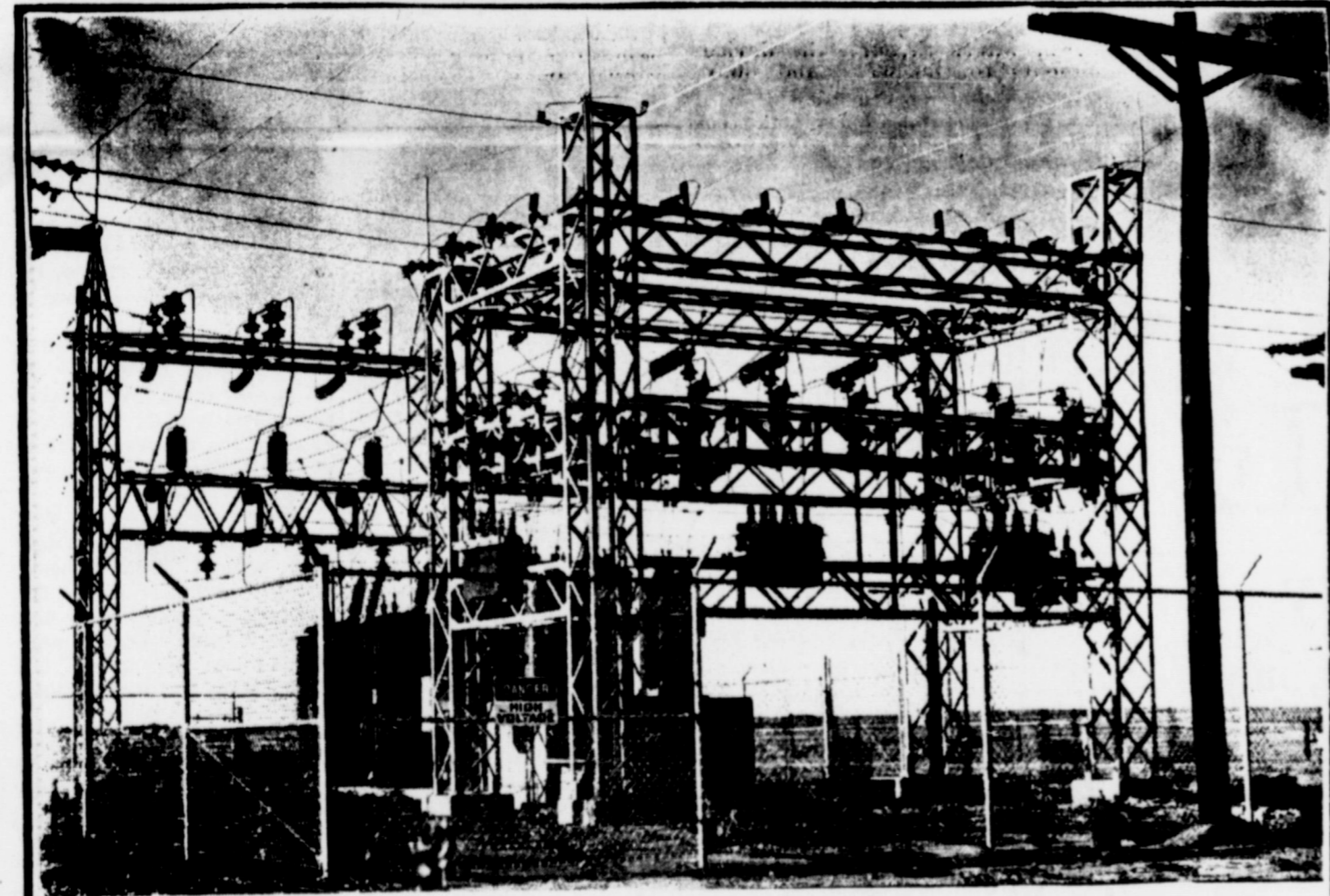

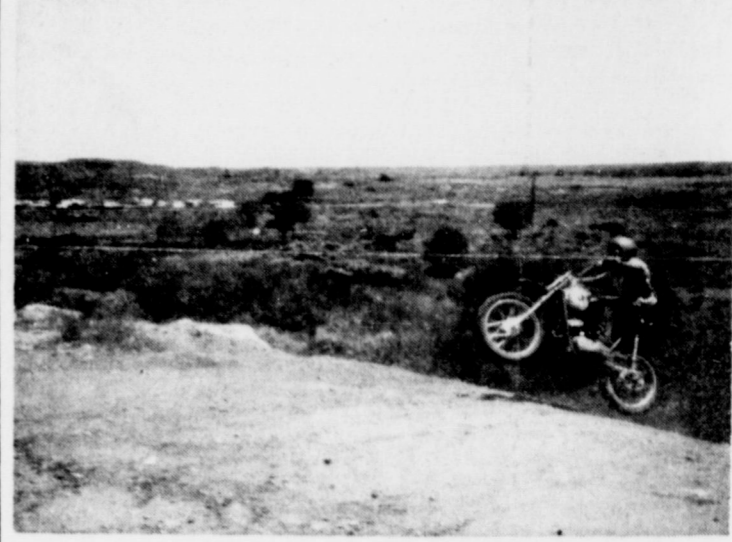

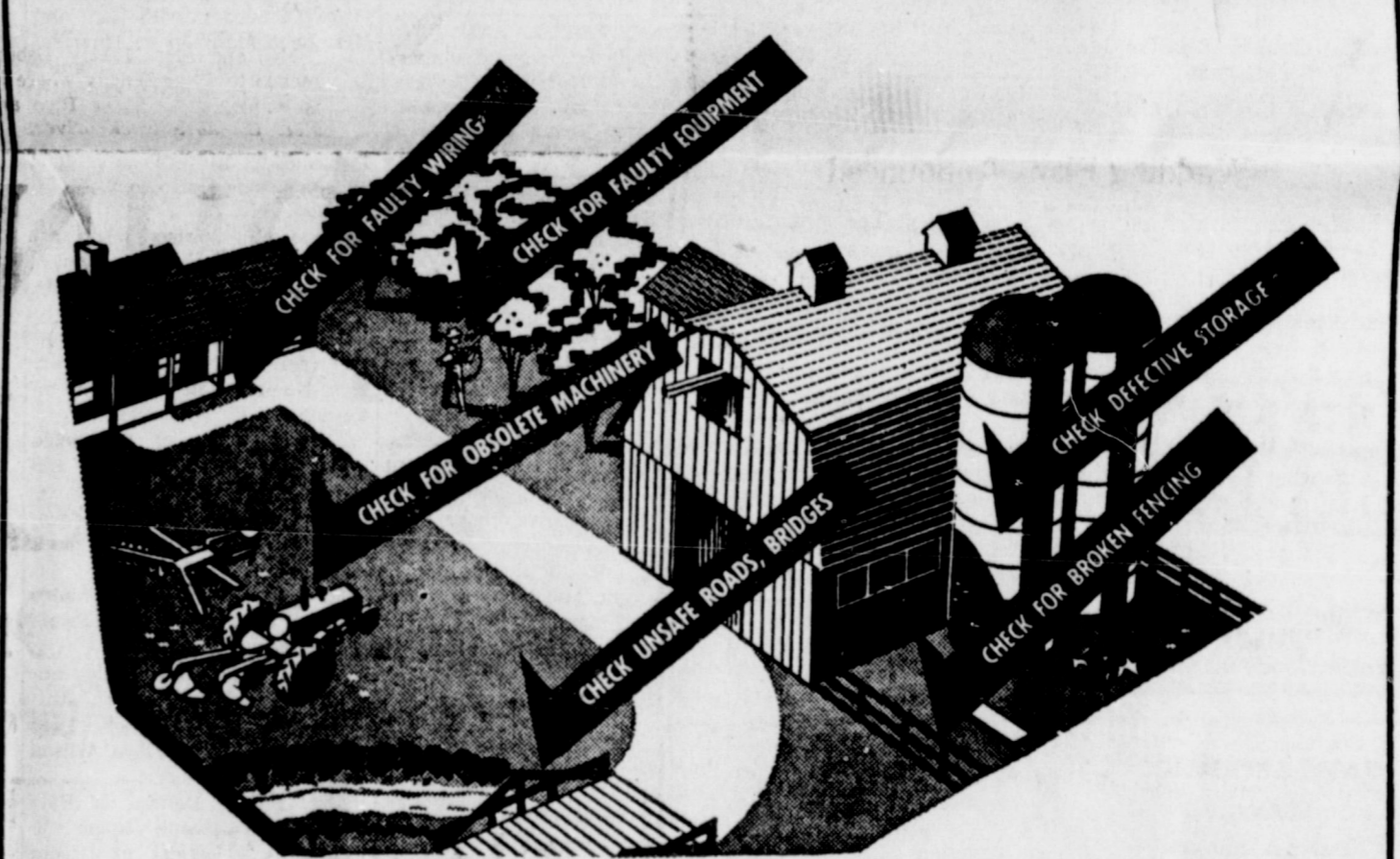

CC Instructors Give Students Extra Help

A study was made in the summer of 1971 to determine if American College Testing scores could be used to designate those students who will have trouble with General Chemistry. The mathematical test will help to determine the mathematical discrepancy of the students. The test is correlated to a workbook. The student can then use this workbook to strengthen areas in which he is weak.

These tests are designed to help the student to be more successful in General Chemistry.

Accent On Health

To avoid the sun would be to exist without one of the great pleasures of life. But, as with most enjoyable things, indiscriminate exposure can result in unhappiness and even serious illnesses, according to the Texas State Department of Health. Most sunlight - induced disorders and diseases are divided into two groups: (1) direct disorders, which are responses that follow an over-exposure to ultraviolet rays in any normal, healthy individual, and (2) indirect reactions, which require the presence of some other skin factor in combination with ultraviolet exposure.

The direct disorders include the immediate, acute sunburn reactions and the delayed reaction that is seen following chronic exposure to light (premature aging, pre-malignant and malignant lesions).

The acute sunburn reaction results from a single overexposure to sunburning ultraviolet rays. Reactions can range in severity from a mild, symptomless skin redness, which first appears about 6 to 12 hours after initial exposure and reaches its peak in about 24 hours, to a more intense skin response in which tenderness, pain, swelling, and blistering are seen.

While mild sunburn reactions generally end in an appealing tanned skin, severe reactions often lead not only to irregular sloughing of the epidermis with a resulting uneven distribution of pigment, but also to the signs and symptoms of toxic reaction ranging from fever, chills, and nausea to prostration.

The total amount of exposure to sunlight required to produce delayed reactions is unknown; however, it is known that irreversible damage to skin occurs with each prolonged exposure to the sun. Cumulative damage eventually results in the changes characteristic of "aged skin."

Since no system exists in human skin that could immediately alert an individual as to when an overdose of ultraviolet light is being received, it is theoretically possible to receive a lethal dose of such radiation without experiencing any significant degree of discomfort. Fortunately, visible and infrared radiation, perceived as brightness and heat, are present along with the ultraviolet help to warn of this danger.

State Health authorities say that almost 40 different types of indirect reactions are known to exist. These may range from pimples to eczema, psoriasis, and other skin diseases. Many diseases are worsened by exposure to sunlight. These include viral herpes simplex (cold sores or shingles) and lymphogranuloma venereum (one of the "minor" venereal diseases). There are biochemical and developmental disorders that give rise to defects in pigmentation of the skin, resulting in an increased susceptibility to ultra-violet damage. This type of sensitivity is seen in albinism and phenylketonuria.

Some skin reactions may be induced by internal administration or external contact with photosensitizing substances. An immediate reaction occurs upon exposure to intense sunlight following the oral administration of certain antibacterial drugs and oral anti-diabetic drugs. A delayed type of reaction sometimes occurs following skin contact with certain cosmetic agents. Some of the most common causative chemicals are found in cosmetics, detergents, deodorant bar soaps, and industrial chemicals.

The severity of both acute sunburn and chronic damage to the skin is dependent upon individual susceptibility. For example, susceptibility is greater in light-

complexioned, red-haired, freckled individuals and in blonde, blue-eyed, normally pigmented persons than in darker individuals of the same race. Negro or black-skinned individuals are least susceptible, regardless of skin tone, even black people are not exempt from harmful effects of prolonged sun exposure.

Radiant energy emanates from the sun due to its internal thermonuclear reactions. The energy that reaches the outer atmosphere of the earth is composed of wavelengths which range from the very short, highly energetic x-ray spectrum to the very long, low-energy radio wavelengths.

Outside the earth's atmosphere, direct exposure to sunlight would be fatal. Fortunately, we are protected by the filtering action of oxygen. Less than one percent of the solar radiation reaching the earth's surface lies in the ultraviolet spectrum, and under optimum conditions, only about two-tenths of one percent of this radiation will produce sunburn damage in human skin. The remaining 99 percent of radiation is composed of visible, infrared, and longer wavelengths.

The total amount of harmful ultraviolet radiation reaching the skin at any given time is influenced by such factors as season, time of day, latitude, and conditions of the immediate atmosphere, say state health officials. Latitude is the most important of these factors; the lower the latitude (30 degrees north latitude in Houston vs 40 degrees north latitude in Philadelphia), the greater will be the risk of harmful solar effects.

The hours of greatest risk at all latitudes are between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. solar time. Certain surfaces in the immediate surroundings, such as white sand, snow, concrete, and shiny metals, can increase the risk, mainly by reflecting the ultraviolet rays. Contrary to commonly held beliefs, a water surface does not greatly enhance one's risk. Sunburn can even be induced by scattered sunlight on an overcast or foggy day.

Learning About Our Children With Play Dough

What better way to learn more about your child than with play dough?

According to Jane Fleischer, family life education specialist of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, play dough acts as a channel of exploring, experimenting, creating and expressing deep feelings for children two to six year old.

"The dough stimulates different kinds of thinking," Miss Fleischer continued. "Notice the child's comments and exclamations as he handles it."

As an exercise for development, the Texas A&M University specialist pointed out that play dough develops large and small muscles as well as eye-hand coordination. It also provides sensory experiences.

"As an outlet for emotional release," she added, "it becomes an acceptable means of working off anger and other problems. As the child pounds and squeezes it, he drains off his angry feelings and makes them more manageable."

Miss Fleischer suggested making your own play dough. Combine one-half cup flour, one-half cup salt, three teaspoons alum and enough water to hold together. Mix as for dough and bread to the consistency of clay.

Store the dough in a light-weight plastic container. Wrap it in a wet towel and then snugly fasten the airtight cover.

"Play dough is easy to make, inexpensive and fun to play with. But most important," the specialist noted, "it's an effective stimulant for your child's active play."

Greenbelt Lake Has Lots Of Water And Is Only A Third Full

According to Frank Drummond, Greenbelt Filter Plant Superintendent, Greenbelt Dam is now impounding 23,934 acre feet of water which is a fraction over a third of its capacity when full.

Frank did quite a bit of figuring and came up with the following information at the present level and what it will be when full.

Saturday, the Lake depth was 60.49 feet and measured 1074 square acres of water. The acre feet of water was 23,934. This figure broken down gives the following: 7,798,893.900 gallons or 31,185,575.600 quarts of water, or 62,271,151.200 pints and 124,542,302.400 glasses of water.

When full, the lake will cover 1990 surface acres of water and will be 84 feet deep at the deepest point. It will hold 59,800 acre feet of water. Here's the breakdown in smaller amounts. It will have 19,485,830,000 gallons of water; 77,943,320,000 quarts; 155,886,640,000 pints and nearly 312 billion glasses of water (311,773,280,000).
