Plans for the Howardwick "Road Runners" Med-co and Industrial Foundation, Inc., were completed this past weekend at a town-wide meeting.

Fourteen directors, to be selected at the first annual meeting of the membership, will administer the foundation. The operation will be directed by a general manager.

The corporation papers are presently being processed through the necessary legal channels, and will be completed within ten days. At this time letters will go out to the people who have put up cash deposits for stock in the old Sherwood Mall, and these investors will have the option of reclaiming their deposits, or transferring them to the foundation. Investors in the foundation will be paid a minimum of 8% interest on their investment, and there will be no limit on the amount that can be invested.

No. 2-The constitutional a mendment abolishing the Lamar

County Hospital District. NOTE: This proposal is related only to Lamar County. The district was created and operated its hospital for a few years; however the district ceased to function and privately owned facilities are now being used for hospital care in Lamar County. The county would like to dispose of assets and facilities of the district. This proposal would abolish the district. No. 3 - The constitutional amendment to require the commissioners court in all counties of the state to compensate all justices of the peace on a salary basis. FOR: The proposed amendment would promote integrity and better justice by removing conflict of interests in courts in which compensation of justice of the peace is dependent on fees he collects. This would tend to increase the dignity and professional conduct of justices of the peace. Uniformity in compensation would be established and the administration of justice would be expedited reducing the number of cases appealed and encouraging a greater respect for the jurisdiction of justice courts. AGAINST: The fee system encourages greater diligence as pay is dependent on performance of official duties. On a salary basis justices of the peace could become subservient to the commissioners court which provides his salary. Many excellent justices of the peace might be lost due to the fact that an aggressive justice of the peace could receive a much larger income from fees than that provided by the commissioners court as mandatory. No. 4 - The constitutional amendment providing for a constitutional revision commission which precedes the convening of the members of the 63rd Legislature as a constitutional convention in January, 1974, for the purpose of submitting to the voters a new constitution or revisions of the existing state constitution FOR: A more workable basic law such as proposed would require less periodic revision. The legislature has always been entrusted with the function of proposing constitutional changes and is the logical choice to make preparation of a new or revised constitution. AGAINST: Constitutional reform cannot and should not be effected through an entirely new document, one of the alternatives open to the convention. A constitutional convention should stem from the people, and if Texas needs a new constitution or thorough revision of






