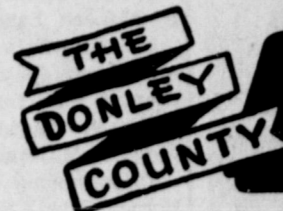
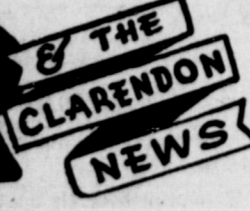

## Howardwick "Road Runners" Foundation, Inc., Formed

Plans for the Howardwick "Road Runners" Med-co and Industrial Foundation, Inc., were completed this past weekend at a town-wide meeting.

Fourteen directors, to be selected at the first annual meeting of the membership, will administer the foundation. The operation will be directed by a general manager.

The corporation papers are presently being processed through the necessary legal channels, and will be completed within ten days. At this time letters will go out to the people who have put up cash deposits for stock in the old Sherwood Mall, and these investors will have the option of reclaiming their deposits, or transferring them to the foundation. Investors in the foundation will be paid a minimum of 8% interest on their investment, and there will be no limit on the amount that can be invested.

It is expected that the "Road Runners" foundation will be responsible for the major part of the business and commercial expansion in the Howardwick area over the next 20 years.

The "Road Runners" will build the Mall, and such mall will now be called Road Runners Mall One.

Merchants, or interested parties eager to start a new business, are invited to contact Harold Childs at Howardwick for information relative to leasing a spot in Mall One. Leasing will be completed within the next few weeks, and subsequently the buildings making up Mall One will be designed to fit the leases. The heads of the new businesses are invited to qualify with the Small Business Administration, and financing will be made available for business installation and operation. It will be developed as a package plan, with SBA providing arrangements for the major portion of the cost.

Construction will start in late winter or early spring, and will be located on a 25 acre track on the southeast corner of the old Dale place on highway 70. Additional units of the Road Runners Mall will materialize over the following months and years.

The foundation will work jointly with the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission in preparing the overall design for Howardwick's multi-services health center.

Health is the third largest industry in the United States, and Howardwick's expansion, relative to industry, will be channeled entirely within the field of health. With the joint developing of the business facilities, along with the health center, job opportunities will be abundant in the rural community for both young and old. Additional plans will be announced, after being processed through PRPS. Five government agencies will be co-developers with the "Road Runners" foundation.

## Lions Observe 50th Anniversary Tuesday Night, Oct. 24, 1972

Members of Clarendon Lions Club took the spotlight in Clarendon this week and especially so Tuesday night, October 24, 1972 when they held their 50th Anniversary Banquet at the College Cafeteria. The Lions Club is Clarendon's oldest service club.

The occasion was marked by many "specials." The Amarillo Downtown Lions Club, the sponsoring club fifty years ago, had ten of its present members in attendance. One of the ten was Ralph Andis, Boss Lion in Clarendon in 1941-42. E. B. "Tex" Mayer, past Director of Lions International, of LeGrange, Texas was the dinner speaker. Recognition was paid several members and since Ladies Night was also observed, Lions presented each lady a corsage as she arrived.

It was a privilege to have Lion Mayer as speaker for the evening. He has addressed Lions in all fifty states, Provinces in Canada, Clubs in Mexico, and in a number of foreign countries. He related a very few of his experiences while traveling internationally: a 15 day tour in India and particularly an engagement in Calcutta; a convention in Ontario, Canada; a visit to Monterrey, Mexico and one of the largest Lions Clubs in the world; and the far northwest into the Bush Country of Alaska.

In all of Lion Mayer's experiences he stressed the brotherhood and understanding fostered through Lionism throughout the world and the possibility of bringing about Peace On Earth through service organizations. He challenged Lions to go beyond the bounds to build stronger, better, communities and complimented the Clarendon Lions on their fifty years of service and the projects to which Lions contribute. In his opening remarks, Lion Mayer quoted the poem, "My Get Up And Go Has Got Up And Went." In closing he quoted "The Touch of the Master's Hand" pointing out the changes brought about through the Touch of the Master's Hand and leaving the thought that the changes could be brought by extending a hand to those around us, the man on the street.

At the conclusion of the address Boss Lion Dennis Rattan presented Lion Mayer with a plaque originally designed for the occasion. Made by K. K. Day, the plaque bore clips of barbed wire taken from Mr. Day's collection of the oldest of this type wire and an engraved plate.

Lion Owen McGarity was master of ceremonies. A special tribute was paid the late J. R. Bartlett, the last of the Charter Members and who died some two months ago, and since the Lions Club year ends July 1, 1972 a plaque from Lions International noting his 50 year membership was shown by Lion Maurice Risley.

Other special recognitions included the presentation of chevrons and pins to Lion Homer Estlack for having been responsible for fifty members; G. W. Estlack and Frank White, Jr. for 30 year memberships and Gene Alderson for a ten year membership. Perfect Attendance records were set by R. E. Drennan, Homer Estlack, and Carl Allmond.

Among the dignitaries present were past Lion International Director Tex Mayer of La Grange, Texas; District 2-T-1 Governor and Mrs. Raymond White and District 2-T-1 Secretary and Mrs. B. F. Cain of Hereford, Texas; and Past District Governor 2-T-1 Floyd and Mrs. Sackett of Pampa.

**OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH AND SAFETY ACT**

This week House liberals delivered an almost fatal blow to some small businessmen and their employees when they voted down an amendment to the Occupational Safety and Health Act which would exempt employers of 15 or less people from the stringent OSHA regulations. The financial burden placed on small businesses by OSHA will in effect cut employee chances for extra income and in some cases may cost employees their jobs. Some businessmen have indicated to me that the costs of meeting these requirements will cause them to cut back their number of employees in order to pay for meeting arbitrary health and safety standards.

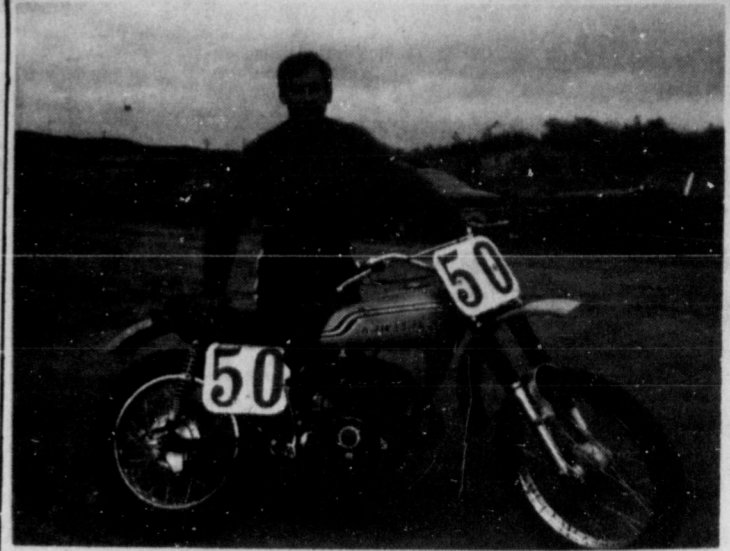
I finally believe that all people should have adequate, safe working conditions but this should be worked out between labor and management, and not by legislative decree. This is just one more function of private business that we are yielding to federal government interference.

In April, I introduced an amendment to the HEW-Labor Appropriations Act which would exempt employers of 25 people or less. The defeated amendment was a modified version of my bill.

**Special ID Cards For Non-Drivers**

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, has reported that almost 7,000 Texans have obtained special personal identification cards since the DPS began issuing them September 1, 1971.

The cards, which were authorized by the 62nd Texas Legislature, are laminated and contain a color photograph of the holder. They are the same size as a Texas drivers license.

Information appearing on the cards includes the holder's date of birth, height, sex and eye color. Each card has a special identification number issued by DPS.

"These cards are especially valuable to those persons who do not hold a Texas drivers license, but who need some sort of official card to help establish their identity. Applicants have included the elderly, persons too young to obtain drivers licenses, and blind and handicapped persons. All Texans are eligible, however," Speir said.

In order to obtain a personal identification card, the applicant must appear at a DPS drivers license field office, execute a special application form, present a birth certificate or other documentary evidence of identity and date of birth, be fingerprinted and pay statutory fee of \$5.00.

The applicant's photograph will be taken and he or she will be issued a temporary receipt.

**WATCH DOG AWARD**

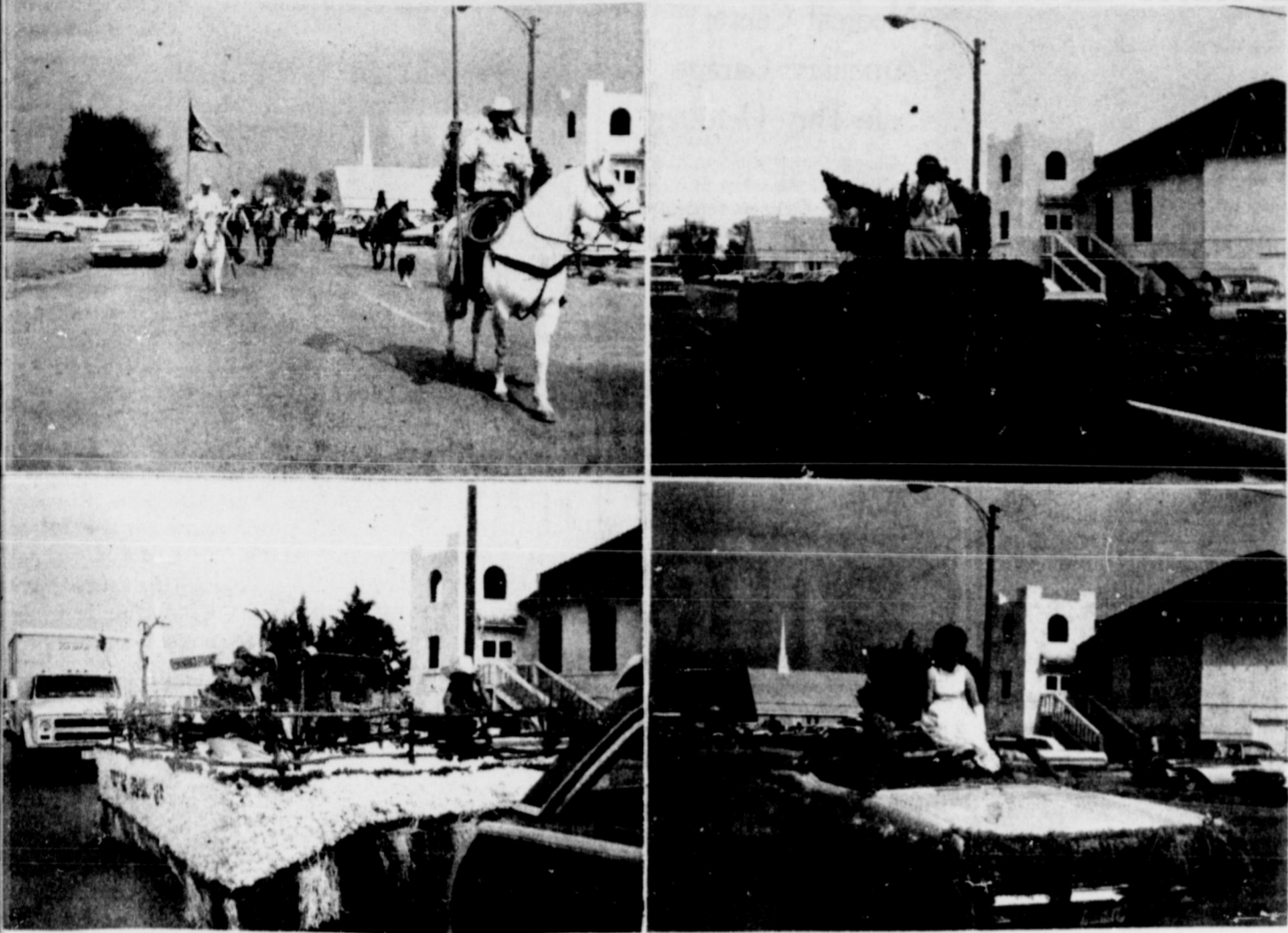

### Pros And Cons Noted For 14 Constitutional Amendments

Citizens all over the United States will be going to the polls Tuesday, November 7, 1972 to vote in the General Election. You will be voting not only for United States, State, and Community officials but will also be voting in the State of Texas on 14 Proposed Constitutional Amendments.

Though the full text of each proposed amendment was carried some months ago, in this and the following issue of the Leader you will be able to read the Proposed Amendments as they will appear on your bal-

lot along with the "For" and "Against" for each of the fourteen. Save these pages, refer to them, give them serious study and when election day comes, go to the Polls and VOTE. All voters must turn out to vote if we are to maintain any say at all in our government. Analysis by Texas Legislative Council.

**No. 1** — The constitutional amendment to provide annual salaries of \$8,400 for members of the Senate and House of Representatives.

**FOR:** The legislator can no

longer be considered a part-time official since problems are becoming more complex and require a greater expenditure of time. Little time is left to devote to private business or professions. The \$4,800 annual salary now provided is not adequate to meet present day costs of living. A raise in salary would provide a greater incentive for public service. Since present salary is inadequate legislators are forced to engage in outside employment to support himself and his family which could lead to a conflict of interest.

**AGAINST:** An increase in salary for legislators would increase the cost of state government when state finances are already overburdened; The State

**No. 2**—The constitutional amendment abolishing the Lamar County Hospital District.

**NOTE:** This proposal is related only to Lamar County. The district was created and operated its hospital for a few years; however the district ceased to function and privately owned facilities are now being used for hospital care in Lamar County. The county would like to dispose of assets and facilities of the district. This proposal would abolish the district.

**No. 3** — The constitutional amendment to require the commissioners court in all counties of the state to compensate all justices of the peace on a salary basis.

**FOR:** The proposed amendment would promote integrity and better justice by removing conflict of interests in courts in which compensation of justice of the peace is dependent on fees he collects. This would tend to increase the dignity and professional conduct of justices of the peace. Uniformity in compensation would be established and the administration of justice would be expedited reducing the number of cases appealed and encouraging a greater respect for the jurisdiction of justice courts.

**AGAINST:** The fee system encourages greater diligence as pay is dependent on performance of official duties. On a salary basis justices of the peace could become subservient to the commissioners court which provides his salary. Many excellent justices of the peace might be lost due to the fact that an aggressive justice of the peace could receive a much larger income from fees than that provided by the commissioners court as mandatory.

**No. 4** — The constitutional amendment providing for a constitutional revision commission which precedes the convening of the members of the 63rd Legislature as a constitutional convention in January, 1974, for the purpose of submitting to the voters a new constitution or revisions of the existing state constitution.

**FOR:** A more workable basic law such as proposed would require less periodic revision. The legislature has always been entrusted with the function of proposing constitutional changes and is the logical choice to make preparation of a new or revised constitution.

**AGAINST:** Constitutional reform cannot and should not be effected through an entirely new document, one of the alternatives open to the convention. A constitutional convention should stem from the people, and if Texas needs a new constitution or thorough revision of

this basic law, then members of the convention should be elected by the people and subject to them.

**No. 5** — The constitutional amendment allowing certain tax exemptions to disabled veterans, their surviving spouses and surviving minor children, and the surviving spouses and surviving minor children of members of the armed forces who lose their life while on active duty.

**FOR:** Persons disabled in military service of the United States deserve compensation for their sacrifice and the tax exemption would be an appreciation token. Tax relief would be subject to strict limitations with only property taxes affected. Decrease in tax revenues would be negligible since in no case may the value of property exempted exceed \$3,000. The amendment is permissive and exemptions could be revoked if the need arises.

**AGAINST:** Compensation of disabled veterans is a federal rather than state responsibility. Generous benefits are already available. Income necessary to provide services to all Texas citizens should not be used to benefit a few. The source of income for school districts and local governments depending heavily on property taxes would be further reduced. Granting tax exemptions to individuals as proposed would establish a bad precedent tending to exempt continually certain persons or classes of persons.

**No. 6** — The constitutional amendment providing that the various political subdivisions of the State may exempt not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the value of residence homesteads of all persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older from ad valorem taxes under certain conditions.

**FOR:** Protection afforded by constitutional guarantees is more effective than statutory prohibitions and the repeal or amendment of discriminatory statutes. Victims of discrimination need the right to use judicial process to challenge constitutionality of discriminatory legislations. Only an equal rights amendment can change completely the present status.

**AGAINST:** Discriminatory laws now existing may be repealed by statute. Adoption of the proposed amendment could result in confusion and litigation as to the meaning of "discrimination."

**FOR:** Ad valorem tax is the

basic form of taxation bringing revenue to counties, cities, towns, and school districts. The present homestead exemption does not grant any relief needed. The senior citizen who lives on a fixed income is hurt by inflation and needs the protection and relief. The proposed amendment protects local government and its creditors by granting option of allowing or not allowing the exemption if pledged for payment of a debt and needed to prevent impairment of that obligation.

**AGAINST:** The reduction of tax revenues of city, school and other taxing districts could handicap the performing of essential functions and services. A basic concept in Texas law demands that property taxes shall be equal and uniform, taxed in proportion to value. Tax would become inequitable and discriminatory. Social security, retirement and welfare programs today assist those over 65.

**No. 7** — The constitutional amendment to provide that equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex, race color, creed, or national origin.

**FOR:** Protection afforded by constitutional guarantees is more effective than statutory prohibitions and the repeal or amendment of discriminatory statutes. Victims of discrimination need the right to use judicial process to challenge constitutionality of discriminatory legislations. Only an equal rights amendment can change completely the present status.

**AGAINST:** Discriminatory laws now existing may be repealed by statute. Adoption of the proposed amendment could result in confusion and litigation as to the meaning of "discrimination."

### Costumes For Halloween Safety

To a child, a Halloween costume is a ball of fun—but it shouldn't turn into a ball of fire.

Clothing Specialist Roxanne Schnorr with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A&M University reminded parents that while "trick or treating," children can be exposed to many direct sources of fire which could easily ignite a costume coverup.

Lighted pumpkins, colorful candles and open fires for roasting wieners or toasting marshmallows are examples of this hazard.

"Since most costumes are made for temporary use, inexpensive and often highly flammable materials are used in their construction," she explained.

"Because of this, the parent should read all labels on the box and garment before selecting a costume with a child," the Texas A&M University specialist continued. The fabric's flame resistance should be described in the labels — the safest stating the material meets the Department of Commerce Standards for flammability safety.

In addition, Miss Schnorr pointed out that some flame retardants are only temporary—washing the costume will remove them. So, consider the warnings — especially if the garment is to be used again and will be washed between uses.

**Danny A. Cearley Receives Certificate Competency SHD**

Danny R. Cearley of Clarendon, son of Mr. and Mrs. John H. Jones, has received the official State Health Department's Certificate of Competency.

To qualify for this certificate, Cearley has completed both a formal and specialized education, accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience, and passed the examination given by the State Health Department's Sanitary Engineers.

Besides his knowledge in using utility management principles, he is skilled in performing his job of supervising the production and distribution of water pollution control facilities. Much of the water specialist's daily work is not seen by the public he serves. Distribution lines and collecting of wastewater are hidden underground. Each operator in Texas is entrusted with about \$64,000 worth of public facilities as compare to an industrial worker who is entrusted with only \$10,000 worth of equipment. Despite their heavy responsibility, water specialists are often underpaid, states the Texas Water Utilities Association.

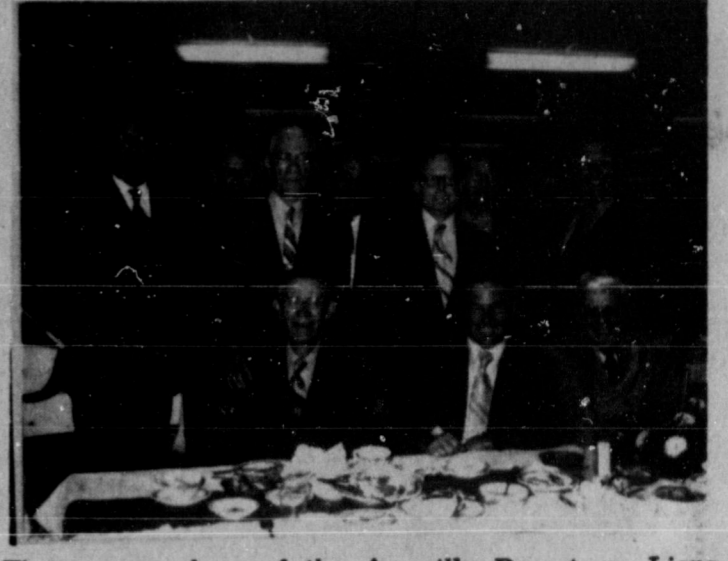
