Local Church To Be Dedicated As Historical Landmark Sun., Oct. 3

The historic Church of St. John Baptist in Clarendon has recently been named a Recorded Texas Historic Landmark, announced Lester W. Prokop, president of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, and dedication date for the marker will be Sunday, October 3, 1971. A certificate designating the building as a Recorded Landmark will be presented at the dedication ceremonies.

A Texas Historical Building Medallion with an interpretive plate, giving a capsule history of the structure will be affixed to the building. The marking of local historic sites and landmarks is part of the Texas Historical Survey Committee's program of preservation activities.

The inscription on the marker reads as follows:

Official Texas Historical Building and 15" x 12" Plate 6-17-71—Donley County, Third and Parks Sts., Clarendon.

Church of St. John Baptist oldest church continuously in use (in earliest Episcopal Parish) in the Texas Panhandle. The first services were held by the Rev. Mr. Townsend of Dallas Diocese in the J. B. McClelland Ranch House, Nov. 1887 on site given 1891 by Isaac W. Carhart, building erected in 1893. A donor, Mrs. Elizabeth Goff of Philadelphia, chose the name. The church was consecrated April 24, 1893, by Bishop A. C. Garrett. First Vicar: The Rev. W. D. Sartwell, 1890-93. Recorded Texas Historic Landmark—1971.

Donley County SCD Election Tuesday

The Donley County Soil and Water Conservation District will hold an election Tuesday, October 5, 1971 for the position of district director in Zone 3. The election will be held at 7:30 p.m. at the Soil Conservation Service Office in Clarendon.

All landowners operators, and their wives who have land in Zone 3 are eligible to vote. Any landowner who owns land in Zone 3 and who lives in Donley County is eligible to run for the position. Zone 3 includes all the land in Donley County east of Highway 70 and north of Red River. All people within this area are encouraged to participate in the election.

The district director of each zone is elected for a five year period. Mr. T. C. D'Spain currently occupies the position in Zone 3.

You are encouraged to support your local Soil and Water Conservation District by voting in the election. These men are your representatives in the development of conservation practices in Donley County.

Moisture Total For Year Climbs to 19.01

Heavy rains the latter part of the week boosted the local rain total for the year to 19.01 inches which is above normal for this time of the year. The total for the month of September is 5.29 inches.

Our official weather observer measured .68 inch on the 23rd, 1.64 for the 24th and .69 for the 25th. These were all early morning readings.

The rain was general with all areas in the county receiving as much or more than here in town. Even though the rain fell slow, the run-off on the Greenbelt watershed netted a rise of 10 inches in Greenbelt Lake which now stands at 55.95 feet. This is the best rise in the lake since April 1970 when the lake reached a depth of 61 feet following the tornado.

Mrs. Jones died at 1:10 a.m. Monday morning in Groom Memorial Hospital in Groom where she had been a patient for 10 days. She was born in Bell County, Texas June 17, 1871 and was married to the late Nathaniel Lee Jones February 13, 1889 at Belton, Texas. She came to Donley County in December 1905 from Bell County. She was a member of the First United Methodist Church in Clarendon.

A pioneer resident of this area, Mrs. Jones was beloved by all who knew her. She remained active and alert with a deep interest in all about her until the last few months of her life. Despite her years, she lived alone until a little over a year ago. Each year she looked forward to her birthday and the special party she always enjoyed when her family and friends gathered for the occasion. Broncs Lose Close Game To Phillips 16-14 Friday Nite

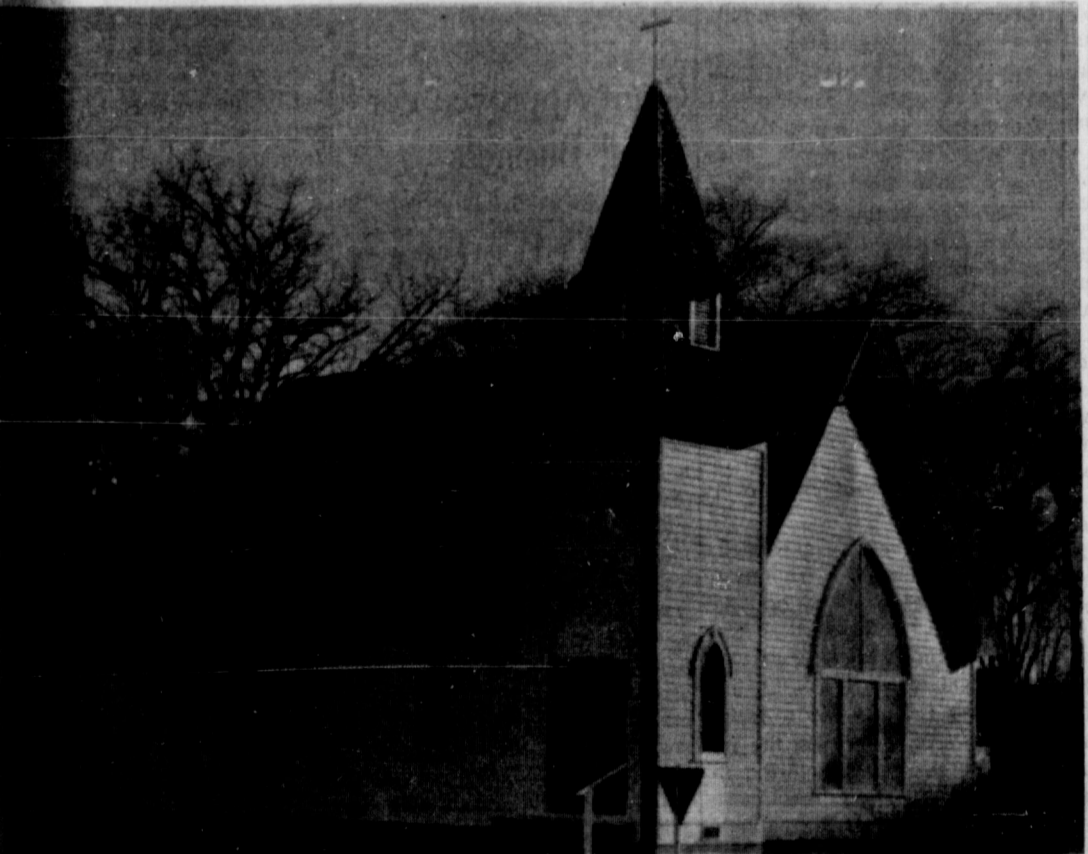
A 2 point safety counted for the difference in the Broncs loss to the Phillips Blackhawks last Friday night on a wet field. The final score was 16-14.

The heavier Blackhawks were able to move quite easily in mid field but the Broncs, on most occasions, put up a very stiff defense when it was needed to keep them off the score board.

Phillips opened the scoring in the second quarter, pushing over from the 3 yard line and making their conversion good. A short time later, Mack Tomlinson passed to Mike Leeper for 57 yards and the TD. Scotty Lindley kicked the extra point to even up the score at half-time.

The third period went scoreless and it was in the fourth period that the Broncs held the Blackhawks on the one foot line only to drop the 2 point safety when Steve Carter was tackled in the end zone the first play after the Broncs took over. Phillips scored seven more points and were ahead 16-7 when Tomlinson skirted right end for 10 yards and six points. Scotty Lindley kicked the extra point which concluded the scoring.

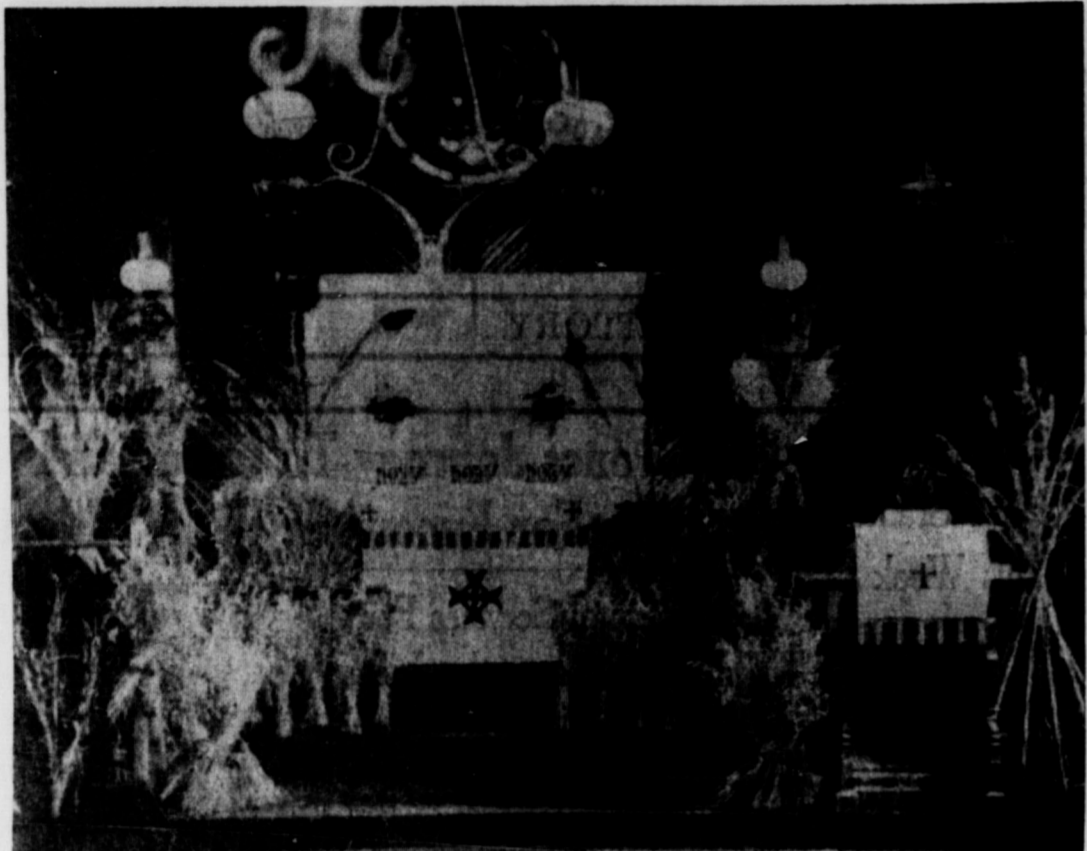

timing and subject matter of special sessions.

"If we can get by with one special session, we sure don't want to have two," Smith said.

COURT REVIEWS DISTRICTS TANGLE — The State Supreme Court heard a barrage of conflicting arguments as to what should be done about House of Representatives redistricting.

All of these views went before the High Court:

That it should order a five-member Legislative Redistricting Board to perform "its constitutional duty" and reapportion the House in line with the 1970 census.

That it should prohibit the Board from reapportioning either House or Senate on grounds that the new census has not been completely published and that redistricting thus should be delayed until 1973.

That 150 single-member House districts are required.

That single-member districts are not required as long as they do not cause discrimination against any group.

APPOINTMENTS — Governor Smith named three new members of the Parks and Wildlife Commission under the 1971 act expanding the agency to six commissioners. New members are Max L. Thomas of Dallas, Joe K. Fulton of Lubbock and Robert Burleson of Temple.

Smith also announced these recent appointments:

Doug Toole Sr. of Houston to Texas Water Quality Board.

Howard B. Boswell to the State Board of Control.

Robert C. Keppler of Dallas to the State Board of Pharmacy.

Lynn B. Griffith of Waxahachie to the Trinity River Authority.

Louis F. Shanks of Austin (re-appointment) to the School Land Board.

Reps. Richard Slack of Pecos and James L. Slider of Naples were reappointed by House Speaker Gus Mutscher to the Texas Legislative Budget Board.

LAND BIDS TAKEN — Bonus bids totaling nearly \$4.8 million were paid for oil and gas leases on 68,867 acres of University of Texas land at public auction last week.

Bids brought the Permanent University Fund to a record of \$579.8 million. Average \$69.26 per acre price was the highest the University has received at lease auctions since 1965. Highest bidders for a single tract were Allied Chemical Corporation and Champlin Petroleum Company in a joint offer of \$260,000 for a 320-acre tract in Ward County. If oil or gas production is realized, the permanent University Fund will receive a one-sixth royalty payment in addition to the bonus bid.

The School Land Board will meet October 5 to consider a rule regulating the use of water on state-owned land under oil and gas leases.

VERNON SITE SELECTED — Vernon Center South was selected by the Texas Board of Mental Health and Mental Retardation as the site for the state's first comprehensive treatment and rehabilitation center for hard core, juvenile drug addicts.

The drug center will contain facilities for housing, educating, treating and training about 350 juveniles 14-21 years of age.

MH-NR Commissioner Dr. David Wade said the proposed program will push Texas into national leadership in treating and rehabilitating young drug users.

GRANTS APPROVED — Texas will get \$411,675 in new federal grants to fund two Offices of Economic Opportunity programs this fiscal year.

One of the grants provides \$237,700 in new funds and \$22,300 in carryover money for state agency assistance. A second for \$96,000 (including \$12,025 in carry-over cash) will finance a state special technical assistance program.

OEA will use the money to provide technical aid to 47 Texas community action agencies and nine limited purpose agencies representing 75 per cent of the population.

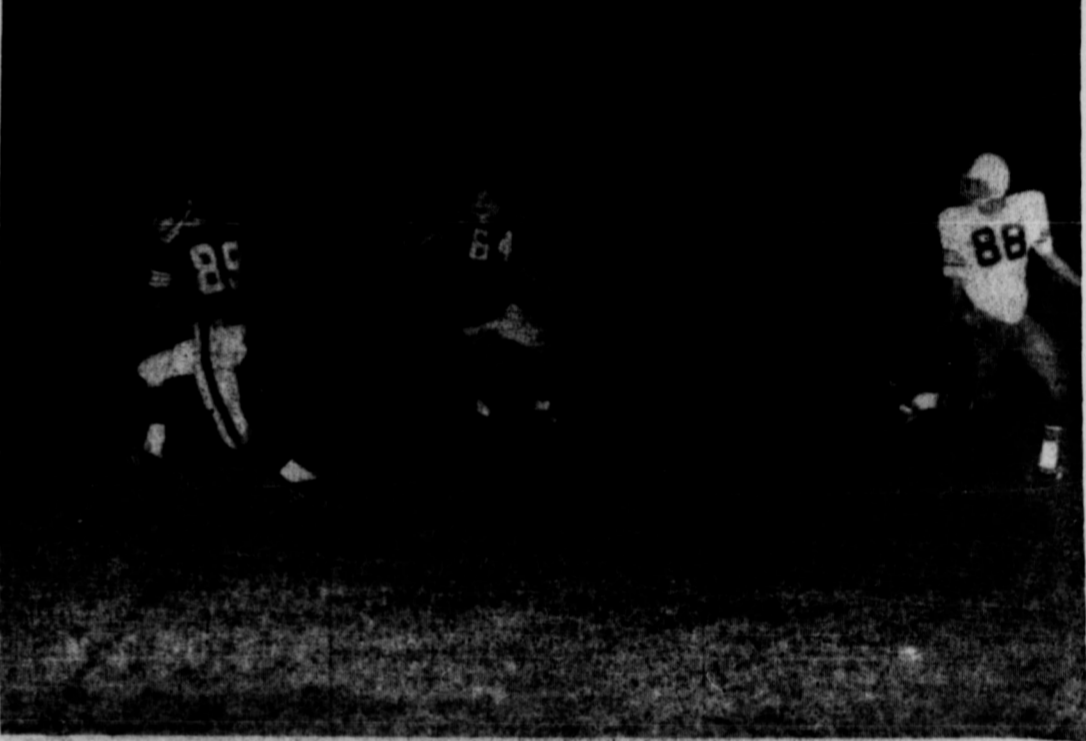
SENATE "RATED" — League of Conservation Voters rated 11 senators with perfect voting records on seven selected environmental issues this year.

Eight others were given a passing score, and 12 flunked (with less than five favorable votes out of seven). Seven of the latter group who registered two or less votes deemed correct by the environmentalists were put down as having "abominable records."

Senate's record, said the environmentalists, was better than that of the House, though only

Highlights and Sidelights From Your State Capitol

By BILL BOYKIN Texas Press Association

Gov. Preston Smith and the State Comptroller's office hold different views on timing of a special session of the Legislature to pass the second half of the 1972-73 budget.

Smith apparently wants to wait until next June — when primary elections are over and a longer-range look at possible tax revenue is available.

Comptroller's aides voiced concern that a session delayed that long could not produce needed new revenue by September 1, start of the state's fiscal year. A sales tax increase, for example, in April would not produce money to the state from merchants until the end of July or early August.

Smith was unimpressed: "He (Comptroller Robert S. Calvert) is not the governor," Smith noted.

Smith's veto of the second year of the biennial spending bill necessitates a complete rewrite in special session within the next year. A special session would have been required, anyway, since the 1971 Legislature did not pass a 1973 welfare appropriation.

"The people are not too anxious to have the legislature in special session," Smith said. "The longer we can delay, the better position we will be in for the Comptroller to give an accurate revenue estimate (for the next year) and to determine revenue needs of the state."

The Governor indicated strongly, however, that if a special session is necessary to redistrict the House of Representatives, budgeting and reapportionment probably will be considered at the same time. He controls the

Grant Approved For Small Business

The Aspermont Small Business Development Center has received notice from the Texas Office of Economic Opportunity of approval of a grant in the amount of \$32,890 for Economic Development.

The ASBDC operates in 33 counties, Donley included, in the field of economic development, business loans, counseling and preparing applications, and feasibility studies. Services are as follows:

1. Screening and processing applications to the Small Business Administration for loans to initiate or expand businesses. It also arranges other sources of credit for promising small businesses, either through the programs of SBA, through other Federal Agencies, or through the private credit sources, including banks.
2. Arranges for management training and counseling for loan recipients and for potential applicants for loans.
3. Helps to identify new or un-filled opportunities for establishment or expansion of small businesses in the community.
4. Familiarize the small towns and communities with state and federal programs designed for improved local development.
5. To help in locating, technical, financial, educational and other services available to the small community.

All applications are presented to local banks and the Small Business Administration Office in Lubbock, Texas for funding.

The grant is for a period of one year beginning 10-1-71 and ending 9-30-72. This will mark the beginning of the seventh year for the ASBDC. Loans totaling 3 million dollars have been made during this period of time.

The ASBDC is a non-profit corporation with 17 board members. Mr. J. Q. Jackson of Quanah, Texas serves as its President; George Frazier, Aspermont, Texas as Vice-President; and Robert Hall, Jayton, Texas as Secretary - Treasurer. The board member for Donley County is Mr. C. J. Lohoefer, retired who lives in Clarendon.

Changes Are Made In Boat Registration

Boat owners registering craft this year will find changes in the law.

For one thing, all water powered by any sort of machinery must now be registered the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Even if the machine is not the principal source of propulsion, the boat must be registered.

Changes in the Texas Vessel Act went into effect 1, 1971, and applications for renewals and original certificates of number may be awarded beginning Jan. 1, 1972.

New registrations will be for two years from the date issued.

The department is also making a staggered system of renewals. All renewal notices be sent out at the same time different registrations will expire at different times, and registration rates will be prorated accordingly.

The new Certificate of Number will be a plastic card which will be carried in the boat owner's wallet. Two decals in the state come with each certificate of Number and are coded with expiration dates marked on the face. They are placed on a line evened and three inches aft of the registration numbers on the transom.

An across-the-board increase of \$3 in registration fees for boats also goes into effect Jan. 1, 1972.

New rates for registration: Up to 16 feet, \$6; 16 to 26 feet, \$9; 26 to 40 feet, \$12, and 40 feet, \$15.

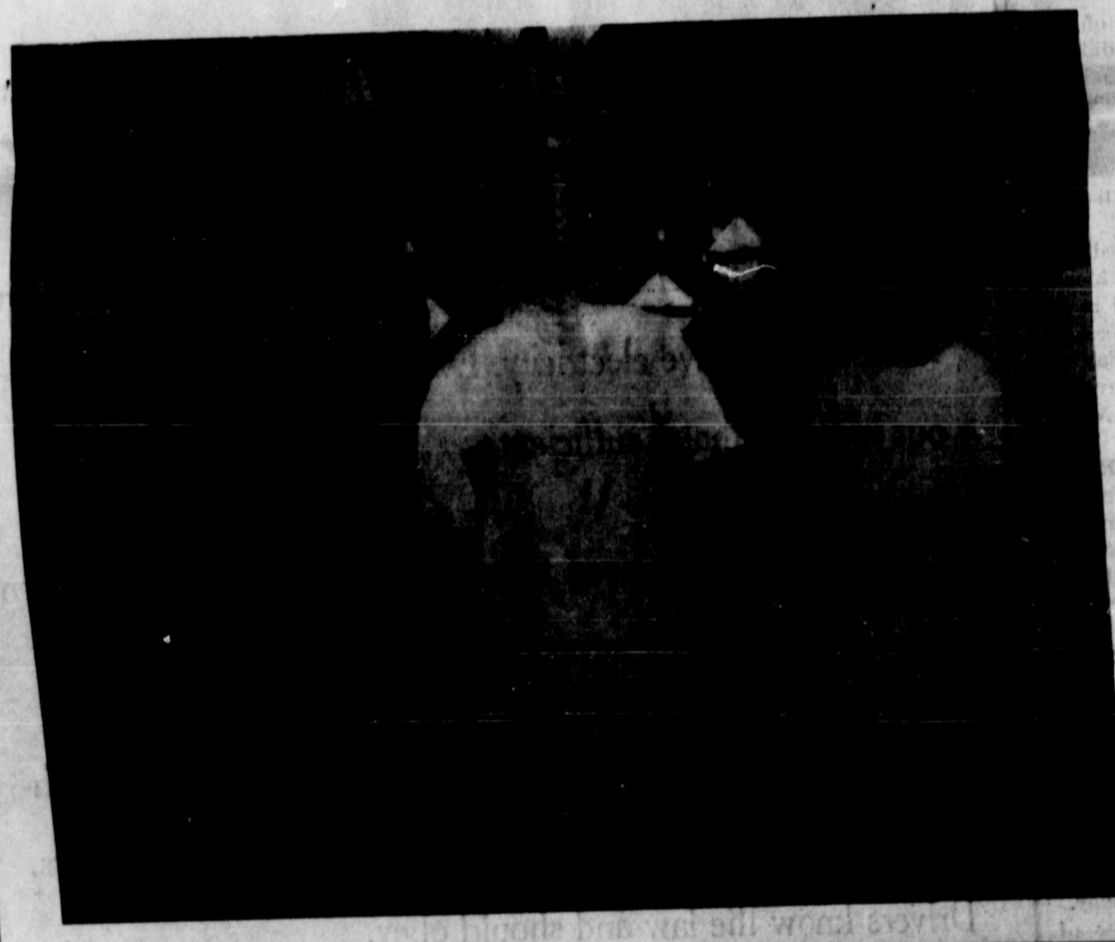

Rural development Legislation

As a part of my continuing effort to bring new life to our rural areas, I joined with Chairman Bob Poage of the House Agriculture Committee in introducing the Rural Development Act of 1971. Included in this bill are two bills which I have introduced separately. One allows an increase in the total amount of operating loan funds which may be loaned by the Farmers Home Administration. The other allows an increase in the amount which may be loaned to one farmer or rancher.

The Rural Development Act would also allow FHA to make loans for small businesses in rural areas, as well as guarantee loans for fire and rescue equipment.

The soil conservation service would be allowed to share costs in creating municipal and industrial water supplies, in soil and water pollution control, and solid waste disposal. The Federal government would also be required to give priority to locating new facilities and offices in areas of 10,000 population or less.

Although I have reservations about certain portions of this bill, I believe it is a good vehicle on which our committee can begin deliberations to solve this most critical problem of bringing new life to our rural areas.

Symposium Group Leader

I have been asked by the sponsoring Federal and State agencies to act as group leader at a September 28-30 conference designed to see what can be done to improve animal waste disposal.

The National Symposium on Animal Waste Management will be co-sponsored by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Environmental Protection Agency

Council and Land Grant Colleges.

Livestock and poultry producers are faced with serious problems as they struggle to comply with new laws and regulations on animal waste management. I am convinced that most producers are willing to adjust their operations where necessary to assist in environmental improvement.

I believe this symposium will provide us with a timely forum from which will come ideas and proposals for better assistance to producers across the nation as well as general benefits to the public, Price said.

At my request two Panhandle feedlot operators have been invited to attend the symposium. They are Tom Herrick of Amarillo and Joe Easley of Hereford.

Findings and recommendations of our work group will be included in the final symposium proceedings which will be made available to Congress, State and Federal agencies, farm organizations and the public.

Legislation Of The Week

Action on the floor was limited last week to three bills two of which were passed on voice vote. The House - Senate conference version of the Public Works Appropriations Bill was adopted on a 377 to 9 vote. The Airport and Airways Act of 1970 was amended to clarify the priorities of Congress for airways modernization and airport development. The Peace Corps authorization was adopted at a level \$12.5 million below last year. I supported an unsuccessful amendment to cut an additional \$27 million because I feel this is one program that could be reduced during a present economic crisis.

1971 Grain Sorghum Loan

The basic county loan rate for grain sorghum grading No. 2 or better in Donley County is \$1.75 less storage and handling. If storage is prepaid through January 1, 1972, average grain will net you \$1.61 cwt.

1971 grain loans will mature June 30, 1972, and may be repaid at anytime prior to that time. Interest rate is 30c per \$100 per month from the date of disbursement to but excluding the month of repayment.

We understand the price of grain is down considerably. By putting it in the loan, you would have a chance to hold it for a while for a market price increase at a later date.

Change of Owners or Operators

It is very important that we have the correct name and address of the owner and operator of each farm. Numerous notices, regulation changes, etc. will be mailed in the near future. So if there will be a change for 1972, please notify this office.

Social Security

Q—What will I need to bring when I file for benefits?

A—The correct answer to this question depends on what type benefit you are applying for. (1) For survivor benefits, generally proof of your age, proof of age for any minor children, proof of your marriage to the insured worker, and any social security numbers assigned to you or the children. (2) For disability benefits, generally proof of age for any minor children, names and addresses of any doctors who have treated you, and names and addresses of hospitals where you have been treated. (3) For retirement benefits, generally only proof of your age and either your W-2 or tax return for the year just ended. The above answer is general but there will be cases where we will need more than what is outlined above. To find out what you need in your specific case, simply call your nearest social security office.

Q—How much will I get from social security?

A—The answer to this question is not at all simple because, as you have probably noted, we pay retirement, disability and survivors benefits, and, too, we pay different categories of people. In order to get a meaningful answer to this question, I would suggest you call your nearest social security office and give them the facts in your particular case. With the facts, your social security office can then give you the amount you would be entitled to.
