Three Accepted For Summer Institute At Hardin Simmons

Frankie Just, Melissa Estes, and Roger Stevens have been accepted to attend the summer Science Institute for talented High School students on the campus of Hardin Simmons University, Abilene, Texas.

The institute, "Environment, Science, and Man," will be conducted June 4 - June 9. Only 100 students are chosen to participate. Each accepted must be recommended by their science or mathematics teacher, must expect to graduate in the spring of 1973, and must be pursuing a university preparatory curriculum having completed the first two levels of high school science and mathematics requirements by June 1972.

The campus of Hardin-Simmons University provides excellent undergraduate classroom and laboratory instruction in the natural sciences and mathematics and all are at the disposal of the students attending the institute. There is a broad array of instrumentation in the science areas, audio-visual aids, and equipment for field trips in the Abilene area.

The institute will introduce concepts of environment analysis from the various perspectives of earth, life, and physical sciences, actual laboratory and field experience, mathematical models relevant to analysis of environmental phenomena, offer up-to-date information on career opportunities in science and provide discussions concerning the training necessary to have an effective career in science or mathematics.

Classes, laboratories and field trips will be held Monday, June 5, through Friday morning, June 9. There will be a brief closing exercise at 11 a.m. Friday, June 9, 1972.

These young people are to be congratulated on their acceptance for the Institute. No other town of this size is privileged to have this number attend. Frankie is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John F. Pre-Trial Hearing Set For June 7th

In a phone conversation Wednesday morning with District Judge, Robert E. Montgomery, the Judge stated that a Pre-Trial Hearing had been set for Wednesday, June 7 in connection with the suit filed by the Citizens Group in regard to the new hospital board appointees and the Hospital District. The hearing will be held in the district court room. The usual hour is 10 a.m.

The plaintiffs in the suit are F. E. Sawyer, H. S. Hardin, John M. Bass, Oran G. Judd and J. H. McMurry. The defendants are: Donley County Hospital District, George W. Smith, Milton Joehetz, R. C. Cagle, Bright Newhouse and Jeff Walker.

The suit is questioning the validity of the attempted appointment of the last four mentioned as members of the hospital board; also that the Donley County Hospital District, its officers and agents be enjoined from expending any of the funds or property of the District for the use of George W. Smith; and that the District be enjoined from presuming to recognize any obligation of the District under the contract dated November 20, 1966; and that George W. Smith be restrained from using any portion or space within the Hospital building, or any building or facility owned by the District, or using any funds, property, equipment or personnel for his own gain, or from accepting any funds from the District.

Everyone receives the paper FREE OF CHARGE as a circular, junker, other unsolicited mail, etc. You are in NO WAY OBLIGATED.

In an effort to build a Subscription List a campaign is often begun with various "gimmicks" offered for a set number of subscriptions sold. However, until a List is established and payment made in advance, mailing must be BOXHOLDER, Pre-addressed, or THROW AWAY. This Third Class Mail is not required to be handled until other mail is worked and may lay for as long as a 48 hour period.

The Donley County Leader is mailed under a SECOND CLASS MAILING PERMIT issued by the U. S. Postal Service which means we have a paid up subscription list. The Donley County Leader also meets all requirements for Legal Publications which only an established newspaper can meet. A Legal Newspaper must be a paper of General Circulation, published for 52 consecutive weeks under a Second Class Mailing Permit to comply with the law on legal notices.

We are affiliated with the Parahandle Press Association, the West Texas Press Association, The Texas Press Association, The National Newspaper Association, and the National Editorial Association.

Once each year, in the month of October, a Newspaper must publish a STATEMENT OF OWNERSHIP setting forth the name of the paper, publication day, the owners or owner, publisher, managers, and the names of holders of mortgages. 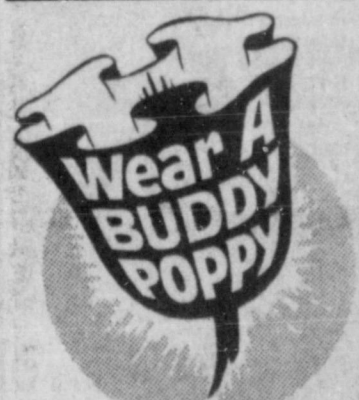
AREA EAST OF TOWN RECEIVES HAIL MONDAY

An area about midway between here and Lelia Lake and to the northeast received heavy hail Monday afternoon and good amounts of water.

The cloud started dumping rain and hail southeast of town with Ruth Corbin reporting .70 inch, Donald Ballew .60 inch. Doyle Hall reported 1.25 east of town and Charles Blackburn reported 1.50 northeast in the Sunnyview community. Hail in spots measured up to golf ball size. Blackburn said hail was still stacked up at his house late Monday night.

A number of farmers who already had planting operations underway will be replanting again. Here in town we received .15 inch and just a few hail stones. Our moisture total for the month rose to 3.56 and 3.92 for the year.

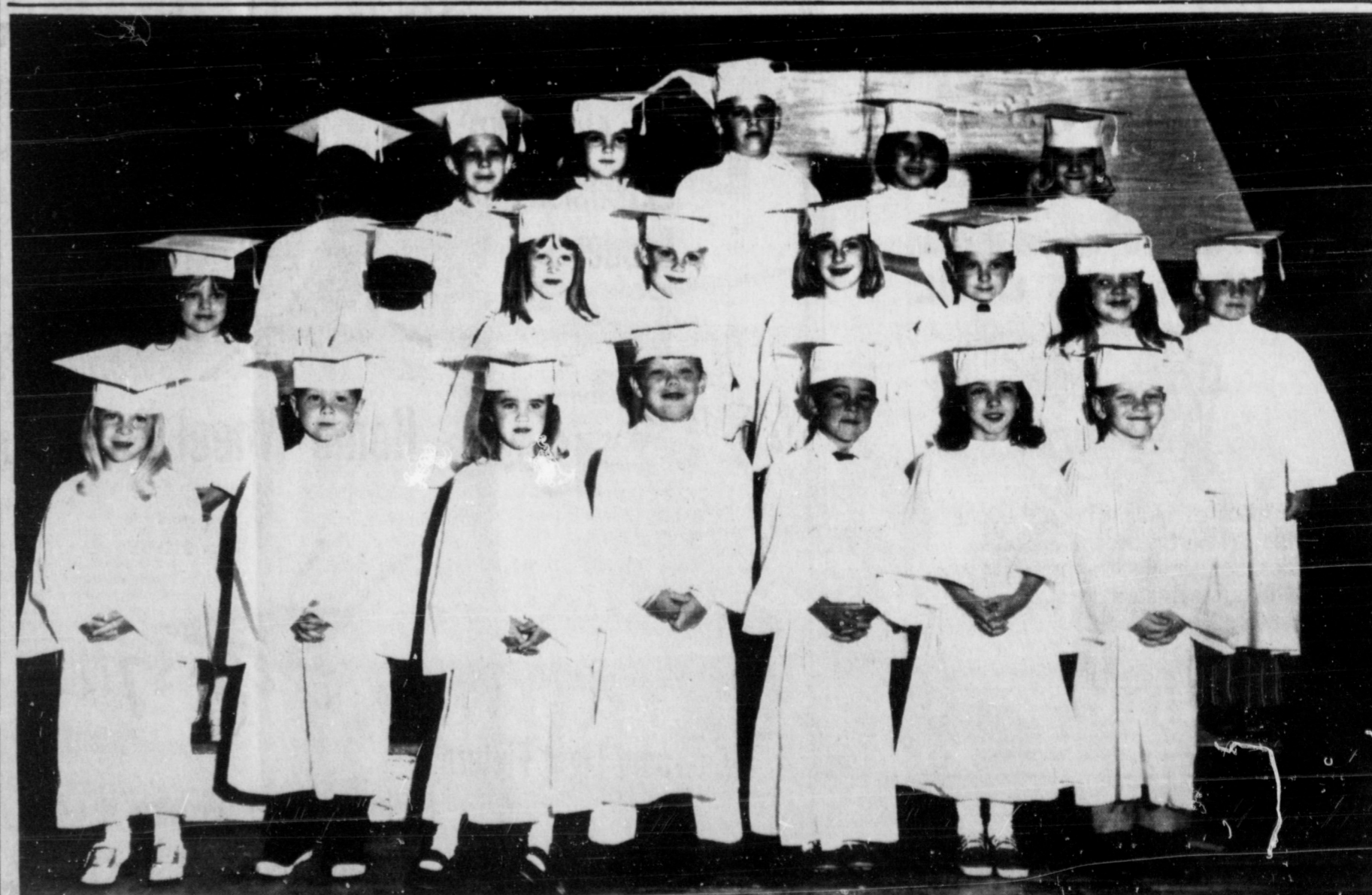


VFW POPPY SALE HERE SET FOR SAT. MAY 27

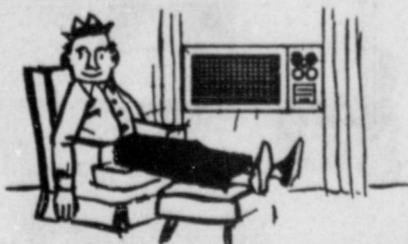

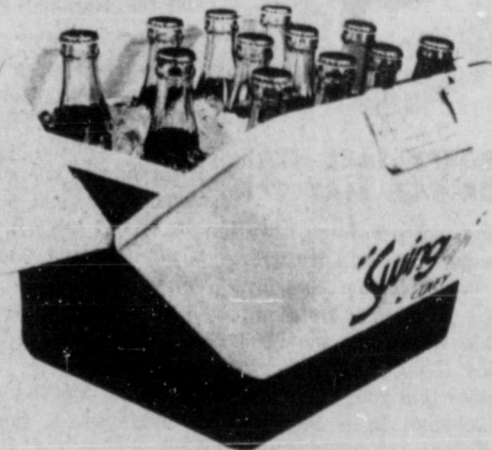

Social Security

Q—I have heard my minor children could collect social security on my record if I've worked under social security long enough should I become disabled or die, even if their father is still supporting them fully. Is this correct?

A—Yes. Too often women feel cheated paying social security taxes feeling they will wind up drawing on their husband's record when they retire. Protection for herself and minor children in the event of her disability and her minor children in the event of her death is often overlooked.

Q—Why does a person have to have five years work to qualify for disability? I am only 20 years old and have been working for three years. What would happen to me if I became disabled at this time?

A—Not all persons need five years work under social security to qualify for disability insurance benefits. Persons becoming disabled before age 31 need less than five years work. The exact amount of work required by persons who become disabled before age 31 depends on their age at the time they become disabled. A young worker can qualify for social security disability insurance benefits with as little as 1½ years work.

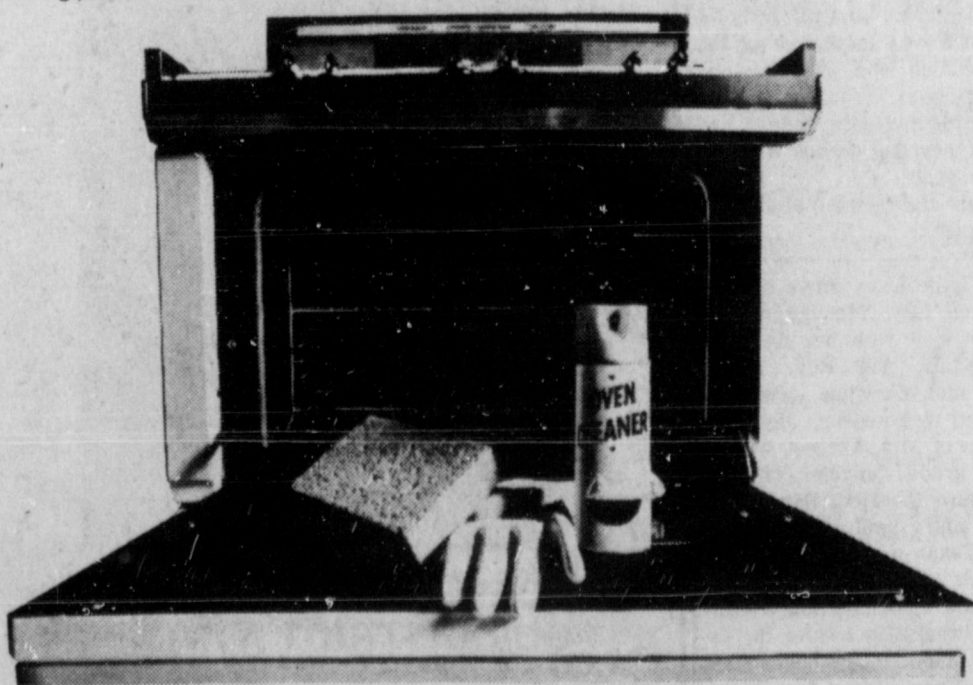
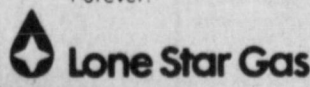

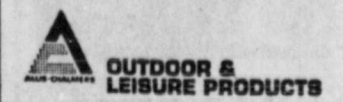

Cotton Growers Assistance Bill I introduced legislation last week that would permit cotton growers who are victims of crop losses due to causes beyond the control of the producer to use the average yield for that crop year in figuring participation levels in the USDA's cotton program during the next three years.

Producers are already protected from losses to their cotton crops if the loss is due to natural causes. My amendment to the Agricultural Adjustment Act would extend assistance to producers whose cotton loss is due to man-made causes that are accidental.

In view of the high costs and risks and low profit margins associated with agricultural operations these days, I believe this bill would serve the interest of cotton growers by protecting their established yields, and I hope it will receive prompt, favorable attention by the Congress.

Tornado Season Is Here

Spring in Texas brings warm breezes, greening fields and trees and — too often — tornadoes.

In an average year 96 tornadoes hit Texas. They occur most often in the northeastern portion of the Low Rolling Plains and in the northern half of North Central Texas.

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration in Austin reported that tornadoes occur at any month and during all hours of the day. However, they occur often during late spring and early summer.

In a 20-year period, 1950-70, three-fifths of all Texas tornadoes occurred in May. More tornadoes hit in Texas than any other state, partly because of its size. However, Texas ranks ninth in the number of tornadoes per square mile, with Oklahoma and Kansas topping the list.

The Environmental Data Service reports that 1,907 tornadoes struck Texas from 1950-70.

The greatest tornado outbreak came in September, 1967, when Hurricane Beulah spawned 115. The worst outbreak of spring tornadoes was in 1957 when 69 were reported. The costliest tornado in Texas occurred May 11, 1970 when Lubbock suffered 26 deaths, 500 injuries and \$135 million in damage.

What can you do when a tornado approaches? Immediate action can save lives, says Wayne Keese agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

A tornado watch is given when the storms are likely to develop in a given area. Stay tuned to newscasts and advisories even if the sky is clear.

A tornado warning means tornadoes have been sighted. Seek shelter in a storm cellar or reinforced building. Stay away from windows. Curl up so that your head and eyes are protected.

When tornadoes are likely, leave mobile homes. They are particularly vulnerable.

"If you're in a car, get out and lie in a depression," says the Texas A&M University engineer. "If there are no low spots or depressions, turn the car at a right angle and proceed away from the tornado as quickly as possible."

Farm animals are vulnerable to tornadoes whether in a barn or on open range. However, if they are scattered, the chances are much greater that only a few animals will be lost.

Screwworm Alert Is Sounded To Stockmen

A "red alert" is being sounded throughout the state as screwworms continue to assault livestock and other animals. "Donley County has not recorded any cases to date, but it's most important that all animals be checked closely and regularly for infestations", says County Agricultural Agent Ronald Gooch with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Weather conditions were favorable for heavy screwworm build-ups last winter in northern Mexico as well as in parts of the Southwest, explains the agent. Some infestations were also spread by transporting infested livestock last fall, and the insect pest spent the mild winter in new quarters. This spring overall conditions were "ripe" for a massive screwworm invasion.

According to Gooch, more than 2,300 cases have been confirmed in Texas this spring, the earliest and heaviest outbreak in the history of the Screwworm Eradication Program.

Although sterile fly production at the Mission Lab is running at its peak — 200 million a week — treatment with these flies is not enough to stop the destructive, flesh-eating pest. Gooch urges all livestock producers and owners of other animals (dogs, cats) to follow certain precautions:

- 1. Carry out all approved preventive practices to help eliminate screwworms. 2. Inspect animals regularly and carefully and treat all wounds whether they are wormy or not. 3. Delay all surgery until cool weather this fall. Shearing, docking,

ing, castrating and dehorning only provide additional wounds for worm infestations. Studies show that almost 90 percent of all worm samples come from calf navels and man-made wounds. 4. Spray animals with an approved product before shipping them. This is a preventive measure against spreading the infestation.

5. Be cautious of livestock shipments coming from infested areas. If buying such animals, be sure to check them thoroughly for wormy wounds.

6. Care should be taken not to move infested livestock across state lines. Infestations resulting from this practice may bring about a quarantine and the regulated movement of livestock.

7. As soon as a wormy wound is found, send a worm sample to the Screwworm Laboratory, Box 969, Mission, Texas 78572. If the case is positive, sterile flies will be dropped as soon as possible to further protect animals in the area.

"Everyone must cooperate if the screwworm eradication program is to be effective," emphasizes Gooch. "This means farmers, ranchers, pet owners, auction managers and others who work or own animals."

Four Donley County Rural Accidents For April Reports DPS

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated four accidents on rural highways in Donley County during the month of April, according to Sergeant Rex Smith, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in five persons killed and one person injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first four months of 1972 shows a total of 19 accidents resulting in seven persons killed, and ten persons injured.

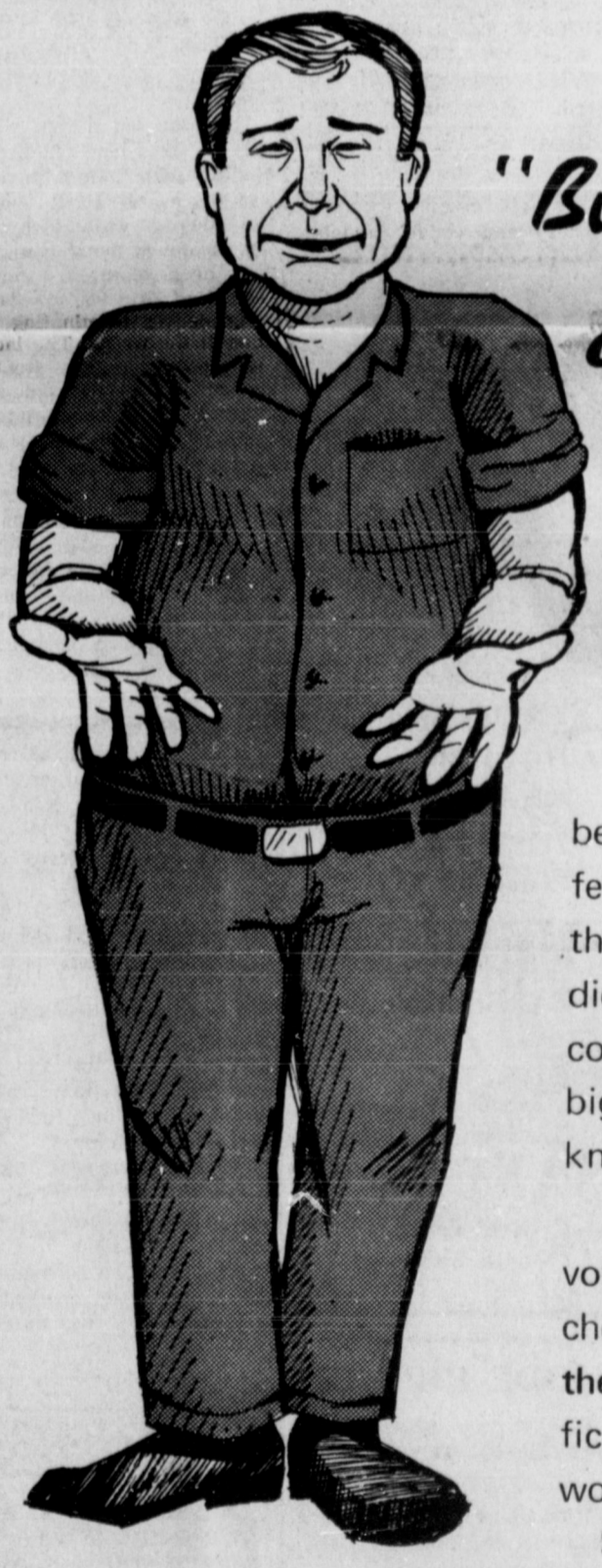

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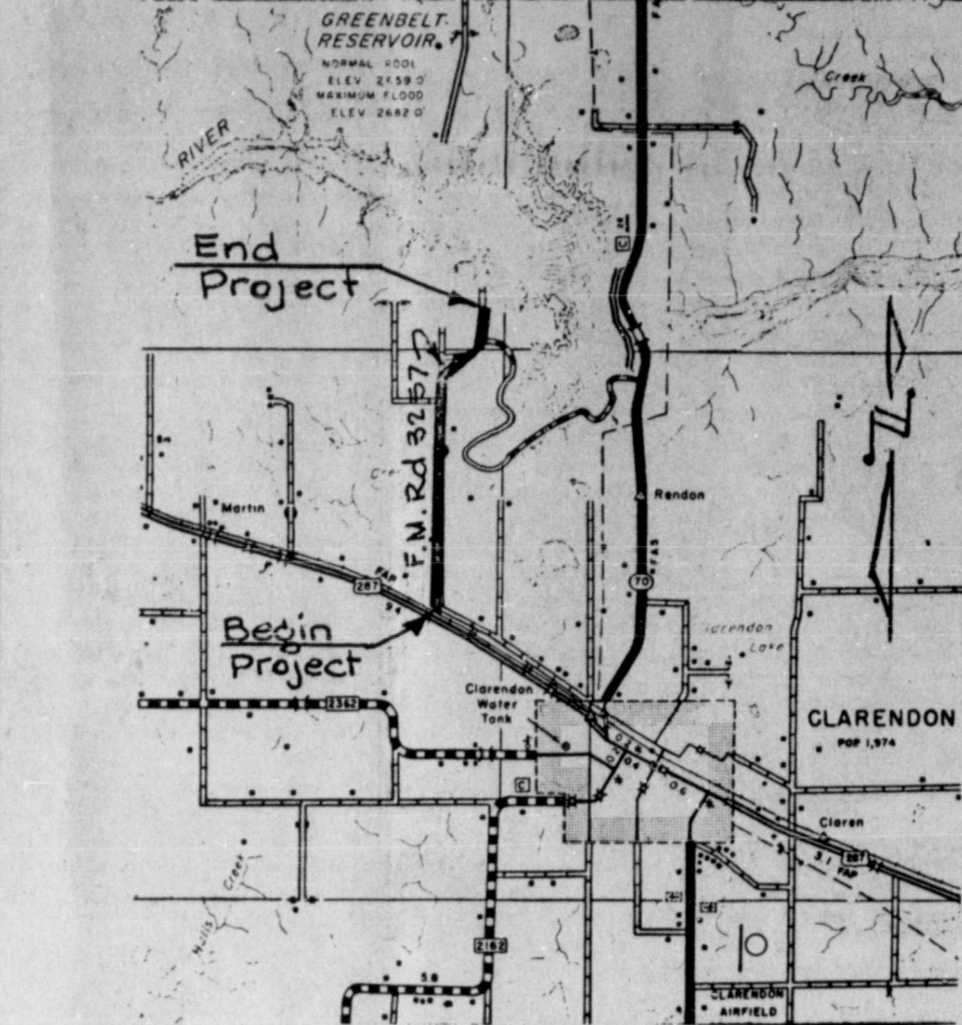

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO LONE STAR GAS COMPANY, A CORPORATION, ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS, A FRANCHISE TO FURNISH AND SUPPLY GAS TO THE GENERAL PUBLIC IN THE CITY OF CLARENDON, DONLEY COUNTY, TEXAS, FOR THE TRANSPORTING, DELIVERY, SALE AND DISTRIBUTION OF GAS IN, OUT OF, AND THROUGH SAID MUNICIPALITY FOR ALL PURPOSES; PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF A FEE OR CHARGE FOR THE USE OF THE STREETS, ALLEYS AND PUBLIC WAYS; PROVIDING THAT IT SHALL BE IN LIEU OF OTHER FEES AND CHARGES, EXCEPTING AD VALOREM TAXES; AND REPEALING ALL PREVIOUS GAS FRANCHISE ORDINANCES.

as the supply lines from the Company's main to the consumer's curb line when mains are located in the streets and to the consumer's property line when mains are located in the alleys. The consumer shall own, operate and maintain all yard lines and house piping. Yard lines are defined as the underground supply lines extending from the point of connection with Company's service line to the point of connection with consumer's house piping.

SECTION 5. Company shall not be required to extend mains on any street more than one hundred fifty (150) feet for any one consumer of gas.

SECTION 6. Company shall be entitled to require from each and every consumer of gas, before gas service is commenced, a deposit of twice the amount of an estimated average monthly bill, which said deposit may be retained by Company until service is discontinued and all bills therefor have been paid. Company shall then return said deposit to the consumer, together with six percent (6%) interest thereon from the date of said deposit up to the date of discontinuance of service. Company shall be entitled to apply said deposit, with accrued interest, to any indebtedness owed Company by the consumer making the deposit.

SECTION 7. The rights, privileges and franchises granted by this ordinance are not to be considered exclusive, and City hereby expressly reserves the right to grant, at any time, like privileges, rights and franchises as it may see fit to any other person or corporation for the purpose of furnishing gas for light, heat and power to and for City and the inhabitants thereof.

SECTION 8. Company shall furnish reasonably adequate service to the public at reasonable rates and charges therefor; and Company shall maintain its property, equipment and appliances in good order and condition.

SECTION 9. Company, its successors and assigns, agrees to pay and City agrees to accept, on or before the 1st day of March, 1973, and on or before the same day of each succeeding year during the life of this franchise, up to and including the year 1997, a sum of money which shall be equivalent to two percent (2%) of the gross receipts received by Company from the sale of gas to its domestic and commercial consumers within the corporate limits of said City (expressly excluding, however, receipts derived from sales to industrial and governmental users and consumers in said City) for the preceding calendar year, which annual payment shall be for the rights and privileges herein granted to Company including expressly, without limitation, the right to use the streets, alleys and public ways of said City. And it is also expressly agreed that the aforesaid annual payment shall be in lieu of any and all other and additional occupation taxes, easement and franchise taxes, or charges (whether levied as an ad valorem, special or other character of tax or charge), in lieu of municipal license and inspection fees, street taxes and street or alley rentals or charges, and all other and additional municipal taxes, charges, levies, fees and rentals of whatsoever kind and characters which City may impose or hereafter be authorized to levy and collect, excepting only the usual general or special ad valorem taxes, which City is authorized to levy and impose upon real and personal property. Should City not have the legal power to agree that the payment of the foregoing sums of money shall be in lieu of taxes, licenses, fees, street or alley rentals or charges, easement or franchise taxes or charges aforesaid, then City agrees that it will apply so much of said sums of money paid as may be necessary to satisfy Company's obligations, if any, to pay any such taxes, licenses, charges, fees, rentals, easement or franchise taxes or charges.

SECTION 10. In addition to the rates charged for gas supplied, Company may make and enforce reasonable charges, rules and regulations for service rendered in the conduct of its business, including a charge for services rendered in the inauguration of natural gas service, and may require, before furnishing service, the execution of a contract therefor. Company shall have the right to contract with each customer with reference to the installation of, and payment for, any and all of the gas piping from the connection thereof with the Company's main in the streets or alleys to and throughout the consumer's premises. Company shall own, operate and maintain all service lines which are defined

excluding the sale of gas to industrial and governmental consumers) within the corporate limits of City, Company agrees that on the same date that payments are made as provided in the preceding paragraph of this Section 9, it will file with the City Clerk a sworn report showing the gross receipts received from the sale of gas to its domestic and commercial consumers within the said corporate limits for the calendar year preceding the date of payment. City, may, if it sees fit, have the books and records of Company examined by a representative of said City to ascertain the correctness of the sworn reports agreed to be filed herein.

Receipts from sales to governmental users or consumers shall include all those receipts derived from the sale of gas to federal, state, county or city governments or branches and subdivisions thereof, school districts or other similar districts, it being the intention to include within the term "governmental users and consumers" all tax-supported institutions owned or operated directly or indirectly by said governments and branches or subdivisions thereof, such as schools, colleges, hospitals, eleemosynary institutions, army or training camps, airports, courthouse, city hall and other institutions of like or similar kind and character. "Industrial users or consumers," as herein used, are those generally and commonly classified as such by Company.

The payment herein provided shall be for the period January 1 to December 31 of the respective year that the payment is made.

SECTION 11. When this franchise ordinance shall have become effective, all previous ordinances of said City granting franchises for gas distribution purposes which were held by Company shall be automatically cancelled and annulled, and shall be of no further force and effect.

(MINIMUM TILLAGE)—Richard Finch is shown standing in sorghum stubble interseeded with rye. The rye was seeded into the sorghum before harvest. The sorghum was harvested and the sorghum stubble and rye were used for winter grazing for cattle. This form of minimum tillage utilized no tillage operation while providing two crops, one for grain and another for grazing. Other methods of minimum tillage are seeding rye in cotton, wheat in grain sorghum, and grain sorghum in wheat. Many other variations may be used.

Basically minimum tillage is a system of farming in which cultivation is limited to those operations essential to produce a crop. In effect, it uses herbicides instead of mechanical methods to control competition. Some of the advantages of minimum tillage are: saves time, lowers production cost, conserves moisture, reduces erosion, gives better seeding survival, increases land use opportunity, gives higher net profits, improves soil structure, and increases wildlife food and cover.

Q—My present husband has adopted my daughter whose father died from injuries suffered in World War II. Does this make her ineligible for schooling under VA's Dependents' Educational Assistance program?

A—No. Adoption does not affect her eligibility which is based on her father's death from service-connected causes.

Q—I receive \$25 monthly VA compensation for a 10 percent service-connected disability, while my brother receives \$20 monthly for his 10 percent disability. Why?

A—You receive the \$25 monthly compensation because your disability was incurred during wartime. Apparently, your brother's compensation is for a peacetime disability, which is 80 percent of the wartime rate or, in his case, \$20.

Wheat Field Day At Bushland Thursday

The latest in research studies and ideas for practical application will be highlighted at a Wheat Field Day slated for Thursday, May 25 at Bushland.

The afternoon program will begin at 1:30 p.m. at the USDA Southwestern Great Plains Research Center, according to County Agricultural Agent Ronald Gooch.

A two-hour field tour will include wheat improvement plots, new varieties, tansy mustard control and irrigation studies. In addition, visitors can see testing being done with triticale and male-sterile wheat-rye crosses, as well as small grains for forage in the High Plains. These include wheat, rye, barley, oats, triticale and agroticum.

Wheat production with minimum tillage and rainfall conservation cultural practices will also be covered.

"Although the dryland plots show the effects of extreme drought stress, the irrigated varieties and selections look very good," says Dr. Frank Petr, Extension area agronomist at Amarillo.

The field day is being sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, the Agricultural Research Service of the USDA, the Texas Wheat Producers Association and the Panhandle Economic Program.
