

An often overlooked problem is that cute little animals will come unmanageable, especially during the breeding season.

GMOs Authorized To Remove Trotlines

Trotline fishermen had better start carrying three-month cal endars around in their pockets. An angler who checks his lines after they have been set for 90 days and finds them missing shouldn't accuse his fishing buddy of pilfering.

As of July 22, Parks and Wildlife game management officers have the authority to remove all freshwater trotlines which have been in place for over 30 days and those which are undated.

Trotliners are required by law to tag their lines with name and address of the owner and the date the line was set and to redate them after 90 days. The tags must be of a material

at least as durable as the trotlines itself.

Kunkel stated that recent research in the Department of Agricultural Economics and Rural Sociology showed that imports for the last half of this year would have to increase 20 percent over the first half to reduce choice cattle prices a penny a pound. Choice steer prices were about 38 cents per pound in the first week of July.

The 20 percent increase would amount to only one pound of namburger per person over the next six months.

The greatest effect of the imports will be on manufacturing peef - the kind used in hamourgers, hot dogs and other processed products, he said. Nations such as Australia and New Zealand export only the lower grades of beef to the United States because the U.S. normally produces enough choice and good grades to meet its own domestic demand.

Also affecting the amount of beef to be imported was the recent temporary suspension of mport tariffs on beef by the European Common Market, Dr. Don Farris of the Department of Agricultural Economics and Rural Sociology said. This suspension, coupled with world denand, may limit the extra a-

Expenses incurred outside the home for the care of a child under 15 (as, for example, in a day care center) may also qualify. However, expenses outside the home are limited to \$200 per month for one child, \$300 for two children or \$400 for three or more children. However, these expenses shall not include educational expenses incurred for a child in the first or higher garde.

If a deduction is claimed for the care of a disabled dependent, the deduction must be reduced by the amount by which the total of the dependent's adjusted gross income and any nontaxable disability payments he receives exceeds \$750. The wood must be dry and free of finishes such as varnish when the preservative is applied, adds the specialist. Four or five brush applications of the preservative at three-to-four-day intervals

will give adequate penetration. All wood in constant contact with the soil is subject to rot, though the heartwood of some species such as cedar, cypress, yellow locust, bois d'arc and mulberry will resist decay for a longer period than others. The outer, lighter-colored part of the tree trunk, called sapwood, is soon destroyed by rot in all spe-
