Local Option Election For Precinct No. 1 To Be Held Next Tuesday

Tuesday, April 11 is the next opportunity for voters of Precinct No. 1 to go to the polls and cast their ballot.

The issue at that time is the Local Option Election. The ballot will read: For or Against the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premise consumption only. Voters may scratch or mark out one statement so that the one remaining will indicate the way you wish to vote.

It is quite evident that if this election carries, there will be another election soon to follow as interested parties in Precincts No. 2 and 4 which includes the downtown area will not want to be discriminated against. This was the same feeling in regard to calling the election for Precinct No. 1 after the City of Howardward went wet a few weeks ago.

To clarify the area which will be involved in this election Tuesday. Permits may be obtained from the area of Super Save to the Clarendon College campus, included the area from Super Save to 8th street and west to the city limits. Also all that area beyond precinct No. 2 to the county line on Highway 287 and along the north side of the county which highway 66 cuts through. Here in town this area includes the public schools, the First Baptist Church and the College Campus. It is the area lying to the west of Super Save and south to 8th Street.

Qualified voters of Precinct No. 1 should go to the polls Tuesday and cast their vote, regardless of the way they want to vote as your vote may be the deciding factor in the issue. This will be a decision of the people as it should be if "A majority is counted."

Precinct No. 1 Clarendon at Old College Bldg., Presiding Judge, Mrs. Nita Shelton.

The polls at each of the above designated polling places shall on said election date be open from 8:00 o'clock a.m. to 7:00 o'clock p.m.

Hedley Voters Elect Officials Saturday

Hedley residents went to the polls Saturday and voted for a City Mayor, three City Aldermen; and two school trustees.

In City elections the incumbents were unopposed. D. E. Boliver received 91 votes for Mayor; Henry Moore received 93 votes, C. L. Taylor 95 votes, and C. D. Walker 93 votes for Aldermen.

There were four candidates for School Trustee. The two incumbents were returned to office with James Potts receiving 124 votes to lead the ticket and J. D. Skaggs 86 votes. Lewis Drum received 23 votes and Kenneth Brinson 25. T. E. Naylor received 42 votes as a write in candidate.

Our correspondent, Mrs. Mabel Bridges, in reporting the results of the elections held Saturday at Hedley said the residents of Hedley asked the following questions:

- Why can't Hedley have a trustee on hospital board?
- Why can't Hedley have a Voting Box for Clarendon Junior College and Donley County Hospital elections?
- Why can't Hedley be notified of all these things that are happening in Donley County in time to vote?
- Over half the Voters in Hedley are people that don't have a way to get to Clarendon to vote but are eligible voters.

New Member Added To College Regents In Sat. Elections

Voters went to the polls last Saturday and in four separate elections, elected one new member to the College Board of Regents and returned all other incumbents.

Clyde L. Price Jr. was elected as the new regent and lead the ticket with 346 votes. Incumbent W. R. Christal received 232 votes, Bright Newhouse 294, Roddy Klinnert 168 votes and Melvin Boothe, President of the Security State Bank at Hedley, received 21 write-in votes.

In the Public School trustee election, Warren Hardin and L. P. (Bud) Moore were re-elected with Hardin receiving 212 votes, Moore 213 votes Roland Shields 133, Doyle Littlefield 98.

In the County School Board election Paul Hancock was re-elected in Precinct 4 with 42 votes and G. W. Estlack was re-elected in Precinct 1 with 74 votes.

In the City Alderman election, all three incumbents were re-elected. Considering no opposition, there was a good vote of confidence cast with Bob Kidd receiving 84 votes, Harold Autry 79 and Dave Croslin 77.

FORMER RESIDENT DIES IN ALVARADO SUNDAY

Word has been received here of the death of Don D. Baker of Alvarado, Texas. Mr. Baker, 79, died suddenly Sunday, April 2, 1972. Funeral services and burial were held there April 3, 1972.

The family lived in Clarendon for a number of years. His brother, Jim Baker, also of Alvarado, died a year to the day of Don's death.

Surviving are his wife; a daughter, Mrs. Betty Blanche Tucker of Amarillo; brothers, D. L. Baker and Harwell Baker of Alvarado, and 4 grandchildren.

DR. SMITH SUES DONLEY COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT IN CROSS ACTION AND COUNTER CLAIM AND THIRD PARTY CLAIM FOR \$900,000

Following the appointment of four new members to the Donley County Hospital Board last Wednesday morning, H. A. Berry of the Law firm of Underwood, Wilson, Sutton, Heare and Berry, Amarillo, on behalf of Dr. George W. Smith, filed a cross action and counter claim and third party claim later the same day, Wednesday, March 29, against the Donley County Hospital District Board and the four members of the board who were replaced, for a total of \$900,000. Replaced Board Members are John Jones, Lloyd Riskey, Ernest Barbee and Earl Wheatley.

In other action in connection with the Hospital Board, the two board members, Jeff Walker and Rev. Milton Jochezt, who were not freeholders (land owners) became qualified to serve on the board when warranty deeds were recorded at 7 p.m. Friday evening, March 31, 1972. Lots 10 and 11, Block 189, City of Clarendon were sold by Chamberlain Motor Co. Inc. Fred E. Chamberlain Jr., President, to Jeff L. Walker Jr. and wife Beth B. Walker for the sum of \$10. Lots 7, 8 and 9, Block 189, were sold by the same firm to Milton H. Jochezt and wife, Wanda Jochezt for \$15, which qualifies them as bonafide land owners.

Cross Plaintiff (Dr. Smith) alleges that at a meeting of the Board of Directors of Donley County Hospital District, held on July 8, 1970, recessed and continued on July 10, 1970, purported action was purporting taken to vacate the position of Superintendent of the Hospital and Administrator and Manager of the Hospital or Hospital District, and to terminate the services of Cross Plaintiff (Dr. Smith) effective July 31, 1970. Cross plaintiff (Dr. Smith) says he is entitled to declaratory judgment ordering, declaring and decreeing that the Board of Directors of Donley County Hospital District were and are bound by the contract and were and are without right to terminate cross plaintiff's (Dr. Smith's) position (manager of the hospital) thereunder.

He then asked, among other things for the court to hold that the cross defendant (Donley County Hospital District) had no right and has no right to terminate cross plaintiff's (Dr. Smith's) rights under such contract, nor to terminate cross plaintiff's (Dr. Smith's) position (manager of the hospital) thereunder.

Cross plaintiff (Dr. Smith) further prays that he have a redress of and from cross defendant (Donley County Hospital District) his damages, (\$300,000) and that he recover all costs of suit.

Dr. Geo. W. Smith says as a result of the aforesaid acts or attempted acts of defendant (The Hospital District,) cross plaintiff (Dr. Smith) has been at least temporarily deprived of his position as provided for under such contract, by law and by the legal adoption of said contract by cross defendants, (the Hospital District), and has been deprived of earnings since July 31, 1970, and otherwise damaged in an amount not less than Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) and if cross defendant (the Hospital District) is permitted to continue to disregard its obligations to cross plaintiff, (Dr. Smith) as hereinabove alleged, cross plaintiff (Dr. Smith) will be damaged in the future in an amount not less than Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000.00).

If such contract is upheld by the courts, it provides the following:

- The party of the first part (the Hospital District) is to pay to the party of the second part (Dr. Smith) for the operation and maintenance of the hospital the sum equal to the sum total of the amount received and collected by Donley County and the City of Clarendon each year, including delinquent tax payments, on the above mentioned lots, on the \$100.00 valuation, such sum to be placed at the disposal of the party of the second part at the end of each month that the same is received. From the proceeds received by the party of the second part, the party of the second part shall make necessary improvements to the building, shall make repairs and maintain the buildings, grounds, and equipment, shall pay all utility bills, shall pay for all equipment and supplies that the party of the second part (Dr. Smith) may deem necessary, shall pay the salaries of all hospital personnel, and all hazard and liability insurance on the property in such amount as may be agreed upon between the parties hereto, but it is expressly agreed and understood that the party of the second part (Dr. Smith) is not limited to the above mentioned items but the party of the second part is further authorized to expend such sum of money in any manner as he may deem necessary for the operation and maintenance of the hospital.
- The earnings from the operation of the hospital are to be used as a supplement to the tax fund as herein mentioned for purposes of paying operating and maintenance expenses of the hospital insofar as the same may be needed, but out of the excess of said earnings, if any, after paying such operating and maintenance expenses, and as a consideration to the party of the second part for the performance of duties as manager of the hospital, the party of the second part shall be paid the sum of \$12,000.00 per year or so much thereof as funds available will permit, such year to be computed from October 1st to October 1st. In computing earnings available for such purpose, computation shall be made on a cash receipts and cash disbursements basis.
- As part of the consideration and conditions of this contract for the party of the second part performing his duties as manager of the said hospital, it is distinctly understood and agreed that the party of the second part may make full use of all the hospital buildings, equipment, grounds, personnel, and facilities in his private practice of medicine and surgery without charge to him.
- At the sole discretion of the party of the second part, the party of the second part may make available the facilities of the hospital to any other licensed medical doctor or dentist of his choosing. . . .
- It is understood and agreed by and between the parties hereto that any tax money that is paid to the party of the second part is and shall be construed to be separate and apart from any well-kept funds or other funds of like nature of both the City of Clarendon and Donley County, and the party of the second part is neither obligated nor expected by the party of the first part to place any patient or patients in the hospital at his expense, or to provide the facilities of the hospital because tax money is used therefor, or because any proper public authority may inquire any person to be an indigent or welfare patient, and any expense of any indigent or welfare patient as may be so adjudged by the proper authorities shall be paid by such public authority to the extent of their customary authority or limits.

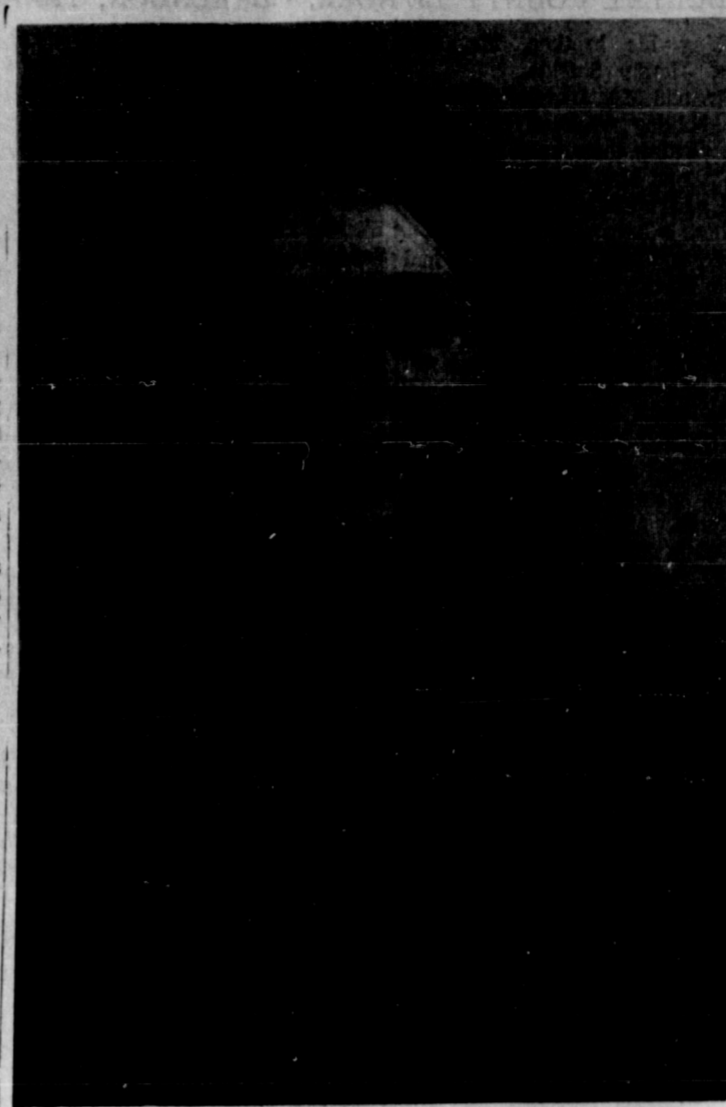

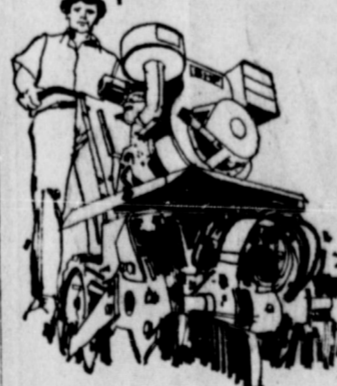

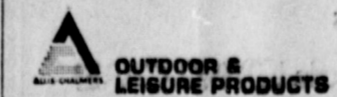

Highlights and Sidelights From Your State Capitol

State lawmakers polished off billboard control and primary election finance legislation in a three-day special session — and added far-reaching procedural reform rules for good measure. They will be back to work in June on budget and tax matters. In their "mini-session," the legislators — many anxious to get back to the campaign trails — sought these accomplishments: They provided for emergency state financing of the May and June primary elections and set aside \$2 million to pay the bills. Another long-term primary finance measure will be necessary next year.

They moved to meet federal highway beautification requirements by outlawing billboards within 660 feet of major highways and providing for screening of junkyards. The measure will cost the state about \$5 million a year in condemnation costs for five years. But it will prevent a \$24 million loss of federal highway construction funds for non-compliance with regulations.

Both House and Senate adopted joint rules including sharp limitations on powers of conference committees to write new legislative matters without majority permission.

The House also accepted rules installing a limited seniority system for committee assignments, reducing the number of committees from 46 to 25 and providing for electronic recording of House and committee proceedings. Legislators also made Texas the eighth state to ratify a proposed federal constitutional amendment guaranteeing equal legal rights for women.

Highlight of the opening day was election of Rep. Rayford Price, 35, of Palestine as new speaker of the House. Price won 77-65 over Rep. L. Dewitt Hale of Corpus Christi. He succeeds Rep. Gus Mutschers of Brenham who resigned after his conviction for bribery conspiracy.

ALLOWABLE ADJUSTED — Texas Railroad Commission decided to hold the oil allowable for the big East Texas Field to 96 per cent during April instead of the 100 per cent fixed for the rest of the state. An increase for the East Texas Field was postponed pending completion of a study.

Chairman Byron Tunnell said the nation has "far too much stake" in East Texas "to risk reservoir damage through excessive production rates."

For the first time since 1948, the Commission fixed a 100 per cent production factor for this month.

COURTS SPEAK — Major sections of Texas vagrancy laws were held unconstitutional by the State Court of Criminal Appeals which said the act makes it a crime to be unemployed or poor. Texas Supreme Court declined to order two aspiring candidates'

names placed on the May primary ballots. One failed to post a filing fee or petition of candidacy. Another was refused a ballot position because he was already a member of a utility district board.

The High Court set for May 10 a hearing on an appeal involving the City of Amarillo's power to tax a Masons' Lodge building and three lots owned by the order.

AG OPINIONS — Texas Air Control Board can pay court costs in civil penalty pollution-control suits from its operating expense fund, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded: It is unlawful to hunt deer with dogs in Shelby County.

Texas National Guardsmen from other states are eligible for resident student tuition status in state-supported colleges and universities.

A person who holds a voter registration certificate is eligible for a junior college district trustee office if he lives in the district.

A criminal conviction for traffic violations would not qualify as a "hearing" subjecting a person to requirements of the Texas Motor Vehicle Safety-Responsibility Act.

The legislature cannot appropriate funds to pay primary election expenses incurred by local political parties in the past.

INSURANCE HEARING PUT OFF — A scheduled March 29 hearing by the State Insurance Board on a proposed increase in home insurance was indefinitely postponed amid talk of compromise.

Board Chairman Larry Teaver sought a year's delay in applying a rating factor providing for rate additions due to inflation and rising construction costs. He had been out-voted by two other Board members on postponing use of the inflation factor.

"The Board is taking a thorough look at all of the factors involved with rating and working toward solutions to complex and complicated problems that arise when considering rate adjustments," Teaver said. He earlier contended the Board's refusal to suspend the inflation trend factor would cost Texans an additional \$27 million in premiums next year, when a \$14 million reduction could have been under his own recommendations.

TRAFFIC TOLL REVEALED — A total of 3,594 persons died in Texas motor vehicle accidents during 1971, according to Texas Department of Public Safety tabulations.

DPS Director Col. Wilson E. Speir said the death toll represents a one per cent increase over 1970, when 3,560 died on the streets and highways. Speir noted that vehicle miles driven increased from 68 billion in 1970 to more than 70.7 billion for 1971 — a four per cent rise in driving. At the same time, the number of licensed Texas drivers rose by nearly 324,000 to a total of almost seven million.

The death rate per 100 million miles of travel actually decreased three per cent from 5.2 in 1970 to 5.1 in 1971, Speir said. The death rate in 1966 was 6.2. Of the 3,594 deaths in 1971, 2,184 occurred on rural roadways and 1,410 in urban areas. There were 2,993 fatal accidents and 394,166 total accidents last year. Speeding and driving while intoxicated were listed as primary violations in fatal mishaps.

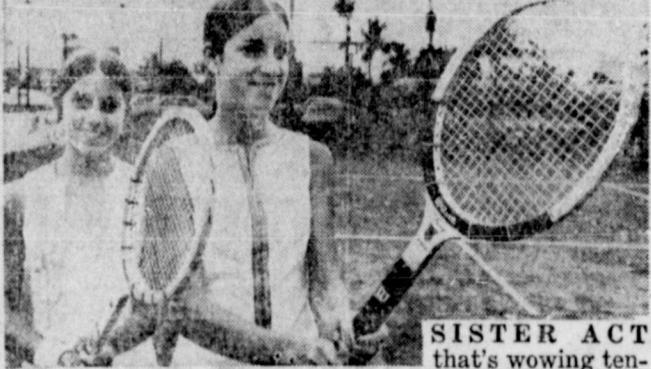

"He did not comment on the ethical aspects of a state official's accepting a stock tip of that sort — perhaps, because Martin, as attorney general, had ruled in favor of Sharp on a key legal issue about Sharpstown State Bank only two and one half years before Sharp made the stock offer to Martin."

"Martin's ruling had the effect of increasing the bank's capitalization dramatically and thus its ability to make large loans, ultimately giving Sharp the financial resources he used in the manipulations charged by the SEC."

"As you know, hundreds of Texans lost their life savings because of Sharp's stock manipulations and it probably wouldn't have happened but for Atty. Gen. Martin's legal opinion."

"Don't you agree, it's time for a change in the office of attorney general of Texas?"

Just so you'll know what you'd be changing to, I'd like to tell you a little about John Hill, I'm a native Texas, grew up in Wink and Kilgore, was national debate champion at Kilgore Junior College and graduated from the University of Texas Law School. Inside The Legislature with

Rep. Tom Christian

Rep. Tom Christian, today, applauded the accomplishments of the Second Called Session of the 62nd Texas Legislature.

"In three short days the Texas Legislature elected a new Speaker, passed emergency legislation, and in my opinion, passed for the first time in history much needed rules reform."

"Under the capable leadership of Speaker Rayford Price the House voted to limit the powers of conference committees, to put an end to additions and deletions

in legislation without the knowledge of the House, to reduce the number of committees from 46 to 25, to create a limited seniority system to promote expertise within the committees, and to record the proceedings of all committees and make them public record," Christian said.

Rep. Christian further stated, "The discharge of three committees — Appropriations, House Administration and Revenue and Taxation — will take the business of appropriations and administration and Revenue and Taxation — will take the business of appropriations and administration out of the hands of Bill Healy and Tommy Shannon and put it back into the hands of the full committees."

Shannon was recently convicted, along with former Speaker Gus Mutscher, of bribery conspiracy.

"The most meaningful reform comes in the rule which provides that the appropriations bill be presented to the full membership of the House at least seven days before a vote is taken," Christian said.

"When the Healy - Mutscher team controlled the House, the appropriations bill was drawn in secret and not made available to the members of the House until the final minutes of a session. Members never knew what it contained until it was too late . . ."

"Another safeguard of the public's right to know, is a provision that requires that public

hearings be held for the Appropriations Bill with notice to be posted prior to time of the hearing," he said.

Christian said, "I am pleased with the recognition of the Republican delegation as a force to be dealt with. The votes of nine members of the GOP delegation made the difference in the victory and defeat for reform in the leadership of this legislative body. By voting as a bloc we were able to swing the election to Price, the conservative, and away from the liberal-Mutscher faction led by Rep. Dewitt Hale of Corpus Christi.

"I feel that we are moving in the direction of real reform in our Legislature. We must continue this positive action until we have restored the faith of the people

of Texas in their government." Christian, who has supported Speaker Price since his break with Mutscher two sessions ago, was named to serve on the Escort Committee to seat the new Speaker and to remain on the rostrum for swearing-in ceremonies.

3,594 Persons In Traffic Accidents

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today the final tabulation of 1971 motor vehicle traffic accidents shows that 3,594 persons died last year on Texas streets and highways. An additional 121,082 were injured and the total economic loss was

\$1.045 billion.

"The death figure of 3,594 represents a 1% increase over the 1970 toll of 3,560. Actually, with all factors considered, the rise in deaths could have been greater," Speir said.

"For example, vehicle miles driven increased from 68 billion in 1970 to over 70.7 billion for 1971. This represents a rise in total driving of 4%. From another standpoint, the number of licensed Texas drivers rose by nearly 324,000 during the past 12 months to a total near 7 million.

"Despite these sizeable increases in both miles driven and numbers of drivers, actual deaths increased only slightly. This means that our death rate per 100 million miles of travel — the nationally accepted indicator

of traffic safety effectiveness — decreased 3% from 5.2 in 1970 to 5.1 in 1971. As recently as 1966, our death rate in Texas was 6.2 so progress is being made," the DPS director added.

Of the 3,594 deaths, 2,184 occurred on rural roadways and 1,410 in urban areas. There were 2,993 fatal accidents and total accidents reported for 1971 was 394,166.

Speir said driving too fast for conditions and driving while intoxicated continued as the primary law violations contributing to fatal mishaps. Other major violations included driving on the wrong side of the roadway and failure to yield the right-of-way.
