Golden Spread Marketing Assoc. organized

The Golden Spread Marketing Association has been organized and is now in business to help the producers with the marketing of their cotton. This organization has been established by the farmers, for the farmers, for the purpose of giving the producer more control and more leverage in marketing their product. The Board of Directors are Bill Mooring, President; Bob Cole, Vice President; Mike Newhouse, Secretary-Treasurer; and David McAnear and Don Robinson, Directors.

The Association is owned strictly by the producers and the only requirement to be a member is a \$100.00 one-time initial membership fee. If the association doesn't

get the best price, the farmer is out no cost whatsoever. This fee may be paid when the producer markets his first cotton through the association. This organization, being farmer owned, will also pay dividends back to the members if a profit is made.

All this association wants to do is have the chance to work with the farmers cotton and try to sell it for the best possible price. It is time for the farmers to regain control over the marketing end of his product, and if more money per bale can be obtained the farmer will profit from it.

Highway construction approved in Donley County

Highway construction on U.S. 287 in Donley County has been approved by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission in Austin according to Childress District Engineer Lewis H. White.

Plans call for overlaying the south bound lanes of U.S. 287 between the Armstrong County line and S.H. 70 in Clarendon with two inches asphaltic concrete paving. Length of project is 12 miles.

The work was approved on the statewide 1985-1986 Rehabilitation Program (Section B).

A seal coat was recently constructed on this same section in

preparation for the new paving. The seal coat will seal pavement cracks and prevent damaging water from reaching the pavement foundation materials and extend the life of the proposed new paving.

The new overlay will restore a smooth ride and add several more years of acceptable service.

Current plans call for a February, 1985, letting with the work to start next summer.

The estimated cost of the improvements is \$1,700,000.

Construction will be supervised by Glenn W. McLain of Wellington.

Drive careful during the holiday

Major Vernon Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Department of Public Safety said today, "Based on past holiday experience, we know that numerous persons will lose their lives and hundreds will be injured on Texas streets and highways during the 1985 New Year's holiday. The Department requests the help and support of the motoring public in reducing this needless waste of human life by observing all traffic laws, especially those regarding speed and alcohol."

Major Cawthon said, "All available DPS Troopers will be on patrol throughout the holiday period in an effort to reduce, both by their presence and actions, violations that could lead to accidents. But it is only through the help and cooperation of the motoring public by their self-

compliance that the needed reduction can be realized."

Major Cawthon stated, "Possibly the most prevalent accidents occurring this period will be the one car run-off-the-roadway type accident which is directly attributed to driver inattention and/or intoxication."

The Major suggested that adequate travel time be budgeted in holiday plans, stop frequently and rest, reduce speed for road conditions and above all, don't mix alcohol and driving. If you drink at a party, let a sober friend drive you home.

"Feel free to request needed assistance from any DPS Trooper during your holiday travels. Let's all do our part to reduce to zero all holiday traffic deaths," Major Cawthon added.

Holiday tough for diabetics

The holidays, although a happy time of year, pose special problems for people struggling with diabetes, especially those patients who are under tight control, according to Howard Graitzer, D.O., of the Texas College of Osteopathic Medicine in Dallas.

Diabetes is a condition in which the body does not produce enough insulin to help utilize the sugars that are eaten. In fact, an estimated 6 million people have the disease and don't know it. In the earlier stages there are no symptoms. A blood test and urinalysis or typical signs and symptoms are used to diagnose the disease. If not controlled early, however, the risk of complications later in life are greatly increased in most patients. Some of these complications include blindness, kidney failure and blood vessel disease.

Control of diabetes consists of keeping a balance between sugar, daily activities and insulin so that the body can function properly. To keep this balance, strictly controlled diabetic patients must monitor and adjust their diets, daily activities and insulin intake rigorously.

"This can be very difficult, especially during the holiday season,"

explained Dr. Graitzer. "We find a lack of compliance around the holiday time. Peer pressure and the temptation of traditional foods make it difficult for the diabetic patient, who must eat specific foods at specific times."

Patients under tight control must check their blood sugar by drawing blood using a self-test kit four to eight times a day, and on some occasions through the night. "It takes a team approach -- the patient, the doctor and the dietitian -- working together to help the patient maintain as close to normal blood sugar level as is possible without bringing it dangerously low and increasing the risk of hypoglycemia."

Because of the seriousness of future complications, Dr. Graitzer feels that the strict control approach can be beneficial for the 25 percent of the diabetic patients who are physically, emotionally and financially able to undertake it. Dr. Graitzer added that such control cannot reverse the complications after they set in, but it appears mainly helpful as a preventive measure.

For this reason, strict adherence to the program is necessary. The holiday season may weaken the resolve. "Diabetes is so insidious. The damage occurs gradually over the years so that patients think they can cheat for a while as long as they bring their blood sugar levels back into balance later. This just isn't the case. The long-term problems of diabetes are going to be faced later on," Dr. Graitzer warned.

Student-Athlete Henson honored

Brent Henson is the kind of student-athlete the University of New Mexico is finding more and more of - a football linebacker who hits the books as hard as he hits quarterbacks.

Tuesday night, Henson took top scholastic honors at UNM's Athletic Advisement Banquet. A four-year letterman and a 3.1 grade-point student in electrical engineering, he

is the Lobos' Western Athletic Conference Scholarship Medal winner for the 1983-84 academic year.

Athletes from all sports in both the men's and women's programs were recognized at Tuesday night's banquet, presided over by Tom Brennan, assistant athletic director for academic advisement.

Brennan pointed out that the average grade point of UNM men athletes during the '83-84 school year was slightly under 2.5, just a shade below the GPA for men

students. The average GPA for women athletes was 2.8, which is actually better than the overall women's average.

"We're very happy with the progress we're making in this very important area," Brennan said.

Other major awards went to the Lobo cross country program which had the highest team GPA at UNM for both men and women (2.8 for the men, 3.0 for the women).

Coaches Del Hessel and Mike MacEachen said they took as much, if not more, pride in the scholastic

progress made by their teams as in athletic improvement.

"When I came here four years ago," Hessel said, "there were 17 athletes in the men's cross country and track programs. Twelve of them had less than a 2.0 grade point. I'm proud of the improvement our athletes have made; this is the most important award they'll ever win."

Henson, a fifth-year senior from Gallup, has been playing football almost as long as he's been in school. Through the years, he's learned how to successfully combine the two.

"We have meetings and practice about four hours a day during the season," he said, describing a typical week during the fall. "I have classes in the morning, and week-

ends we're either traveling or locked away somewhere (sequestered before a game). For studying, that just leaves nights and Sundays. It doesn't leave much time for a social life, either.

"There's a lot more time after football season is over, but it seems like you budget your time a lot better during the season."

Now, with his injury-plagued but highly successful career on the football field behind him, Henson plans to graduate in May and find a job in his academic field.

"It's a strange feeling to be done with football," he said. "Starting with little league, I've been playing for 15 years now. But I guess you've got to get on with your life."

Brent Henson is the grandson of Leona Henson and the late Gracie Henson.

1984 PAYMENT-IN-KIND WHEAT

The final date to obtain your 1984 PIK wheat was November 30, 1984. The storage stopped on this date. If you want to wait until the first of next year to pick up this wheat you will have to come in and sign a request to do so.

ACREAGE CONSERVATION RESERVE [ACR] NON-GRAZING DATES

The 1985 program will bring a change pertaining to the grazing of your ACR acres. In the past we have had a 6-month non-grazing period; this will be changed to 5-months for the 1985 crop year. The dates for the non-grazing period will be May 5th through October 14th.

1984 PRODUCTION EVIDENCE AND PROVEN YIELDS

March 1, 1985 is the final date to furnish production evidence and request a proven yield for wheat and feed grains.

April 1, 1985 is the final date for cotton production to be furnished on farms which production is sold or stored off of the farm.

PAYMENT LIMITATION

For 1985, as in the past years, the \$50,000.00 payment limitation applies to the total deficiency and diversion payments for the 1985 crop year. Except that any 1985 wheat deficiency payment in excess of \$0.83 per bushel is not subject to the limitation.

All corporations, partnerships, estates and trusts will soon receive questionnaires from this office concerning 1985 payments. Please return these as soon as possible so that this office can make applicable determinations that may be needed.

1985 FARM PROGRAM SIGN-UP

Sign-up for the 1985 farm program will continue through March 1, 1985. Program participation is required for program benefits such as loans, deficiency and diversion payments. You may request advance diversion and deficiency payments equal to 1/2 the projected payment rates, upon sign-up.

PUBLIC COMMENTS SOUGHT

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is holding a public meeting in Washington, D.C., on December 12, 1984 to consider recommendations by state and county review groups concerning agriculture conservation, pollution control and forestry programs. The public is invited to submit comments and suggestions. For additional information, write to the Director of the Conservation and Environmental Protection Division, ASCS, P.O. Box 2415, Washington, D.C. 20013.

AGRICULTURE FOREIGN INVESTMENT DISCLOSURE ACT

Foreign persons who acquire or transfer any interest, other than a security interest in U.S. agriculture land must report within 90 days of such transactions to the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. Foreign persons are required to keep direct and indirect ownership current, report to USDA if they cease to be a foreign person, and if the land ceases to be agricultural. Severe penalties may be assessed for failure to report timely.

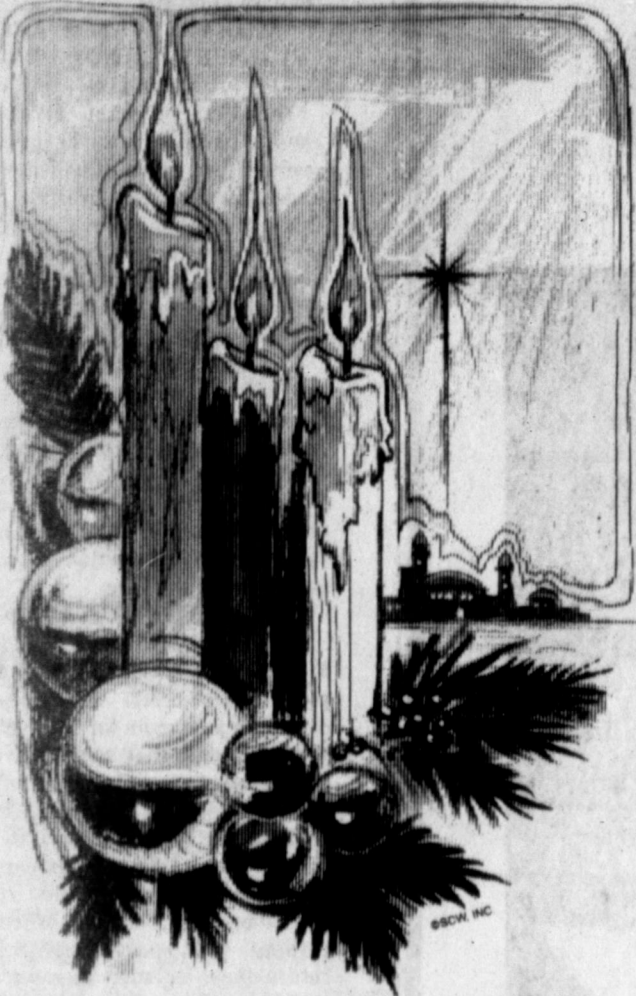

State paid \$59.7 million to outside consultants last year

State Comptroller Bob Bullock released a special state financial report Wednesday showing state agencies paid \$59.7 million last year for professional advise from outside consultants.

"Texans may think all their tax dollars go to pay a bunch of bureaucrats in Austin," Bullock said. "But slices of the state's budget pie went to almost 16,000 private consultants last year for their expert advise in specialized fields."

More than 60 percent -- or \$37 million -- of the state's outside consultation spending went for engineering, medical and architectural services, Bullock said. Engineering advise for projects including road and bridge construction and water resources cost the state \$15.4 million last year, while medical services cost \$13.2 million and architectural fees were \$8.4.

Most medical expenses were for worker's compensation and most architectural work went for prison construction projects. Advise on education cost \$3.2 million and outside legal help billed the state \$2.3 million.

"Ten state agencies accounted for almost 60 percent -- or \$35.1 million -- in state dollars for professional services in 1984," Bullock said.

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation led the list, paying \$14.7 million for outside consultants, followed by the Department of Corrections, \$4.3 million, and the Attorney General, \$4.1 million. For eight of the top 10 spenders, outside professional help cost less than 5 percent of their overall state budgets.

Payments for professional services added up to less than one percent of the state's 1984 spending, Bullock said, with the average consultant contract costing the state \$3,679.

SWCD still taking orders for trees

Stanley Altman with the Donley County Soil and Water Conservation District wishes to remind farmers and ranchers in Donley County that now is the time to order trees for planting this spring. Some of the tree varieties have already been sold out. Some of the other varieties are nearly all committed.

These trees will be delivered about the middle of March. They would like for you to come by 416 S. Kearney and order the trees you will need as soon as possible so that you will be assured of the trees you want.

Remember, trees can save you money by protecting young tender crops and by protecting your home and barns from those cold north winds and by shading these same buildings from the sun in the summer time. These things can save you dollars on your fuel bills each year.

Dropping oil prices causing shortfall in state revenues

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Tuesday he would be forced to lower his estimate of state revenues by more than \$250 million unless world oil prices improve.

"We've just finished our latest look at the state's revenue picture," Bullock said. "If I had to tell the Legislature today what they can expect, I would say their revenue shortfall is \$900 million, not \$640 million as expected."

Bullock emphasized his revenue cut is not yet official but will be official in January unless conditions change for the better.

"I'll wait until the Legislature gets here in January to add up all the totals. But I'm telling them today, as early as I possibly can, what they'll be facing if the price of oil on the

world spot market doesn't pick up between now and then.

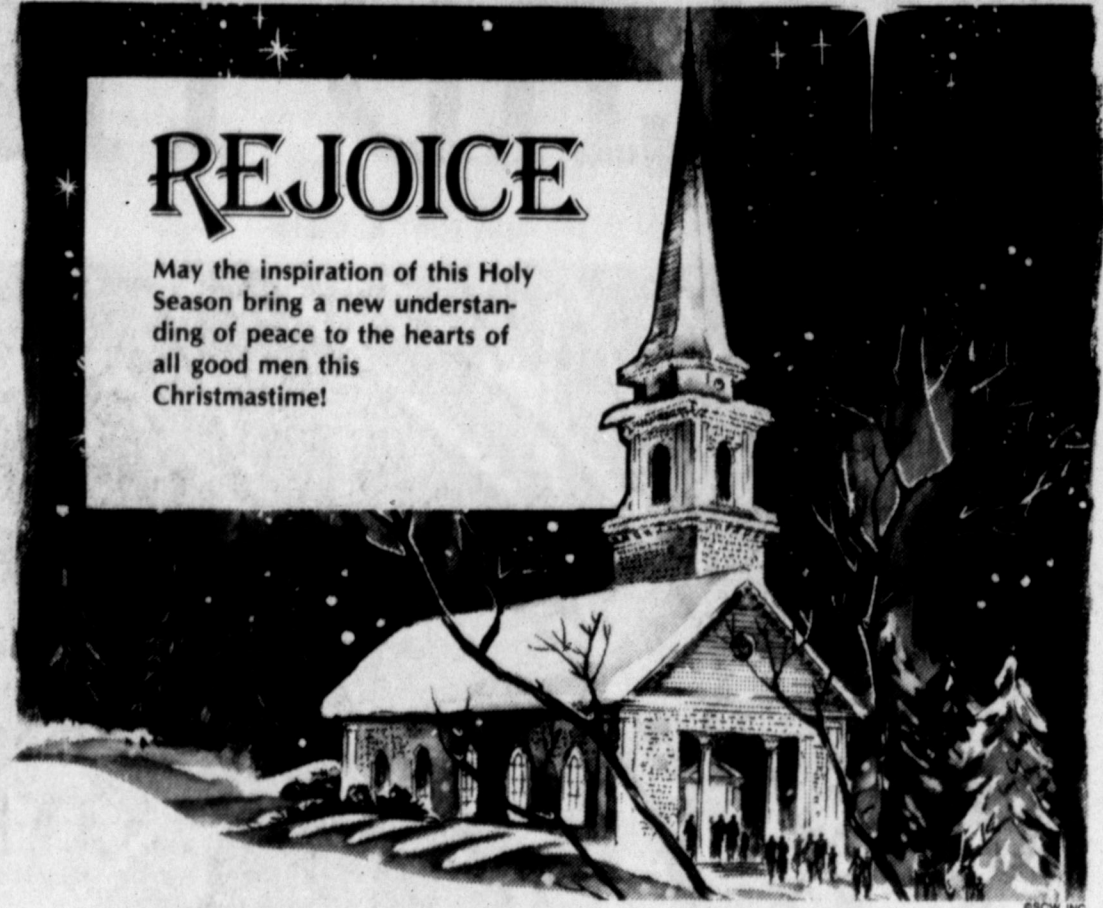
"I know this is bad news. I know it is going to be hard for the agencies and the Legislators to live with. I know the members have heard from

their constituents why this program or that program needs more money. But all I can tell them is we're scraping the bottom of a \$25 barrel of oil and it might even get worse before it gets better."

Know Your Traffic Laws

Of the 254 counties in Texas, 105 recorded an increase in motor vehicle traffic accidents during 1983 as compared with 1982.

Of all the persons killed in passenger cars, trucks and buses during 1983, 97.8% were not wearing seat belts when the fatal accident occurred. Statistics show that the chances of being killed in an accident during 1983 were nearly four times as great for persons not wearing seat belts as for those wearing seat belts.

More fatal motor vehicle traffic accidents statewide occur Saturday, between the hours of 12 midnight and 1 a.m. than any other hour of the day or night. For 1983 there were 737 deaths statewide during that hour.

Any person who defaces, injures, knocks down or removes any sign, posted as provided in this Act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor...It is punishable by a fine of not more than two hundred dollars (\$200) for the first conviction.

Persons owning a motor vehicle which is used on the City, County or State Highways must have a safety inspection sticker. This sticker must be renewed by a state qualified inspector.

The driver of a motor vehicle shall, when following another vehicle, maintain an assured clear distance between the two vehicles, exercising due regard for speed of such vehicles, traffic upon and conditions of the street or highway, so that such motor vehicle can be safely brought to a stop without colliding with the preceding vehicle, or veering into other vehicles, objects or persons on or near the street or highway.

Recalling the days of an old-fashioned Christmas

Can you remember the aroma of candles burning on the Christmas tree? If so, you have some precious memories of a bygone era, the time of the old-fashioned Christmas.

Most of us have only handed-down stories to evoke that special bit of Americana. According to these reminiscences, here is what Christmas was like many years ago:

Dashing through the snow in a one-horse open sleigh was not just a song, it was a very real experience during the holiday season, with harness bells jingling away as you crossed fields blanketed with snow.

At home, the old wood stove would be hard at work. Maybe mother would be making a batch of candy or baking some of her delicious holiday cookies.

There was wood to be brought in for the stove and fireplace; that was brother's job, while sister helped in the kitchen.

There was the tree — a real fir, pine or spruce tree — decorated with strings of popcorn made from home-

grown corn, apples from the orchard, and handmade paper cones.

Even shopping was a special treat in those days; the wood stove in the local store would give out its warmth and spices in open bins would give off their wonderful aroma. On the counter, there were jars of colored candies to entice the youngsters.

On Christmas Eve, church bells would summon the faithful to special services; or perhaps there would be a Christmas play performed.

In the morning, there were gifts to open, gifts that had been fashioned by hand. There might be a hand-carved whistle, hand-knit socks, or carefully embroidered handkerchiefs. Whatever the gift, you knew it had been made with love and received it in that spirit.

Later that Christmas Day, the family would gather in the kitchen, the biggest room in the house, at a long table burdened with holiday foods. There would be Christmas turkey or ham or goose, pies that had been baked the day before, as well as special holiday



bread.

After dinner, the youngsters would take their sleds to coast down snowy slopes; or, they might head for the

pond with their ice skates.

At the end of the day, visiting uncles and aunts and cousins would pile into a sleigh or bobsled as the horses

stamped their feet and shook their harnesses. And off they would go, shouting goodnight and "Merry Christmas" under the Christmas stars.



Wassail bowl

If you give the customary toast at holiday time, you are carrying on a tradition going back hundreds of years, to the wassail bowl.

At that time, the daughter of a Germanic chieftain offered a gold cup filled with wine to the host of a reception held in her father's honor. She told the host, "Waes hael hlaeford Cyning," or "Be of health, Lord King."

The practice of drinking a wassail quickly became popular. Those who could not afford the fine wines of nobility used hot oil, sugar, nutmeg and ginger, topped with toasted bread. Gradually, a drink to one's health became known as a toast!

Rosemary bush

The herb, rosemary, has been associated with Christmas for centuries. Legend has it that on the way to Egypt, Mary washed the Baby Jesus' clothes and spread them over a rosemary bush to dry in the sun.

That is how the rosemary bush got its lovely fragrance, according to the legend.

The Yule log

The yule log ceremony originated in Scandinavia, according to scholars. In ancient celebrations of the solstice, huge logs were blessed and burned in the hope that they would forever bring light, warmth and comfort.

The land of Jesus' birth, then and now

"O little town of Bethlehem, how still we see thee lie..."

Bethlehem! The very word calls to mind an image of verdant pastures and sheep grazing under shepherds' watchful eyes...dusty streets trod by donkeys laden with water jugs...and whitewashed dwellings clustered about the village well.

Here it was that Ruth gleaned barley in the fields belonging to Boaz. It was here that the young David tended his father's sheep and where he was anointed king of Israel.

In the time of Jesus, Bethlehem was just a small village in the province of Judea. Yet the prophet Micah foresaw its future eminence. Had he not prophesied, "But thou, Bethlehem Ephratah, though thou be little among the thousands of Judah, yet out of thee shall he come forth unto me that is to be ruler in Israel; whose goings forth have been from of old, from everlasting."

This prophecy and the Star of Bethlehem led the Wise Men to the place where Jesus lay. Today, the towers of many faiths dominate the landscape, just as the star must have on that night almost 2000 years ago. And, instead of Three Wise Men, thousands of pilgrims will descend upon the town where the Savior was born.

But, instead of a humble stable, they will find a basilica built over the cave where Mary and Joseph are said to have found shelter. A silver star marks the exact spot where Jesus is believed to have been born. Fifteen lamps surround it, donated by various Christian communities; demonstrating that here, in the land of Jesus' birth, differences fall away before a common faith.

Most pilgrims to the Holy Land will

also travel to Galilee, where the town of Nazareth lies. Although the distance between the towns is short by today's standards, in the time of Mary and Joseph, the journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem must have been a hardship for them — especially for the young woman, heavy with child. As it was, Jews resented the census greatly; it was a humiliating reminder of their subservience to Rome.

When Jesus lived in Nazareth, the countryside was composed of wooded hills, each with its little plain. Galilee was one of the most beautiful of the provinces. In fact, Galileans were suspected of being too easy-going and not strict enough in observing the laws; perhaps this was attributed to their pleasant surroundings.

Here, in Nazareth, the growing Jesus would become familiar with such commonplace sights as the fig trees, the mustard plants, and fields of grain, all of which he would draw upon later in his parables.

Since it was the practice for sons to follow in their father's trade, undoubtedly Joseph trained the young Jesus to be a carpenter, like himself. He probably taught Jesus the Sh'ma: "Here, O Israel, The Lord our God is One lord; and you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul and with all your might."

As the Bible reveals, Mary and Joseph were devout Jews, following the traditions of their ancestors. In accordance with Jewish custom, they traveled to Jerusalem every year at the Feast of the Passover.

What an impression that city must have made on the young Jesus! It was the holy city to all believing Jews, the

city that God Himself had chosen as the place for His worship. Here was the Temple, the center of Jewish tradition. The psalmist describes the feelings of pilgrims as they went up to the Temple:

"I was glad when they said unto me, Let us go into the house of the Lord.

Our feet shall stand within thy gates, O Jerusalem.

Jerusalem is builded as a city that is compact together;

Whither the tribes go up, the tribes of the Lord, unto the testimony of Israel, to give thanks unto the name of the Lord.

For there are set thrones of judgment, the thrones of the house of David."

Today, only the Western Wall, the Wailing Wall, remains of the Temple. But, visitors can still see the pool of Siloam, where the blind man washed his eyes to regain his sight, as Jesus had told him to do. And, from the Mount of Olives, travelers can look down upon the Holy City, just as Jesus did.

Although Nazareth is no longer the humble village it must have been when Jesus lived there, its narrow, roofed streets and colorful marketplace evoke Biblical times, and today's Galileans still harvest their wheat in much the same manner of their ancestors. Along the shores of the Sea of Galilee, fishermen still cast their nets into the lake, just as Peter, Andrew, James and John must have done.

There have been many changes in the land where Jesus once walked, but the thoughts of Christians will be turning back to that wondrous event that took place there in another time, in a small Judean town called Bethlehem.
