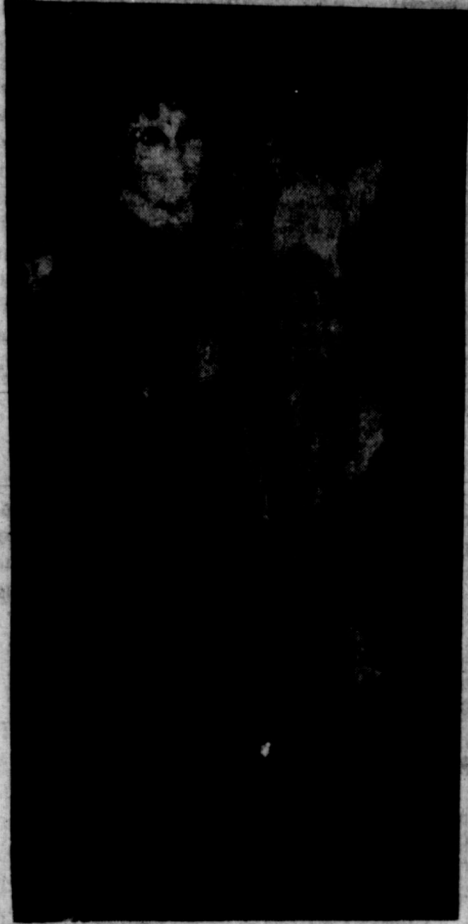

Donley County Junior Livestock Show Begins Jan. 18

The Donley County Junior Livestock Association has finalized plans for the 1985 Donley County Junior Livestock Show.

The FFA and Donley County 4-H youth will combine their exhibitions of lambs, pigs, steers, and heifers.

The show will start Friday, January 18, 1985, with the weigh-in and stalling of animals. The show will be held at the Community Building in Clarendon.

Judge for this year's show will be Herman Boone, Roberts County Agent, Miami, Texas.

Officers of the association are: President, James McAnear, Jr.; Vice President, Mike Smith; Treasurer, Lester Petty; and Secretary, Mitchie Fuston. Don Robinson will be superintendent of the sheep show, Dan Hall and Curtis Schaefer will be superintendents of the swine show, while Jack Moreman and Mike Smith will serve as show superintendents of the steer and heifer shows.

The school schedule will be as follows: Friday afternoon, January 18, weigh-in of animals; Saturday, January 19, starting at 9 a.m., lamb show, followed by the barrow show and breeding swine show, at 1 p.m., beef heifer show followed by the steer show. There will be a concession stand during the show. At 6 p.m. there will be a buyers

Bronco Basketball

Over the Christmas holidays the boys varsity basketball team played three games. On December 28, the Broncos traveled to Gruver and were beaten 43-72. Gruver jumped out to a 18-8 lead in the first quarter and continued to show why they are one of the better class A teams in the panhandle. Dean Cearley led in scoring and rebounding, with 10 and 11 respectively. Stan Garland had a good game coming off the bench scoring 6 points, grabbing 6 rebounds, and getting defensive player of the game.

Saturday, December 29th, the Broncos were dealt a tough loss to the Panhandle Panthers, 45-60. "This game was the most physical game we have played in two years, it seemed every time we turned around they were all over us," said Coach Loveless. The Broncos could only bring down a total of 27 rebounds, one of the lowest totals of the year. Trent Sharp was the "Player of the Game" scoring 22 points and getting defensive player of the game honors. Rodney Smith was the leading rebounder with 9.

The Broncos started the new year on the right step defeating the Hedley Owls 54-44 in Hedley. The Owls jumped out to an early 14-9 lead but the hustling Broncos had the score tied at 23 at halftime. In the third quarter the Bronco defense held Hedley to 4 points and had control of the game. Dean Cearley was the defensive player of the game. Randy Crump led in scoring with 18. Stan Garland and Dean Cearley had 7 rebounds apiece. Stanley Gardner, Randy Crump, and Dean Cearley were the players of the game.

On January 4th and 5th, the Broncos earned the consolation

trophy in the Claude Tournament. In the first game, the Broncos lost a close game to Happy 52-62. "We outscored Happy for 28 minutes of the game, but we had a defensive breakdown for 4 minutes that cost us the game," said Coach Steven Loveless. "We've had this problem of playing with consistency all year and we are starting to come around as a team." Trent Sharp and Randy Crump were the "Players of the Game." Dean Cearley had 11 rebounds and Randy Crump had 10 rebounds and 13 points. Trent Sharp led all scorers with 19 points. Dean Cearley was the "Defensive Player of the Game."

The players that participated were Trent Sharp, 14 points and 6 assists; Wes Hatley, 5 rebounds; Rodney Smith, 6 points; Dean Cearley, 15 points, 8 steals; Randy Crump 22 points, 17 rebounds; Stanley Gardner, 15 points, and Stan Garland, 10 rebounds.

The Broncos will be going into district play with a 6-8 record. The Broncos played in Quanah this past Tuesday and host Wellington this Friday and travel to Memphis, Tuesday, January 15th. Come out and support the tough Bronco basketball team.

YOUR FLOWERS AND PLANTS

Helpful Hints From SAF - The Center For Commercial Floriculture

Q. The other day I saw some white cottony blobs on my coleus. Any idea what they are and how I can get rid of them?



A. From your description, it sounds like mealybugs. This plant pest, appears as white cottony blobs, especially around leaf joints or in crevices. They are tough to control because they are well protected by a water-resistant waxy secretion. They suck the sap of the plant and can stunt and kill it.

The best advice is to be persistent with treatment. To eliminate mealybugs, dab them with diluted rubbing alcohol on a cotton swab. After the bugs die and fall off, wash the plant with warm, soapy water. Then rinse with clear water.

Particularly susceptible to mealybugs are cacti, grape, ivy, coleus, croton, African violet, dracaena, ferns and palms. The quicker you can spot trouble and take appropriate action, the better the results.

• Our bodies cannot distinguish between sugars gotten from fruits, vegetables, milk, honey or confections, according to Dr. Helen A. Guthrie of Pennsylvania State University.

• Chocolate has less caffeine per serving than coffee, tea or soft drinks. A one-and-a-half-ounce chocolate bar contains only nine mg. of caffeine, far below the 450-900 mg. needed for overstimulation, says the American Dietetic Association and the Food and Drug Administration.

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Q: My insurance company refuses
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cident because it was not reported to
the police within 24 hours. A friend
had the identical situation and got
paid by her company. Can my com-
pany refuse to pay?

A: The policy must be read to see
what notice the company requires be-
fore it is liable to the insured. The com-
pany may insist that since you did not
report the accident in time, they were
not able to investigate.

The courts hold fairly strictly against
insurance companies in this sort of dis-
agreement. Your company will have
to pay unless they can prove they were
harmed in some way by your failure to
report immediately to the police.

Q: When can an individual under
normal conditions and circumstances
carry a firearm? Can I carry a fire-
arm from one county to another?

A: A rifle with a barrel length greater
than 16 inches or a shotgun with a bar-
rel length greater than 18 inches may be
generally carried except at a school,
polling place, or court. A handgun may
not be carried on or about your person
unless you are:

1. Working in the armed forces or
for a prison;
2. On your own property;
3. Traveling (generally from your
residence to another county);
4. Hunting, fishing or target
shooting;
5. A peace officer;
6. A licensed security officer in uni-
form at work.

A convicted felon may not possess a
firearm except at home. No one may
possess explosives, machine guns,
sawed-off firearms, silencers, switch-

you and the LAW

Q: How do you go about getting child support from another state? I was awarded child support in Louisiana in 1977 and have never received any of the money. I am a Texas resident now.

A: Under the Uniform Reciprocal Enforcement of Support Act, you may bring suit through your home county to have your ex-husband called before a Louisiana Court. Your first step is to register your out-of-state support order after you have lived here for 6 months. Each county then has a slightly different method of proceeding to notify your ex-husband of the amount due and to initiate the action in the foreign county.

Q: My neighbors are noisy and offensive. One operates a wrecker service out of his home, while another runs a garage. There is a deed restriction prohibiting this type of activity in our subdivision, but both men ignore it. Is there any way I can remedy this situation short of direct confrontation?

A: Property holders may enforce the restrictive covenants by bringing an action for injunctive relief. You may also request a declaratory judgment to determine the validity, applicability or enforceability of the deed restrictions. Finally, you may bring a cause for damages if the injunctive relief of removing the business would be too harsh a remedy. In this type of action, you would assert that your property has been diminished in value by the neighbors' businesses.

Q: My husband and I had foster children. After he died, I adopted the children. On the birth certificates, the father is listed as unknown. Is there any way to add my late husband's name to the certificates?

A: It is very unlikely that the birth certificate can be amended to name

your husband as the children's father. Birth certificates can be amended to add a father's name only after a paternity or legitimation determination is made by a court.

Q: In my husband's will, he is giving specified amounts of money to members of his family. The remainder of his estate will be equally divided between me and his daughter. Is he giving away our entire estate or only 50 percent? Part of the estate is mine, since we have been married many years.

A: Without reading your husband's will, I cannot tell whether he is disposing of what he owns or if he is also giving your share. It is possible, though, for his will to dispose of all property both his and yours. In that case, you will be "Put to an election," which means that you choose between taking under his will or keeping the share of the estate you already own.

Q: Can my former husband be made to pay nearly \$14,000 in back child support even though our son is over 18? We need the money as my son is in college and can't work because he has asthma. Can the father be made to pay lawyer's fees?

A: An action to enforce child support arrearages must be brought within 10 years of the time support is due and before the child reaches 18. Also, an action that attempts to extend child support past 18 because of the child's disability must be brought before the 18th birthday.

Attorney fees could have been requested as part of an enforcement action if the case had been brought in time.

- 1/4 cup chopped parsley
- 1 jar (15 1/4 ounces) Prego No Salt Added Spaghetti Sauce (about 1 3/4 cups)
- 1/4 cup Burgundy wine or water
- 1/4 teaspoon fennel seed
- 1/8 teaspoon garlic powder

1. Cook shells according to package directions. Drain; set aside.
2. In small bowl combine cheeses and parsley. Stuff into shells.
3. In 10-inch skillet over medium heat, combine spaghetti sauce, wine, fennel and garlic. Bring to a boil.
4. Place shells in skillet. Reduce heat to low. Cover; simmer 10 minutes. Spoon sauce over shells. Makes 4 servings.

The J.V. girls played very well throughout the Shamrock Tournament. Their next game will be Friday, January 11 against Wellington in the Clarendon gym.

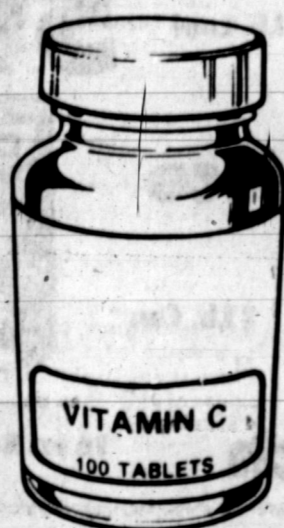
Lady Broncos falter in Claude Tournament

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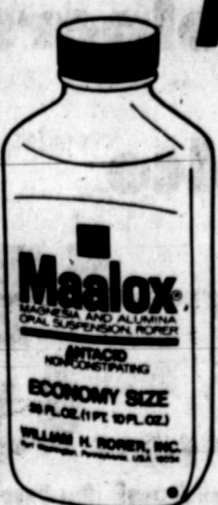


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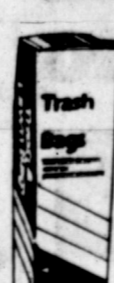
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
