Everyone knows by now who won Super Bowl XIX, but some facts you may not have read according to AP News are:

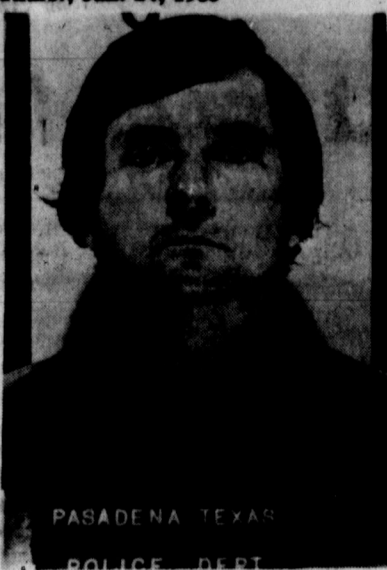
1. There are 49 players on each team. Each man on the winning team received \$36,000. The members of the losing team received \$18,000.

Texas Most Wanted

PASADENA, Texas -- Edward Harold Bell has been running from the law for the past five years.

Bell, now 45 years old, is wanted for Failure to Appear in Court on Charges of Murder and four counts of Indecency with a Child.

This week, Bell has been selected as the first fugitive to be featured as Texas Most Wanted. A \$1,000 reward is being offered by the Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council for information leading to Bell's capture.

A former diesel mechanic, construction worker and pharmaceutical salesman, Bell was originally apprehended August 24, 1978, just a short time after he allegedly shot and killed Larry Dean Dickens, 26, of Pasadena.

Police reports indicated Dickens was at his mother's house and saw a man exposing himself to children in the neighborhood. Dickens, who was the father of a young daughter, went outside and grabbed the keys to the suspect's truck in an effort to detain him for police.

It was a brave act that cost him his life.

The suspect pulled out a pistol and began shooting at Dickens, who staggered into the garage of his mother's home and collapsed on the floor with wounds. Witnesses say the offender then pulled a rifle out of his truck, walked into the garage and -- ignoring pleas from Dickens' mother that his life be spared -- shot the young man in the head at close range.

A short time later, police apprehended Edward Harold Bell.

Bell is described as a white male, 5-11, 220 pounds, with brown hair and hazel eyes. He forfeited a \$125,000 bond when he failed to appear in court on January 8, 1979, to stand trial.

Anyone with information about Bell's whereabouts is asked to call the Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council toll-free at 1-800-252-8477 or their local Crime Stoppers program. Callers do not have to reveal their identities.

Texas Most Wanted is a weekly cooperative effort between Crime Stoppers and the Department of Public Safety and is designed to enlist the support of citizens in determining the location of dangerous fugitives.

Cash rewards are also offered on a regular basis for information leading to the capture of other wanted felons.

Know Your Traffic Laws

RIGHT-OF-WAY

The driver of a vehicle on an unpaved street or roadway approaching the intersection of a paved roadway shall stop, yield and grant the privilege of immediate use of such intersection to any vehicle on such paved roadway which is within the intersection or approaching such intersection in such proximity thereto as to constitute a hazard, and after so stopping may only proceed thereafter when such driver may safely enter the intersection without interference or collision with traffic using such paved street or roadway.

Vehicles approaching the intersection of a different street or roadways, not otherwise regulated therein, or controlled by traffic control signs or signals, shall stop, yield and grant the privilege of immediate use of such intersection to any other vehicle which has entered the intersection from such driver's right or is approaching such intersection from such driver's right in such proximity thereto as to constitute a hazard.

Fatal rural and statewide motor vehicle traffic accidents and the manner of collision: Pedestrian: Rural 10.4% - Statewide 16.4%; Rear-end: Rural 4.4% - Statewide 5.3%; Sideswipe: Rural 0.7% - Statewide 1.1%; Animal: Rural 0.6% - Statewide 0.8%; Pedalcyclist: Rural 0.9% - Statewide 1.5%.

From The PEN of PASTOR PINION

Pen of Pastor Pinion "A BIBLICAL VIEW OF ABORTION"

This past week marks the twelfth year anniversary of the Supreme Court decision (Roe vs. Wade, Jan. 22, 1973) to legalize abortion. For the next several weeks I would like to address the much controversial issue of abortion.

When does human life begin? At birth or at conception? Politicians, scientists, pro-life and pro-choice forces all agree that the answer to the abortion question hinges on this distinction.

Politicians are now introducing legislation to define life as beginning at conception. It is a good piece of legislation and should go far toward protecting the life of the unborn. Yet can a Christian rest his beliefs on a piece of legislation?

Our convictions must rest firmly on the Scriptures. We cannot look to man's reason, to politicians' legislation, or to scientists' claims for the basis of our faith and practice. Christians must look to the Bible for their beliefs. What does the Bible say about the beginning of life?

First, God makes no distinction between the value He places on the born or the unborn. Both are afforded equal protection under the

law given in Exodus 21:22-25. Though there has been some controversy in the past about the interpretation of this passage, scholars generally agree that its meaning is: "When men strive together and they hurt unintentionally a woman with child, and her child comes forth but no mischief happens—that is, the woman and the child do not die—the one who hurt her shall surely be punished by a fine. But if any mischief happens, that is, if the woman dies or the child, then you shall give life for life."

From this passage, God makes no legal distinction between a person born and one not yet born. Both are equal value to God.

Second, man is a sinner from conception. In Psalm 51:5 David laments, "Behold, I was shapen in iniquity; and in sin did my mother conceive me." The Jerusalem Bible translates that sentence more graphically, "I was born guilty, a sinner from the moment of conception." No man can be a sinner until he possesses a soul. David understood that he was a living soul from the moment of conception.

Third, God directs the lives of the unborn. Isaiah states, "The Lord hath called me from the womb; from the bowels of my mother hath he made mention of my name" (Isaiah 49:1). Later, he says, "And now, saith the Lord that formed me from the womb to be his servant..." (Isaiah 49:5)

Jeremiah also quotes God, as saying to him, "Before I formed thee in the belly I knew thee; and before thou camest forth out of the womb I sanctified thee, and I ordained thee a prophet unto the nations" (Jeremiah 1:5). Sanctified and ordained - those words signify actions directed at the soul of a man. God dealt with the souls of these men before birth.

Clearly the weight of Scripture is pro-life. The Bible indicates the sanctity of human life from conception. Christians can base their objections to abortion confidently on the Word of God. Laws and scientific theories change; the bible never changes.

Capitol Comments

by FOSTER WHALEY

The legislative session is getting off to a slow start. We have just received committee assignments after two weeks.

I was placed back on the Appropriations Committee and the County Affairs Committee. This was my request. There will be some tough battles fought on both of these committees.

From the underground, I'm told there have been tens of thousands of dollars spent by lobbyists representing certain financial institutions trying to destroy Texas homestead laws. No bill has been filed on this subject yet. The rumor is they can't get anyone in either House to carry the legislation. This is a high compliment to this legislature.

These certain lending institutions are looking at owners' \$269 billion of equity in homes like a hungry buzzard would a dead cow.

Several bills have been introduced that speak to the education reform bill that was passed last summer. The Governor has threatened a veto of any bill that supposedly weakens H.B. 72. There is some talk of cutting out the funds for certain areas such as Teacher Testing - \$17 million - and the tens of millions on the controversial pre-kindergarten baby-sitting program. One school superintendent called from a small rural school and said in some cases they would have 24 or 25 students in a class. Because of the strict requirement of no more than 22 students per class, it could cost this school district from \$75,000-\$100,000 to accommodate just five or six extra students. This is the fruit of taking too much control from local government.

PESTICIDE PROBLEMS

Last week I introduced a bill that would place the authority for writing pesticide regulations in the hands of three entomologists, three plant pathologists and three weed control specialists. The tenth member of the board would be the director of the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center Laboratory in San Benito.


