The combined achievements of these outstanding citizens would fill the page of a newspaper. They all are to be congratulated for their many contributions to our community.

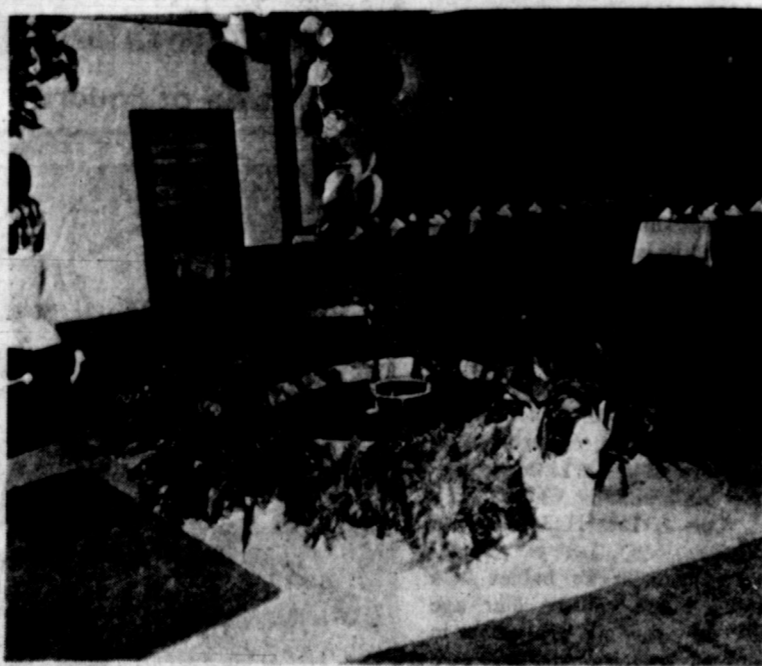

Clarendon girls and boys win district

The district track and field meet was held in Shamrock Saturday and Clarendon boys and girls came home with boy championships. Times were affected by high winds.

The Broncos scored 145 points to Memphis 125 points. The Broncos picked up five gold medals during the meet. Trent Sharp won the 800 meter run in 2:03.67 and the 400 meter dash in 50.79. Russell Alexander won the discus with a throw of 146'6". Dewey Mincey won the pole vault with a jump of 12'.

The 1600 meter relay consisting of Robert Youngblood, Rodney Smith, Leland Howell, and Trent Sharp ran first with a time of 3:36.23. Robert Youngblood had two seconds in the hurdles. He ran the highs in 15.72 and the ILEH in 40.56 to lower his own school record of 41.22 set last year. Robert also finished fourth in the vault at 11'6". Rodney Smith was third in the 400 meter dash with a time of 52.75 and fifth in the long jump with a jump of 20'4". Dan White was third in the shot with a put of 45'6" and fifth in the discus with a throw of 118'.

Donley County down in sales tax receipts

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$48.9 million in local tax payments to the 1,003 cities that levy the one-percent sales tax.

Bullock cautioned against attempts to draw conclusions about the Texas economy based on one month's rebate figure but added the April payments "are in line with our projections for the state."

April checks represent taxes collected on sales made in February and reported to the Comptroller by March 20.

Donley County is 9.87% short of the same period last year. Clarendon received \$1,478.33 compared to \$4,168.95 for the same period last year. So far this year the city has received \$23,923.12.

Hedley did not receive a check this period, but Howardwick received \$2,581.23.

When you shop locally, you not

only help our local economy, but this money helps keep our taxes lower. If the city had not received the one hundred thousand dollars from the one percent sales tax last year to help run our city, this money would have had to be made up some place else, probably through higher local tax.

We know that everything one needs cannot be bought in our county, but before you try some place else, try our local merchants. If they don't have it, they may be able to get it for you. Think about this...when you go to the ballgames, notice the signs in the backfield. How many out of town bill board do you see? Watch your football programs. How many out of town sponsors do you see? Read your childrens school annuals. How many out of town advertisers to you see? OK - it might cost a little more, but aren't we worth a little more?

Problems which are increasingly confronting farmers and ranchers of the area, and some ways to combat them, will be examined May 2, 1985, during the East Panhandle Range Tour in the Alanreed-McLean area.

Control of goldaster, mesquite, yucca and shinoak will be featured during the tour, said Ronald Gooch, Donley County Extension Agent.

The program will also include information on control of internal and

external parasites in cattle, range weed control, range and improved pasture grasses, and a free barbecue lunch.

The tour starts at 9:30 a.m. on the O.J. Weldon place, southeast of Alanreed on Highway 291, just after it crosses Interstate 40. The first stop at Weldon's will inspect yucca control. The plot is on the south side of the old railroad and on the east side of highway 291. Other stops will

inspect goldaster weed plots and mesquite controls on Joe McGee. Shinoak control will be checked on Jake Hess II, and on Tony Smitherman.

The tour will arrive at the Gray County Ag. Barn in the southeast edge of McLean for a free noon barbecue. Following lunch, short presentations and a panel discussion will cover rangeland weed control, range grasses, and improved pasture grasses. Also, control of internal parasites (grubs and worms) and fly control with ear tags on cattle will be discussed. The program should be adjourned by 2:00 p.m.

Texas Agricultural Extension Service Specialists who will assist with the discussions include: J.F. Cadenhead, Range and Brush Control; Frank Petr, Agronomist; and Carl Patrick, Entomologist. Also County Extension Agents in the sponsoring counties will assist the program discussions.

Meal reservations should be made by calling the County Extension Office, 874-2141, before noon, May 1, 1985.

HOUSE MEMBERS SAY "NO" TO TAX INCREASES

The President and the Senate leadership have announced their "compromise" budget. Although I have some reservations about certain parts of that compromise, I am encouraged by the fact that it does reduce the deficit by \$52.7 billion without raising taxes.

Reducing the deficit must, in my opinion, be one of this nation's top priorities. That's why I am an original co-sponsor of legislation introduced by Charlie Stenholm entitled the Balanced Budget/Tax Limitation Amendment. A central aspect of that legislation is the provision that prohibits the Congress from balancing the budget by raising taxes.

President Reagan, with his celebrated challenge to legislators threatening a tax increase to "make my day" told the Congress that any tax increase would be quickly vetoed. Now, along with 145 of my fellow Republicans in the House of Representatives, I have given the President the assurance that his veto will be upheld in the House.

Congressman Connie Mack and I have circulated a letter and received the necessary number of signatures to avoid an override of a presidential veto of any tax increases. The following is the text of that letter:

Dear Mr. President:

We wholeheartedly support your commitment to veto any increase in taxes.

The American people expressed themselves clearly in the November election: they oppose any attempt by Congress to tax its way out of the deficit problem.

When you challenged the legislative branch to "make my day," you again demonstrated the political courage necessary to tackle the deficit problem head on. Mr. President, we stand with you all the way.

We, the undersigned members of Congress, join with the American people in support of your veto of any legislation raising taxes.

This letter may be short, but its impact is significant. With the commitment of the 146 signers, we are sure that any attempt to raise the taxes of the American public can be stricken down first by the Presidential veto, and then by a Congress which will not allow that veto to be overridden.

The White House/Senate budget is an example of the fact that we can reduce our deficit without raising taxes. There are steps beyond this budget that could also reduce our deficit. The recommendations made by the President's Private Sector Survey on Cost Control, also known as the Grace Commission, could save up to \$424 billion in the next three years. I want to see many of those recommendations enacted.

I'm proud to say that I have founded the Grace Caucus in the House of Representatives. Along with members from both sides of the political aisle, I hope to begin the legislative process to get some of the major Grace Commission cost-saving measures enacted into law. I will keep you up to date on the progress of that Caucus.

Boulter is forming two Military Academy Appointment Committees to help with the candidate selection

process. Although interviews will not begin until early December, applicants must contact Boulter's office by September.

"The details of the process will be available at high schools throughout the district. Any interested party can also contact either one of my offices, in Wichita Falls or Amarillo. Making the decision to attend an academy is an important step in a young person's life. Through my office, and high school counseling offices, students will be able to determine if their abilities and interests make them viable candidates," Boulter concluded.

She advised the women to become involved in an issue or cause, to have a positive attitude, see tough situations through, motivate others and spend the extra hours to see the job through.

Mrs. Finney explained a new family community leadership training program being conducted by the national association. She said it is designed to help women learn the proper steps to take to provide leadership in community affairs. "If you know the right way to approach a problem, you can be heard...you can make a difference," she said.

During the district conference in the activities building of West Texas State University, the Extension Homemakers also participated in discussion groups to improve local club programs.

A luncheon fashion show featured Randall County homemakers modeling summer styles.

Joanne Arasim, curator of textiles for the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum at WTSU, presented a special program tracing changes in the styles of wedding gowns and other marriage customs. She displayed several wedding gowns from

the museum's collection. Extension Homemaker Clubs provide leadership and educational opportunities for homemakers, under the leadership of the county agent and the support of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, an arm of Texas A&M University.

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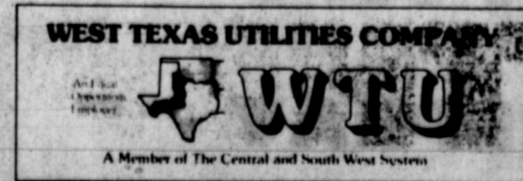

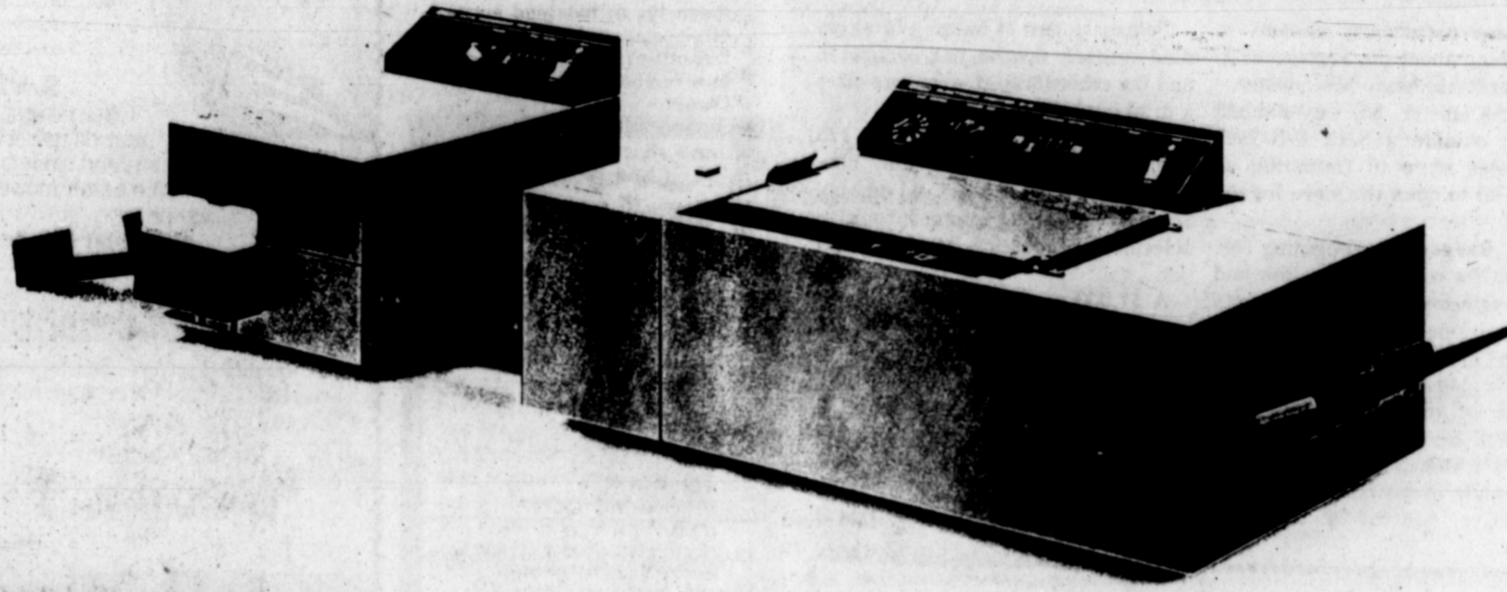

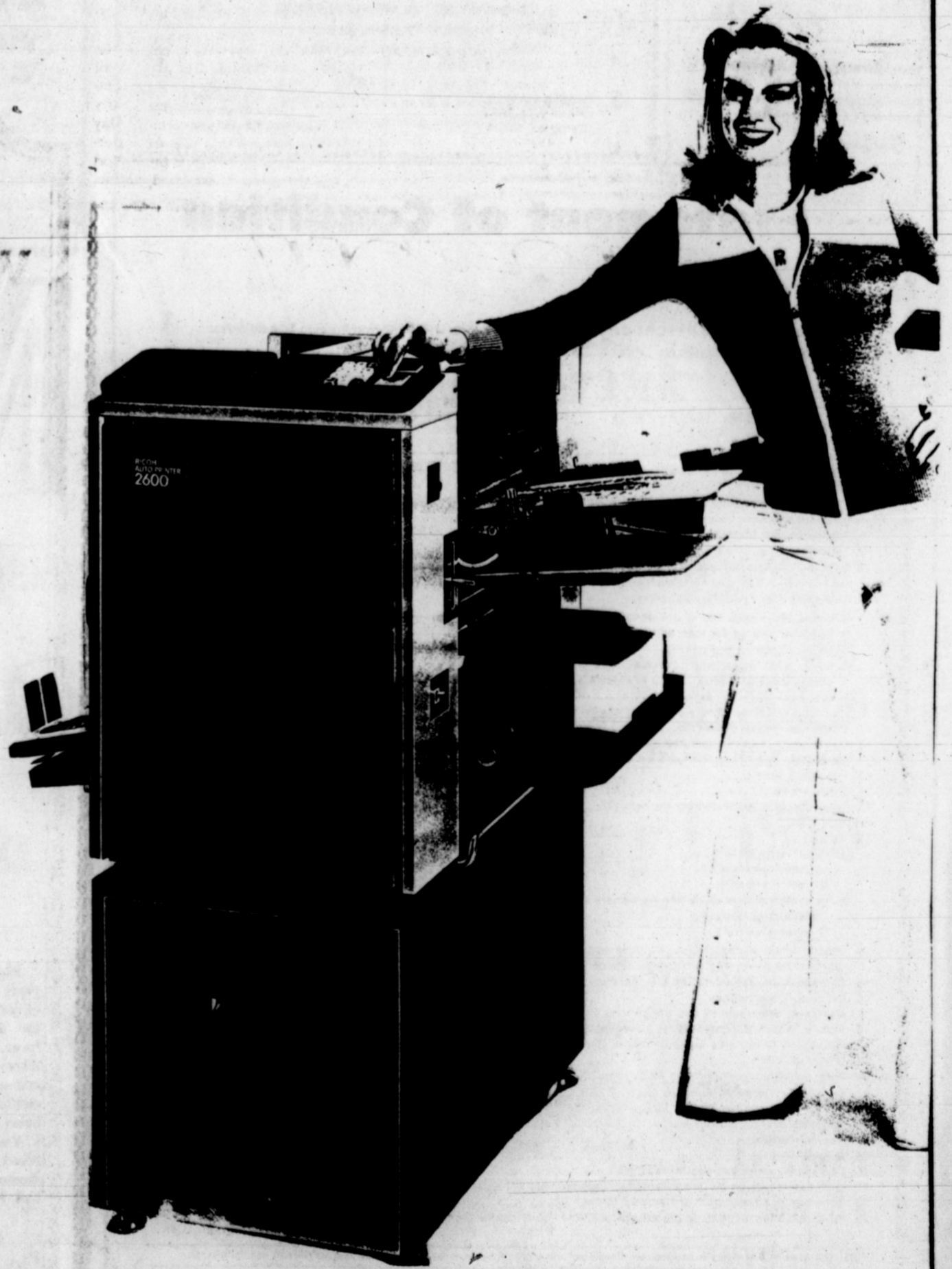

Texas Most Wanted

GATESVILLE, Texas -- William Joseph Mann isn't the type of young man who is likely to have his life story filmed by Hollywood.

No enterprising writer will pen his biography.

Instead, Mann's first 22 years on earth appear to be one of a lost youth -- of drug and alcohol problems, of a series of family tragedies, of run-ins with the law that have culminated with him making the Texas Most Wanted list.

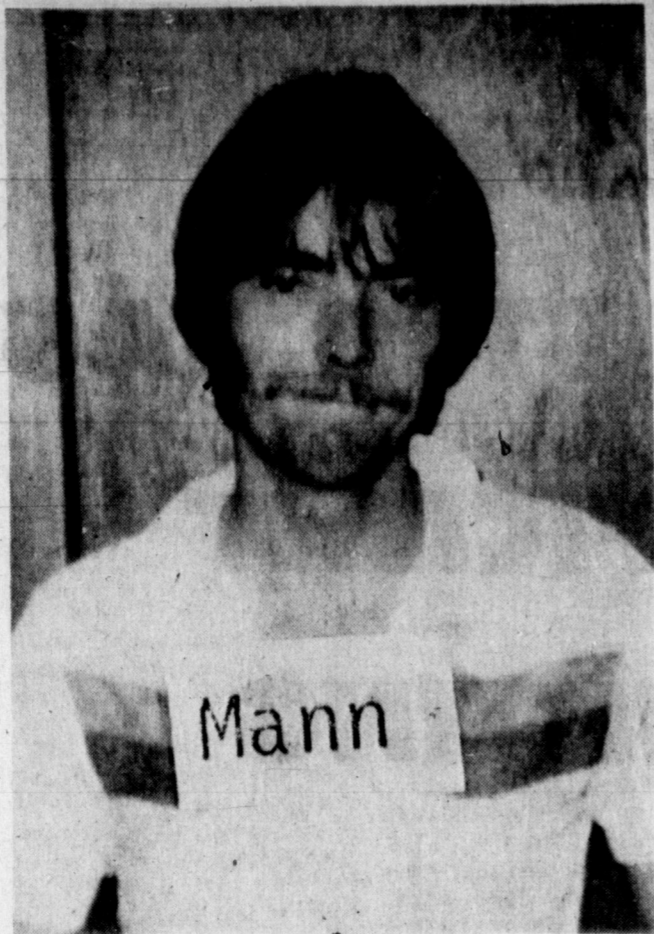
Mann is wanted by authorities in Gatesville on a warrant charging him with burglary of a business. And the Texas Rangers want to talk to him about the September 1983 murder of a grocery store employee in Gatesville.

Mann's latest problems with the law began September 1, 1983, when a doctor's office in Gatesville was burglarized. A variety of drugs and some cash were taken in the break-in. Investigators found a tennis shoe print on the ledge beneath the northeast window of the office, where the point of entry had been made.

Shortly after the burglary, Gatesville police officers questioned Mann about the burglary and noticed he had tennis shoes that closely matched the shoe print left at the scene. A small quantity of prescription drugs, similar to those taken in the burglary, was later found during a search of Mann's residence.

However, Mann left town before an arrest warrant could be issued.

Law enforcement officers have been trying to catch up to him ever since.



They are particularly anxious to talk to Mann about the September 2, 1983, murder of Mary McCallister.

Ms. McCallister, 55, was stabbed to death outside a Sack It-N-Pack convenience store in Gatesville as she arrived to open the store for the day.

Texas Rangers investigating the case said the convenience store had been burglarized and the victim's personal property had also been ransacked after her death.

Mann's legal problems are a reflection of the turmoil that has surrounded his personal life. The product of a broken home, he entered a clinic while in his late teens in an attempt to control a drinking problem.

Police say two of Mann's brothers died untimely deaths, one by suicide and the other through exposure after a drinking bout.

Mann is a white male, 5-9, 125 pounds, with blond hair and blue eyes. He will be 23 years old on May 16, making him the youngest fugitive selected for the Texas Most Wanted list.

A \$1,000 reward is being offered by Texas Crime Stoppers for information leading to the capture of William Joseph Mann. Anyone with knowledge of his whereabouts is asked to call Texas Crime Stoppers toll-free at 1-800-252-8477, or their local Crime Stoppers program. In all cases, callers do not have to reveal their identities.

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ASPIRIN AFTER SURGERY

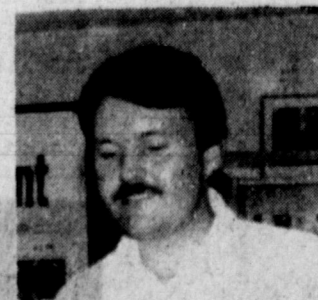
Aspirin has been available for dozens of years and is found in many homes. It is an effective analgesic [pain reliever], it relieves the inflammation of arthritis, and reduces fever. In the not too distant past, it was discovered that aspirin had an additional action. In relatively small doses aspirin slows clotting of blood and helps prevent strokes and heart attacks.

A new use related to this action of aspirin on blood clotting was recently reported in the medical journal Lancet. Sixty individuals who had heart bypass operations were studied.

One group received 100 milligrams of aspirin daily and the other group received a placebo [sugar pill that resembled aspirin in appearance]. Tests conducted 4 months after the therapy began showed that the aspirin group had less blockage of heart blood vessels and fewer heart beat irregularities of the ventricular type. Benefits with aspirin occurred only when aspirin therapy began within 24 hours of bypass surgery.

The researchers like the aspirin therapy over standard therapy with anticoagulants because of lower cost and ease of administration (once daily dosing and no injections).

TAKE ALONG SALAD

Marinating vegetables for salad makes good sense. You can prepare them early in the day yet have a crisp, fresh tasting combination to serve at night. This one is perfect as a traveling salad too. Tightly covered and placed in an ice chest, it's as refreshing for an all-day outing as it is when just carried next door for a backyard barbecue.

Marinated Broccoli Salad

- 1 bunch broccoli, about 1-1/2 lbs.
- Almond oil*
- Salt
- 6 Tablespoons white wine vinegar
- 1 teaspoon minced garlic
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 3/4 teaspoon salad herbs
- 2 Tablespoons sugar
- 1/4 lb. mushrooms, sliced
- 1 small onion, sliced
- 1/2 cup slivered almonds, toasted

Cut broccoli flowerettes from stems; trim leaves (do not discard). If stems are thick, pare off any fibrous exterior and discard. Slice stems on diagonal into 1-inch pieces. Coat bottom of large, heavy frying pan with oil; arrange broccoli in pan; sprinkle with salt and add water to depth of about 1/4-inch. Cover and cook over medium-high heat until steam escapes; lower heat

and cook a few minutes longer. Turn broccoli with spatula for even cooking and pierce with fork to check degree of doneness. Add a little more water if necessary and cook until broccoli is just fork-tender. Meanwhile, combine 1/2 cup almond oil, vinegar, garlic, the 3/4 teaspoon salt, pepper, herbs, sugar, mushrooms and onion in bowl; add hot broccoli and toss gently to coat thoroughly. Cover and chill at least 4 hours. Serve topped with the almonds. Makes 4 servings.

*If unavailable, use light salad oil.
