K-9 Korp sponsors rabies clinic May 24th

The Donley County 4-H K-9 Korp, in conjunction with the City-County rabies clinic and Deyhle Veterinary Service, will provide a heart worm exam and dipping service.

The clinic will be held Friday, May 24, 1985 at County Jail facility from 3-5 p.m.

The cost of the services are as follows: 1. Dipping - \$8.00 Ex-Par, 21 day residue, kills fleas, ticks, and lice; 2. Heart Worm Direct Exam and Filter Exam - \$7.00; 3. Rabies - \$6.00 vaccination, plus \$1.00 for City-County tags, for a total of \$7.00.

The Donley County 4-H K-9 Korp will receive a generous portion of the proceeds for co-sponsoring this clinic. The Korp will use the money to go to the Texas State Dog Show

held in Victoria, Texas, in August. Do your dog a favor: Have him checked for heart worms, dipped for ticks, fleas, and lice. Do yourself a favor: Have him vaccinated.

All Donley County residents are encouraged to take advantage of all of the clinic services for your pet, and support your local 4-H K-9 Korp to State!

WTU offers home audits

Home energy audits described as "simple, free and easy" are being offered to customers of West Texas Utilities Company.

The program is called QUEST... short for Quick Energy Savings Test...and is designed to show just how energy efficient a home really is. "QUEST is a vehicle through which our customers can find out how they can control their energy use," said Jerry Chambliss, WTU local manager. "Most people could conserve more energy in their homes if they knew what to do."

QUEST actually is a quick energy analysis of a home. All a customer has to do is to obtain a questionnaire from the local WTU office, fill in the blanks, and send it back to WTU by postage free-reply mail.

The questionnaires are received by WTU's Customer Technical Services Department in Abilene for evaluation. With the customer's prior 13-month electric billing, accurate analysis of the home energy efficiency can be made. A less accurate analysis can be done without the 13-month billing.

Nancy Johnson of Abilene, supervisor of residential audits, said a customer can expect to get results on a questionnaire back in about two or three weeks.

She said customers will receive a report consisting of three parts:

---Estimates of monthly utility cost comparisons for similar-sized homes, occupancy and appliances.

---Graphs indicating annual utility costs for an energy efficient home and for an average home.

---Estimated potential dollar savings and ranges of cost for energy conservation measures which may be appropriate for the home based on information the customer supplied through the questionnaire.

It doesn't take long to fill out the questionnaire, but for proper results the customer should be as accurate as possible, Mrs. Johnson said.

QUEST is available to all WTU customers, but it does not supplant the more detailed Residential Conservation Service (RCS) audit that has been offered by all electric utilities for the past several years.

The RCS audit is still available for a \$15 charge.

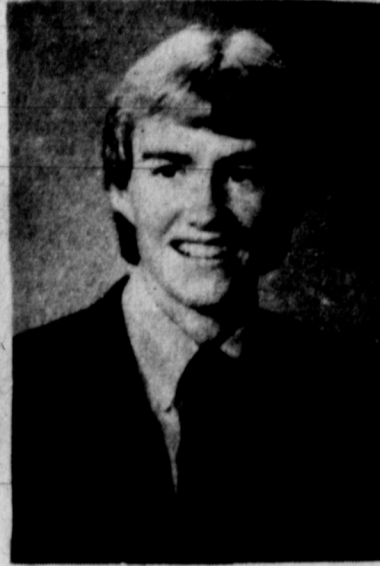
Dairy Queen operators raise funds for Children's Miracle Network Telethon

Scott Myers also judged as a junior, and placed ninth overall and eighth in halter.

The senior team qualified for the state horse judging contest to be held during 4-H Roundup at Texas A&M University, June 4-6, 1985.

Trent Sharp wins state in 8 800 meter

Trent Sharp won the state in his 800 meter run in a time of 1:54.2. He took the lead from the very beginning and never was in trouble of losing it. The win was his second in a row. Trent set the 2A state record in 1984 with a time of 1:52.5. Strong winds hurt his attempt to lower the record. He finished the year undefeated in the 800 meter run. He became the first Clarendon boy to ever win state. Trent will continue his running next year with the Baylor Bears.

Funeral services for Dr. Edwin Larry Manning, age 65, were held at 2:00 p.m. on Wednesday, May 15, 1985 in the First United Presbyterian Church in Clarendon with Dr. Clem Sorley of Ferris, Texas and Dr. Burr Morris of Yellville, Arkansas, officiating. Masonic Graveside Services and Interment was in Citizens Cemetery with arrangements under the direction of Robertson Funeral Directors.

Dr. Manning died at 1:30 a.m. on Monday, May 13, 1985 in High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo. He was born July 13, 1919 in Dallas County, Texas and was married to Dorothy Juanita Grubbs on May 8, 1939 in Dallas, Texas. He had been a resident of Clarendon for the past 6 years and had served as the Minister of the First United Presbyterian Church during that time. He had lived in Dimmitt for seven years prior to moving here. He had been an ordained Minister since 1958 and was a member of the Masonic Lodge and was a Professor at Clarendon Junior College. He was a veteran of World War II having served in the South Pacific during that time. He was a member of the First United Presbyterian Church.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Dorothy Juanita Manning of Clarendon; one daughter, Mrs. Sharon Lovelock of Taylorville, Illinois; three sons, Roy Manning of Orlando, Florida, Roger Manning of Austin, Sam Manning of Midland; two sisters, Mrs. Royline Nealy of Quinlan, Mrs. Margaret Kines of Kaufman; and eleven grandchildren.

Alternate forms of payment for dental services was a major issue addressed during the session. Employers and individuals are exploring options such as "alphabet organizations" (providing dental care for a fixed, monthly fee) and direct reimbursement (an employer's reimbursement of dental care costs directly to an employee).

Among the new products exhibited were social security-numbered plastic discs which are bonded to the teeth. The discs are recorded in a nationwide computerized system to help in locating and identifying missing persons.

The Texas Dental Association is a statewide voluntary professional association with 25 local societies and more than 6,200 members.

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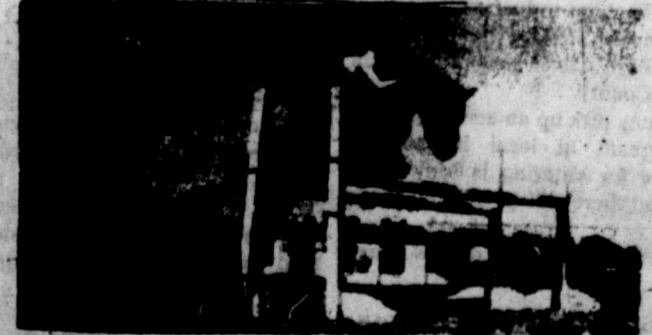
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Sorority news

THE CATCHING AWAY OF THE CHURCH

An event is coming that will leave mankind gaping in wonder. News wires and networks will tell of millions of people who vanished without warning. To the world it will be a mystery, but for Christians it will be another great prophecy fulfilled.

The event is the Rapture - the removal of all believers from the earth.

The word rapture does not appear in English versions of the Bible, but comes from the Latin word that means "to catch away." And though the word is not in the Bible the concept is clearly Biblical.

Scripture teaches that Christ will return in the air to catch away all believers and take them to be with Him forever. Like Enoch (Gen. 5:24) and Elijah (II Kings 2:11), Christians will be carried away into the presence of God.

Paul pictures this in I Corinthians 15:51,52, "We shall not all sleep, but we shall all be changed, in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet; for the trumpet will sound, and the dead will be raised imperishable, and we shall be changed."

The Rapture will take only an instant. The word for "moment" in Greek speaks of a time period so small it cannot be divided. The Rapture will occur so fast that no one will see it happen.
