### Postal Rates Up As Of March 2, 1974

Postal rates went up two cents as of Saturday, March 2 when the domestic postal rate increase became effective.

Eight cent, first class mail is now 10 cents. Post cards are now 8 cents. Airmail rates went from 11 cents to 13 cents. Air mail post cards increased from 9 to 11 cents and the 8 cent envelope is now 12 cents and the air mail envelope has climbed from 11 cents to 15 cents.

Transit rates are now 8 cents for the first two ounces and 2 cents for each additional ounce or fraction of an ounce. Single piece third class rate is a minimum of 10 cents up to 2 ounces and rises on a graduated scale thereafter. Bulk rate has been raised from 26 cents to 32 cents per pound. The minimum per piece is 6.3 cents.

Parcel post rates have also increased varying according to distance and weight of the parcel.

### Greenbelt Water Use Continues To Grow

According to the monthly report from Greenbelt Water Authority the consumption of water by member cities continues to grow. For the month of February 1971 and 1972 the number of gallons used remained about the same. In 1973 Clarendon used 6,242,000 gallons as compared to 7,997,000 gallons in February of 1974.

Childress has been the largest consumer in all years and in February of 1973 used 22,365,000 as compared to 19,894,000 in 1974. Hedley used 1,040,000 gallons in February of 1973 compared to 1,271,000 in 1974. Quanah, Crowell, Bestwall and Red River used slightly more through February 1974 than 1973.

Total gallons used in February 1974 reached 60,245,000 gallons as compared to 52,423,000 in 1973. Lake depth reached an all time high March 1, 1974 with 63.00 ft. This compares with 60.13 in 1973; 58.17 in 1972, 57.42 in 1971, and 58.31 in 1970 at the same date, March 1.

### Drivers Ignoring The 55 MPH Speed Limit

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today he is disturbed by many complaints by Texas motorists about drivers refusing to obey the 55-mile-per-hour speed limit, and has directed DPS troopers to intensify their enforcement efforts.

"When the new law went into effect January 20 of this year," he said, "our surveys indicated a high degree of voluntary compliance on the part of Texas drivers."

"But since that time, we have noticed that motorists, or at least many of them, have been gradually 'inching' up their speeds on Texas highways. Consequently, our troopers have been increasing their volume of speeding citations, and will have to continue to intensify their efforts until a more reasonable degree of voluntary compliance is achieved."

Speir said he has received numerous reports by motorists who are complying with the new law who are frightened and angered by others who pass them at speeds dangerously above the legal limit, and still others who "tailgate" them when they can't pass for one reason or another.

"We commend those drivers who are cooperating in the state and national effort to reduce accidents, save lives, and at the same time conserve fuel by driving within the legal limits," Speir said.

"And we solicit the cooperation of those who would forget or ignore the dangers posed to themselves and others by dangerous and illegal speeds on the highways of our state."

"We would remind everyone that consistently through the years, excessive speed is involved in more fatal accidents than any other single factor."

The Lost Sheep

Matthew 18:17 - "Even so, I tell you, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who need no repentance."

Jeremiah ask the question "Is there no balm in Gilead; is there no physician there?" (Jeremiah 8:22). He is bereaved over the sins of the people and he is searching for some element of healing to bring about a reconciliation of the people with God.

The people of God do not always live as righteous in the sight of God as He would desire. When the people turn from God and remember their bond of the Covenant no more God sends his messenger to the people to call them to repentance.

In response to Jeremiah's question there came the American Folk Hymn affirming: "There is a balm in Gilead, To make the wounded whole; There is a balm in Gilead, To heal the sin sick soul."

In Jesus' day the scribes and Pharisees were the spiritual shepherds but they had betrayed their trust by neglecting those individuals who needed them desperately. They had so engulfed the Law of Moses with external requirements that the

spiritual truth had been lost and they separated themselves from those of the children of God who were "unclean" and thus unworthy of fellowship in the house of the Lord. And it was these same scribes and Pharisees who raised the voice of descension when Jesus came on the scene because he was found constantly in the company of tax collectors and sinners, e.g., the unclean. Therefore, they could not grasp his meaning when he announced "I came to seek and to save the lost" (Matthew 18:11), and "They that are whole have no need of a physician, but they that are sick" (Matthew 9:12).

He was saying that the scribes and Pharisees had blown their chance to be the balm in Gilead which could have saved the least of the Children of God. Now, He was come to do just that.

I recall a conversation with an ambitious preacher who wanted to climb the ecclesiastical ladder as quickly as possible. His admonition was to go into a new appointment and as quickly as possible learn who were the influential people in that congregation. Then, these were to be the ones with whom you were to concern yourself and not worry about the others. In a way, he was saying concern yourself with the ninety-nine (the righteous, the whole) and do not mind the one (the unrighteous, the sick). That preacher was a true Pharisee of the Pharisees who neglected his spiritual trust as God's shepherd.

God does not neglect those who need Him, and He calls His Shepherds to seek and to save those who are lost. THINK ON THIS: Forget self, think of others.

13th District, Texas

Congressman Bob Price is sending his district assistant, Mr. Gene Hanks, on a tour of communities throughout the 13th Congressional District to conduct non-partisan, open-to-the-public, "Town Hall" meetings. "Congressional business demands that I spend much of my time in Washington serving the people of the 13th District," Price commented, "but it is vital that I keep abreast of the concerns of the people in order to fully represent their views in the Congress. Since I am able to visit the many communities spread over the District less often than I would like, I am sending my assistant on tour to conduct "Town Hall" meetings where he will be able to hear the current views of the people. In turn, I am in contact with my assistant by telephone."

Price expressed the hope that many citizens who are interested in their federal government would attend the meetings conducted by Hanks. Hanks will keep the following schedule of "Town Hall" meetings: MONDAY, MARCH 11 9 to 11 a.m. Clarendon-Farmer's State Bank. 12 to 1:30 p.m. Hedley-Security State Bank. 2:30 to 3:30 p.m. Clarendon Jr. College, in the cafeteria.

Congressman Bob Price has welcomed with the comment, "It's about time," Environmental Protection Agency approval of an "experimental use permit" for 44 Texas counties enabling the use of a sodium cyanide pellet gun for control of coyotes

and other predators.

The permit, recently approved by the EPA in Washington, calls for testing of a spring-loaded sodium cyanide ejector mechanism which is contained in a 6-inch tube planted in the ground which discharges a lethal dose of poison into the mouth of a coyote that tugs at a scent placed at the top of the tube.

The permit enables ranchers to use the system on private land in Cottle, Dickens and King counties in the 13th Congressional District, and in 41 other counties in Texas. The mechanisms and pellets may be obtained through extension agents in the 44 test counties may use the mechanism with potassium cyanide pellets, not sodium cyanide ones.

The EPA placed a ban on chemical toxicants in controlling predators in 1972, although the ban did not cover the use of potassium cyanide. Last October the U. S. House Agriculture Committee, of which Price is a member, passed a resolution calling for use of the sodium cyanide pellet gun because of its instant and humane killing effects and the rapid decomposition of the pellets which tend to avoid secondary kills. EPA's recent test permit appears to be a response to that action.

"This EPA test simply shows the naivete' of the EPA ruling," Price said. "Ranchers have been using this device for a number of years. Ranchers don't need experiments; they need legal authority and safe chemical toxicants to control coyotes and other predators. "Livestock raisers must be allowed some effective means of controlling predators," Price said. "Last year, the loss of sheep and lambs to coyotes was 5.7 times as great as for the average of the six years before the original EPA ban took effect. Calves also fall victim to predators. Predator activity does serious economic harm to livestock businesses if left uncontrolled, and this, in turn, poses yet another factor which tends to force retail meat prices higher."

"I do hope that the findings of the experiment announced by

EPA, which I feel is unnecessary, will lead to wider use of effective coyote control methods," the Congressman commented. Concerning another predator, rats, Price noted that strychnine may be used in this regard.

Computer Service By WTSU As of 1974

November 1974 will begin a new era in university and regional computing services supplied by West Texas State University.

It is the proposed full operation date for WT's new DEC system-1070, million dollar computer system which puts the university in league with Harvard, MIT, Stanford, Oxford and Yale.

The installation of the DEC system-1070 will provide a "huge change from the teaching and research view," noted Durwood Henderson, director of WT's computer services. The "university-oriented" system features operationally-independent terminals which can be connected from both local and remote sites. Up to 60 students, researchers and administrators will be able to utilize the 24 million word on-line data base for their individual projects at one time.

A simple telephone call can put the operator of a remote terminal in contact with the system's features, which include instruction look-ahead, increased memory size and tremendous flexibility in instructional uses.

A student running a program will be able to see the results within one day, instead of up

to three weeks as with the present computer system. "It will go as fast as the student," said Dr. Phillip Genaler, head of WT's computer information systems.

Through a special priority access code, an operator can call up data and programs only for his specific need. Strictly controlled access to the memory banks is vital for confidentiality in a system which may ultimately contain a central data bank for Panhandle law enforcement.

Students will, however, be able to do math problems, or have almost immediate results from Chemical analysis tests.

"Nobody within a 250 mile radius has as good of a system," said William A. Miller, WT instructor in computer information systems.

The new DECsystem - 1070 should facilitate WT's handling of many regional services. In addition to doing work for WT, Randall County and the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, the West Texas State University computer system supplies all data processing services offered by Region XVI Education Service Center. Around-the-clock operation enables the system to handle student class scheduling of 21,000 students from 24 campuses; the annual processing of over 125,000 report cards; attendance reporting for 24,000 students from 30 campuses; test scoring of over 10,000 standardized tests; and the annual processing of 82,000 payroll checks.

**Crop Symposium Mar. 7 At Research Center**

Producers will get an opportunity to hear the latest information available on limited and no-tillage systems for crop production in a symposium at the USDA Southwestern Great Plains Research Center, Bushland March 7.

The afternoon event, according to Dr. B. A. Stewart, USDA research leader, will be keynoted by Frank D. Lessiter, editor of *No-Till Farmer*, Milwaukee, Wis.

Other speakers to address the group on weed control, soil water shortage, bed-furrow systems and equipment requirements are Dr. A. F. Wiese, Dr. P. W. Unger, Jack T. Musick, and R. R. Allen.

Featured speakers for the last half of the program include Lehman Fowler, manager of Winrock Farms, Texline; Frank Buzzard, a farmer from Perryton; and Phillip Homer, farmer of Knox City.

Their topics will be on no-till and limited till systems under sprinklers, for gravity irrigated conditions, and for non-irrigated conditions.

Presiding over the sessions will be Dr. Frank Petr, agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Amarillo, and Allen King, agronomist with the Soil Conservation Service also of Amarillo.

The meeting is jointly sponsored by the Extension Service, the Experiment Station, the USDA-ARS, and the Soil Conservation Service.

Crop producers are especially encouraged to attend the public meeting, says Stewart.

**Easter Seal Appeal  
Started Here Mar. 1st**

The 1974 Easter Seal Appeal will open in Donley County Friday, March 1, 1974 according to Wesley P. Knorpp, who serves as Easter Seal Representative for the County.

Knorpp said that Easter Seal Appeal letters would begin arriving at homes in the county about March 1.

As Easter Seal Representative, Knorpp is the person to contact to request services from the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas. These services include physical and occupational therapy, speech and hearing programs and special information services to help solve the many problems faced by the families of handicapped children and adults.

Last year 20,570 handicapped people received help from the Texas Easter Seal Society. With the costs of providing expert professional care rising, more money than ever will be needed.

Funds help support 18 centers in Texas, where services are provided to those crippled children and adults who cannot provide for themselves and who do not qualify for help from any other source.

"The people of Texas have always responded generously to helping the handicapped, and I feel certain they will make it possible to increase Easter Seal services to crippled Texans throughout the coming year," Knorpp said.

**Department Graduates  
23 Game Wardens**

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's first Deputy Game Warden School graduated its first class of 23 commissioned officers in January, according to department law enforcement personnel.

Deputy game wardens, who receive no pay and must pay their own expenses, attended classes 12 hours per day for six days to complete the 72-hour course.

Deputy wardens are commissioned by the Parks and Wildlife Department and must complete the course, which is conducted in Austin, within one year of their commissioning in order to retain their commissions.

They are empowered to enforce game laws only and work under the close supervision of local game wardens.

The course includes orientation and organization, community relations, game and fish laws, patrol procedures, case preparation, firearms training, defensive driving, courtroom demeanor, the penal code and

**Voter Guidelines**

1. Register to vote at least 30 days prior to the Democratic Primary, which is May 4, 1974.
2. All registered voters, 18 years and older, are eligible to vote in all Democratic Party elections.
3. Present registrations are valid if you have voted in a Democratic Primary or a General Election within the last three years.
4. Register to vote at your County Tax Assessor - Collector's office or with a property deputized person allowed to register voters.
5. Notify your County Tax Assessor-Collector of change of address 5 days prior to election day so that you are registered in the proper precinct, if you have moved within the county.
6. On moving from one county to another, you must re-register 30 days prior to the election, if you wish to vote in your new place of residence.
7. On April 14, 1974, the absentee voting for the first primary by personal appearance at the County Clerk's office begins and goes through the fourth day preceding the election.
8. Applications for absentee voting for the first primary must be received by the County Clerk not later than the close of business on April 30, 1974.
9. Marked absentee ballots for the first primary must be mailed back to the County Clerk and postmarked not later than midnight on May 3, 1974.

**Use Your Jumper  
Cables Safely**

"Dead" car batteries are common during the winter, and that brings jumper cables into action. Their safe use is important to avoid injuries, points out an agricultural engineer for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The negative plate of a battery gives off hydrogen gas, so a spark could set off an explosion. When using jumper cables, be sure the ignition of both cars is off. Be sure both batteries are of the same vol-

tage. Attach one cable to the positive terminals first. Run the second cable from the negative terminal of the good battery to a grounding point on the other car. Now try to start the car with the "dead" battery. You may have to start the other car as well to avoid excessive discharge of its battery.
