

W.B. Wiggins

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As we count down the weeks before the 33rd Annual Hedley Cotton Festival, we will be spotlighting some of the people who are most closely concerned with it and the business of farming cotton.

Certainly one of the most important is the manager of the gin. In Hedley that person is W.B. (Nookie) Wiggins.

Shortly after graduating from

Nookie went to work for Alva Simmons who was the manager of the Beatty Gin. He worked as a suction hand.

During the war, when Booker Shaw was in the navy, Nookie kept the books in the office. After the war he started to work as the ginner's helper.

Fred G. Watt was the head

ginner and according to Nookie, Mr. Watt taught him everything there was to know about the workings of a gin. He taught him how to keep it running and how to repair it when it broke down. Most importantly, he taught him how to keep his fingers out of the saws in the stands that drew the cotton up into the gin.

In 1947, Nookie accepted the position of manager of the West Texas Gin, then owned by Quanah Cotton Oil Company. It was sold a few years ago to the Archie Daniels Company. He has managed the gin since then.

There have been some good years and there have been some that weren't so good, but there has never been a complete cotton

The closest there was to failure was in 1983, when the West Texas Gin weighed and ginned 1,900 bales during the entire season.

The best season ever enjoyed by the gin was 1977 when they weighed and ginned 6,500 bales of

Nookie wasn't a stranger to a field of cotton when he started working at a gin. His father, W.W. Wiggins, farmed north and west of Hedley. Nookie has hoed and pulled his share of cotton. When he was pulling, he thought he was pulling more than his brothers, Jeff and Orin.

Nookie married Geraldine Land on November 30, 1940. He was twenty and she was sixteen. When he went to Roscoe to ask for her hand, Roscoe asked him how he

intended to make her a living. A very nervous Nookie replied, "I

At that, Roscoe told him he could rent his land for the next year. When talking to Nookie about it, he said, "You know I really didn't have any idea about how I was going to make a living. It hadn't entered my mind that I was going to provide for her for the next seventy years or

Anyway, Nookie worked her father's land the next year. By working at the gin during the fall they were able to live very well.

In 1945 he started farming the land owned by his father and still farms it. He bought the land from his father in 1965.

The Clarendon Broncos got their first win of the season with a 6-0 win over the Floydada Whirlwinds Friday night.

The games only score that counted was a 14 yard run by quarterback Robert Youngblood with 4:30 left in the fourth quarter. Youngblood, starting his first game at quarterback, was back to pass and saw an opening and made a great run to score.

The second time the Broncos had the ball, Rodney Smith stepped thru the middle of the line 73 yards for an apparent TD but the play was called back because of clipping.

The first half was a battle of the two teams defenses. Floydada got the ball deep in Bronco territory twice in the first half due to Bronco turnovers. A strong Bronco defense turned back the winds both times. The last time from the Bronco 15 yard line Dean Cearly sacked the quarterback on fourth down.

The second half started like the Winds would get the first score of the night. The Broncos received and Dewey Mincey fumbled the kick off and the Winds recovered at the Bronco 35 yard line. 

From The PEN of PASTOR # PINION?



This week in our continuing series on "Revival God's Way," we want to talk about the kind of Revival we need. In doing so, I

have chosen three simple headings. We need first of all, a Prayed-Down Revival, secondly, we need a Preached-Up Revival, and thirdly, we need a Powered-In Revival.

A PRAYED-DOWN REVIVAL Oh, how we as the people of God need to come again to mighty, prevailing, intercessory prayer; not ust the ordinary kind of praying, but praying that will not be denied, praying that will not let go until the fire from Heaven falls.

Whatever God has wrought in the past through His people and by His power and in answer to the heartery of His own people who day and night beseech the throne of Almighty God with their prayers, I believe He will do it again. My bible says He is the same yesterday, today and forever.

A PREACHED-UP REVIVAL

We need a Preached-Up Revival. Just as there never has been a great revival that was not born in prayer, just as truly there has never been a great sweeping revival that did not come in my mighty, earnest, red hot, passionate preaching of the whole counsel of God.

Paul said, "...it pleased God by the foolishness of preaching to save them that believe" (I Cor. 1:21), and I am just old-fashioned enough to believe that that is still God's plan for God has never changed.

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I am one Preacher who believes that a Preacher is shirking his duty as a God-called man if he refuses or fails or neglects to cry out against sin. The commandment to us is still, "Cry aloud, spare not, lift up thy voice like a trumpet, and shew my people their transgression" (Isaiah 53:1).

Men need to know that God will punish sin. They need to have it thundered in their ears that there is a judgment coming for those who sin. They need to be taught from the word of God that sin will bring judgment, retribution, heartbreak, the wrath of God, and that it will separate a soul from God and send it to Hell.

We need to stand up and Preach against sin and not apologize for it!

A POWERED-UP REVIVAL

I think of the power that the Apostle Paul had, of the power that Peter - just an ignorant, unlearned fisherman - had on Pentecost, of power of Charles G. Finney, of the power of Billy Sv Jay, and of the power of Dwight .. Moody. I read that Revivals in the United States in the years gone by when under that power of the Holy Spirit, the Preachers of God stood in the pulpit and declared in no uncertain terms the Word of God unflinchingly and called men to repentence.

Oh, may we see Revival God's

But the lesson we learned was even better than the entertainment of the day. We saw the value of an object is in the eye of the beholder and almost everything appealed to someone. Back in the good old days, cotton was pulled by hand, in a long sack dragged behind you.

Now, thanks to modern, sophisticated machinery, this backbreaking job is done for us. What used to take an average worker days to accomplish, can now be done in hours. As a result of modern technology, you seldom see anyone pulling cotton by hand.

We go to great lengths to tell our children of how we used to toil in the field from daylight to dark for a little as 23c per hundredweight.

"Things were different when I was a boy. Then, when school was out, I'd change my school clothes, grab a snack from my mother's kitchen, and head for the cotton patch. There I'd pull cotton until

dark, then go home and milk the cows, gather the eggs and slop the hogs. By the time I'd eaten my supper and got my lessons, it was time for bed. I didn't go to town every night and shoot pool and play video games. If I went to town at all, it was on Saturday afternoon with the rest of my family. Mother would take her cream and eggs to town and trade them for the groceries we couldn't raise ourselves. Things were different back

These two enterprising young men are learning what their fathers mean when they talk about the good old days and pulling cotton.

Keith Brinson and Guy Watt are junior high students at Hedley School. They earned 7.5c per

pound for pulling cotton. (Unlike the good old days). Keith may not milk a cow, but Guy has been milking since before he started to school. Both have chopped cotton and thrown back cotton behind the stripper. They also help during roundup and bale and haul hay during the season.

Thirteen years old, Keith is the son of Kenneth and Dorothy Brinson and Guy is the son of Fred and Peggy Watt, all of Hedley.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

GENERAL ELECTION

NOVEMBER 6, 1984

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 29 proposes a constitutional amendment that provides to state-chartered banks the same rights and privileges that are or may be granted to national banks of the United States Joinciled in this state. For example, if national banks become authorized to maintain branch offices, this amendment would extend the same privilege to state banks.

the same privilege to state banks.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide state banks the same rights and privileges as national banks."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 19 proooses a constitutional amendment that restructures the Permanent University Fund to provide: (1) for the expansion of the institutions eligible to participate in the bonding capacity of the fund to include the components of The University of Texas and Texas A&M University systems that have been added to those two systems of higher education since the Permanent University Fund was last restructured by constitutional amendment; (2) for the expansion of the purposes for which bond proceeds can be expended from new construction to include major repair and rehabilitation projects and the acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and materials; (3) for an increase in the bonding capacity from 20% (% for The University of Texas System and 1/3 for the Texas A&M University System) to 30% (20% for The University of Texas System and 10% for Texas A&M University System) of the value of the assets (exclusive of real estate) in the Permanent University Fund in order to provide sufficient bond proceeds to care for the addition of 10 new institutions to those authorized to participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program and to care for the expanded purposes for which the bond proceeds can be spent; and (4) for the dedication of the dividends, interest, and other income from the Permanent University Fund remaining after payment of principal and interest due on bonds and notes issued, to the provision of support and maintenance (over and above normal legislative appropriations) for Texas A&M University in Brazos County, Prairie View A&M University, and

The University of Texas at Austin.

House Joint Resolution 19 also annually appropriates \$100 million in each fiscal year, beginning September 1, 1985 (from the first money coming into the state treasury that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution) for the use of those

agencies and institutions of higher education which are not included in The University of Texas or Texas A&M University Systems and, therefore, not eligible to participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program. The amount of this appropriation could be adjusted every five years by a 3 vote of the Legislature, but could not be adjusted in such a way as to affect outstanding bonding indebtedness. Each institution of higher education that is eligible to participate (i.e., those institutions of higher education outside The University of Texas and Texas A&M University Systems) would be authorized to expend directly its share (such share to be determined pursuant to an equitable formula) of the \$100 million appropriation for the purposes of acquiring land, constructing and equipping buildings or other permanent improvements, major repair and rehabilitation of other permanent buildings or improvements, and acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and materials. Additionally, each institution would be authorized to issue bonds backed by a pledge of up to 50% of its share of the \$100 million annual appropriation for the purpose of land acquisition, new construction, and major repair and rehabilitation projects.

Except in the case of fire or natural disaster and in other extraordinary cases, verified by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature, all institutions of higher education would be precluded from receiving appropriations of general revenue funds for the purposes of land acquisition, new construction, and major repair and rehabilitation projects.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to create from general revenue a special higher education assistance fund for construction and related activities, to restructure the Permanent University Fund, and to increase the number of institutions eligible to benefit from the Permanent University Fund."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 65 prooses a constitutional amendment which authorizes the legislature to provide for the payment of assistance to the surviving dependent parents, brothers, and sisters of officers, employees and agents of the state or its political subdivisions, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units authorized to make arrests, who die in the course of performing hazardous official duties. Payments to surviving spouses and dependent children of

such officers, employees, and agents are already authorized by the Constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for payment of assistance to the surviving dependent parents, brothers, and sisters of certain public servants killed while on duty."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 20 proposes a constitutional amendment which abolishes the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties if a majority of the voters in each of those counties vote in favor of abolishing the office of county treasurer in a local election to be held on the issue. All the powers, duties, and functions of the office of county treasurer in each of these counties would be transferred to

the county clerk.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment which provides a new method of filling a vacancy in the office of Lieutenant Governor. The amendment requires the President pro tempore of the Senate to call together the committee of the whole Senate within 30 days after a vacancy occurs in the office of Lieutenant Governor. The committee would be required to elect one of its members to perform the duties of the Lieutenant Governor until the next general election. This individual would continue his duties as Senator at the same time that he performs the Lieutenant Governor's duties. If the Senator who is elected ceases to be a Senator before the next general election, another Senator must be elected according to the above procedure to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties. The President pro tempore would be required to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties pending the election of one of its members by the committee of the whole Senate.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the state senate to fill a vacancy in the office of lieutenant governor."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 prooses a constitutional amendment that permits the use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on non-assessable life, health, or accident insurance policies and annuity contracts issued by a mutual insurance company authorized to do business in this state. The constitutional prohibition against a grant of public money to an individual, association, or corporation or against becoming a stockholder in a corporation, association, or com-pany has limited life and health group policies of political subdivisions to non-mutual insurance companies. The amendment would permit mutual insurance companies to bid for those policies.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment to permit use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on certain insurance contracts of mutual insurance companies authorized to do business in Texas."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

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House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment to change the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct to include one Judge of a Municipal Court and one Judge of a County Court at Law, who shall be selected at large and appointed by the Supreme Court with the advice and consent of the Senate.

The amendment also provides additional grounds for removal from office of judges or justices of Texas courts, and provides additional disciplinary actions that could be taken in lieu of removal or censure. The amendment would extend the Commission's disciplinary authority to masters, magistrates, and retired or former judges who hear cases by designation. The amendment creates a tribunal to review recommendations of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct for removal or retirement of a judge or justice. The review tribunal would be composed of seven (7) Justices or Judges of the Courts of Appeals selected by lot by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. The amendment also provides for appeal of the review tribunal's decision to the Supreme Court of Texas and grants an accused judge the right to discovery of evidence.

right to discovery of evidence.
The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment relating to the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and the authority and procedure to discipline active judges, certain retired and former judges, and certain masters and magistrates of the courts."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment which increases the per diem of members of the Legislature. The amount of per diem allowed during a calendar year would be equal to the maximum amount set in federal income tax statutes as of January 1 of that same year as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator. Current per diem is \$30; the maximum deduction is now \$75.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide a per diem for members of the legislature equal to the maximum daily amount allowed by federal law as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator."


the night.
