Bicentennial Plans Draw Attention Of President Nixon Sun.

Nation-wide attention was drawn to Clarendon and Donley County Sunday by United States President Richard Nixon when he cited youth involvement in Donley County's Bicentennial celebration plans and mentioned Clarendon as the only rural community making great progress in its celebration efforts. Mrs. Norma Selvidge, chairman of the Donley County Living History Commission and a member of the Texas Panhandle Centennial Committee returned Friday from a two-day visit with celebration officials in Washington where she conferred with members of the National Bicentennial Committee, Anne Armstrong, National Bicentennial secretary, and Hugh Hall, acting director of the celebration planning. Joe Dohal of Washington D. C. has called and asked for a copy of Clarendon's entire youth program and involvement.

National Girl Scout Week Is March 10-16

This week, March 10-16, Girl Scouts all over the United States are observing Girl Scout Week. The year 1974 marks the 62nd anniversary of the founding of Girl Scouts of the U.S.A. The organization has grown from 18 members in 1912 to nearly 4 million girls and adults today. Through the years the major efforts of the Girl Scout program have been to build better relationships among persons of all ages, religions, races, and nationalities, and to improve the quality of our environment. Many changes have taken place. Today's organization is more flexible than in the past and the individual is more actively participating in the development of activities and greater involvement in decisions affecting home, church, school, and Girl Scouts. With the establishment of Camp Cibola north of Clarendon, Quivira Girl Scout Council is able to offer a more varied program of camping. Clarendon Girl Scout Troops have helped encourage people to go to the polls and vote, have helped to fix the City Park up by painting the park equipment, made tray favors for Rest Homes, visited Rest Homes and helped with City-wide clean-up.

Hedley Owls Drop Game In Semi-Finals

Hedley Owls and their coach Mr. Lemley, went to Austin the past week end hoping to bring home the State Basketball title and the boys put up a battle in the semi-finals Friday morning. Huckaby (Stephenville) and Anderson opened the tournament at 9:30 Friday morning with Huckaby taking the game 62-53. Hedley played LaPoyner (Larue) at 11 a.m., took an early lead and maintained the lead until the final seconds of the first half when LaPoyner hit a shot from mid-court for 2 points tying up the game at 23. The Owls came back cold in the third period however maintained a tied score until about four and a half seconds in the third period. LaPoyner tallied 11 straight points holding Hedley scoreless. In the fourth period Hedley played a full-court press but were unable to recover and lost out 42-53. Leon Freeman, a senior and a four year all-district player and a second team all state player in his junior year counted 13 points and 11 rebounds. Tony Rieken scored 12 points. Huckaby and LaPoyner played Saturday morning for the State title with Huckaby defeating LaPoyner for the Championship title by a score of 49-48. Everyone is proud of the record of Hedley's fine team and coach. It isn't every team that achieves the distinction of playing in the State Tournament. And you can bet these boys will be working toward a return try for the State crown next year.

Bulldogs Place 3rd In Region V Tourney

The Clarendon College Bulldogs participated in the Regional Basketball Tournament at Brownwood the past week end and brought home a third place in Region V play. The Bulldogs' first game was with McLennan of Waco. After trailing 36-31 at halftime and never tying or leading throughout the game in the final seconds the Bulldogs stole the ball and scored 2 points to win the game 69-68. In the semi-finals Clarendon was pitted against Howard County, winner over Weatherford. Clarendon lost this game 66-68 in overtime after leading a good part of the game. The loss placed Clarendon in the Consolation Bracket against Odessa College who was defeated by Hill County Junior College. Odessa was the only team in the Conference that the Bulldogs had not beaten this year. Clarendon won this game 86-63 to take third place in the tournament. Hill County placed first, Howard County second, Clarendon third, and Odessa 4th. Hill County will now represent Region V in the National Tournament. Joe Pride, an outstanding player for the Bulldogs throughout the year and at the Regional tournament, was named to the All-Regional First Team. Of interest to many may be the fact that Amarillo fell in the first round to Odessa College.

USDA Plans Survey Of Farmers' Costs

During March and early April, survey takers from the U. S. Department of Agriculture will ask farmers here and around the nation about the costs required to raise their crops and livestock last year, according to Jerry Gage, executive director of the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. Jerry said that the survey will be handled by the USDA's Statistical Reporting Service (SRS). It is a project to assemble farmers' costs for the purposes of providing a reliable basis for decisions in agriculture and of developing responsive programs for farmers. The survey will determine what shares of production costs went to crops, livestock, fertilizer, fuel, taxes, interest, and other expenses. Jerry said SRS has indicated that farmers spent about \$63 billion for production items during 1973 - 75 cents out of each \$1 earned. However, farmers' spending patterns change quite rapidly. The project is entitled The Farm Production Expenditures Survey. When it is completed only regional and national summaries will be issued, not personal information, according to SRS.

VFW Has Markers For Veteran's Graves Now

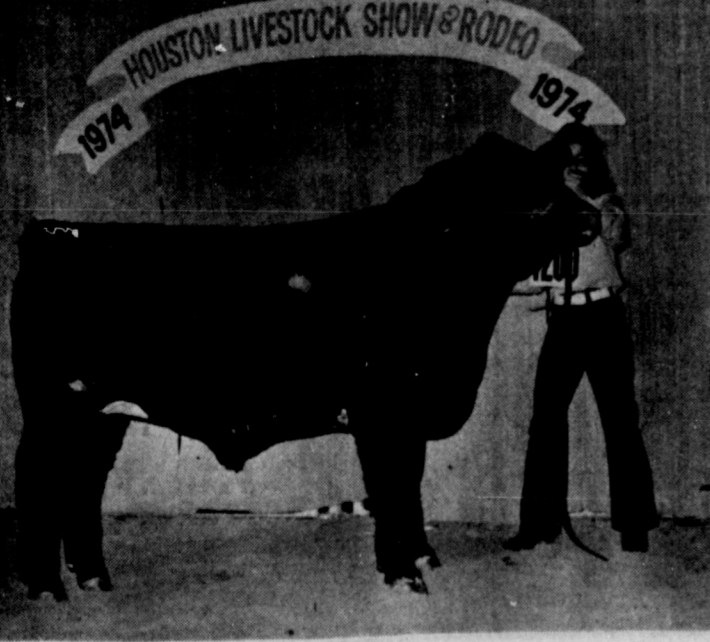

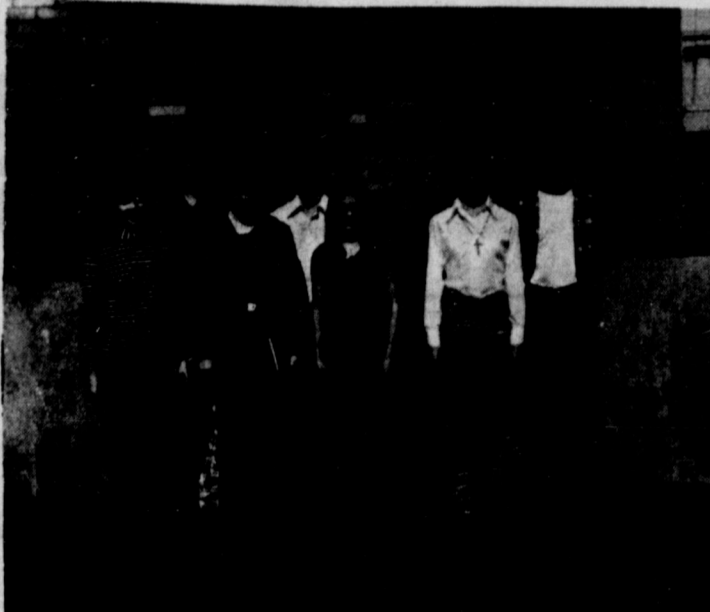

ROTC Program At CC For Fall Term

Mr. Kenneth D. Vaughan, president of Clarendon College, has announced that an agreement has been reached with officials of West Texas State University to provide an on-campus Army Reserve Training program beginning in the spring. The agreement heralds what could be a new era of cooperation between the two schools, according to Lt. Col. John O. Childs, Professor of Military Science at WTSU.

Childs indicates that his staff will travel to Clarendon College campus to teach the courses. A curriculum identical to the first two years of WTSU's program will be offered. Courses

offered will be transferable among all senior ROTC units.

Mr. Beryl D. Clinton, Dean of Clarendon College has indicated that students electing to enroll in this program may substitute ROTC classes for required physical education and health classes. Those students wishing to enroll in the ROTC program may contact Captain D. Colgan of the WTSU ROTC faculty who will be present at Clarendon College during registration for the Fall semester.

Students completing the two years at Clarendon College will be eligible to compete for advanced scholarships the same as ROTC students at four year institutions. Scholarship students receive \$100 per month for approximately ten months of each year. Courses for the first two years include military marksmanship drill, map reading, and military history. Courses are open to either sex as well as veterans.

Officials of both institutions are enthusiastic about the cooperative program which is planned to benefit both colleges. The cooperation of Col. Childs, President Vaughan, Dean Clinton and Leonard Selvidge of Clarendon College and WTSU President Watkins, Vice-President Kenneth Laycock, Ray Malzahn, and Virgil Henson has been instrumental in bringing about this agreement.

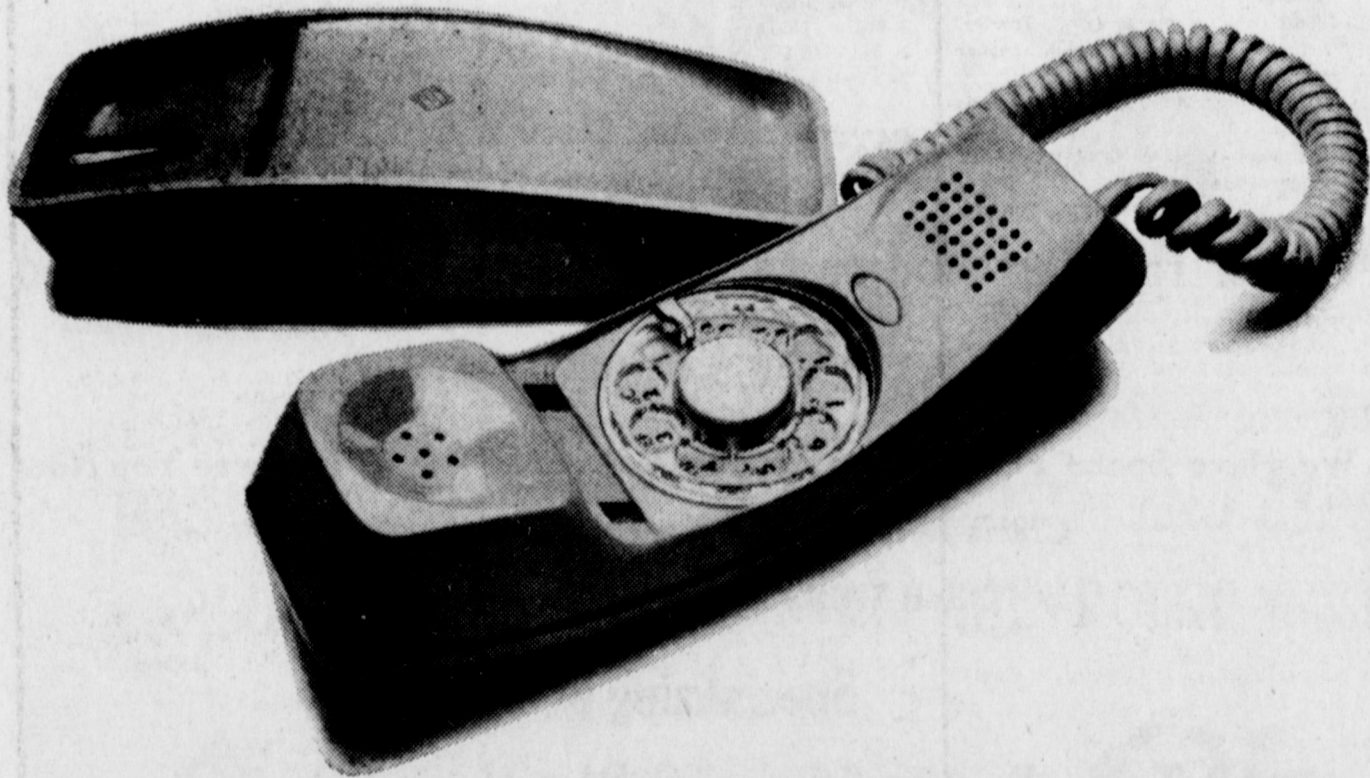

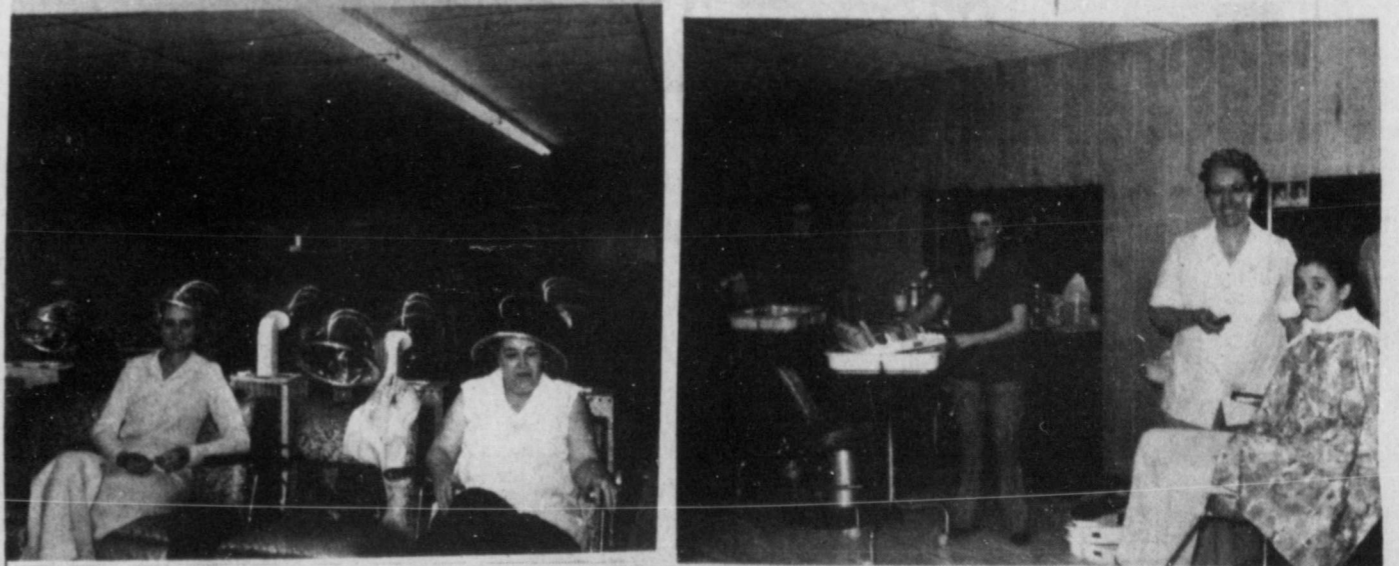

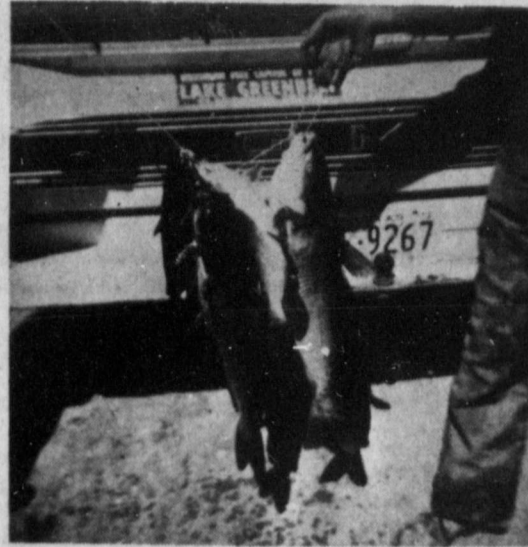

Cotton Classing News

The USDA Cotton Division Classing Office at Altus classed 6,900 samples for the week ending March 8, and the season total stood at 490,300 samples classed. Samples receipts have been decreasing daily, according to C. E. Cox, officer in charge at Altus, and it is believed that only a small percentage of the harvest remains to be classed. A year ago at this time 355,600 samples had been classed, with the harvest only about 95 per cent complete.

Total classed from the Memphis classing territory counties was 298,900 samples, compared with 238,000 at this date last year. These figures included samples classed at both Altus and Memphis classing offices, and this year is the largest single year during the fifteen seasons the Memphis classing office has been in operation.

Grades on Memphis territory cotton classed during the week were 31 per cent White and 62 per cent Light Spotted. Predominant grade was 32, with 39 per cent of the total.

Staples were predominantly 31 and 32, with staple 32 accounting for 68 per cent of the total. Micronaire readings were in the 3.5 to 4.9 range on 63 per cent of the samples. Thirty-six per cent was low mike and one per cent high mike.

LEGAL NOTICE

Pork Referendum and Producer Board Election

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Pork Producers Association, 2422 Tabo, Sherman, Texas 75090, proposes a referendum election on May 14, 1974 under provision of Article 55c, Vernon's Civil Statutes, on the proposition of whether or not the pork producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of 10 cents per head on all slaughter animals to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members of a 15 member commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, predator control, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of pork.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place at Sherman, Texas before midnight on the date of the election.

Any person within this state engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced slaughter hogs for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers. If such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to April 30, 1974 may obtain one at his local County Agent's Office.

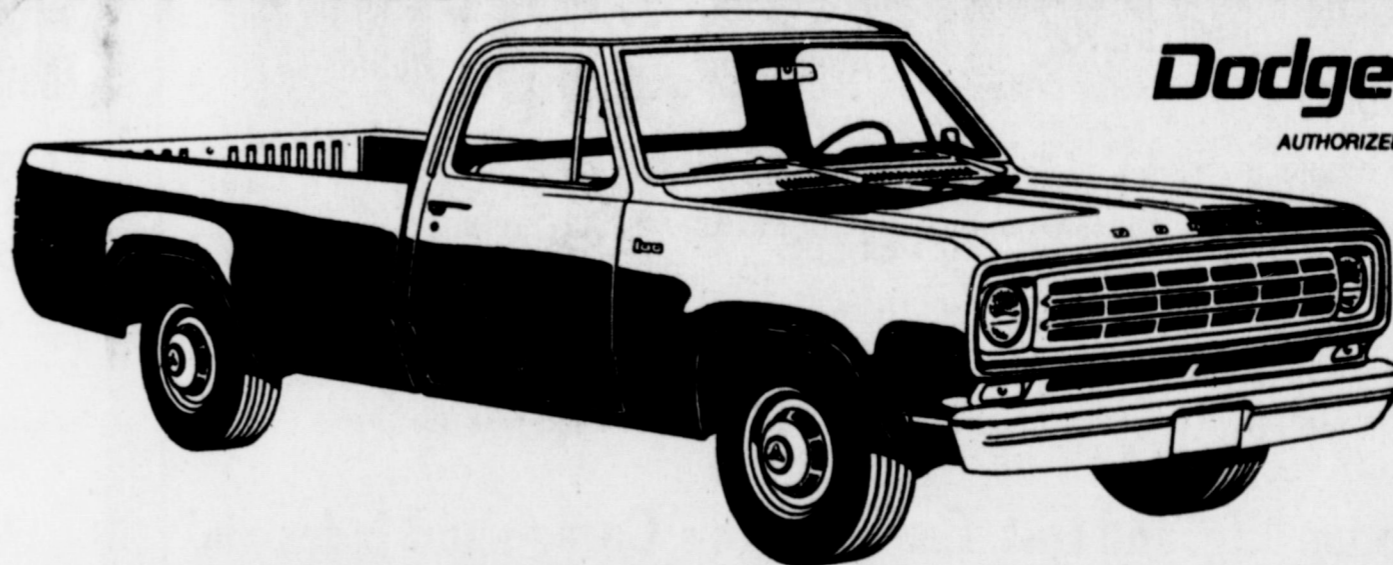
