erendum election on May 14. 1974 under provision of Article 55c, Vernon's Civil Statutes, on proposition of whether or not the pork producers in the State of Texas shall assess mselves a maximum amount of 10 cents per head on all slaughter animals to be collected at the point of first pro-cessing or sale and to elect mbers of a 15 member comodity producers board to administer proceeds of such asessment to be used for re search, predator control, dis-ease and insect control, education, and promotion designed






