Bobby Frank Lindsey is probably the youngest farmer in the Hedley area. At twenty-five years of age, it seems as if he's been farming all his life.

He started helping his father, Frank, before he started school. He helped with moving the equipment and hauling seed as Frank planted. By the time he was eleven,

he was driving the tractor and pulling loads of cotton to the gin with the pickup.

After graduating from high school in 1977, he began farming full time, first with his father, then on his own.

He bought his first land in 1979 when he purchased 77 acres just north of the Hedley city limits. The first year he farmed it, he ginned 57 bales of cotton. The next year, he ginned 43 bales. Last year he only ginned 37 bales. He didn't have any rain from June until

October. It looks as if he'll make a pretty good crop this year, if nothing happens to it. Like all farmers, he tries not to say how much he expects to make for fear of getting a hail the day before he starts pulling or some other such disaster.

In 1981, he bought 317 acres at Lelia Lake. The first year he farmed it, he ginned 83 bales off of the 149 acres of cotton allotment. The next year, the powers that be, cut his cotton allotment to 90 acres and he made 68 bales.

It gets pretty discouraging for a young man when he works twelve to sixteen hours a day battling through drought and insects to raise a cotton crop, and when he finally gets his cotton ginned, has to sell it for less than it costs to buy his seed, fertilizer, equipment, and labor, much less payments on the land and pay the taxes.

But, young men like Bobby Lindsey will keep working, and maybe, someday, the time will come when they can make a living working the land.

Bobby has 120 acres of wheat that made 23 bushels of wheat per acre in 1983, but it only made 15 bushels this year due to the drought.

He has ten head of cows, each with a calf, and hopes they will sell for enough to help with his deficit.

He lives at home with his parents, Frank and Helen, and sister, Jeannie.

With his mother, sister, and other various female relatives handy to do his bidding, he has no plans to take a wife.

Mr. Boliver was born September 28, 1912 in Clarendon. He had been a resident of Hedley since 1917. He was owner and publisher of the Hedley Informer from 1934-1978. At the time of his retirement he ran the only hand set type newspaper in

Texas. Mr. Boliver was a member of the First Baptist Church. He was a former mayor and fire chief of Hedley. Mr. Boliver married Joyce Tinsley, September 28, 1939 at Hedley.

He is survived by his wife, Joyce; two sons, David Edward Jr. of Trenton, N.J. and Jimmy of Amarillo; one sister, Mrs. Pauline Leggett of Hedley; and one granddaughter, Angie Boliver of Amarillo.

After that the two teams started trading punts until the 2nd quarter. A Bronco fumble gave the Roughriders the ball on the Bronco 17 yard line. October 7-13 Fire

Prevention Week

A special reminder from the City of Howardwick Fire Department that October 7 through October 13 is Fire Prevention Week.

They are asking all residents of Howardwick to take a few moments to check a few things in their homes to insure a safe and happy winter.

1. Before using your chimneys or woodburners they recommend that they be cleaned and checked for any lodged material or old dust accumulation that would prevent the proper ventilation.

2. Be sure that all furnaces and or gas heaters be checked. All furnaces should have filters changed and cleaned of all old lint that has accumulated during the spring and summer months while not in use. Gas heaters should be checked and valve turn on's should be tight and not leaking. And always be sure that you have proper ventilation anytime you use gas or propane.

3. Never allow anything that would catch fire to come in contact with your source of heat, such as clothing that you may be trying to dry or towels that may be hanging over your heater in your bathroom. These items may become too hot and ignite a small fire that could spread.

4. DO NOT allow children to stand up to an open face heater trying to get warm. Their clothing can catch fire very fast due to the materials used in their clothing.

It would only take a few moments to check these things in your home and everyone in your home will enjoy a happier and safer winter knowing that you did take the time

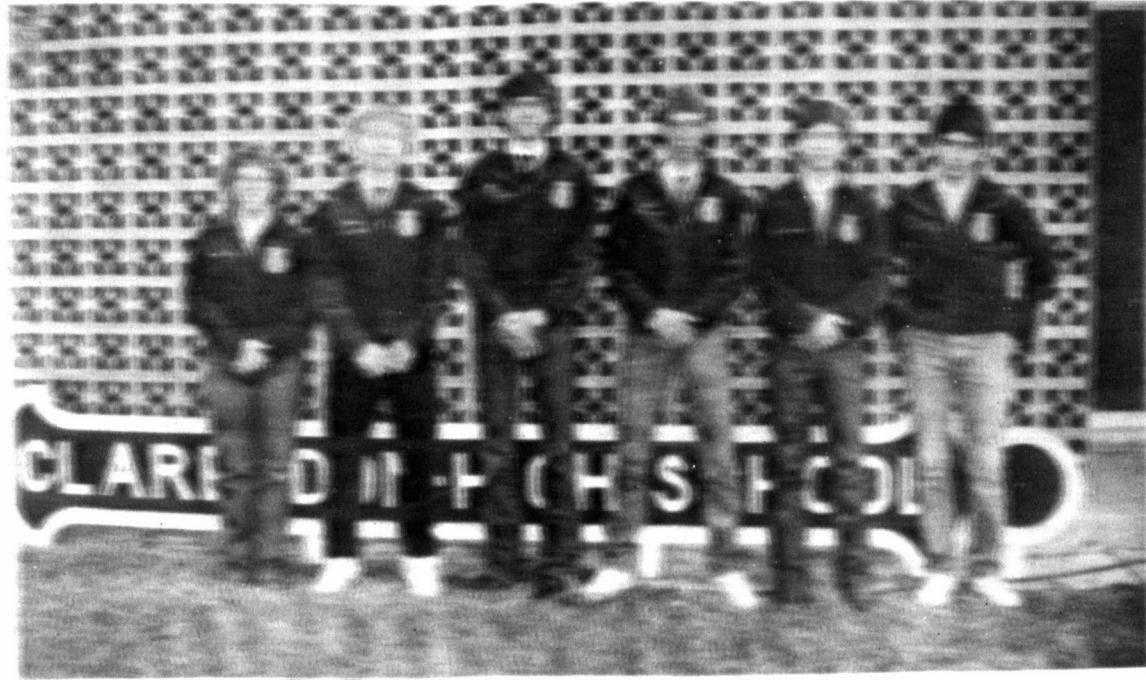
Temperature experiences unreasonable cool temperatures

Tuesday, September 25 the temperature dropped approximately 12 degrees from Wednesday night of 94 to Tuesday night of 82, and by Saturday night the temperature was 70 degrees below the freezing mark of 32.

Parties reported crop around the county received from moderate to heavy damage. Some parts of the

county received heavy rainfall prior to start the growth of the cotton entirely while others stated they received very little damage. One orchard farmer reported the trees in the top of his pecan grove.

The freeze was primarily heavy enough over the county to kill most of the family garden and watermelon patches.

Flora Anne Bozeman Brown, age 94, a long time citizen of Colorado City, passed away on September 27 in a Big Spring Nursing Home. Mrs. Brown was born in Mitchell County on August 31, 1890 to David and Ellen Corley Bozeman. Her father, a pioneer of Mitchell County, homesteaded land in the northwest part of the county, first living in a half-dugout until their permanent home was completed. In 1916 she married John Brown of Albany, Texas and together they lived on the Triangle Ranch, formerly known as the Bush and Tiller Ranch. In 1925 when the children were old enough to attend school, the Browns moved to Colorado City. Mr. Brown died in 1943.

Mrs. Brown was a member of the First Presbyterian Church, Self Culture Club, and the Colorado City Garden Club. In 1970 she was honored as a lifetime member of the Women of the Church. She also taught a Sunday School class for over 50 years.

She is survived by a son, George Reynolds Brown of Horeshoe Bay, and two daughters, Ms. G.R. (Myra) Robinson of Big Spring and Mrs. Tom (Lucy) Saye of Clarendon. Another daughter, Mrs. George (Betty) Christian died in 1957. She is also survived by eight grandchildren, ten great-grandchildren, two sisters, Mrs. Roy

(Alice) Coles of Colorado City and Mrs. C.H. (Viola) Womack of Albuquerque, New Mexico, and several nieces and nephews.

Therefore do not be anxious, saying, "What shall we eat?" or "What shall we drink?" or "What shall we wear?" For the Gentiles seek all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them all. But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things shall be yours as well. *Matthew 6:31-33*
